



### PRIEST'S MESSAGE

Dear Clergy and Faithful of the Metropolis of San Francisco,

#### "For where two or three are gathered together in My name, I am there in the midst of them." Matthew 18:20

By now you are aware of the updated guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for those **fully vaccinated** against COVID-19, which many states and localities are adopting. The CDC has stated that **people in the United States** <u>who have been</u> <u>fully vaccinated</u> can resume pre-pandemic activities, indoors and outdoors, without wearing a mask and with no social distancing, except where required by local or state guidelines or business restrictions.

In following the guidelines of the CDC, we will no longer be requiring reservations for services. Our parishes should continue safety measures (hand washing, social distancing, masks) as they deem appropriate and in accordance with local and state guidelines. Parishes may continue to offer live-streaming services.

As Christians, we have an ethical obligation to protect all people. Those not fully vaccinated are recommended to continue to wear masks in order to protect themselves and others from potential exposure. As faith, trust, and love are guiding principles for us as Orthodox Christians, we will not ask nor require proof of vaccination.

We must demonstrate respect and love as a Christian family to all our brothers and sisters in Christ, some of whom may wish to continue to wear masks during worship. There are still groups of people unable to be vaccinated (children under 12) as well as others who may have a condition or take medications that weaken the immune system and, even though vaccinated, may not be fully protected. Even after vaccination, some may need or merely wish to continue taking all precautions.

We have navigated through the unchartered waters of the pandemic for 16 months, and I am profoundly grateful to our clergy and faithful in our entire Metropolis for their patience and cooperation with regard to the adherence of federal, state and local guidelines to ensure the health and safety of our congregations.

Praying that our Lord God may continue to grant us His Divine love and protection, as we continue to worship Him with one mind, one heart, and one voice, I remain,

# CHURCH HISTORY

### Early Greek Community of Pasadena & the San Gabriel Valley

Taken from the 50th Anniversary of St. Anthony, 2003. Written by +Dr. Nikitas J. Tripodes and submitted to newsletter by Anthia Lucas

### <u>The Icaríans</u>

In 1945, the Tripodes brothers, Paris, Gust and Jack and their brother-in-law Mike Katsaros, all originally from the Aegean island of Icaria, left their homes in Cleveland, Ohio and embarked on a systematic exploration of various California cities, and Phoenix, Arizona, with the intent of moving their families to a warmer climate. During their voyage of discovery, it was decided they would move to the suburbs east of Los Angeles. They informed their surprised spouses of their decisions and soon, they were all living in Monterey Park. Tom and Assimina Glaros, from Ohio and Gust and Kalliope Horaites from Chicago, moved in 1947. Tom and Gust, like many Icarians in the east were painters, and soon started a house painting business. Within a few years many more Icarian transplants from eastern cities were moving to Southern California, most of whom were settling in Alhambra, San Gabriel, South Pasadena and San Marino.

Unlike the earlier Greek residents of the Pasadena area, the Icarian immigrants came from established Greek communities in Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Pennsylvania and New York and were active in the church and Greek community organizations, especially the Ahepa.

Most of the Icarian settlers had been members of one of the chapters of the Pan-Icarian Brotherhood which began in 1903 in Pittsburg and is the oldest Hellenic organization in the Americas. In January 1950, a new chapter of the Pan-Icarian Brotherhood was started at the home of Stelios and Anastasia Horaites in Alhambra. In the early years of the club, special events were held at the Lion's Club Hall in Monterey Park. For the club's first 30 years, dinner meetings were held on an almost monthly basis at the homes of members. As the membership expanded, meetings were more likely to be held at a restaurant or St. Anthony's Hellenic Cultural Center. The club still holds an annual "Icarian Independence Day" Picnic around July 17, in South Pasadena.

From an initial membership of twelve immigrant men, the club currently has over 200 multi-generational members of both sexes spread over much of Southern California. Despite the insularity of the Pan-Icarian Brotherhood in its early years, its members were extremely active in the general Greek community. Early Greek organizations in the Pasadena area such as the Ahepa and Philoptochos were founded with many Icaria members. They formed an early nucleus of support for the establishment of a Greek Orthodox church in the San Gabriel Valley. Members of the local Icarian community provided over a quarter of the funds pledged by individuals for the purchase of the original church property and since then, have been well represented in all phases of its growth and maintenance. Despite the continuous dispersion of the Icarian community, St. Anthon's is still regarded as the spiritual home of the club and continues to be a site of its activities.

