



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# PRIEST'S MESSAGE

#### Dear Faithful,

The **Great Fast or Lent** is a period of preparation leading up to Holy Week and Pascha. The **Lenten Triodion** governs the divine services of Great Lent as well as those of the Weeks of Preparation preceding Great Lent. Lent is an old English word meaning "spring." The Great Fast has come to be called Lent by association because it occurs during spring. It is also called "great" to distinguish it from the other fasts of the liturgical year.

Observance of Great Lent is characterized by abstention from many foods, intensified private and public prayer, personal improvement, and almsgiving. All of these disciplines are important, however I am challenging each of us to focus on one in particular. I am encouraging us all to focus on our personal prayer life during this upcoming Lenten season and Holy Week.

As Orthodox Christians we are expected, and in fact instructed, to pay closer attention to our private prayers to God. Yes, we should practice and follow all of the disciplines during Great Lent, including fasting. However, we must heed the warning of our Fathers of our Church: fasting without prayer is considered "the fast of the demons" since the demons do not eat according to their incorporeal nature, and also they do not pray.

When the faithful approach for Holy Confession, quite often the first thing they utter during their confession is... "I have not been praying." We all struggle with finding the time and the will to pray more, or even at all. That is why, this beautiful and peaceful time of the liturgical calendar is so important. God is inviting us back, waiting at the door as he waited for the Prodigal Son. We read in the Gospel of Matthew 7:7 "Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you."

When asked about prayer and how much we should be praying, I often explain what works for me. Rather than pray the entire Vesper Service in the evening, I focus on a shorter rule of prayer. In my personal experience, I find that my mind wonders when praying a full and long service. Everyone is different, but during my evening prayers I feel more fulfilled when I focus on the "quality" of my prayer life rather that the "quantity." With this in mind, I want each of us - man, woman, child, single person and families to commit to praying the short prayer attributed to St Ephraim the Syrian. Of all Lenten hymns and prayers, this short prayer can be termed the "Lenten Prayer." It would be wonderful, if you could pray the "Lenten Prayer" twice a day: at the beginning of your day when you rise and at the conclusion of your day when you retire.

As we recite the prayer, we make a prostration after each petition of the prayer. These prostrations constitute one of the distinctive characteristics of the entire Lenten worship. As we all experience the difficult effort of spiritual recovery (returning to God), we understand that our Church does not consider our soul separate from our body. Our whole person has fallen away from God and must be restored. Our goal is to restore both body and soul, returning our entire person to God. For this reason the whole person, body and soul, repents. The body participates in the prayer of the soul just as the soul prays through and with the body. Prostrations are a sign of repentance, of humility, of adoration and obedience to God. Thus, this beautiful prayer is described as our "Lenten Prayer." Make this short but fulfilling prayer an important part of your Lenten experience. Pray twice a day. Follow all of the Lenten disciplines. Make this Great Lent a most special time as we all commit to daily private prayers to God in our homes. Have a fruitful and blessed Lenten season!

Dear Faithful,

We are approaching the beautiful season of Great Lent. Lent begins for Orthodox Christians this year on Monday March 15<sup>th</sup> 2021. The two Saturdays before Great Lent begins and the first Saturday of Great Lent, are special days within the Church tradition. These special Saturdays are set, aside for prayers of those who have fallen asleep. In fact all Saturdays are the traditional day of prayer for our loved ones who have passed, because Christ lay dead in the Tomb on Saturday.

These special days are devoted to prayer for departed relatives and other faithful who would not be commemorated specifically as saints of the Church. The Divine Services on these days have special hymns added to them to commemorate the departed. There is a special Memorial Service at the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy, for which Koliva is prepared and placed on a special table in the Church Nave. These Saturdays are March 6, 13 & 20, this year with Orthros beginning at 9 am. and Divine Liturgy at 10 am. (Memorial Service at the conclusion)

Because we are still dealing with a pandemic this year's Divine Services must be treated differently to ensure all participants are safe. We are asking that we all follow these procedures:

- 1. Online Registration will be available on the Monday before the Saturday Services. (If preferred, you may call the church office to register)
- Bring a small bowl of Koliva. Place your prepared Koliva on the special table in the Church Nave. The Koliva will be blessed at the end of the Divine Liturgy. We will <u>not</u> share Koliva after the service. Please, take the blessed Koliva home for your family to enjoy.
- 3. In this mailing you will find a form to fill out the names you would like to be commemorated. You may mail these names to the church office, or bring them to the service. There will be a special basket on the table to place your names. These names will be commemorated at all three services. Please print clearly!

