

PRIEST'S MESSAGE (continued)

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Christos Anesti! Christ is Risen!

In accordance with the anticipated announcement on June 15, for the State of California, the Los Angeles County Health Department, and the recent guidance from the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), individuals who are fully vaccinated will no longer be required to wear face coverings. Secondly, those fully vaccinated will not be required to comply with social distancing during worship services, sacraments and events at our Los Angeles Vicariate churches. Thirdly, we will also no longer be requiring reservations for services. Please note that current requirements are still in effect for the first two Sundays of June (6 and 13), and for all sacraments and services before June 15. Our churches will continue to have sanitation and safety measures in place. All other aspects of worship, parish gatherings, and youth activities will also return to normal. My recommendation for Saint Anthony Church is that we should limit these activities in the summer, and begin in earnest in September. This will afford us the opportunity to properly prepare our facilities. Finally, our Saint Anthony Parish will continue to offer live-stream services.

As a final note, as we transfer back to some normalcy, let us all remember to demonstrate respect and love to our Christian family, to all our brothers and sisters in Christ, some of whom may wish to continue to wear masks during worship for their own valid reasons. There are still groups of people unable to be vaccinated (children under 12) as well as others who may have a condition or take medications that weaken the immune system, and even though vaccinated, may not be fully protected. Even after vaccination, some may need or merely wish to continue taking all precautions.

As Christians, we have an ethical obligation to protect the vulnerable. Those that are not fully vaccinated are recommended to continue to wear face masks in order to protect themselves and others from potential exposure. While some organizations require proof of vaccination, others maintain an "honor system" policy, which will be our approach, as faith, trust, and love are guiding principles for us as Orthodox Christians.

We have navigated the unchartered waters of the pandemic for 16 months, and I am profoundly grateful for your faithfulness, your continued support of Saint Anthony's, and for your cooperation with regard to your adherence of federal, state and local guidelines to ensure the health and safety of our parishioners.

Praying that our Resurrected Lord may continue to grant us His Divine love and protection, as we worship Him with one mind, one heart, and one voice.

Church History

Early Greek Community of Pasadena & the San Gabriel Valley Taken from the 50th Anniversary of St. Anthony, 2003.

Hellenic Society of Pasadena

The Pasadena Greek community's first known attempt to organize itself was the formation of the Hellenic Society in 1934. The group was legally incorporated as a "benevolent, non-profit corporation," on December 22, 1938, as the Hellenic Society of Pasadena by ten Greek immigrant men, all Pasadena residents: Peter Becronis, James Gianopulos, Nick Karos, Peter Morris, Nick Pappas (Papaioanou), Nick Pappas (Papademetropoulos), Gust Panos, Louis Vagenas, Tom Vagenas, and James Yankos. The Greek bachelor contingent strongly supported the club which met regularly at the American Legion Hall on Vinedo Street in Pasadena. The American Legion Hall would play an important role in the life of Pasadena's growing Greek community providing a venue for Sunday School and Greek language classes, Greek dance classes, Ahepa meetings and socials.

The main purpose of the Hellenic Society was to provide a place where Greeks could congregate and perpetuate the culture. It never sought to establish a Greek Orthodox Church in Pasadena but rather to foster ties among its members. Many of its members were bachelors and needed a social outlet. As a benevolent organization, the club might help pay funeral expenses of its members but generally kept its charitable activities out of the limelight. The articles of incorporation specify the club's purpose:

To provide a place where its members and other persons may gather and assemble to be instructed in the arts of good citizenship and other social and cultural subjects

To aid and assist the needy in the community

To purchase, hold, lease, acquire, and sell property, real and or personal of every kind and description

To borrow and loan money

To issue bonds and execute mortgages and do everything suitable, proper and convenient for the accomplishment of it purpose.

