

PRIEST'S MESSAGE

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We have reached that beautiful time of year, **August 1st - August 15th**, when we offer devotions in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary,

Our Holy Orthodox Church has set four major Feast Days for the Mother of God. On August 15th we commemorate one of these holy days, The Dormition (falling asleep) of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

This great Feast Day of the Dormition is preceded by 15 days of devotions and prayers to the Blessed Mother of God. During this period we observe a strict period of fasting. We pray and attend Paraklesis (Supplication) Services to the Theotokos and we attend the Divine Liturgy on Sunday August 15th. By following these disciplines of the Church, we will properly prepare ourselves for the sacrament of Holy Communion on that blessed day.

When visiting the Old City of Jerusalem, one can see the tomb of the Theotokos, just below the beautiful gardens of Gethsemane. This is the holy site of her Dormition. Descending the stairs to the tomb, one can observe on the left side (at the 50 foot level) the tomb of the parents of the Theotokos, Joachim and Anna. At the immediate right, one will find the tomb of the protector of the Theotokos, St. Joseph. Continuing down to the 100 foot level, at the base of the marble staircase, is the empty tomb of the Mother of God. According to Holy Tradition, when the time came for the Mother of God to depart from this earth, to join her Son in Heaven, she sent for all of the Apostles of Christ to be at her bedside. All the Apostles were present at the time of her burial, except for St. Thomas who returned too late for the funeral. He asked to visit her body, which had been buried for three days. When the tomb was opened, they were amazed to find that the body of Mary was gone. An Angel of the Lord appeared to the Apostles and announced that she had been taken to Heaven. This is the belief of all Orthodox Christians in accordance with Holy Tradition.

The first 15 days of August are sacred for Orthodox Christians around the world. It is a special time that brings feelings of intensified reverence. Special prayers and services are held regularly during these 15 days. Please consult our calendar for dates and times to attend services or watch them via live stream. This is a special time half way between Pascha and Advent (Christmas), when we can all refocus our minds and souls on our faith. This is a golden opportunity for us to be in church to pray, fast, and participate in our blessed services.

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CHURCH HISTORY

Early Greek Community of Pasadena & the San Gabriel Valley

Early Greek School Programs

By the 1920s, the families of Pasadena's Greek immigrant parents wanted to instill an understanding of Greek language and culture in their children and sought the services of private tutors. John K. Heliotes, early Pasadena confectioner, paid for a private Greek tutor for his niece and nephew. Despinis (Miss) Fourfouki, as she was known to her pupils, was one of the area's first Greek language teachers. By 1928, the Los Angeles Greek Community was running satellite Greek schools in various communities. In the 1930's there was a Greek school program at Hamilton Elementary in Pasadena, on Del Mar Avenue, taught by Mrs. Artemis Vasiliou the daughter of Father Germanos of the Los Angeles church. Local students of Kyria Vasiliou were Jack Becronis, Achilles A. Achilles, Peter Pappas, Catherine (Pappas) Trigonis and John Poulos. Despina Fourfouki taught at Hamilton Elementary in the early 1940s to a number of Pasadena Greek Americans such as George Bicos, George Poulos, Rose (Zavoures) Linardos, Mary (Zavoures) Phillips, Edison Soulakis and Louis Soulakis. Despina Fourfouki also taught small groups of students at the Pasadena home of Alex and Maria Pappas on Parkwood Avenue. In the late 1940s, a number of Greek American children from the Pasadena area attended a Greek school taught by Stamata Buzas in the city of Huntington Park.

In 1952, Father Anthony Kosturos, one of the two priests at St. Sophia Cathedral in Los Angeles, was the principal of the Greek school program with its satellite schools. In the November 1952 edition of the Los Angeles Hellenic, Father Kosturos reported that enrollment in the Pasadena Greek School program was higher than in any other community. Classes were taught by Stamata Buzas at the First Congregational Church in South Pasadena, now Oneonta Congregational Church. Other locations of Greek schools in the area were the meeting hall of the East Pasadena American Legion Post on Vinedo Avenue and the home of the Stefanos family in San Marino.

The need to establish Greek language programs would ultimately give the final impetus to start a Greek Orthodox Church to serve Pasadena and the San Gabriel Valley.

