

## PRIEST'S MESSAGE

On Sunday June 23rd we celebrated **The Feast of All Saints** in our Holy Orthodox Church. The Feast of All Saints marks the beginning of a new season in the ecclesiastical calendar of our Church. The season from Easter to Pentecost occurs in the springtime, while the Feast of All Saints ushers us into the beautiful season of summer.

Summertime! Students and teachers have completed another school year and people are thinking about their vacations. Many have already begun to enjoy outdoor activities, sports, cookouts, and trips to the beach. To be sure, responsibilities do not end. Some painting may have to be done and landscaping continues. Their is always something to be done. Nevertheless, summertime is a time of sun, enjoyment, and a more relaxed pace.

In our culture the change of seasons creates a paradox for the new liturgical cycle. From Easter to Pentecost the local parish is usually vibrant with activities. But after Pentecost and the Feast of All Saints, with the beginning of summer, the pace usually slows down. Church Schools end. Meetings are less frequent. Bible classes and other study groups take a break. Even worship is drastically affected. As I often say in Church: "God does not take the summer off!"

Is this what the Lord truly desires for His people during the summer? How can we in our personal, family, and parish lives harmonize the summer change of pace with the orthodox spiritual values of the Church? How can we truly enjoy a rightful measure of fun and relaxation and still be mindful of our prayer life and worship to God?

An understanding of the word "Saint" would help us to relate our Christian faith to our summer activities. It is not an exaggeration to say that, if we truly understand the full meaning of sainthood, we would have the key to the most enjoyable summer of them all: A Christian summer! It may be that, by God's providence, the timing of the Feast of All Saints is exactly what we need, after all! What greater spiritual challenge is there for us at the beginning of the summer than to think about the Saints and to emulate their lives of growing closer to God.

I challenge us all to keep God in our mind, in our heart, and in our soul during this beautiful time of year. Have a blessed summer.

## **VBS XIX**

#### Roar! Life is Wild - God is Good

There were seven rotations: Opening prayer/ music, Imagination Station, Bible Adventure, Stampede Sports, Kid Vid Cinema, Hungry Herd Café and Safari Celebration.

#### Bible Adventure, Experiencing God's Word

One memorable Bible point was reinforced each day. Kids explored God's goodness and celebrated Bible adventures through our Orthodox faith.

<u>Day One: When life is unfair – God is good</u>. Bible point: Israelites were slaves for the Egyptians (Exodus 5:6). Each day a poster was put up and referred to during and after being presented with the Bible story. The preschool children built towers out of blocks and tried to make it as tall as the could. To demonstrate how heavy a brick could be we passed around a very heavy object. Older students made towers by building bricks from mud (recipe upon request). Each group built their unique tower by sharing their ideas and creativity, followed by discussion on how do you think the Israelites felt doing all the hard work and the being treated badly by the taskmasters.

<u>Day two: When life is scary-God is good</u>. Bible point: Moses asks Pharaoh to let his people go, each time he said no. Finally God sends plagues on Egypt (Exodus 7:14-12:32). Both groups learned about the ten plagues through repetition and visuals, visuals being a variety of candy to demonstrate a plague i.e. red for water turning into blood, black for darkness, etc.

<u>Day Three: When life changes-God is good</u>. The Red Sea parted and we walked through safely although the Pharaohs chariots and soldiers did not make it across. The Israelites entered the wilderness. They complained and whined about why Moses brought them to this wilderness and did not have enough food. God was good he sent them manna and quail to eat. He told them to fill one jar with manna. Our manna was frosted flakes and our quail was marshmallows dipped in chocolate.

<u>Day Four: When life is good- God is good.</u> We crossed the Jordan River taking the Ark of the Covenant carried by children; we put inside the ark the jar of manna, the Rod of Aaron and the Ten Commandments. After we crossed the Jordan River we built a memorial to remember God's goodness using twelve stones to represent the twelve tribes of Israel.

Philoptochos oversees this outreach and seeks the participation of community members. Our commitment is the **first Wednesday of each month, once a month, 6:45 PM to approximately 8:45 PM.** There is no food preparation. You can bring dessert (ie: cookies, brownies etc.) for sixty clients.

Duties include plating food and minimal clean up. There is a commercial dishwasher or you may bring heavy duty paper plates.

Please consider signing up to serve at Union Station Adult Center. Three to four people generally will be sufficient to serve and clean up.

Dates available: July 3, August 7, September 4, October 2, November 6, and December 4.

All dates are on a Wednesday from 6:45 PM to 8:45 PM.

## **Check List for Adult Center Servers**

Food will be in the ovens in OFF position. If it needs to be warmed up, turn on ovens to 300 degrees.

Juice and milk will be in the refrigerator.