Annual Christmas dances and summer picnics at Oak Grove Park, now Hahamonga Park, in Pasadena and later Swiss Park in Duarte were two of the club's main activities. The Hellenic Society was kept alive by dwindling numbers of Greek immigrants, mostly bachelors, who still attended its regular meetings, but was never able to attract the interest of the American born Greeks. The Hellenic Society died out in the mid 1960s, but for several decades it functioned as the de facto hub of the Hellenic community in the San Gabriel Valley.

<u>Post World War II Era</u>

Dan Bozikis, a native of Cleveland, Ohio served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1942 to 1945. Prior to being sent to combat duty in the Pacific, he went through boot camp in San Diego and was in the first contingent of soldiers to open Camp Pendleton. He was typical of many Greek-American G.I.s from all parts of the country who had been stationed or had passed through California during the war years. They left with a favorable impression and wanted to return. Many Greeks had a pent-up desire to escape the dismal winters of the East and Midwest for a more amiable Mediterranean climate. With the lifting of wartime travel restrictions and the end of gas rationing, moving out West was a dream that could finally become reality. Bozikis finally made his move West in 1957 and soon became involved with the growing Greek Orthodox community in Pasadena.

California's postwar economic and population boom greatly increased the number of Greeks in the state. The Greek-Americans who settled in the San Gabriel Valley after the war were primarily transplants from eastern and mid-western cities. They were accustomed to attending a Greek Orthodox Church in their community and may have been active in various well established Hellenic organizations. The new arrivals had no sentimental or historic ties to the Los Angeles community and were therefore less complacent about traveling long distances for religious and cultural activities. They wanted their own clubs, Greek Schools, Sunday Schools and ultimately a Greek Orthodox Church in their own neighborhood. The dying Hellenic community of the Pasadena area would get an invigorating infusion of new blood and the realization of a true center for its spiritual and cultural needs.

Within a few months after the end of World War II the first Greek transplants to the San Gabriel Valley were laying the foundation for a revitalized Hellenic community.

Founded in 1934 and chartered by the State of California in 1938 as a philanthropic, mutual aid society. The clasped hands of friendship signify the club's mutual aid goals for its members. What appears to be a "dollar sign" at the top of the emblem are the superimposed letters "H" and "S", for Hellenic Society.



Dan Bozikis, a Cleveland, Ohio native was trained at Camp Pendleton while serving in the US Marine Corps during WWII. Like many Greek-American GIs, he fell in love with California's weather and moved West after the War.



Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis...

After this Jesus revealed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias; and He revealed Himself in this way. Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of His disciples were together. Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing." They said to him, "We will go with you." They went out and got into the boat; but that night they caught nothing. Just as day was breaking, Jesus stood on the beach; yet the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to them, "Children, have you any fish?" They answered Him, "No." He said to them, "Cast the net on the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in, for the quantity of fish. That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on his clothes, for he was stripped for work, and sprang into the sea. But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, but about a hundred yards off. When they got out on land, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish lying on it, and bread. Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught." So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred and fifty-three of them; and although there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." Now none of the disciples dared ask Him, "Who are you?" They knew it was the Lord. Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and so with the fish. This was now the third time that Jesus was revealed to the disciples after He was raised from the dead.

John 21: 1-14

We know that most of the Disciples were fishermen. We also know that Jesus, by trade, was a carpenter. There are several instances in the Gospels, including this Gospel, where the Disciples are trying without success to catch fish. Jesus, in each instance, tells the Disciples to recast the net, but on the other side of the boat, the "right side." When the Disciples cast the net as Jesus directs them, they are not only successful at catching fish, but they catch a quantity of fish so great that the boats start to sink and the nets cannot hold the fish.

One lesson that I take away from this Gospel passage is that when we are open to doing something the way Jesus asks us to do it, we are more likely to have success, even abundance. The challenge for us is, "Are we open to doing something His way?"

Many times we try and fail at things in life. And when we fail, we try again,. We try to think how we can improve. But how many times in our struggles and in our failures, do we invite the Lord in to be part of them? How many times do we surrender doing something our way and try it His way?