If you should have questions please feel free to call or email the church office. I hope and pray that we all have a blessed Lenten Season.

### FAQs

#### <u>Frequently Asked Questions</u> <u>about Stewardship:</u>

"As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's grace." (1 Peter 4:10)

#### Q: IS THERE A DIFFERENCE BETWEEN "DUES" & "STEWARDSHIP"?

A: Yes! Three or four generations ago, it was commonplace for families throughout our Archdiocese to pay their annual "dues" or required membership fee to be a member of their local parish. Over time it was clear that this was not the healthiest way of committing to a local church as giving remained stagnant and the authentic Christian commitment of sacrificial giving became an afterthought. (note: the annual "dues" of \$300-350 *back then* would equate to roughly \$2,500-\$3,000 *today*) Stewardship, however, offers us the chance to recognize our unique blessings from God, and to give back based on what we have received. Stewardship is management of another's property, and all our blessings and gifts we have been given ultimately belong to God. We are but his caretakers, his priests, his *stewards* on this earth.

#### Q: HOW MUCH SHOULD I GIVE?

A: The foundations of Christian stewardship is both from Scripture and the teachings of our Lord. You may have heard the term *tithing* (the word *tithe* literally means *tenth* in Hebrew), and this refers to the biblical giving goal of 10% of your household income to your local church (Lev. 27:30; Num. 18:25-28; Deut. 14:22-24; 2 Chron. 31:5-6). Yet, we also hear from our Lord Jesus Christ that true giving is when we offer sacrificially "all that we have" (Luke 21:4), "store up your treasures in heaven" (Matt. 6:20), "it is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35), "for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor. 9:7). With this in mind, you are invited to prayerfully reflect on your own household income, and make your sacrificial offering based on what you receive. Consider also what you offer to Christ's Church in comparison to your monthly utility/service payments. ("Am I giving my phone more than my Church?") Use the chart to the right as a guide.

#### Q: WHAT DOES MY STEWARDSHIP PAY FOR?

A: It costs approximately \$2,000/day to keep the church open. Most operating expenses are paid from stewardship. Some examples are mortgage, utilities, office staff and pastoral salaries, candles, permits, and facilities maintenance. Additional costs are directly related to church programs.

#### Q: WHAT IS THE EASIEST WAY TO FULFILL MY PLEDGE?

A: The easiest way is online! Pledging and paying online is fast and EASY and is the preferred method for many of our families. Simply go to our website saint-anthonys.org and click the DONATE button and this will take you to our online giving platform. Under "Regular" click the Make a Donation button, then click Create a Recurring Donation, enter your weekly/monthly/semi-annually amount and fill in the necessary information. You can always call the church office for assistance in setting up easy recurring giving payments. Paying your pledge can also be done by check, envelopes, or credit card payments, though these are not as convenient for you.

#### Q: WHEN SHOULD I MAKE MY ANNUAL PLEDGE?

A: We would ask you to turn in your pledge card by January 31<sup>st</sup>. Our church budget is based on our expected annual income and expenses. Forecasting stewardship in January helps meet our parish goals.

#### Q: I DON'T LIKE TO PAY MY PLEDGE UNTIL DECEMBER. SHOULD I STILL PLEDGE IN JANUARY?

A: Yes. January pledging allows for effective fiscal budgeting. Pledge your annual amount, then pay weekly, monthly, semi-annually or annually.

#### Q: WHY DO I HAVE TO UPDATE MY INFORMATION EVERY YEAR?

A: We ask for updated information to provide you the opportunity to review your pledge for the upcoming year. As cost of living increases every year, so do our own parish expenses, and our giving to the church needs to adjust accordingly. We anticipate automatic online giving to become the standard in order to simplify the process.

#### Q: DOESN'T THE GREEK FESTIVAL BRING IN MOST OF THE FUNDING FOR THE CHURCH?

A: No. While the annual Pasadena Greek Fest is an important source of funding and support, it actually accounts for less than 15% of the total revenue brought in each year. Stewardship raises four times as much and is our primary source of funding for operating expenses. Ultimately, the goal is to have zero reliance on outside sources of funding, which would then make the Festival an outreach and community building opportunity, thus greatly alleviating the stress and dependency of this event.

