(From the Gospel Reading of the Sunday of the Fathers of the First Ecumenical Council -Celebrated, this year, on Sunday May 16th)


In this passage, we see that Jesus honored God, the Father, by fulfilling His purpose on earth. We, too, honor God in the same way. When anything in creation fulfills its purpose, it brings glory to God. Birds bring glory to God by flying, chirping, nesting, and doing those things that God intended them to do. In fact, anything created by God brings glory to God when it fulfills the purpose for which it was created. St. Irenaeus described it best when he wrote, "The glory of God is a human being fully alive!"

There are many ways to bring glory to God. I have outlined five specific ways which I would like to share with you. If we can each incorporate these five steps in our lives, we, too, can show God the glory He deserves from us.

The first is to worship Him. Worship is our main responsibility to God. In scripture we read that we should, "Use our whole body as a tool to do what is right for the glory of God." Using our five senses in the Liturgy and other church services is certainly a good start in how to worship God. Our form of worship includes praying both corporally (with others) and privately to Him, singing, praising, bowing and kneeling to Him. Do we ever sing or even hum a church hymn during a regular weekday? Do we ever stop and thank God when we receive some good news? Do we ever get down on our hands and knees to pray to God at the end of a long day, or at the beginning of a new day? Do we ever reverently bow our head when doing our cross or praying before icons? These are all acts of worship we use to express glory to God.

Second is to bring glory to God by loving others. We were all born into God's family. Following Christ is not just a matter of believing. It also includes belonging to and learning to love the greater family of God. As St. Paul wrote "Accept each other just as Christ accepted you; then God will be glorified." It is a daunting task to love others just as they are, without judgment or a desire to change them, but it is our responsibility to learn and understand how to love as God does. As we know, God is love. By loving as He does we pay God the honor He deserves from us. Jesus taught us this when he said, "As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another."

Third, we next bring glory to God by imitating Him. Since we are members of His family, God wants us to grow spiritually. We must endeavor to think, feel, and act like Christ. We can ask ourselves helpful, guiding questions such as; "What would Christ do in this situation?" "Would God be pleased with what I am about to do?" or "What would I do if Christ were standing right here next to me?" The more we develop Christ-like qualities, the more we bring glory to God. In the Bible we read, "As the Spirit of the Lord works within us, we become more and more like him and reflect his glory even more."

The fourth way to glorify God is by serving others with our gifts. Each one of us was uniquely designed by God with talents, gifts, skills, and abilities. God did not give us our gifts for selfish reasons. They were given to benefit others. All our gifts are given that we may benefit one another. St. Peter wrote in his First Epistle, "God has given gifts to each of you from his great variety of spiritual gifts. Manage them well so that God's generosity can flow from you,"... and he continues, "Are you called to help others? Do it with all the strength and energy that God supplies. Then God will be given glory."

Finally, we bring glory to God by telling others about Him. We must not keep God a secret from the world which so desperately needs Him. As we willingly tell others about a new book we have read or film we have seen, with that same eagerness we should share what we know and love about our Lord. We should be confident to share our own personal experiences of God's grace in our lives. When we speak from the love and joy in our heart, God's love will be evident to others. He expects us to share His message with others. The Bible states, "As God's grace brings more and more people to Christ...God will receive more and more glory."

Jesus was faced with a difficult decision towards the end of his three-year ministry. Would he fulfill His purpose and bring glory to God, or would He look for the comfortable way out. We know what our Lord did. We, too, are faced with similar decisions to make. Will we choose comfort and ease, or will we live the rest of our lives for God's glory, knowing what he has promised us? Are we going to live for ourselves or God? The decision is ours.

President Message



Christos Anesti! It is a time of hope and renewal as we all have experienced another blessed and joyous Easter. The Easter services followed a very spiritually fulfilling and meaningful Lenten period, where we were led once again by our spiritual leader, Father Peter. This is the time of year when I receive my Lenten pledge let-

ter completed on the first day of Lent. This has become an important annual ritual at St. Anthony that causes us to strive to fulfill and build upon our commitments and spiritual goals.