The fact is, for many of us, including me, stubborn pride keeps us doing things our way, rather than surrendering and doing them His way. This is why we have problems in interpersonal relationships, why we don't get along in our families, why our marriages struggle, and why our kids rebel. It's because we're obsessed with doing things OUR way, rather than doing them HIS way.

He tells us to forgive. We choose to hold grudges.

He tells us to trust. We doubt.

He tells us to give generously. We give begrudgingly.

He tells us to serve one another. We put ourselves first.

He tells us to remember the Sabbath. We put other things ahead of worship.

He tells us to build up one another. We tear down one another.

He tells us to pursue holiness. We pursue fame and fortune.

He tells us we are of infinite value. We fight for equality.

Imagine if when Jesus told the Disciples to cast the net on the right side, they cast it on the left.

Imagine if the Disciples had complained to Jesus that they were fishermen and He was a carpenter and what did He know about catching fish?

Imagine if they had quit.

But.... they tried it His way, and it worked, and then some!

Imagine what the world could be like if we could do things His way, instead of our own.

Imagine how your life could change if you started doing more things His way, instead of your own way. Yes, it would mean swallowing some pride. Yes, it would mean recasting a net you may already be tired of casting. But it could mean a phenomenal catch of fish, or an incredible change in your life, your marriage, a friendship, a job, or your overall outlook on life.










FEASTS & SAINTS OF THE MONTH


Holy Ascension 10 June

The Lord Jesus passed forty days on earth after His Resurrection from the dead, appearing continually in various places to His disciples, with whom He also spoke, ate, and drank, thereby further demonstrating His Resurrection. On this Thursday, the fortieth day after Pascha, He appeared again in Jerusalem. After He had first spoken to the disciples about many things, He gave them His last commandment, that is, that they go forth and proclaim His Name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. But He also commanded them that for the present, they were not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait there together until they receive power from on high, when the Holy Spirit would come upon them.

Saying these things, He led them to the Mount of Olives, and raising His hands, He blessed them; and saying again the words of the Father's blessing, He was parted from them and taken up. Immediately a cloud of light, a proof of His majesty, received Him. Sitting thereon as though on a royal chariot, He was taken up into Heaven, and after a short time was concealed from the sight of the disciples, who remained where they were with their eyes fixed on Him. At this point, two Angels in the form of men in white raiment appeared to them and said, "Ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into Heaven? This same Jesus, Who is taken up from you into Heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen Him go into Heaven" (Acts 1:11). These words, in a complete and concise manner, declare what is taught in the Symbol of Faith concerning the Son and Word of God.

Therefore, having so fulfilled all His dispensation for us, our Lord Jesus Christ ascended in glory into Heaven, and sat at the right hand of God the Father. As for His sacred disciples, they returned from the Mount of Olives to Jerusalem, rejoicing because Christ had promised to send them the Holy Spirit.

It should be noted that the Mount of Olives is a Sabbath's day journey from Jerusalem, that is, the distance a Jew was permitted to walk on the day of the Sabbath. Ecumenius writes, "A Sabbath day's journey is one mile in length, as Clement says in his fifth Stromatis; it is two thousand cubits, as the Interpretation of the Acts states." They draw this conclusion from the fact that, while they were in the wilderness, the Israelites of old kept within this distance from the Holy Tabernacle, whither they walked on the Sabbath day to worship God.

Pentecost 20 June

After the Savior's Ascension into the Heavens, the eleven Apostles and the rest of His disciples, the God-loving women who followed after Him from the beginning, His Mother, the most holy Virgin Mary, and His brethren-all together about 120 souls returned from the Mount of Olives to Jerusalem. Entering into the house where they gathered, they went into the upper room, and there they persevered in prayer and supplication, awaiting the coming of the Holy Spirit, as their Divine Teacher had promised them. In the meanwhile, they chose Matthias, who was elected to take the place of Judas among the Apostles.