### <u>АНЕРА</u>

Hundreds of mutual aid societies were formed by immigrants from a particular village, island or area of Greece across North America by the early 1900s. These were usually the first Hellenic organizations to form in United States cities. As the local immigrant communities became better established, members organized churches, but uniting the Greek diaspora into a national organization was a daunting challenge. Various early attempts at forming a Pan-Hellenic organization ultimately failed.

Anti-immigrant sentiments were common throughout the United States and Greeks were sporadic targets of racist organizations. In 1922, the American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association was formed in Atlanta, Georgia, partly to rebuff anti-immigrant sentiments by purporting to "Americanize the Greeks". Despite its efforts, and public displays of American patriotism, the AHEPA was at its core a purely Hellenic organization devoted to preserving and expanding Greek culture in the United States and Canada.

In time auxiliary organizations included Daughters of Penelope for women, Sons of Pericles for young men and Maids of Athena for young women. By 1950 over 360 AHEPA chapters had been established in all 48 contiguous states and many Canadian provinces.

By 1950, Los Angeles County had AHEPA chapters in Los Angeles, San Pedro, Long Beach and Hollywood. Many of the post-World War II Icarian transplants to the San Gabriel Valley had been active AHEPA members in Chicago and Cleveland, providing a natural foundation for a new AHEPA chapter. Enough charter members were recruited from local Greek community and the ranks of the Hellenic Society, so that on April 23 1950, the Rose Bowl Chapter #373 of the Order of AHEPA was instituted. By December of that year the women's auxiliary, Daughters of Penelope, Adrasteia Chapter #233 was founded. In the 1950s, youth auxiliaries of the Sons of Pericles, Chapter #234 and Maids of Athena, Alethia Chapter #135 would be formed. The Pasadena chapters of the Sons and Maids were the first groups formed for the San Gabriel Valley's Greek youth.

Early meetings and special events were held at the Odd Fellows Hall in South Pasadena or the American Legion Halls in Pasadena and South Pasadena. The Daughters held weekly sewing meetings at members' homes to make clothes for the Red Cross, knit afghans for disabled veterans, and prepare food packages for Greek soldiers serving in Korea. The chapter also adopted a 12-year-old Greek orphan and sent supplies to various orphanages in Greece.

The newly formed Pasadena AHEPA and Daughters of Penelope chapters became a main focus of Greek social life in the Pasadena area. In 1951, the Pasadena Ahepans hosted a large regional AHEPA conference with a banquet, fashion show and Greek Glendi, for the general Greek community. In July of 1951, a well-attended ball featuring a twenty-piece orchestra helped raise money for gift packages for Greek American soldiers serving in Korea.

The presence of well organized, active AHEPA and Daughters chapters in Pasadena invigorated Pasadena's growing Greek community. Both organizations would be very involved in the formation and support of the St. Anthony's community and would maintain unusually strong ties to the church. The Pasadena AHEPA continues to function as a support organization for Saint Anthony Church by sponsoring annual fundraisers.

The activities and crafts were creative and reinforced Holy Week.


It is difficult to play games when not in person but both of you were able to involve the children virtually.




### VIP NEWS

### Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis...

#### The Parable of the Talents

He also who had received the one talent came forward, saying, 'Master, I knew you to be a hard man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you did not winnow; so, I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground Here you have what is yours.' But his master answered him, 'You wicked and slothful servant! You knew that I reap where I have not sowed, and gather where I have not winnowed? Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and at my coming I should have received what was my own with interest. So, take the talent from him, and give it to him who has the ten talents. For to everyone who has will more be given, and he will have abundance; but from him who has not, even what he has will be taken away. Matthew 25: 24-29

Years ago, at summer camp, we did a session on this parable. Each cabin group that participated had approximately 18 campers. For an icebreaker, we gave each cabin a fifty-piece puzzle to do. We gave each camper a random number of pieces—some got five, some got three, some got two, and one camper got one piece. No one really knew who had received how many pieces. We quietly asked the camper with the one piece to sit quietly by and to put his piece in last.

The campers then got to work on the puzzle. Those who had more pieces thought they had more power and more say in how the puzzle was going to come out. However, they quickly realized that no one had more than ten percent of the puzzle to contribute. It then became more of a collaborative effort, which was good to see. The camper who had the one piece sat off to the side, mostly unnoticed by his cabin mates. Perhaps they assumed he's already put in his pieces. Perhaps they just lost track of him in their enthusiasm for getting the project done. And perhaps they just forgot about him because he was quiet, and they were not.