The first special event of the spring was the Pentahilliarko (Pente) dinner dance, held April 24 at the Altadena Town & Country Club. Special thanks to John and Terese Caire and also Stephanie Soewers for co-chairing the wonderful event. This was a fun evening with great food, fun and fellowship.

The month after the Pente is our famous Golf Tournament, which will be held on May 21 at Brookside Park in Pasadena. Jimmy Christos and Ted Vavoulis are co-chairing, and they will once again provide a very fun and innovatively festive tournament. If you haven't participated, whether as a golfer, volunteer or just a spectator, it is a lot of fun. Many non-parishioners have told me it's the best tournament they have played in, and this year I finally learned how to play golf so that I can actually take part in this tremendous tournament! Special thanks to Ted Attala for loaning me his spare set of clubs. This is an important fundraiser, with all proceeds going to the building program.

The final special event of the spring is a new one, and equally exciting as the others. We will be hosting what will be an annual family picnic on Sunday June 6 after church. The picnic will be at Lacy Park in San Marino where we have reserved a large seating area and athletic fields. Lacy Park is a beautiful setting for this event, and will feature music, activities for the kids, young and old. Our family picnics, whether at Easter time or part of our 50-year celebration, have always been very enjoyable, and we look forward to making this a very special annual event for the whole community. The picnic

will also mark and celebrate the end of the Sunday school year. Special thanks to Perry Vidalakis and John Buzas for co-chairing the Family Picnic.

There continues to be good news on the building project for our new Parish Center. Yesterday was the appeal hearing in front of the Los Angeles County Planning Commission. As I mentioned in my last message, our project was approved by the county by the Regional Planning hearing officer in February. That decision was appealed, by a lone neighbor, to the LA County Planning Commission. On April 14, the Commissioners voted unanimously 4-0 to deny the appeal and uphold the approval. In issuing their ruling, the Commission was very supportive of our project. Father Peter prepared an effective opening statement to the Commission (page 5).

In terms of the project itself, we finalized all design plans and have entered into the construction drawing phase. We will begin interviewing contractors in May, and will present the budget and the overall project for approval in early June. The progress is very exciting, and I will have a lot more detail and information in next month's President's message. Stay tuned!

And, finally, we are getting ready to launch the new St. Anthony website. The new site will be a major step forward with greatly enhanced design, content and features. Look for the email announcement for the launch of the new site. Each section, whether it be Sunday School, Building Committee, Greek School, Dance Groups, GOYA, etc., will need updated content. For the new website, we are asking that the Group leaders and co-leaders take ownership of the website content for their group. The new site will be a dynamic one, with constant upkeep with new and revised content needed throughout the year.

As you can see, there are a lot of very exciting things happening right now at St. Anthony. Please plan on taking advantage of all these wonderful opportunities for fellowship, volunteer work, and stewardship.

Opening Comments by Father Peter in Support of the St. Anthony Building Project; Los Angeles County Planning Commission

Good afternoon. The Greek Orthodox Church is the second largest Christian denomination (300 million faithful) worldwide. The foundation of our faith is based on Holy Scripture and Church Tradition.

That is why this building is so important for our congregation now. Our current facility is aging and dilapidated. It is not complaint with ADA and other codes and is therefore inadequate to the task of providing an adequate environment for our faithful and to serve the needs of the greater community. The community of Saint Anthony needs this building so that we can all work towards our spiritual goal of eternal salvation.

The Church has been at this location for over 50 years. We purchased the property from another church. The hall has been at this location for 45 years. We are simply building a modern building so that we can continue our existing ministry and community service. This request for CSD modification is simply to locate the new building as far


north as is reasonable for all concerned.