1952 - First Church Services

With an eye towards future business relationships, funeral homes were keen to offer their chapels for use by fledgling parishes. The chapel of the Reynolds and Eberle Mortuary at 825 E. Orange Grove had the distinction of being the site of Pasadena's first Greek Orthodox Church services on the Saturday before Palm Sunday, April 12, 1952. On that day Father Leonidas C. Condos, the Proestameno (head priest) of the Los Angeles Greek Orthodox community, came to Pasadena to administer Holy Communion for the convenience of the elderly.

CHURCH HISTORY (continued)

Because of their Sunday duties at St. Sophia Cathedral in Los Angeles, Father Condos and Father Anthony Kosturos offered Sunday School lessons on Saturdays at the East Pasadena Women's Club. Funeral homes were available on Sundays but the priests from St. Sophia were not. Services were often held at homes in the Pasadena area on Saturdays. One of the first families to open their home for services was Dimitri and Stavroula Zavoures on Virginia Avenue in Pasadena. Stavroula recruited many of the local Greeks for a service in their backyard patio. Jack and Mary Tripodes hosted several Saturday services in their South Pasadena home. A fireplace with an elevated hearth was used as a makeshift altar. Paul and Frances Casacky's San Marino home also functioned as an impromptu church, with their son Tom performing the duties of altar boy.

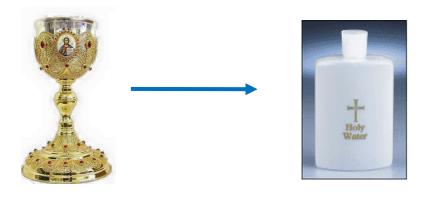
Next Parish Council Meeting Tuesday, August 10th

Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis...

Jesus said to His Disciples, "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hid. Nor do men light a lamp and put it under a bushel, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven. Think not that I have come to abolish the law and the prophets; I have come not to abolish them but to fulfil them. For truly, I say to you, till heaven and earth pass away, not an iota, not a dot, will pass from the law until all is accomplished. Whoever then relaxes one of the least of these commandments and teaches men so, shall be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but he who does them and teaches them shall be called great in the kingdom of heaven"

Matthew 5: 14-19

When someone asks you about your religious affiliation, you most likely will tell them that you are an Orthodox Christian. Perhaps you might even give them the name of the church to which you are a member. In the Gospel of Matthew 5:14-19, Jesus challenges His followers to adopt an even more specific identity. He tells us, that we "are the light of the world."

Being a Christian is a lot more than attending church on Sunday mornings. Certainly this is part of what it means to be a Christian. But during the rest of the week, we have another role that is even more important - to be a light to the world, to share the light of Christ with the world.

Jesus gives us two examples of what it means to be a light in the world. He tells us that "a city on a hill cannot be hidden." In other words, the true Christian is like a city on a hill - our Christianity is visible for all to see. Secondly, Jesus tells us that we do not light a lamp and then put it under a bushel, but we put it on a stand so that our house can be lit. We are not supposed to keep our Christianity, our Light of Christ, hidden. We are supposed to show it for all to see. We are supposed to demonstrate it through works and we are supposed to TALK about it with other people.

Jesus encourages us to let our light "so shine before men that they may see (our) good works and give glory to (our) Father who is in heaven." (5:16) The Christian life is not just about being good and doing good works. It's about being the light of Christ in the world. The good works we do should not be ends to themselves or a means to bring credit to ourselves. The good works should give glory to God and serve as a witness to Him. This is the ideal.

If we really are the city on the hill and lights of Christ in the world, more of the world will come to Christ. It is the "stupid controversies" that hold us back. It is probably also a fundamental misunderstanding that Christians are not just consumers of the Good News but that we are supposed to be bringing others to Christ.

There is most definitely a teaching and evangelism element to Christianity and it belongs not only to the clergy but to every member of the Body of Christ. The first thing God created was Light. Christ is revealed as the Light "that shines in the darkness," and that darkness cannot overcome the Light. (John 1:5). We are called upon to be "Lights" to the world, to let His light shine through us so that others may come to know Christ through us.

