

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PRIEST'S MESSAGE

See Jesus Only!

If one were to ask the average Orthodox Christian: "What time of year do you go to Church multiple times a week, outside of normal Sunday services?", the typical answer would probably reference Great Lent or Holy Week. However, in the month of August, the average Orthodox parish has anywhere from 10-20 liturgical services outside of Sundays. Of course, the bulk of this is due to the Paraklesis (or Supplication) services to the Theotokos, asking for her intercessory prayers as we prepare for the Feast Day of her Dormition on August 15th. With this, in the month of August we also commemorate a number of beloved saints' feastdays, such as St. Phanourios (August 27) and the Beheading of St. John the Baptist (August 29). We are also blessed to celebrate one of the 12 Great Feasts of our Church, with the Holy Transfiguration of our Lord and Savior on August 6. If we read the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke, we read the events which lead up to our Lord's Transfiguration on Mt. Tabor, when Christ asks His disciples 'who do you say that I am?' to which Peter and the disciples proclaim Him to be the Messiah, the Christ of God. And just before the time of the Transfiguration, He tells them just what must happen to the Son of God—that He will be delivered into the hands of man, and will be crucified and killed.

It is right before our Lord is preparing to go to His voluntary Passion and Crucifixion that He is Transfigured. In our own life we cannot enter into the joy of the Transfiguration unless we are prepared to accept the Cross. This is made very clear in the service of Baptism and Chrismation of new Orthodox Christians into the Church. Even if the newly baptized is an infant, one of the first things they are given is a cross to wear! Until we take up our own cross, we are not fully ready to follow Christ.

After the disciples Peter, James, and John had seen our Lord Transfigured in glory and splendor, notice the Gospel of Matthew points out "when they lifted up their eyes, they saw no one but Jesus only." The Lord does not always appear in radiant glory to all who stand before Him. To the beginner, He appears in the form of a servant, to those able to follow Him as He climbs the mountain, he appears in the form of God, the form in which he existed before the world was created. It is possible for the same Lord to not appear in the same way to all who stand before Him, but to appear to some in one way and to others in another way, according to the measure of each person's faith. The Messiah was expected to be a figure of glory and brilliance and those who thought Jesus might be the true Messiah were puzzled by His ordinary appearance, but this stumbling block was removed for the inner circle of Jesus' disciples. When they lifted their eyes, they saw no one, but Jesus only.

Being a disciple in this world is to attach yourself to the person of Jesus. We must see Jesus only, in His humility. If we are so blessed to have these lightning flash moments of the Transfiguration in our life, maybe some of you even have some kind of transformative miracle story that rejuvenated your faith at the time... but the truth is, they do not last... and we must immediately find Jesus where he is normally found, in the midst of our everyday, humble, and sometimes mundane lives and duties.

Having seen three persons before, Jesus, Moses, and Elijah, they now see one person, no longer requiring to be strict adherents to the Old Testament Law of Moses, and no longer anticipating the prophecies of Elijah. For in the person of Jesus Christ, we no longer follow the law, but the lawgiver Himself, and we no longer anticipate the prophecies, but follow the fulfillment of all prophecies.

May we always have our eyes, our hearts, and our minds, fixated on Jesus only! Amen!

The Philoptochos Society of Saint Anthony, Panagia Chapter Scholarship Award

In 2001, the beginning of a new millennium, Philoptochos established **The Philoptochos Society of Saint Anthony Panagia Chapter Scholarship Award** to recognize high school graduates from Saint Anthony community. The scholarship is reflective of the mission of Philoptochos, assisting and recognizing the youth of our church. They are our future, sustaining our faith and promoting philanthropia.

The scholarship committee evaluates applications using a rubric one to five, which rates applicants on: leadership, extracurricular activities, citizenship, character, academic achievement and participation in the life of the church. All information is confidential.

Philoptochos has presented 56 scholarships in the last 18 years. Michael Demopulos received the first scholarship and is currently a fully credential high school history teacher. A list of all our recipients can be found on the next page. Years 2003, 2005, and 2006 had no applicants for the scholarship.