# Q: I ALREADY PAY FOR GREEK DANCE, GREEK LANGUAGE SCHOOL, BASKETBALL, ETC. WHY DO I HAVE TO PAY STEWARDSHIP TOO?

A: These programs operate independently from the church operating budget. The church provides the facility in addition to expenses enabling their operation and receives no money from these organizations. *It is also important to know that families participating in our children's ministries must be currently pledged stewards.* 

# **Q**: IF I DONATE TO A MEMORIAL FUND, BUILDING FUND, FESTIVAL, OR EVENT, DOES THAT COUNT AS PART OF MY STEWARDSHIP?

A: No. Your stewardship is represented entirely by your stated pledge.

#### Q: IF I MAKE A NON-MONETARY DONATION TO THE CHURCH, CAN THIS REPRESENT MY STEWARDSHIP?

A: No. Your stewardship pledge cannot be substituted for non-monetary donations. However, your various donations to the festival and the church are always greatly appreciated and are tax-deductible.

#### Q: WHEN SHOULD MY CHILDREN BECOME STEWARDS?

A: As the principles of stewardship is that of sacrificial giving from what we have received, everyone is encouraged to become a "cheerful giver" as soon as one begins to generate his/her own income.

#### Q: WHAT IF I OR MY FAMILY EXPERIENCE A FINANCIAL HARDSHIP OR SEVERE CHANGE IN INCOME?

A: Parishioners who are experiencing financial hardships and are unable to fulfill their stewardship obligation, but still want to be considered in "good standing", can always contact the church office, and you may always speak with one of our priests.

*Fact: With our congregation at roughly 300 families, to fully cover our operating expenses our goal is to have average stewardship be \$2,000 per family or above. Right now, <u>83% of our stewards are under that goal.</u>* 

### Church History

Early Greek Community of Pasadena & the San Gabriel Valley Taken from the 50th Anniversary of St. Anthony, 2003. Written by: +Dr. Nikitas J. Tripodes

### Food and Beverage

No occupation is more closely linked to Greek Immigrants than the restauranteur. From the diners of the East Coast to the hamburger stands of Southern California, Greeks were disproportionately represented in independently owned food service businesses throughout North America. Around 1912 -1913, George Malamis became Pasadena's first Greek restaurateur when he took over the American Restaurant at 720 South Fair Oaks Avenue. He was listed as the owner of the business until 1915. Nothing is known about the fate of Malamis or his business. The next Greek owned restaurants in Pasadena appeared in 1924 and were owned by George Kokoris at 133 North fair Oaks Avenue and Theodore Mantas at 540 South Fair Oaks Avenue. The number of Greek owned restaurants slowly increased.

In the 1930's, Peter Alexakis, Peter Becronis, Chris and Spiros Buzas, Dimitrios Gymnaitis, John Koliapoulos, William Makis, James G. Nichols, (Mecca Café) Steve and Cleopatra Pappas, James Paras, John Poulos Theo Ramos, Michael Saines, and Manolis Tavoularis all owned restaurants on Colorado or Fair Oaks Avenue. Vasilios Linard (Linardos) and Anthony Manos had been partners in the Colorado Inn in 1929, but dissolved their partnership and were running separate restaurants by 1938, on Lincoln Avenue and North Lake Avenue.

The end of Prohibition provided a number of Pasadena Greeks with a brand new business opportunity - liquor sales. Restaurants added bars and liquor stores were opened. Tom Haralambos Koumboulesis started Acme Distributing Company, on Raymond Avenue in Pasadena, immediately after Prohibition's repeal in 1933 and was a large scale liquor distributor in Los Angeles, servicing many Greek owned businesses. Haralambos Beverage Company now operates out of Whittier under the direction of Tom's son and grandsons\*. Peter Becronis and the Lafkas family owned several liquor stores in Pasadena in the late 1930s. Sam Heliotes closed his soda fountain and opened a liquor store in 1938. A liquor store added to the many Vaselacopulos businesses on South Fair Oaks Avenue. In 1947, Xenophon Lakios brought his family from Florida and opened Charlie's Liquors on Valley Boulevard in El Monte. Ted Cocores and Peter Kousakis started Ted's Liquors in Monterey Park in 1948. It is still run by the Cocores family today.\*

It should be noted that Greeks ran restaurants, but not "Greek" restaurants. The occasional Greek inspired dish might have popped up as a special, for example, "Greek salads" were on some menus, but the food served was overwhelmingly hearty American fare.