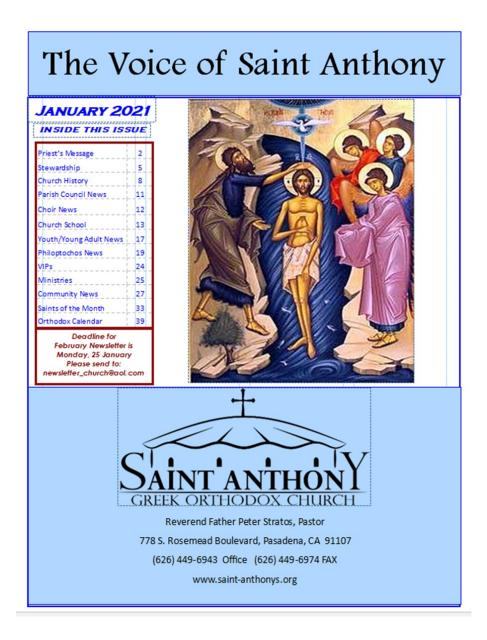
Each year on Pascha, we celebrate the Resurrection by lighting candles. This act reminds us not only that the Light of Christ cannot be overcome by darkness, but that we carry this Light within us everywhere we go. It's not the physical candle that makes us alight with Christ, but the fire which burns in our hearts and souls. The Gospel of Matthew is a reminder to keep that Light strong and to share it. If your Light is flickering, you can strengthen it at any time through prayer, worship, confession, and encouragement from other Christians. So let us use what is available to us to keep our Lights burning strongly and let us share the Light with others, not only by what we say but especially by what we do.

FEASTS & SAINTS OF THE MONTH

Dormition Fast

1 August—14 August

The commemoration of the Dormition of the Theotokos and the preparation for the Feast begin on August 1 with a period of fasting. A strict fast is followed on most of the days (no meat, dairy, oil, or wine), with the exceptions of fish on the Feast of the Transfiguration (August 6) and the day of the Dormition. Oil and Wine are allowed on Saturdays and Sundays.


On the weekdays before the Feast, Paraklesis services are held in most parishes. These consist of the Great Paraklesis and the Small Paraklesis, both services of supplication and prayer for the intercessions of the Theotokos.

Transfiguration of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ

6 August

Our Lord had spoken to His disciples many times not only concerning His Passion, Cross, and Death, but also concerning the coming persecutions and afflictions that they themselves would endure. Since all these evils were near at hand, but the enjoyment of good things which they hoped to receive in their stead was yet to come, our Savior desired to give them full assurance, evidently and openly, concerning that glory which is prepared for those who endure to the end. Therefore, fulfilling that which He had promised shortly before, that "there be some standing here which shall not taste of death, till they see the Son of man coming in His Kingdom" (Matthew 16:28), He took His three foremost disciples and ascended Mount Tabor, where He was transfigured before them. His face shone like the sun, and His clothes became white as the light. Suddenly, together with this dread and marvelous effulgence of light, there appeared those pinnacles of the Prophets, Moses and Elias, who spoke with the Lord Jesus concerning His saving Passion which was about to take place. Standing before Him as reverent servants, they showed that He is the Lord of both the living and the dead, for Moses came forth from Hades, having died many centuries before, and Elias, as it were from heaven, whither he had been taken up while yet alive. After a little while a radiant cloud overshadowed them and out of the cloud they heard that same voice which had been heard at the Jordan at the Baptism of Christ, testifying to the Divinity of Jesus and saying: "This is My beloved Son, in Whom I am well-pleased; hear ye Him" (Matthew 17: 5).

Such are the marvels, truly worthy of God, celebrated in this present feast, which is an image and prefiguring of the future state of the righteous, whose splendor the Lord spoke of, saying: "Then shall the righteous shine forth as the sun" (Matt. 13:43). According to tradition, the Lord's Transfiguration came to pass forty days before His Crucifixion; this is why the Transfiguration is celebrated forty days before the Exaltation of the Cross.



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

The Dormition of our Most Holy Lady the Theotokos and Ever Virgin Mary

15 August

Concerning the Dormition of the Theotokos, this is what the Church has received from ancient times from the tradition of the Fathers. When the time drew nigh that our Savior was well-pleased to take His Mother to Himself, He declared unto her through an Angel that three days hence, He would translate her from this temporal life to eternity and bliss. On hearing this, she went up with haste to the Mount of Olives, where she prayed continuously. Giving thanks to God, she returned to her house and prepared whatever was necessary for her burial. While these things were taking place, clouds caught up the Apostles from the ends of the earth, where each one happened to be preaching, and brought them at once to the house of the Mother of God, who informed them of the cause of their sudden gathering. As a mother, she consoled them in their affliction as was meet, and then raised her hands to Heaven and prayed for the peace of the world. She blessed the Apostles, and, reclining upon her bed with seemliness, gave up her all-holy spirit into the hands of her Son and God.