Thus, on this day, the seventh Sunday of Pascha, the tenth day after the Ascension and the fiftieth day after Pascha, at the third hour of the day from the rising of the sun, there suddenly came a sound from Heaven, as when a mighty wind blows, and it filled the whole house where the Apostles and the rest with them were gathered. Immediately after the sound, there appeared tongues of fire that divided and rested upon the head of each one. Filled with the Spirit, all those present began speaking not in their native tongue, but in other tongues and dialects, as the Holy Spirit instructed them.

The multitudes that had come together from various places for the feast, most of whom were Jews by race and religion, were called Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and so forth, according to the places where they dwelt. Though they spoke many different tongues, they were present in Jerusalem by divine dispensation. When they heard that sound that came down from Heaven to the place where the disciples of Christ were gathered, all ran together to learn what had taken place. But they were confounded when they came and heard the Apostles speaking in their own tongues. Marveling at this, they said one to another, "Behold, are not all these which speak Galileans? And how hear we every man in our own tongue, wherein we were born?" But others, because of their foolishness and excess of evil, mocked the wonder and said that the Apostles were drunken.

Then Peter stood up with the eleven, and raising his voice, spoke to all the people, proving that that which had taken place was not drunkenness, but the fulfillment of God's promise that had been spoken by the Prophet Joel: "And it shall come to pass in the last days, that I shall pour out of My Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and daughters shall prophesy" (Joel 2:28), and he preached Jesus of Nazareth unto them, proving in many ways that He is Christ the Lord, Whom the Jews crucified but God raised from the dead. On hearing Peter's teaching, many were smitten with compunction and received the word. Thus, they were baptized, and on that day about three thousand souls were added to the Faith of Christ.

Such, therefore, are the reasons for today's feast: the coming of the All-holy Spirit into the world, the completion of the Lord Jesus Christ's promise, and the fulfillment of the hope of the sacred disciples, which we celebrate today. On this last, and great, and saving day of Pentecost, the Apostles of the Saviour, who were unlearned fishermen, made wise now of a sudden by the Holy Spirit, clearly and with divine authority spoke the heavenly doctrines. They became heralds of the truth and teachers of the whole world. They were ordained and began their apostleship, of which the salvation of those 3000 souls in one day was the comely and marvelous first fruit.

Some erroneously hold that Pentecost is the "birthday of the Church." But this is not true, for the teaching of the holy Fathers is that the Church existed before all other things. Saint Gregory the Theologian speaks of "the Church of Christ ... both before Christ and after Christ". Saint Epiphanius of Cyprus writes, "The Catholic Church, which exists from the ages, is revealed most clearly in the incarnate advent of Christ". Saint John Damascene observes, "The Holy Catholic Church of God, therefore, is the assembly of the holy Fathers, Patriarchs, Prophets, Apostles, Evangelists, and Martyrs who have been from the very beginning, to whom were added all the nations who believed with one accord". According to Saint Gregory the Theologian, "The Prophets established the Church, the Apostles conjoined it, and the Evangelists set it in order". The Church existed from the creation of the Angels, for the Angels came into existence before the creation of the world, and they have always been members of the Church. Saint Clement, Bishop of Rome, says in his second epistle to the Corinthians, the Church *"was created before the sun and moon";* and a little further on, *"The Church existeth not now for the first time, but hath been from the beginning"* (II Cor. 14).