- Check with night staff for the number to be served.
- Ask what time to begin serving clients dinner.
- Wash hands, long hair tied back or wear a hairnet
- Count as many plates that will be needed (55-60). Use gloves when in direct contact with food.
- Fill approximately 6 pitchers with punch and 2 with milk
- Union Station Homeless Services clients will set up their tables and bus them also.
- Organize an assembly line just before serving time. Begin preparing dinner plates and line up on serving counter.
- **Do not start** by being too generous with portions; attempt to keep evenly portioned. If food is left over they may have second servings.
- Set aside 5-7 plates for late comers.
- When food has been served, start preparing dessert, when possible give dessert with meal
- Leftovers: Consolidate, cover, label type of food, date and put into refrigerator.
- Clean up counters, dishes are usually scraped by clients if not rinse prior to placing in dishwasher. Leave kitchen orderly and clean.
- Do not bring anything back. Leave food and dispose aluminum containers.

## Saint Anthony 's VIPs collect non-perishable foods for the Foothill Unity Center.

The Foothill Unity Center was founded in 1980 and is the primary provider of food, case management/crisis help and access to health care resources across eleven San Gabriel Valley cities in Los Angeles County. As the federally designated Community Action Agency for the Foothill Area, they operate two locations in Monrovia and Pasadena, serving clients in Pasadena, Altadena, South Pasadena, Sierra Madre, Arcadia, Monrovia, Bradbury, Duarte, Azusa, Baldwin Park and Irwindale. 79% of their clients are at or below the National Poverty Level. The number of people served by the organization has more than tripled over the last five years, making community funding contributions and volunteer support more critical than ever.

# Metropolitan Nikitas Elected Archbishop of Thyateira and Great Britain



## FEASTS & SAINTS OF THE MONTH

#### Cosmas and Damian

## 1 July

These Saints, who are different from those who are celebrated on the 1st of November, were from Rome. They were physicians, freely bestowing healing upon beasts and men, asking nothing from the healed other than that they confess and believe in Christ. They ended their life in martyrdom in the year 284, under the Emperors Carinus and Numerian.

## Saint Euphemia, the Great Martyr

## 11 July

In 451, during the reign of the Sovereigns Marcian and Pulcheria, the Fourth Ecumenical Council was convoked in Chalcedon against Eutyches and those of like mind with him. After much debate, the Fathers who were the defenders of Orthodoxy, being 630 in number, agreed among themselves and with those who were of contrary mind, to write their respective definitions of faith in separate books, and to ask God to confirm the truth in this matter. When they had prepared these texts, they placed the two tomes in the case that held Saint Euphemia's relics, sealed it, and departed. After three days of night-long supplications, they opened the reliquary in the presence of the Emperor and found the tome of the heretics under the feet of the Martyr, and that of the Orthodox in her right hand.

## Fathers of the 4th Ecumenical Council

## 14 July

On the Sunday that falls from the 13th to the 19th of the present month, we chant the Service to the 630 Holy and God-bearing Fathers who came together for the 4th Ecumenical Council assembled in Chalcedon in 451, to condemn Eutyches and Dioscorus. Eutyches taught that there was only one nature, the divine, in Christ after the Incarnation. Dioscorus, Patriarch of Alexandria, llegally received Eutyches back into communion and deposed Saint Flavian, Patriarch of Constantinople, who had excommunicated Eutyches.

## Saint Marina

#### 17 July

This Martyr lived during the reign of Claudius II (268-270). She was from Pisidia of Cilicia and was the only daughter of a certain priest of the idols. On being orphaned by her mother, she was handed over to a certain woman who instructed her in the Faith of Christ. When she was fifteen years old, she was apprehended by the ruler of Olmbrius, and when asked her name, homeland, and faith, she answered:

"My name is Marina; I am the offspring of the Pisidia; I call upon the Name of my Lord Jesus Christ."

Because of this, she endured bonds, imprisonment, and many whippings. She was finally beheaded in the year 270.

Saint Marina is especially invoked for deliverance from demonic possession.

## Saint Prophet Elias

## 20 July

Elias of great fame was from Thisbe or Thesbe, a town of Galaad (Gilead), beyond the Jordan. He was of priestly lineage, a man of a solitary and ascetical character, clothed in a mantle of sheep skin, and girded about his loins with a leather belt. His name is interpreted as "Yah is my God." His zeal for the glory of God was compared to fire, and his speech for teaching and rebuke was likened unto a burning lamp. From this too he received the name Zealot.

Therefore, set aflame with such zeal, he sternly reproved the impiety and lawlessness of Ahab and his wife Jezebel. He shut up heaven by means of prayer, and it did not rain for three years and six months. Ravens brought him food for his need when, at God's command, he was hiding by the torrent of Horrath. He multiplied the little flour and oil of the poor widow of Sarephtha of Sidon, who had given him hospitality in her home, and when her son died, he raised him up. He brought down fire from Heaven upon Mount Carmel, and it burned up the sacrifice offered to God before all the people of Israel, that they might know the truth. At the torrent of Kisson, he slew 450 false prophets and priests who worshipped idols and led the people astray. He received food wondrously at the hand of an Angel, and being strengthened by this food he walked for forty days and forty nights. He beheld God on Mount Horeb, as far as this is possible for human nature. He foretold the destruction of the house of Ahab, and the death of his son Ohozias; and as for the two captains of fifty who were sent by the king, he burned them for their punishment, bringing fire down from Heaven. He divided the flow of the Jordan, and he and his disciple Elisseus passed through as it were on dry land; and finally, while speaking with him, Elias was suddenly snatched away by a fiery chariot in the year 895 B.C., and he ascended as though into heaven, whither God most certainly translated him alive, as He did Enoch (Genesis 5:24; IV Kings 2: 11).