The Saint Anthony community is extremely active in its service to those outside its immediate reach. Each of our groups has done wonderful works of service, charity and donation in our local community, the Pasadena area, our state, our country and throughout the world. Just to mention a few of the projects, our Ladies Philanthropic "Friends of the Poor" donated incubators to Methodist Hospital Pediatric ICU just two years ago and our youth groups raised money for an annual Walk-a-Thon called 'Kids Helping Kids with Cancer'. Many of our parishioners serve meals, on a monthly basis, at Union Station, and our parish adopts families and orphans each year from area cities and LAYN.

This community hall is and will be the hub of learning and Christian service, in conjunction with our liturgical worship in the Church. As it stands, the existing community hall is inadequate to the task of teaching and practicing the faith of giving to others. The new facility will be an asset, not only to the St. Anthony Parish, but to the "greater" community.

(Note: The Planning Commission unanimously upheld the approval of St. Anthony's Project at the end of this hearing, April 14, 2010).



Youth Corner: Mr. Christos Kanakis - Hunger Strike



On March 21st, a group of our GOYANS participated in the Hunger Strike which was hosted at Saint Paul Greek Orthodox Church in Irvine, along with GOYANS from the parishes in Southern California.

The Hunger Strike's purpose was to raise

money for the children in Tanzania as they were sponsored to participate, collect food for the orphans for Project Mexico, be informed of the tragedy of hunger in the world, and learn how their Orthodox faith and good works go hand-inhand. While everyone was made sure to be hydrated with water and Gatorade, all the participants gave up food to experience an empty stomach for the day.

The GOYANS began the day by placing plastic forks in an area of grass and painted their finger-prints on a banner to represent the children who have passed away as a result of hunger.

After becoming acquainted with one another, they were divided into small groups to learn about how all human beings throughout the world are made in the image and likeness of God and how we are all living icons.

Next, each participant of the Hunger Strike was given a profile passport of a child in Tanzania, which described how they live and how a normal day in their life is like. Everyone had the chance to reflect on his or her worst and best day and compare with that of a Tanzanian child.

After an activity of learning how to sing an African song on being "Christ's Ambassadors," the youth, led by their chaperones, went door to door to collect canned food and nonperishables for the orphans for Project Mexico. It was impressive to see the zeal and determination of the participants as they collected a large amount of food.

The youth also learned and participated in making the offering bread that is used for Holy Communion and Antidoron called *prosforo*, and

then learned how the Gifts for Holy Communion were prepared.

Water is an extremely important element for survival, and the GOYANS learned how the Church sanctifies water, like when Christ was baptized and sanctified the River of Jordan. The sad reality is that the people in Africa do not have the same resources of water as we do in the United States, and people have to carry water from miles away. After having a 'water race' where each group had to compete with one another to carry water from one side of the field to the other with a cup on each person's head, the youth experienced how important it was to transfer water without spilling a drop.

After the lesson on the sanctity and importance of water, Fr. Steve officiated an *Agiasmo* service, where the youth prayed over the water for Christ to sanctify, and everyone was blessed with the Holy Water.

By the end of day, everyone reflected and prayed for a child in Tanzania, and the evening was concluded with a memorial service for all who passed away from hunger in Africa.

After breaking their day of fasting from food, the GOYANS ate koliva from the memorial service and the *prosforo* they had learned to make and slept in the Church under the dome of Christ. The next day everyone shared their experience with the community in Church on Sunday and with their family and friends at home.

We are all proud of our GOYANS for participating in this inspiring event. We will plan to have our own Hunger Strike next year at Saint Anthony.






On March 3rd, the goyans spent their night feeding the homeless at Union Station. It was a great feeling to give back to the community.



Bible Study Corner—Doubting Thomas John 20:19-31



During the month of March, our Bible study group was on a modified sabbatical. Instead of continuing with our studies, we attended the Catechism classes that were being presented by Christos Kanakis and Philip Lanergan. It was during one of these classes that certain questions arose regarding the faith, the Church and

the Bible in relation to its divine inspiration. I grasped from these questions that the person possessed true sincerity in desiring to receive truthful answers to the questions. Questions are appropriate and most welcomed when it comes to the authenticity of our faith, and these questions caused me to take pause and to think about my own faith. Is my faith steadfast and secure, or could it be shaken by the open hostility displayed by the secular and unbelieving culture of today? This led me to the assigned Gospel reading for the Sunday of Thomas that is found in **John 20:19-31**. After all, it was from him that the phrase, "**Doubting Thomas"** was coined.