Among our recipients, many pursued higher degrees, lawyers, doctors, teachers, professors, researchers, speech therapists, physical therapists, financial advisors and investors, engineers and myriad of majors created by our technological age.

Philoptochos continues to keep you in our prayers with the hope you are using your knowledge to change the world for the better, to make an impact on society and the people around you, to improve the lives of those less fortunate than you or who don't have a voice and faithfully practicing your devotion of your Orthodox beliefs.

Philoptochos oversees this outreach and seeks the participation of community members. Our commitment is the **first Wednesday of each month, once a month, 6:45 PM to approximately 8:45 PM.** There is no food preparation. You can bring dessert (ie: cookies, brownies etc.) for sixty clients.

Duties include plating food and minimal clean up. There is a commercial dishwasher or you may bring heavy duty paper plates.

Please consider signing up to serve at Union Station Adult Center. Three to four people generally will be sufficient to serve and clean up.

Dates available: July 3, August 7, September 4, October 2, November 6, and December 4.

All dates are on a Wednesday from 6:45 PM to 8:45 PM.

Check List for Adult Center Servers

Food will be in the ovens in OFF position. If it needs to be warmed up, turn on ovens to 300 degrees.

Juice and milk will be in the refrigerator.

- Check with night staff for the number to be served.
- Ask what time to begin serving clients dinner.
- · Wash hands, long hair tied back or wear a hairnet
- Count as many plates that will be needed (55-60). Use gloves when in direct contact with food.
- Fill approximately 6 pitchers with punch and 2 with milk
- Union Station Homeless Services clients will set up their tables and bus them also.
- Organize an assembly line just before serving time. Begin preparing dinner plates and line up on serving counter.
- **Do not start** by being too generous with portions; attempt to keep evenly portioned. If food is left over they may have second servings.
- Set aside 5-7 plates for late comers.
- When food has been served, start preparing dessert, when possible give dessert with meal
- Leftovers: Consolidate, cover, label type of food, date and put into refrigerator.
- Clean up counters, dishes are usually scraped by clients if not rinse prior to placing in dishwasher. Leave kitchen orderly and clean.
- Do not bring anything back. Leave food and dispose aluminum containers.

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VIP NEWS

Saint Anthony 's VIPs collect non-perishable foods for the Foothill Unity Center.

The Foothill Unity Center was founded in 1980 and is the primary provider of food, case management/crisis help and access to health care resources across eleven San Gabriel Valley cities in Los Angeles County. As the federally designated Community Action Agency for the Foothill Area, they operate two locations in Monrovia and Pasadena, serving clients in Pasadena, Altadena, South Pasadena, Sierra Madre, Arcadia, Monrovia, Bradbury, Duarte, Azusa, Baldwin Park and Irwindale. 79% of their clients are at or below the National Poverty Level. The number of people served by the organization has more than tripled over the last five years, making community funding contributions and volunteer support more critical than ever.



His Eminence Archbishop Nikitas of Thyateira and Great Britain

AXIOS to His Eminence Archbishop Nikitas on his recent election by the Holy and Sacred Synod as Archbishop of Thyateira and Great Britain.

Born in Tampa, Florida to Constantine and Kaliope Lulias, Archbishop Nikitas (Lioulias) was active in the church throughout his youth along with his brother, John, who is a renowned teacher and scholar of Greek Folk Dance. Following high school, Archbishop Nikitas studied at the University of Florida where he earned a Bachelor of Arts with Honors in 1976. He then enrolled at Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology, graduating in 1980 with a Master of Divinity with Honors. Archbishop Nikitas pursued additional graduate studies at the University of Thessaloniki for two years. He was a Rotary International Graduate Scholar from 1980 – 1981 and a Graduate Scholar, Ministry of the Exterior, Greece, from 1981 – 1982. He further studied the Russian language at the St. Petersburg Theological Seminary in Russia, from late 1992 to mid-1993.