When Greeks went ethnic, it was more often with another nationality's cuisine. The Buzas brothers Spiros and Chris, ran the Oneonta Italian Inn at Fremont and Huntington Drive in South Pasadena from 1937 to 1942. In 1938 Gus Vrahnos opened Pierre's, The House of Crepes Suzette in San Marino.

# Church History (continued)

The 1930s and 40s ushered in the spread of Greek restauranteurs to other parts of the San Gabriel Valley, including George Spanos in El Monte, Gus Zaffiras in San Gabriel, Anton Demos in Monterey Park, and William Poulos' The Corinthian Restaurant on Las Tunas Drive in San Gabriel. Peter Dolkas, Nicholas C. Zaraftis and Alex D. Avouris all owned restaurants on Main Street in Alhambra. Monterey Park had its second Greek owned business in 1946 when Paris (Paraskos) Tripodes took over Parson's Drive-In on Garvey Avenue. Prior to the completion of Interstate 10, Garvey Avenue was the main east-west route linking Los Angeles to the rest of the nation. Capitalizing on Garvey's heavy traffic flow, Paris opened another Monterey Park eatery in 1951 with partner Sam Kruse (Stamtatios Karousos) and a few months later Paris' youngest brother, Louis joined the business. Paris Restaurant served standard American food with a few ethnic specialties, but was often presumed to be a French restaurant. The restaurant was also confused with Paras Restaurant in Pasadena owned by James Paras and George Sarvis.

Two other Tripodes brothers, Gust and Jack, along with brother-in-law Mike Katsaros began Gus's BBQ in South Pasadena in 1947. Greeks were such a novelty in South Pasadena that customers would come in just to see what they looked like. After Jack and Mary Tripodes purchased their South Pasadena home in 1950 they were told the sale would have been blocked if they had not won a (presumably secret) vote of approval by a panel of city fathers. Greeks fared better in South Pasadena than other ethnic groups who were effectively excluded for many years by the town's realtors. The Tripodes family is still in South Pasadena and Gus's, still in family hands\*, is the oldest family run business in town.

Steve Bicos came to Pasadena from the Kalavrytan village of Tourlada (via Chicago) with his uncle James Bicos. They opened Top's Café in 1952, on Colorado Boulevard, in what is now the Playhouse District of Pasadena. Steve later introduced the San Gabriel Valley to his Greek hamburger stand, with the opening of Top's on Main Street in Alhambra in 1963. The Greek owned hamburger stand with an American and Mexican fast food menu, outdoor seating, and generous portions is a Los Angeles creation popularized in the 1950s by a few pioneering Greek immigrants. Today dozens of such Greek owned establishments pepper the San Gabriel Valley and hundreds have spread throughout Southern California.



One of the first consumer television sets in the United States was set up in the restaurant and was a big draw for business.

Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis...

The Orthodox Church year contains feast-days that have fixed dates: the Nativity is December 25, Theophany is January 6, etc. All of these feasts are celebrated on the same date each year. There are also feasts that are movable. Every year they fall on a different date, moving according to when Pascha (Easter) is celebrated. In 2021, Pascha is on May 2. Palm Sunday is April 25. Great Lent begins on March 15. And on February 21, ten Sundays before Pascha, we begin what is called the **Triodion**, a four -Sunday period which we could call "Pre-Lent." In total, there are 19 Sundays per year that revolve around Pascha:

~Four Sundays of Triodion

~Five Sundays in Great Lent

~Palm Sunday

~PASCHA

~Five Sundays of the Paschal season

~Sunday of the Holy Fathers

~Pentecost

~All Saints

In 2021, this cycle begins February 21 and will end with All Saints on June 27.

In modern Christianity, Lent has become about deprivation. Pre-Lent is when you dread what you will deprive yourself of. Lent is when you suffer deprivation. Easter is when you celebrate the end of deprivation. And the rest of the year, you regress to what you were before Lent, happy that the experience is over.

