



#### PRIEST'S MESSAGE



## SAINT ANTHONY GREEK ORTHODOX CHURCH

Dear Members,

I hope and pray you all had a wonderful summer! As September approaches, we are preparing for a new Ecclesiastical Year. All our groups and ministries are hard at work preparing for the 2019-20 year, especially our Church School educators. It is these devoted instructors who are tasked with teaching our children about our Faith, and I wish to commend them for all that they do for our young people. They spend hours, unseen, preparing their curriculum and lessons for our children. They are committed to being in church each Sunday, prepared for your students directly after Holy Communion. I have been reflecting on our upcoming Church School year and want to share with you all some of my thoughts and about this vital ministry.

I would like to begin with how greatly impressed, and deeply moved, I was this past year with our children's attendance for major holy days in the life of our Church, specifically on the Sunday of Orthodoxy and on Holy Wednesday for Holy Unction. I saw children and families at those services who attend regularly and some that I had not seen all year! Their presence at these services reveals a connection to Orthodoxy. These connections to our Orthodox Faith must be strengthened every week. The world is a hard place. The challenges we, as adults, and our children face are significant. Our greatest source of strength is a living relationship with Christ.

As the new ecclesiastical year begins, we have an opportunity to renew our commitment to our Faith. We must all decide that this is the year we each PUT GOD FIRST! Our children learn by watching what we do. Do we make certain that we bring them weekly into God's presence? Do we make certain we show them the importance of Holy Communion and a personal relationship with Christ? Do we show them how to live a sacramental life? A very thorough academic analysis of "faith communities," of all denominations and religions, concluded that **the** clear indicator of a "Vital Faith Community" is a consistent commitment of the faithful to attend weekly worship services and to bring their children for religious education.

On Sunday, September 8, 2019 we will hold Church School & Youth Ministries Registration. I am counting on you to be at Divine Liturgy that day and to register your school-aged children for Church School. After completing Church School Registration, you will also have an opportunity to learn about, and to sign up for, other youth ministries. These other ministries are offered in order to complement Religious Education, not to stand in its place. They serve as a means for our children to further connect and build strong bonds with other Orthodox Christians.

Christ loves your children and calls them to know Him well. Your Church School educators love your children. We love you all and call you to PUT GOD FIRST! Let us ALL PUT GOD FIRST so there can be no doubt that St Anthony is a Vital Faith Community.

#### **Union Station Homeless Services**

In 1973 a group of community volunteers opened Union Station as a simple hospitality center to serve poor and homeless men in downtown Pasadena. Since then, Union Station has grown..

Under the guidance of Philoptochos for over 25 years our community has participated once a month (rain or shine, holiday or no holiday) providing and serving hot meals for about 50-60 individuals fulfilling what is written in **Hebrews13:16**:

"Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God."

Food is prepared in our kitchen, and then delivered to the center. Other necessities will be purchased and taken to the facility.

Members of our church and our youth groups are encouraged to sign up for one or more month to serve. It only takes one and a half hour of your time.

The main dish will be provided, and the side dishes will be pot luck. Please come for an evening of fellowship with your Philoptochos friends.


If you haven't paid your membership, please do so.



#### FEASTS & SAINTS OF THE MONTH

#### Beginning of the Ecclesiastical Year September 01

For the maintenance of their armed forces, the Roman emperors decreed that their subjects in every district should be taxed every year. This same decree was reissued every fifteen years, since the Roman soldiers were obliged to serve for fifteen years. At the end of each fifteen-year period, an assessment was made of what economic changes had taken place and a new tax was decreed, which was to be paid over the span of the fifteen years. This imperial decree, which was issued before the season of winter, was named Indictio, that is, Definiton, or Order. This name was adopted by the emperors in Constantinople also. At other times, the latter also used the term Epinemisis, that is, Distribution (Dianome).

It is commonly held that Saint Constantine the Great introduced the Indiction decrees in A.D. 312, after he beheld the sign of the Cross in heaven and vanquished Maxentius and was proclaimed Emperor in the West. Some, however (and this seems more likely), ascribe the institution of the Indiction to Augustus Caesar, three years before the birth of Christ. Those who hold this view offer as proof the papal bull issued in A.D. 781 which is dated thus: Anno IV, Indictionis LIII -that is, the fourth year of the fifty-third Indiction.

From this, we can deduce the aforementioned year (3 B.C.) by multiplying the fifty-two complete Indictions by the number of years in each (15), and adding the three years of the fifty-third Indiction. There are three types of Indictions: 1) That which was introduced in the West, and which is called Imperial, or Caesarean, or Constantinian, and which begins on the 24th of September; 2) The so-called Papal Indiction, which begins on the 1st of January; and 3) The Constantinopolitan, which was adopted by the Patriarchs of that city after the fall of the Eastern Empire in 1453. This Indiction is indicated in their own hand on the decrees they issue, without the numeration of the fifteen years.