Eventually, the campers had forty-nine of the fifty pieces of the puzzle. Before they could become excited for what they had accomplished—ninety eight percent of the puzzle was done—they quickly became concerned about the missing piece. They wondered if it was lost. They worried they would not finish the puzzle. They were frustrated because this one piece was the most beautiful piece in the puzzle—they could even tell that before the piece was put in.

We asked the person who had the missing piece to put it in. It was the most beautiful piece of the puzzle. It made the puzzle complete. Without it, there would have been a gaping hole in the middle of the puzzle. Everyone cheered on the camper as he put in that final piece, and the cabin rejoiced together, every camper equally, it seemed, that the task had been accomplished. We then discussed the experience.

The camper who had the one puzzle piece said that he felt alone and isolated during most of the icebreaker. He was not included in the conversation or the planning. In the end, he held the piece that made the whole thing come together. No, he did not have five pieces, no he was not loud, no he was not included. But without him, the puzzle could not be complete.

In God's plan of salvation, everyone has at least one piece of the puzzle to put in. It may be large or small, it may be a corner or an edge or a middle piece. It may be colorful, and it may be plain. However, no one did not receive at least one piece of the puzzle to contribute.

We cannot fixate on what we do not have. We cannot let jealousy and envy about what we do not have impact how we use what we do have. Of the three servants in the Parable of the Talents, there was no one who received nothing. Everyone received something. And in our icebreaker of the puzzle pieces, there was no one who received nothing. Everyone needs to contribute what they have for the good of the puzzle. Everyone who contributes and everything that is contributed is important, because without all the pieces, even the seemingly plain ones, the puzzle would be incomplete. And everyone needs to contribute because everyone has something to contribute. We need to celebrate and encourage everyone because we need everyone to do their share so that the puzzle is complete.

In the Gospel Parable, the man who had received the one talent did nothing with it. He claimed to have been afraid of the master. Maybe he lacked confidence, maybe he did not think the master had much faith in him because he only entrusted him one talent. Maybe he was angry that he had only received one talent. The lesson of that man is that fear is not an excuse, nor is anger, jealousy, or laziness. There is no excuse to not use the talents God has entrusted us with.

This parable is especially meaningful in my own life. For many years of my childhood, I felt a call to the priesthood. At first, it was a very pleasant thought. I dreamed of wearing vestments and doing services. I was an altar boy, I went to many services, I got to wear altar boy vestments. The priesthood, for a young child, was like the dream job. As I got older and considered the ramifications of becoming a priest, it started to seem like a nightmare. There was a lot more to being a priest than just going to church on Sundays. Taking a bit part serving in the altar was a far cry from leading a congregation. And the worst part of the whole thing would be the separation from family, first going to the Seminary in Boston, and then being sent wherever the church needed a priest to serve. I began making up a list of reasons to not be a priest, to not answer a call that I knew I had. I realized which piece of the puzzle I was holding, and spent a long time wishing I were holding something else.

I had never read the Bible all the way through until I was in college. When I stumbled on the Parable of the Talents, it frightened me. I read it repeatedly. I started reading it daily. I realized that I had a call, a talent entrusted to me, to be a Greek Orthodox priest. What would happen if I did not follow it? Certainly, the master would be angry and disappointed. If the ticket to salvation is in part how we have used our talent, not answering the call could cost me my salvation. And for what? Being afraid of the cold winters in Boston, being afraid of where I might get sent to serve. This parable was the passage of Scripture that helped me answer my call, to use my talent to serve as a priest.

What is your talent? What is the piece of the puzzle that you hold? Are you eager to put it into the puzzle of society? Hesitant? Afraid? Angry that it is not another piece? Do you think your piece is not important?

God gave everyone at least one talent. Each person holds at least one piece to the puzzle. Fear is not an excuse not to put it in. We should have an incentive to honor and encourage all people, because each person has at least one piece to contribute to the puzzle. It might seem like an inconsequential piece, like the guy who delivers the food to the market. But remove that guy who gets us our food and we would all die. Some quiet and shy person sitting in the corner of the lunchroom with no one to talk to might be the one who will eventually cure cancer. But if they are too lonely, they might withdraw and not do much, thinking they have nothing to offer. Therefore, it is vitally important to encourage and include everyone, because we do not know which pieces each of us is holding.