This is not how the Lenten journey is set up in the Orthodox Church, at least ideally. The period of the Triodion is supposed to be a period of planning the changes we hope to make during Great Lent. Great Lent is the time when we enact these changes. Pascha is the time we celebrate the changes we've made. And the rest of the year is a time to maintain our spiritual changes. The cycle then should repeat each year, so that as the years pass, we see marked spiritual growth.

The Epistle lesson from Saint Paul's letter to Timothy brings several thoughts to my mind. Saint Paul mentions how *"you have observed my teaching, my conduct, my aim in life, my faith, my patience, my love, my steadfastness."* (2 Timothy 3:10)

As we begin our journey to the Resurrection, look at each of these things and give yourself a rating on the scale of 1-10 (1 being poor, 10 being excellent). How are you doing on teaching? (Both learning about the faith and teaching others) Is your conduct in line with Christian moral principles? What is your top aim in life—is it salvation or something else? How strong is your faith? How would you rate yourself on patience? Love? Are you steadfast (faithful) in your Christian walk? These are some great questions (albeit challenging ones) to consider as we begin our journey to renewal for Great Lent.

A second point that Paul makes is that *"all who desire to live a godly life in Christ Jesus will be persecuted."* (2 Timothy 3:12) Have you felt "persecuted" over your faith in the past year? If the answer is no, ask yourself why? Do others know about your faith? Does everyone approve? Have you ever told someone you couldn't do something because it wasn't Christian? What was their response?

In 2 Timothy 3:14, he reminds us to *"continue in what you have learned and have firmly believed."* Great Lent is not a time to throw out everything we know, but to build upon what we have learned. Finally, in 2 Timothy 3:15, he reminds us that *"from childhood you have been acquainted with the sacred writings which are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus."* Yes, many of us have been acquainted with christ since childhood. Great Lent, beginning with the Triodion, is a call to deepen our understanding and grow our relationship with Christ.

Let us flee the Pharisee's exalted parlance; let us learn the Publican's humble demeanor, and with sighs unto the Savior cry out and say, To us be gracious, O only forgiving Lord.

#### Judgment Sunday – Meatfare Sunday 7 March

The foregoing two parables -- especially that of the Prodigal Son -- have presented to us God's extreme goodness and love for man. But lest certain persons, putting their confidence in this alone, live carelessly, squandering upon sin the time given them to work out their salvation and death suddenly snatch them away, the most divine Fathers have appointed this day's feast commemorating Christ's impartial Second Coming, through which we bring to mind that God is not only the Friend of man, but also the most righteous Judge, Who recompenses to each according to his deeds.

It is the aim of the holy Fathers, through bringing to mind that fearful day, to rouse us from the slumber of carelessness unto the work of virtue and to move us to love and compassion for our brethren. Besides this, even as on the coming Sunday of Cheese-fare we commemorate Adam's exile from the Paradise of delight -- which exile is the beginning of life as we know it now -- it is clear that today's is reckoned the last of all feasts, because on the last day of judgment, truly, everything of this world will come to an end.

All foods, except meat and meat products, are allowed during the week that follows this Sunday.

### Forgiveness Sunday 14 March

The Holy Fathers have appointed the commemoration of Adam's exile from the Paradise of delight here, on the eve of the holy Forty-day Fast, demonstrating to us not by simple words, but by actual deeds, how beneficial fasting is for man, and how harmful and destructive are insatiety and the transgressing of the divine commandments. For the first commandment that God gave to man was that of fasting, which the first-fashioned received but did not keep; and not only did they not become gods, as they had imagined, but they lost even that blessed life which they had, and they fell into corruption and death, and transmitted these and innumerable other evils to all of mankind. The God-bearing Fathers set these things before us today, that by bringing to mind what we have fallen from, and what we have suffered because of the insatiety and disobedience of the first-fashioned, we might be diligent to return again to that ancient bliss and glory by means of fasting and obedience to all the divine commands. Taking occasion from today's Gospel (Matt. 6:14-21) to begin the Fast unencumbered by enmity, we also ask forgiveness this day, first from God, then from one another and all creation.