That which came to pass at Pentecost, then, was the ordination of the Apostles, the commencement of the apostolic preaching to the nations, and the inauguration of the priesthood of the new Israel. Saint Cyril of Alexandria says that "Our Lord Jesus Christ herein ordained the instructors and teachers of the world and the stewards of His divine Mysteries ... showing together with the dignity of Apostleship, the incomparable glory of the authority given them ... Revealing them to be splendid with the great dignity of the Apostleship and showing them forth as both stewards and priests of the divine altars . . . they became fit to initiate others through the enlightening guidance of the Holy Spirit". Saint Gregory Palamas says, "Now, therefore ... the Holy Spirit descended ... showing the Disciples to be supernal luminaries ... and the distributed grace of the Divine Spirit came through the ordination of the Apostles upon their successors" . And Saint Sophronius, Bishop of Jerusalem, writes, "After the visitation of the Comforter, the Apostles became high priests". Therefore, together with the baptism of the Holy Spirit which came upon them who were present in the upper chamber, which the Lord had foretold as recorded in the Acts, "ye shall be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days hence" (Acts 1:5), the Apostles were also appointed and raised to the high priestly rank, according to Saint John Chrysostom . On this day commenced the celebration of the Holy Eucharist by which we become "partakers of the Divine Nature" (II Peter 1:4). For before Pentecost, it is said of the Apostles and disciples only that they abode in "prayer and supplication" (Acts 1:14); it is only after the coming of the Holy Spirit that they persevered in the "breaking of bread, "that is, the communion of the Holy Mysteries-"and in prayer" (Acts 2:42).

The feast of holy Pentecost, therefore, determined the beginning of the priesthood of grace, not the beginning of the Church. All foods allowed during the week following Pentecost.

Day of the Holy Spirit 21 June

As it is the custom of the Church, on the day after every great Feast, to honor those through whom it came to pass our Lady on the day after the Lord's Nativity, Joachim and Anna after our Lady's Nativity, the holy Baptist the day after Theophany, and so forth, on this day we honor our God the All-holy Spirit, the Comforter promised by our Savior to His disciples (John 14:16), Who descended upon them at holy Pentecost and guided them "into all truth" and through them, us.

He that was greater than all who are born of women, the Prophet who received God's testimony that he surpassed all the Prophets, was born of the aged and barren Elizabeth (Luke 1: 7) and filled all his kinsmen, and those that lived round about, with gladness and wonder. But even more wondrous was that which followed on the eighth day when he was circumcised, that is, the day on which a male child receives his name. Those present called him Zacharias, the name of his father. But the mother said, "Not so, but he shall be called John." Since the child's father was unable to speak, he was asked, by means of a sign, to indicate the child's name. He then asked for a tablet and wrote, "His name is John." And immediately Zacharias' mouth was opened, his tongue was loosed from its silence of nine months, and filled with the Holy Spirit, he blessed the God of Israel, Who had fulfilled the promises made to their fathers, and had visited them that were sitting in darkness and the shadow of death, and had sent to them the light of salvation. Zacharias prophesied concerning the child also, saying that he would be a Prophet of the Most High and Forerunner of Jesus Christ. And the child John, who was filled with grace, grew and waxed strong in the Spirit; and he was in the wilderness until the day of his showing to Israel (Luke 1:57-80).



His name is a variation of the Hebrew "Johanan," which means "Yah is gracious."

Peter & Paul, Holy Apostles 29 June

The divinely-blessed **Peter** was from Bethsaida of Galilee. He was the son of Jonas and the brother of Andrew the First-called. He was a fisherman by trade, unlearned and poor, and was called Simon; later he was renamed Peter by the Lord Jesus Christ Himself, Who looked at him and said, *"Thou art Simon the son of Jonas; thou shalt be called Cephas (which is by interpretation, Peter)"* (John 1:42). On being raised by the Lord to the dignity of an Apostle and becoming inseparable from Him as His zealous disciple, he followed Him from the beginning of His preaching of salvation up until the very Passion, when, in the court of Caiaphas the high priest, he denied Him thrice because of his fear of the Jews and of the danger at hand. But again, after many bitter tears, he received complete forgiveness of his transgression. After the Resurrection of Christ and the descent of the Holy Spirit, he preached in Judea, Antioch, and certain parts of Asia, and finally came to Rome, where he was crucified upside down by Nero, and thus he ascended to the eternal habitations about the year 66 or 68, leaving two Catholic (General) Epistles to the Church of Christ.