With reverence and many lights, and chanting burial hymns, the Apostles took up that God-receiving body and brought it to the sepulcher, while the Angels from Heaven chanted with them, and sent forth her who is higher than the Cherubim. But one Jew, moved by malice, audaciously stretched forth his hand upon the bed and immediately received from divine judgment the wages of his audacity. Those daring hands were severed by an invisible blow. But when he repented and asked forgiveness, his hands were restored. When they had reached the place called Gethsemane, they buried there with honor the all-immaculate body of the Theotokos, which was the source of Life. But on the third day after the burial, when they were eating together, and raised up the artos (bread) in Jesus' Name, as was their custom, the Theotokos appeared in the air, saying "Rejoice" to them. From this they learned concerning the bodily translation of the Theotokos into the Heavens.

Saint Phanourios

27 August

Little is known of the holy Martyr Phanourios, except that which is depicted concerning his martyrdom on his holy icon, which was discovered in the year 1500 among the ruins of an ancient church on Rhodes, when the Moslems ruled there. Thus he is called "the Newly Revealed." The faithful pray to Saint Phanourios especially to help them recover things that have been lost, and because he has answered their prayers so often, the custom has arisen of baking a Phaneropita ("Phanourios-Cake") as a thank you-offering.

29 August

The divine Baptist, the Prophet born of a Prophet, the seal of all the Prophets and beginning of the Apostles, the mediator between the Old and New Covenants, the voice of one crying in the wilderness, the God-sent Messenger of the incarnate Messiah, the forerunner of Christ's coming into the world (Esaias 40: 3; Mal. 3: 1); who by many miracles was both conceived and born; who was filled with the Holy Spirit while yet in his mother's womb; who came forth like another Elias the Zealot, whose life in the wilderness and divine zeal for God's Law he imitated: this divine Prophet, after he had preached the baptism of repentance according to God's command; had taught men of low rank and high how they must order their lives; had admonished those whom he baptized and had filled them with the fear of God, teaching them that no one is able to escape the wrath to come if he does not do works worthy of repentance; had, through such preaching, prepared their hearts to receive the evangelical teachings of the Savior; and finally, after he had pointed out to the people the very Savior, and said, "Behold the Lamb of God, Which taketh away the sin of the world" (Luke 3:2-18; John 1: 29-36), after all this, John sealed with his own blood the truth of his words and was made a sacred victim for the divine Law at the hands of a transgressor.

This was Herod Antipas, the Tetrarch of Galilee, the son of Herod the Great. This man had a lawful wife, the daughter of Arethas (or Aretas), the King of Arabia (that is, Arabia Petraea, which had the famous Nabatean stone city of Petra as its capital. This is the Aretas mentioned by Saint Paul in II Cor. 11:32).

Beheading of John the Baptist

Without any cause, and against every commandment of the Law, he put her away and took to himself Herodias, the wife of his brother Philip, to whom Herodias had borne a daughter, Salome. He would not desist from this unlawful union even when John, the preacher of repentance, the bold and austere accuser of the lawless, censured him and told him, "It is not lawful for thee to have thy brother's wife" (Mark 6: 18). Thus Herod, besides his other unholy acts, added yet this, that he apprehended John and shut him in prison; and perhaps he would have killed him straightway, had he not feared the people, who had extreme reverence for John. Certainly, in the beginning, he himself had great reverence for this just and holy man. But finally, being pierced with the sting of a mad lust for the woman Herodias, he laid his defiled hands on the teacher of purity on the very day he was celebrating his birthday. When Salome, Herodias' daughter, had danced in order to please him and those who were supping with him, he promised her -- with an oath more foolish than any foolishness -- that he would give her anything she asked, even unto the half of his kingdom. And she, consulting with her mother, straightway asked for the head of John the Baptist in a charger. Hence this transgressor of the Law, preferring his lawless oath above the precepts of the Law, fulfilled this godless promise and filled his loathsome banquet with the blood of the Prophet. So it was that the all-venerable head, revered by the Angels, was given as a prize for an abominable dance, and became the plaything of the dissolute daughter of a debauched mother. As for the body of the divine Baptist, it was taken up by his disciples and placed in a tomb

(Mark 6: 21 - 29).