Following his ordination to the priesthood, he was assigned as the Associate Pastor at Saints Constantine and Helen Greek Orthodox Cathedral in Merrillville, Indiana. In 1987, he became the Chancellor of the Greek Orthodox Diocese of Chicago, Illinois, and later served at the parish of Saint Demetrios in Chicago. During this same time he also served as a Lecturer in Orthodox Theology at Loyola University in Chicago.


Archbishop Nikitas was elected by the Holy and Sacred Synod of the Ecumenical Patriarchate to serve as the Metropolitan of Hong Kong and Southeast Asia, a position he held from December 1996 through August 2007. While in Hong Kong he also served as a Lecturer in Orthodox Theology and Liturgy at the Holy Spirit Catholic Seminary in Hong Kong from 1999 – 2007.

Upon his appointment as the Director of the Patriarch Athenagoras Orthodox Institute (PAOI), he was named Metropolitan of the Dardanelles and a Hierarch of the Ecumenical Throne. He served at the PAOI from 2007 – 2019, where he was also a Lecturer in Orthodox Theology.

Archbishop Nikitas serves the Mother Church in Constantinople in numerous important areas including: Coordinator of the Patriarchal Task Force on Human Trafficking and Modernday Slavery; Chairman of the Committee on Youth for the Ecumenical Patriarchate; and Co-Chair and Steering Committee member of the Elijah Inter-Faith Foundation. He has also received numerous commendations for his involvement and leadership in interfaith dialogue.

Archbishop Nikitas is well-known in the Metropolis of San Francisco having served for an extended period at the parishes of Ascension Cathedral in Oakland and Saint Nicholas Church in San Jose. He also visited many other communities on the west coast and is respected as a strong leader and visionary for the Orthodox Church.

A gifted preacher and teacher, Archbishop Nikitas is fluent in English, Greek (Koine, Katharevousa, and Demotic), and Russian. He also has a working command of Latin, Church Slavonic, and Spanish.











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








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
















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




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




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




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FEASTS & SAINTS OF THE MONTH

Dormition Fast 1 August—14 August

The commemoration of the Dormition of the Theotokos and the preparation for the Feast begin on August 1 with a period of fasting. A strict fast is followed on most of the days (no meat, dairy, oil, or wine), with the exceptions of fish on the Feast of the Transfiguration (August 6) and the day of the Dormition. Oil and Wine are allowed on Saturdays and Sundays.

On the weekdays before the Feast, Paraklesis services are held in most parishes. These consist of the Great Paraklesis and the Small Paraklesis, both services of supplication and prayer for the intercessions of the Theotokos.

Transfiguration of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ

6 August

Our Lord had spoken to His disciples many times not only concerning His Passion, Cross, and Death, but also concerning the coming persecutions and afflictions that they themselves would endure. Since all these evils were near at hand, but the enjoyment of good things which they hoped to receive in their stead was yet to come, our Savior desired to give them full assurance, evidently and openly, concerning that glory which is prepared for those who endure to the end. Therefore, fulfilling that which He had promised shortly before, that "there be some standing here which shall not taste of death, till they see the Son of man coming in His Kingdom" (Matt. 16:28), He took His three foremost disciples and ascended Mount Tabor, where He was transfigured before them. His face shone like the sun, and His clothes became white as the light. Suddenly, together with this dread and marvelous effulgence of light, there appeared those pinnacles of the Prophets, Moses and Elias, who spoke with the Lord Jesus concerning His saving Passion which was about to take place. Standing before Him as reverent servants, they showed that He is the Lord of both the living and the dead, for Moses came forth from Hades, having died many centuries before, and Elias, as it were from heaven, whither he had been taken up while yet alive. After a little while a radiant cloud overshadowed them and out of the cloud they heard that same voice which had been heard at the Jordan at the Baptism of Christ, testifying to the Divinity of Jesus and saying: "This is My beloved Son, in Whom I am well-pleased; hear ye Him" (Matthew 17: 5).