Paul, the chosen vessel of Christ, the glory of the Church, the Apostle of the Nations and teacher of the whole world, was a Jew by race, of the tribe of Benjamin, having Tarsus as his homeland. He was a Roman citizen, fluent in the Greek language, an expert in knowledge of the Law, a Pharisee, born of a Pharisee, and a disciple of Gamaliel, a Pharisee and notable teacher of the Law in Jerusalem. For this cause, from the beginning, Paul was a most fervent zealot for the traditions of the Jews and a great persecutor of the Church of Christ; at that time, his name was Saul (Acts 22:3-4). In his great passion of rage and fury against the disciples of the Lord, he went to Damascus bearing letters of introduction from the high priest. His intention was to bring the disciples of Christ back to Jerusalem in bonds. As he was approaching Damascus, about midday there suddenly shone upon him a light from Heaven. Falling on the earth, he heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou Me?" And he asked, "Who art Thou, Lord?" And the Lord said, *"I am Jesus Whom thou persecutest; it is hard for thee to kick against the pricks."*

And that heavenly voice and brilliance made him tremble, and he was blinded for a time. He was led by the hand into the city, and on account of a divine revelation to the Apostle Ananias (see Oct. 1), he was baptized by him, and both his bodily and spiritual eyes were opened to the knowledge of the Sun of Righteousness. And straightway- O wondrous transformation! - beyond all expectation, he spoke with boldness in the synagogues, proclaiming that "Christ is the Son of God" (Acts 9:1-21). As for his zeal in preaching the Gospel after these things had come to pass, as for his un-abating labors and afflictions of diverse kinds, the wounds, the prisons, the bonds, the beatings, the stoning, the shipwrecks, the journeys, the perils on land, on sea, in cities, in wildernesses, the continual vigils, the daily fasting, the hunger, the thirst, the nakedness, and all those other things that he endured for the Name of Christ, and which he underwent before nations and kings and the Israelites, and above all, his care for all the churches, his fiery longing for the salvation of all, whereby he became all things to all men, that he might save them all if possible, and because of which, with his heart aflame, he continuously traveled throughout all parts, visiting them all, and like a bird of heaven flying from Asia and Europe, the West and East, neither staying nor abiding in any one place - all these things are related incident by incident in the Book of the Acts, and as he himself tells them in his Epistles.

His Epistles, being fourteen in number, are explained in 250 homilies by the divine Chrysostom and make manifest the loftiness of his thoughts, the abundance of the revelations made to him, the wisdom given to him from God, wherewith he brings together in a wondrous manner the Old with the New Testaments, and expounds the mysteries thereof which had been concealed under types; he confirms the doctrines of the Faith, expounds the ethical teaching of the Gospel, and demonstrates with exactness the duties incumbent upon every rank, age, and order of man. In all these things his teaching proved to be a spiritual trumpet, and his speech was seen to be more radiant than the sun, and by these means he clearly sounded forth the word of truth and illumined the ends of the world.

Having completed the work of his ministry, he likewise ended his life in martyrdom when he was beheaded in Rome during the reign of Nero, at the same time, some say, when Peter was crucified.

Synaxis of 12 Apostles 30 June

The names of the Twelve Apostles are these: Simon, who was called Peter, and his brother Andrew, the First-called; James the son of Zebedee, and his brother John, who was also the Evangelist and Theologian; Philip, and Bartholomew; Thomas, and Matthew the publican, who was also called Levi and was an Evangelist; James the son of Alphaeus, and Jude (also called Lebbaeus, and surnamed Thaddaeus), the brother of James, the Brother of God; Simon the Cananite ("the Zealot"), and Matthias, who was elected to fill the place of Judas the traitor.