In this Gospel lesson, Jesus appeared to His disciples: however, Thomas was not present. He received a report from the other disciples that Jesus appeared to them but he remained skeptical. "The other disciples therefore said to him, 'We have seen the Lord.' So he said to them, 'Unless I see in His hands the print of the nails, and put my finger into the print of the nails, and put my hand into His side, I will not believe. (John 20:25).' Thomas wants a thorough examination of Christ's wounds before he is willing to believe the story of his fellow disciples. Eight days transpire, and Jesus once again appears to His disciples. This time Thomas is present, and Jesus singles him out. "Then He said to Thomas, 'Reach your finger here, and look at My hands; and reach your hand here, and put it into My side. Do not be unbelieving, but believing. (John 20:27)' Thomas then makes an incredible proclamation of faith and adoration towards Jesus as he responded with complete assurance and deep conviction, "And Thomas answered and said to Him, 'My Lord and my God. (John 20:28)' Blessed Theophylact states in relation to this proclamation, "But when Thomas cries out, my Lord and my God, he confesses Christ's divine essence and affirms that the names Lord and God refer to one and the same Person." Basically, with the words "my Lord and my God," Thomas summarized John's reason for writing his Gospel, "but these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in His name. (John 20:31)"

But what was the reaction of Jesus in response to the words of Thomas, "Jesus said to him, "Thomas,

because you have seen Me, you have believed. Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed. (John 20:29)" Regarding Thomas' doubt. the Orthodox Study Bible writes, "The doubt of Thomas is described in the Church hymns as "blessed," for it was not a doubt of resistance to truth, but one that desperately desired a truthful answer—a doubt which gave birth to faith when the answer was revealed. In hymns of the Church, Christ says to Thomas, "Your doubt will teach My Passion and Resurrection to all," and we affirm that his doubt "brought the hearts of believers to knowledge." The conversion of Thomas' doubt into faith led him to the clearest confession of Christ's divinity, addressing Jesus as my Lord and my God. (John 20:28)"

Jesus wasn't hard on Thomas for his doubts. Despite his skepticism, Thomas remained loyal to his fellow believers and to Jesus Himself. It is encouraging to know that Jesus had a personal interest in and loving concern for Thomas. He wanted to strengthen his faith and include him in the blessings that lay in store for His followers. Thomas reminds us that unbelief robs us of blessings and opportunities. In today's society it is deemed sophisticated and intellectual to question what Jesus did, but such questions are usually evidence of stubborn hearts and not of searching minds. However in Thomas we can observe that some people need to doubt before they believe. If doubt leads to questions, questions lead to answers, and the answers are accepted, then doubt has done a good work. It is when doubt turns into stubbornness and a hardened heart that creates an environment and lifestyle that will consequently harm one's faith. Many of us throughout our lifetime have experienced or will experience levels of doubt, but we shouldn't stop there. We should let our doubts deepen our faith as we continue to search for the answer. In Thomas I am reminded that the skeptic is not rejected by Godthat when one possesses doubts or uncertainties he or she will not be automatically rejected by Christ. I am able to observe in this Gospel reading that Jesus willingly comes to us, to show us His hands and side that we might believe. So if you have any doubtsshare them. Jesus will come to you, and when you recognize Him, you will bow down with Thomas, and cry, "My Lord and my God!" Everyone, believers and non-believers alike live by faith. The difference is in the object of faith. As Orthodox Christians we put our faith in God and His Word, while the unbelievers put their faith in themselves. As we who believe yet have not seen be reminded of the special blessing and words of our Savior, "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed. (John 20:29)"