This Indiction begins on the **1st of September** and is observed with special ceremony in the Church. Since the completion of each year takes place, as it were, with the harvest and gathering of the crops into storehouses, and we begin anew from henceforth the sowing of seed in the earth for the production of future crops, September is considered the beginning of the New Year. The Church also keeps festival this day, beseeching God for fair weather, seasonable rains, and an abundance of the fruits of the earth. The Holy Scriptures (Lev. 23:24-5 and Num. 29:1-2) also testify that the people of Israel celebrated the feast of the Blowing of the Trumpets on this day, offering hymns of thanksgiving. In addition to all the aforesaid, on this feast we also commemorate our Saviour's entry into the synagogue in Nazareth, where He was given the book of the Prophet Esaias to read, and He opened it and found the place where it is written, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me, for which cause He hath anointed Me..." (Luke 4:16-30).

It should be noted that to the present day, the Church has always celebrated the beginning of the New Year on September 1. This was the custom in Constantinople until its fall in 1453 and in Russia until the reign of Peter I. September 1 is still festively celebrated as the New Year at the Patriarchate of Constantinople; among the Jews also the New Year, although reckoned according to a moveable calendar, usually falls in September. The service of the Menaion for January 1 is for our Lord's Circumcision and for the memorial of Saint Basil the Great, without any mention of its being the beginning of a new year.

## The Nativity of Our Most Holy Lady the Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary September 08

According to the ancient tradition of the Church, the Theotokos was born of barren and aged parents, Joachim and Anna, about the year 16 or 17 before the birth of Christ. Joachim was descended from the royal line of David, of the tribe of Judah. Anna was of the priestly tribe of Levi, a daughter of the priest Matthan and Mary, his wife.

#### The Holy & Righteous Ancestors of God, Joachim and Anna September 09

Today, the day following the Nativity of the most holy Theotokos, we celebrate the Synaxis of Saints Joachim and Anna, honoring them as her parents.

#### Exaltation of the Holy Cross / Saint Stavros September 14

Saint Helen, the mother of Saint Constantine the Great, when she was already advanced in years, undertook, in her great piety, the hardships of a journey to Jerusalem in search of the cross, about the year 325. After finding the Tomb of our Lord, and three crosses, it was believed that one must be that of our Lord, the other two of the thieves crucified with Him; but Saint Helen was at a loss which one might be the Wood of our salvation.

At the inspiration of Saint Macarius, Archbishop of Jerusalem, a lady of Jerusalem, who was already at the point of death from a certain disease, was brought to touch the crosses, and as soon as she came near to the Cross of our Lord, she was made perfectly whole. Consequently, the precious Cross was lifted on high for all to venerate.

#### Sophia, Faith, Hope, Love September 17


These Saints were from Italy and contested for the Faith about the year 126, during the reign of the Emperor Hadrian. Faith was twelve years old, Hope, ten, and Love, nine; each was tormented and then beheaded, from the eldest to the youngest. Their mother Sophia mourned at their grave for three days, where she also fell asleep in peace; because of her courageous endurance in the face of her daughters' sufferings, she is also counted a martyr. The name Sophia means "wisdom" in Greek; as for her daughters' names, Faith, Hope, and Love (Charity), they are Pistis, Elpis, and Agape in Greek.

#### Falling Asleep of Saint John the Theologian September 26

This Apostle was from Bethsaida of Galilee, and was the son of Zebedee and Salome, and the brother of James the elder. First a fisherman by trade, he became an Apostle and the beloved Disciple of Christ. Only he of all the Disciples followed Him even to the Cross, and was entrusted with the care of our Savior's Mother, as it were another son to her, and a brother of Christ the Teacher. After this, he preached throughout Asia Minor, especially in Ephesus. When the second persecution against the Christians began in the year 96 during the reign of Domitian, he was taken in bonds to Rome, and there was cast into a vat filled to the brim with boiling oil. Coming forth unharmed, he was exiled to the island of Patmos, where he wrote the Book of Revelation. Returning again to Ephesus after the death of the tyrant, he wrote his Gospel (after the other Evangelists had already written theirs) and his three Catholic Epistles. In all, he lived ninety-five years and fell asleep in the Lord during the reign of Trajan in the year 100. He was called Theologian because he loftily expounded in his Gospel the theology of the inexpressible and eternal birth of the Son and Word of God the Father. It is for this cause that an eagle-a symbol of the Holy Spirit, as Saint Irenaeus says-is depicted in his icon, for this was one of the four symbolic living creatures that the Prophet Ezekiel saw (Ezek. 1:10).







#### The Gospel Book

At every Liturgy we read from one of the four Gospels: Mark, Luke, Matthew and John, all of which were written to convey the life, teachings, crucifixion and resurrection from the dead of our Lord and savior, Jesus Christ.

Adorned out of reverence and largely kept on the altar, the Gospel Book contains *not* the whole Bible but *only* the four



Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. It is a sacramental embodiment of Christ and in the Liturgy is kissed and treated like an icon of Christ, an icon written in words not paint. Traditionally, the bringing out of the Gospels during the Liturgy is said by St. Nicholas Cabasilas, a 14th century mystic and saint, to represent the coming of Christ into the world and His manifestation to the crowds of people who followed Him. The entrance hymn sung by the clergy, taken from Psalm 95:6, professes what our response ought to be to the Lord Jesus: "come let us worship and bow down before Christ."

The centrality of the Gospels in the Liturgy of the Word and their placement on the altar impresses upon us that Christ is the center of the Church and that Christ ought to be the center of our lives. It is through the Gospels that we come to know who Christ is.