One more comment on puzzles. The puzzle of our society and puzzle of our salvation are so big that we cannot possibly see all of it. I gave the example one time of a puzzle covering the grounds of our church. Some of the puzzle would be in the church sanctuary, some in the hall, some on the back field. If one is in the church, he or she cannot see the backfield. Just like in our world, we do not see all facets of everyone's life. I am not familiar with water treatment plants, as an example, but they are very important in my life. Without clean water, I would die in a few days. The guy who works at the water treatment plant does not see the cancer surgeon, who does not see the priest, who does not see the scientist, who does not see the teacher, and so on. Each of us needs to place his piece(s) in the puzzle of humanity to make the big picture, which God sees, complete. So instead of wondering why we received one piece and not another, why we have one piece and not five, and why we can only see the puzzle in the church but not on the backfield, let us do our best with the piece(s) we have received, trusting that God will reward us for what we have done and what we see.

Lord, thank You for the talents You have entrusted me. (List them)

Help me to be a good steward of my talents, using them to Your glory and using them to help my fellow man.

Help me not to be afraid to use what I have been given.

Help me to be content with what I have rather than wishing for talents I do not have.

Even though I cannot see the whole picture of Your plan for salvation, give me the strength to do my part to contribute to the good of all people.


May I honor You this day and always with what You have given me.

# FEASTS & SAINTS OF THE MONTH

Cosmas & Damian, Unmercenaries

### 1 July

These Saints, who are different from those who are celebrated on the 1st of November, were from Rome. They were physicians, freely bestowing healing upon beasts and men, asking nothing from the healed other than that they confess and believe in Christ. They ended their life in martyrdom in the year 284, under the Emperors Carinus and Numerian.

### Kyriaki the Great Martyr

### 7 July

Saint Kyriake was the daughter of Christian parents, Dorotheus and Eusebia. She was given her name because she was born on Sunday, the day of the Lord (in Greek, Kyriake). She contested in Nicomedia during the reign of Diocletian, in the year 300. After many bitter torments she was condemned to suffer beheading, but being granted time to pray first, she made her prayer and gave up her holy soul in peace.

### Euphemia the Great Martyr

### 11 July

In 451, during the reign of the Sovereigns Marcian and Pulcheria, the Fourth Ecumenical Council was convoked in Chalcedon against Eutyches and those of like mind with him. After much debate, the Fathers who were the defenders of Orthodoxy, being 630 in number, agreed among themselves and with those who were of contrary mind, to write their respective definitions of faith in separate books, and to ask God to confirm the truth in this matter. When they had prepared these texts, they placed the two tomes in the case that held Saint Euphemia's relics, sealed it, and departed. After three days of night-long supplications, they opened the reliquary in the presence of the Emperor, and found the tome of the heretics under the feet of the Martyr, and that of the Orthodox in her right hand.

#### Marina Holy & Great Martyr

#### 17 July

This Martyr lived during the reign of Claudius II (268-270). She was from Pisidia of Cilicia and was the only daughter of a certain priest of the idols. On being orphaned by her mother, she was handed over to a certain woman who instructed her in the Faith of Christ. When she was fifteen years old, she was apprehended by the ruler of Olmbrius, and when asked her name, homeland, and faith, she answered: "My name is Marina; I am the offspring of the Pisidia; I call upon the Name of my Lord Jesus Christ." Because of this she endured bonds, imprisonment, and many whippings, and was finally beheaded in the year 270. Saint Marina is especially invoked for deliverance from demonic possession.



#### Glorious Prophet Elias (Elijah)

#### 20 July

Elias of great fame was from Thisbe, a town beyond the Jordan. He was of priestly lineage, a man of a solitary and ascetical character, clothed in a mantle of sheep skin, and girded about his loins with a leather belt. His name means "Yah is my God." His zeal for the glory of God was compared to fire, and his speech for teaching and rebuke was likened unto a burning lamp. From this too he received the name Zealot.

Therefore, set aflame with such zeal, he sternly reproved the impiety and lawlessness of Ahab and his wife Jezebel. He shut up heaven by means of prayer, and it did not rain for three years and six months. Ravens brought him food for his need when, at God's command, he was hiding by the torrent of Horrath. He multiplied the little flour and oil of the poor widow of Sarephtha of Sidon, who had given him hospitality in her home, and when her son died, he raised him up. He brought down fire from Heaven upon Mount Carmel, and it burned up the sacrifice offered to God before all the people of Israel, that they might know the truth. At the torrent of Kisson, he slew 450 false prophets and priests who worshipped idols and led the people astray. He received food wondrously at the hand of an Angel, and being strengthened by this food he walked for forty days and forty nights.