#### Sunday of Orthodoxy

#### 21 March


For more than one hundred years the Church of Christ was troubled by the persecution of the Iconoclasts of evil belief, beginning in the reign of Leo the Isaurian (717-741) and ending in the reign of Theophilus (829-842). After Theophilus's death, his widow the Empress Theodora (celebrated Feb. 11), together with the Patriarch Methodius (June 14), established Orthodoxy anew. This ever-memorable Queen venerated the icon of the Mother of God in the presence of the Patriarch Methodius and the other confessors and righteous men, and openly cried out these holy words: "If anyone does not offer relative worship to the holy icons, not adoring them as though they were gods, but venerating them out of love as images of the archetype, let him be anathema." Then with common prayer and fasting during the whole first week of the Forty-day Fast, she asked God's forgiveness for her husband. After this, on the first Sunday of the Fast, she and her son, Michael the Emperor, made a procession with all the clergy and people and restored the holy icons, and again adorned the Church of Christ with them. This is the holy deed that all we the Orthodox commemorate today, and we call this radiant and venerable day the Sunday of Orthodoxy, that is, the triumph of true doctrine over heresy.



#### Sunday of St. Gregory Palamas

#### 15 March

This divine Father, who was from Asia Minor, was from childhood reared in the royal court of Constantinople, where he was instructed in both religious and secular wisdom. Later, while still a youth, he left the imperial court and struggled in asceticism on Mount Athos, and in the Skete at Beroea. He spent some time in Thessalonica being treated for an illness that came from his harsh manner of life. He was present in Constantinople at the Council that was convened in 1341 against Barlaam of Calabria, and at the Council of 1347 against Acindynus, who was of like mind with Barlaam; Barlaam and Acindynus claimed that the grace of God is created. At both these Councils, the Saint contended courageously for the true dogmas of the Church of Christ, teaching in particular that divine grace is not created, but is the uncreated energies of God which are poured forth throughout creation: otherwise it would be impossible, if grace were created, for man to have genuine communion with the uncreated God. In 1347 he was appointed Metropolitan of Thessalonica.

He tended his flock in an apostolic manner for some twelve years, and wrote many books and treatises on the most exalted doctrines of our Faith; and having lived for a total of sixty-three years, he reposed in the Lord in 1359.

His holy relics are kept in the Cathedral of Thessalonica. A full service was composed for his feast day by the Patriarch Philotheus in 1368, when it was established that his feast be celebrated on this day. Since works without right faith avail nothing, we set Orthodoxy of faith as the foundation of all that we accomplish during the Fast, by celebrating the Triumph of Orthodoxy the Sunday before, and the great defender of the teachings of the Holy Fathers today.


#### Annunciation of the Theotokos

#### 25 March

Six months after John the Forerunner's conception, the Archangel Gabriel was sent by God to Nazareth, a town of Galilee, unto Mary the Virgin, who had come forth from the Temple a mature maiden (see Nov. 21). According to the tradition handed down by the Fathers, she had been betrothed to Joseph four months. On coming to Joseph's house, the Archangel declared: "Rejoice, thou Full of Grace, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women." After some consideration, and turmoil of soul, and fear because of this greeting, the Virgin, when she had finally obtained full assurance concerning God's unsearchable condescension and the ineffable dispensation that was to take place through her, and believing that all things are possible to the Most High, answered in humility: "Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to thy word." And at this, the Holy Spirit came upon her, and the power of the Most High overshadowed her all-blameless womb, and the Son and Word of God, Who existed before the ages, was conceived and became flesh in her immaculate body (Luke 1:26-38).



Bearing in her womb the Uncontainable One, the blessed Virgin went with haste from Nazareth to the hill country of Judea, where Zacharias had his dwelling; for she desired to find Elizabeth her kinswoman and rejoice together with her, because, as she had learned from the Archangel, Elizabeth had conceived in her old age. Furthermore, she wished to tell her of the great things that the Mighty One had been well-pleased to bring to pass in her, and she greeted Elizabeth and drew nigh to her. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, she felt her six-monthold babe, Saint John the Baptist, prophesied of the dawning of the spiritual Sun. Immediately, the aged Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and recognized her as the Mother of her Lord. The Virgin also, moved by a supernatural rejoicing in the spirit, glorified her God and Savior, saying: "My soul doth magnify the Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Saviour," Luke 1:39-55 Page 42