But from thence also, after seven years, by means of an epistle he reproached Joram, the son of Josaphat, as it is written: "And there came a message in writing to him from Elias the Prophet, saying, Thus saith the Lord God of David thy father, Because thou hast not walked in the way," and so forth (II Chron. 21:12). According to the opinion of the majority of the interpreters, this came to pass either through his disciple Elisseus, or through another Prophet when Elias appeared to them, even as he appeared on Mount Tabor to the disciples of Christ.

# Mary Magdalene, Myrrh-bearer and Equal to the Apostles 22 July

Saint Mary was from Magdala in Galilee on the Sea of Tiberias, and for this was named Magdalene. When the Lord Jesus cast out seven demons from her, from which she had been suffering, she became His faithful and inseparable disciple, following Him and ministering unto Him even to the time of His crucifixion and burial. Then, returning to Jerusalem together with the rest of the Myrrh-bearers, she prepared the fragrant spices for anointing the body of the Lord. And on the Lord's day they came very early to the tomb, even before the Angels appeared declaring the Resurrection of the Lord. When Mary Magdalene saw the stone taken away from the tomb, she ran and proclaimed it to Peter and John. And returning immediately to the tomb and weeping outside, she was deemed worthy to be the first of the Myrrh-bearers to behold the Lord arisen from the dead, and when she fell at His feet, she heard Him say, "Touch Me not."

After the Lord's Ascension, nothing certain is known concerning her. Some accounts say that she went to Rome and later returned to Jerusalem, and from there proceeded to Ephesus, where she ended her life, preaching Christ. Although it is sometimes said that Saint Mary Magdalene was the "sinful woman" of the Gospel, this is nowhere stated in the tradition of the Church, in the sacred hymnology, or in the Holy Gospels themselves, which say only that our Lord cast seven demons out of her, not that she was a fallen woman.

## Dormition of Anna, Mother of the Theotokos

## 25 July

According to tradition, Anna, the ancestor of God, lived for sixty-nine years, and her spouse Joachim, for eighty. According to one account, Saint Joachim died two years before Saint Anna. The Theotokos had been orphaned of both her parents already when she was eleven years of age, while she was living in the Temple. Saint Anna is invoked for conceiving children and for help in difficult childbirth.

#### Saint Paraskeve

## 26 July

Saint Paraskeve, who was from a certain village near Rome, was born to pious parents, Agatho and Politia. Since she was born on a Friday (in Greek, Paraskeve), she was given this name, which means "preparation" or "preparedness". (Compare Matthew 27:62, Mark 15:42, Luke 23:54, and John 19:31, where 'Friday' is called "the day of the preparation")

From childhood she was instructed in the sacred letters and devoted herself to the study of the divine Scriptures, while leading a monastic life and guiding many to the Faith of Christ. During the reign of the Emperor Antoninus Pius, she was apprehended because she was a Christian and was urged to worship the idols, but she answered with the words of Jeremiah: "Let the gods that have not made heaven and the earth perish from off the earth" (Jeremiah 10:11).

Because of this she endured exceedingly painful torments, and was beheaded in the year 140. The faithful pray to her for the healing of eye ailments.

## Saint Panteleimon, the Great Martyr

## 27 July

This Saint, who had Nicomedia as his homeland, was the son of Eustorgius and Eubula. His father was an idolater, but his mother was a Christian from her ancestors. It was through her that he was instructed in piety, and still later, he was catechized in the Faith of Christ by Saint Hermolaus and baptized by him. Being proficient in the physician's vocation, he practiced it in a philanthropic manner, healing every illness more by the grace of Christ than by medicines. Thus, although his parents had named him Pantoleon ("in all things a lion"), because of the compassion he showed for the souls and bodies of all, he was worthily renamed Panteleimon, meaning "all-merciful."

On one occasion, when he restored the sight of a certain blind man by calling on the Divine Name, he enlightened also the eyes of this man's soul to the knowledge of the truth. This also became the cause for the martyrdom of him who had been blind, since when he was asked by whom and in what manner his eyes had been opened. In imitation of that blind man of the Gospel he confessed with boldness both who the physician was and the manner of his healing. For this he was put to death immediately. Panteleimon was arrested also, and having endured many wounds, he was finally beheaded in the year 305, during the reign of Maximian.

Saint Panteleimon is one of the Holy Unmercenaries and is held in special honor among them, even as Saint George is among the Martyrs.