The Dormition of our Most Holy Lady the Theotokos and Ever Virgin Mary

15 August

Concerning the Dormition of the Theotokos, this is what the Church has received from ancient times from the tradition of the Fathers. When the time drew nigh that our Savior was well-pleased to take His Mother to Himself, He declared unto her through an Angel that three days hence, He would translate her from this temporal life to eternity and bliss. On hearing this, she went up with haste to the Mount of Olives, where she prayed continuously. Giving thanks to God, she returned to her house and prepared whatever was necessary for her burial. While these things were taking place, clouds caught up the Apostles from the ends of the earth, where each one happened to be preaching, and brought them at once to the house of the Mother of God, who informed them of the cause of their sudden gathering. As a mother, she consoled them in their affliction as was meet, and then raised her hands to Heaven and prayed for the peace of the world. She blessed the Apostles, and, reclining upon her bed with seemliness, gave up her all-holy spirit into the hands of her Son and God.


Beheading of John the Baptist 29 August

The divine Baptist, the Prophet born of a Prophet, the seal of all the Prophets and beginning of the Apostles, the mediator between the Old and New Covenants, the voice of one crying in the wilderness, the God-sent Messenger of the incarnate Messiah, the forerunner of Christ's coming into the world (Esaias 40: 3; Mal. 3: 1); who by many miracles was both conceived and born; who was filled with the Holy Spirit while yet in his mother's womb; who came forth like another Elias the Zealot, whose life in the wilderness and divine zeal for God's Law he imitated: this divine Prophet, after he had preached the baptism of repentance according to God's command; had taught men of low rank and high how they must order their lives; had admonished those whom he baptized and had filled them with the fear of God, teaching them that no one is able to escape the wrath to come if he does not do works worthy of repentance; had, through such preaching, prepared their hearts to receive the evangelical teachings of the Savior; and finally, after he had pointed out to the people the very Savior, and said, "Behold the Lamb of God, Which taketh away the sin of the world" (Luke 3:2-18; John 1: 29-36), after all this, John sealed with his own blood the truth of his words and was made a sacred victim for the divine Law at the hands of a transgressor.

This was Herod Antipas, the Tetrarch of Galilee, the son of Herod the Great. This man had a lawful wife, the daughter of Arethas (or Aretas), the King of Arabia (that is, Arabia Petraea, which had the famous Nabatean stone city of Petra as its capital. This is the Aretas mentioned by Saint Paul in II Cor. 11:32). Without any cause, and against every commandment of the Law, he put her away and took to himself Herodias, the wife of his brother Philip, to whom Herodias had borne a daughter, Salome. He would not desist from this unlawful union even when John, the preacher of repentance, the bold and austere accuser of the lawless, censured him and told him, "It is not lawful for thee to have thy brother's wife" (Mark 6: 18). Thus Herod, besides his other unholy acts, added yet this, that he apprehended John and shut him in prison; and perhaps he would have killed him straightway, had he not feared the people, who had extreme reverence for John. Certainly, in the beginning, he himself had great reverence for this just and holy man. But finally, being pierced with the sting of a mad lust for the woman Herodias, he laid his defiled hands on the teacher of purity on the very day he was celebrating his birthday. When Salome, Herodias' daughter, had danced in order to please him and those who were supping with him, he promised her -- with an oath more foolish than any foolishness -- that he would give her anything she asked, even unto the half of his kingdom. And she, consulting with her mother, straightway asked for the head of John the Baptist in a charger. Hence this transgressor of the Law, preferring his lawless oath above the precepts of the Law, fulfilled this godless promise and filled his loathsome banquet with the blood of the Prophet. So it was that the all-venerable head, revered by the Angels, was given as a prize for an abominable dance, and became the plaything of the dissolute daughter of a debauched mother. As for the body of the divine Baptist, it was taken up by his disciples and placed in a tomb (Mark 6: 21 - 29).