### Glorious Prophet Elias (Elijah)

He beheld God on Mount Horeb, as far as this is possible for human nature. He foretold the destruction of the house of Ahab, and the death of his son Ohozias; and as for the two captains of fifty that were sent by the king, he burned them for their punishment, bringing fire down from Heaven.

He divided the flow of the Jordan, and he and his disciple Elisseus passed through as it were on dry land; and finally, while speaking with him, Elias was suddenly snatched away by a fiery chariot in the year 895 B.C., and he ascended as though into heaven, whither God most certainly translated him alive, as He did Enoch.

But from thence also, after seven years, by means of an epistle he reproached Joram, the son of Josaphat, as it is written: "And there came a message in writing to him from Elias the Prophet, saying, Thus saith the Lord God of David thy father, Because thou hast not walked in the way," and so forth (II Chron. 21:12). According to the opinion of the majority of the interpreters, this came to pass either through his disciple Elisseus, or through another Prophet when Elias appeared to them, even as he appeared on Mount Tabor to the disciples of Christ.

### Mary Magadelene, the Holy Myrrh Bearer, Equal to the Apostles

### 22 July

Saint Mary was from Magdala in Galilee on the Sea of Tiberias, and for this was named Magdalene. When the Lord Jesus cast out seven demons from her, she became His faithful disciple, following Him and ministering unto Him even to the time of His crucifixion and burial. Then, returning to Jerusalem together with the rest of the Myrrh-bearers, she prepared the fragrant spices for anointing the body of the Lord. And on the Lord's day they came very early to the tomb, even before the Angels appeared declaring the Resurrection of the Lord. When Mary Magdalene saw the stone taken away from the tomb, she ran and proclaimed it to Peter and John. And returning immediately to the tomb and weeping outside, she was deemed worthy to be the first of the Myrrh-bearers to behold the Lord arisen from the dead, and when she fell at His feet, she heard Him say, "Touch Me not." After the Lord's Ascension, nothing certain is known concerning her. Some accounts say that she went to Rome and later returned to Jerusalem, and from there proceeded to Ephesus, where she ended her life, preaching Christ. "Madeleine" is a form of Magdalene.

Dormition of Saint Anna, mother of Theotokos

#### 25 July


According to tradition, Anna, the ancestor of God, lived for sixty-nine years, and her spouse Joachim, for eighty; according to one account, Saint Joachim died two years before Saint Anna. The Theotokos had been orphaned of both her parents already when she was eleven years of age, when she was living in the Temple. Saint Anna is invoked for conceiving children, and for help in difficult childbirth.




#### 27 July

This Saint, who had Nicomedia as his homeland, was the son of Eustorgius and Eubula. His father was an idolater, but his mother was a Christian from her ancestors. It was through her that he was instructed in piety, and still later, he was catechized and baptized in the Faith of Christ by Saint Hermolaus baptized by him. Being proficient in the physician's vocation, he practiced in a philanthropic manner, healing every illness more by the grace of Christ than by medicines. Thus, although his parents had named him Pantoleon ("in all things a lion"), because of the compassion he showed for the souls and bodies of all, he was worthily renamed Panteleimon, meaning "all-merciful." On one occasion, when he restored the sight of a certain blind man by calling on the Divine Name, he enlightened also the eyes of this man's soul to the knowledge of the truth. This also became the cause for the martyrdom of him who had been blind, since when he was asked by whom and in what manner his eyes had been opened,. As did the blind man of the Gospel, this man confessed with boldness to both who the physician was and the manner of his healing. For this he was put to death immediately. Panteleimon was arrested also, and having endured many wounds, he was finally beheaded in the year 305, during the reign of Maximian.

Saint Panteleimon is one of the Holy Unmercenaries, and is held in special honor among them.







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Without love there is no salvation, no true relationship with God, no real relationships with others There is no joy, no hope, no compassion. Love is the foundation for all true relationships. God is love. If we do not have love, we do not know God. We cannot combat sin without love. We cannot really pray without love. We honestly cannot bear ourselves without love. Let us seek love rather than perfection. Perfection and holiness follow love. If we wish to attain paradise, then we must clothe ourselves in love. Love first, ask questions later.

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
