



Next Parish Council Meeting Tuesday, February 8th



Church History

History of Saint Anthony Church 1954-2004

The Road Towards Consecration (1978-1984)

Although the construction of Saint Anthony Church was complete, the Building Committee was not yet relieved from duty. The interior of the church and its wall were still bare. Between 1978 and 1979 the images of the Pantocrator in the center of the dome, the prophets surrounding the Pantocrator, and the Life of Christ depicted around the dome were painted. These were painted by the famed iconographer, George Filipakis. Father Nicholas Liberis worked closely with the committee to select the beautiful Byzantine icons that adorn the church. Early 1980 witnessed the painting of the Platytera, showing the Holy Mother of Christ with the Christ Child on her lap, the Four Hierarchs in the Apse, and the twelve floor-to-ceiling icons of the Saints painted on the north and south side of the nave. The Iconostasion, the icon screen separating the altar from the nave, the Bishop's throne, and the baptismal font were place inside the church in 1980. The final iconographic project was completed in 1981 with the assembly of mosaic images of Christ and Saint Anthony on the front façade of the church. With the exterior and interior projects completed of the new church, Saint Anthony's had only one more holy task left to achieve...the Consecration.


In December of 1982, after nine years of ministry, Father Nicholas Liberis completed his service to Saint Anthony Church. Replacing him on January 16, 1983 was Father John Zanetos, who was transferred to Saint Anthony's as her full time priest after twenty-five years of dedicated ministry as Dean of Annunciation Cathedral in Boston. Among one of the first goals the dynamic Father John set forth for his new community was the consecration of the newly built Greek Orthodox Church.

On the eve of Consecration Day, His Eminence Archbishop Iakovos, accompanied by His Grace Bishop Anthony and Father Zanetos, placed Relics of the Saints atop the Holy Alter Table. The next day during the Consecration Ceremony, His Eminence Archbishop Iakovos, holding the Holy Relics of the Saints, led the clergy, the choir and the entire congregation around the church building three times, stopping for an epistle reading each time the church entrance was approached.


At the conclusion of the three processions, His Eminence Archbishop Iakovos entered the church carrying the Holy Relics, then he proceeded to the Holy Altar where he permanently sealed the Holy Relics of Saints in a crypt into the Holy Altar Table. Saint Anthony's congregation looked on as both His Eminence and His Grace washed the Holy Altar with ordinary soap and sponges. With the Holy Altar now fully vested, Bishop Anthony proceeded to anoint all the church walls and icons. As a final act of the Consecration Ceremony, His Eminence and His Grace removed their white consecration robes, which were cut into small pieces, and they bestowed them to the faithful at the end of the Liturgy.

Chartered in 1954, bought in 1959, then built in 1977, Saint Anthony Greek Orthodox Church was now baptized on June 10, 1984.

Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis...

Kick-Starting My Faith in the New Year with Worship

Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them.

And when they saw Him, they worshipped Him; but some doubted.

Matthew 28:16-17

Worship is one of the most beautiful aspects of the Orthodox Christian life, but also, in some respects, one of the most confusing. Why confusing, you may ask? Because people approach worship in different ways. Some come often, others seldom. For some worship is exciting, for others it is boring. Some people take comfort in the repetitiveness of our services and others feel constrained by it. Here are a few thoughts on worship, as we reflect on kick-starting our faith in this new year.

Worship is communal prayer. Whether that is a small gathering of two or three or a large gathering of thousands, communal prayer is worship. In the Orthodox Church, we have formalized, codified worship services. This means that our worship is done the same way all over the world. The Divine Liturgy is celebrated essentially the same way throughout the world. Same with weddings, baptisms, funerals, Holy Week. I say "essentially" on purpose, because the essential elements of worship are the same. There may be some nuances that reflect a certain culture. For instance, all Divine Liturgies include a procession of the Holy Gifts called the Great Entrance. However, in Africa, at the Great Entrance, the people incorporate a liturgical dance into the procession. This is not done in other parts of the world.

One of the benefits of worship is that we feel a sense of community when we worship. We are not alone. We don't feel lonely or isolated in our Christian walk when we are worshipping with others.

Another benefit of worship, especially at the Divine Liturgy, is that it is an all-encompassing guided prayer. What does that mean? It means that the Divine Liturgy offers the opportunity to pray for just about everything we can think of. How often do you pray for our country? Our president? For good weather? For people who are suffering or in captivity? How often do you pray for the forgiveness of your sins, or for a Christian end to your life, in other words, for a good death? In the Divine Liturgy, we pray for all of these things and more.

The "guiding" in the Divine Services is done by the clergy, namely the priest and the deacon, who offer petitions or prompts. The people answer with responses, either "Lord, have mercy," "Grant this, O Lord," or simply "Amen." Without the people present, the clergy would simply be offering prompts or directions with no answers given. I've heard it said that it is the people who do much of the praying in the services. Thus, worship is work, it is communal prayer offered by the people, led by the clergy. This happens not only at the Divine Liturgy, but at the other services of the church, where all the people, not just the clergy or the choir or the chanters, raise their voices as one united Body of Christ, to offer prayers on behalf of all people for all things that we need for this life, as we prepare for entrance into the next life.

Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis... continued

Unique to the Divine Liturgy, and what makes the Divine Liturgy the most important of our services, is the opportunity to not only worship and pray, but to receive Christ in Holy Communion. The Divine Liturgy affords us the opportunity to touch God and for God to touch us. The most intimate thing a person can do is to touch God. And thus Holy Communion is an opportunity to receive the God's embrace and for us to embrace God, with our bodies - with our minds, our mouths, our hearts and our souls.

While many look at worship in a negative light, I see it in a positive light. I don't see worship as "I have to go to church" but rather "what a beautiful opportunity to be with God in worship." If receiving Holy Communion is supposed to bring us spiritual ecstasy, then this is something we should WANT to do frequently. And thankfully our church affords us, between Sundays and Feast days, over 100 opportunities in most communities every year. These are not obligations, but rather are privileges.

I chose the verses for this lesson on purpose. Because while we may worship with great joy and even great frequency, there will be times in our lives when we question the value of worship. We will wonder, does it really matter if I just skip today? We will wonder, does it really matter how often I receive Holy Communion? In Matthew 28:16-17, we read that Jesus directed His disciples to go to a mountain, presumably to worship. Because when they saw Jesus, that's exactly what they did, they worshipped Him. As a caveat in verse 17, we read that some of these disciples, these worshippers, doubted. And that's ok. We are going to have doubts. The devil will put doubts in our hearts. Other days we won't have doubts and we will come with confidence. The important thing about the disciples in these verses was that they showed up, doubts and all. And the most important aspect of worship is merely being there, being in the presence of God, being in community. There will be some days we come with joy and some days we come with doubt, but please come, as often as you can. Because as we read in I Corinthians 11:26, "For as often as you eat this Bread and drink the Cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until He comes." As often as we receive Holy Communion, we proclaim our faith and our desire to be people of faith.

I will share with you that there are many days I worship and don't feel much of anything. And there are other days I worship and feel as if I were standing in heaven. It's not a profound experience every time out. But it can't be a profound experience of worship if you are not there. So come and worship, as often as you can.

Lord, thank You for the gift of worship.

Thank You for the gift of the Divine Liturgy and the gift of the Eucharist.

Help me to understand the importance of worship.

Help me come to worship with joy and with focus.

Help inspire me through worship to also inspire others, and for others to inspire me.

Be with me in my moments of doubt.

Walk with me through my spiritual valleys.

Enable me through worship to stand on spiritual mountain-tops.

Amen.

Come worship as often as you can. Come with joy. Come even if you have doubts. But come!

Saint Anthony Bowling League is underway for the winter/spring season. Bowling began on Wednesday, January 26 at Bowlero Lanes in Pasadena.



Feasts and Saints for this month


The Presentation of the Lord

2 February

When the most pure Mother and Ever-Virgin Mary's forty days of purification had been fulfilled, she took her first-born Son to Jerusalem on this, the fortieth day after His birth, that she might **present Him in the temple** according to the Law of Moses, which teaches that every first-born male child be dedicated to God, and also that she might offer the sacrifice of a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons, as required by the Law (Luke 2:22-24; Exod. 13:2; Lev. 12:6-8).

On this same day, a just and devout man, the greatly aged Symeon, was also present in the temple, being guided by the Holy Spirit. For a long time, this man had been awaiting the salvation of God and he had been informed by divine revelation that he would not die until he beheld the Lord's Christ. Thus, when he beheld Him at that time and took Him up into his aged arms, he gave glory to God, singing: "Now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace, O Master. . ." And he confessed that he would close his eyes joyfully, since he had seen the Light of Revelation for the nations and the Glory of Israel (Luke 2:25-32).

From ancient times, the Holy Church has retained this tradition of the churching of the mother and new-born child on the fortieth day and of the reading of prayers of purification.



Saint Theodore Commander and Great Martyr 8 February

The Holy Martyr Theodore was from Euchaita of Galatia and dwelt in Heraclea of Pontus. He was a renowned commander in the military. Emperor Licinius was told that he was a Christian and abominated the idols. Licinius therefore sent certain men to him from Nicomedia, to honor him and ask him to appear before him. Through them, however, Saint Theodore sent back a message that it was necessary for various reasons, that Licinius come to Heraclea. Licinius, seeing in this a hope of turning Saint Theodore away from Christ did as was asked of him.

When the Emperor came to Heraclea, Saint Theodore met him with honor and the Emperor in turn gave Theodore his hand, believing that through him he would be able to draw the Christians to the worship of his idols.

Saint Theodore—continued

Seated upon his throne in the midst of the people, he publicly bade Theodore offer sacrifice to the gods. But Theodore asked that the emperor entrust him with the most venerable of his gods, those of gold and silver, that he might take them home and himself attend upon them that evening, promising that the following day he would honor them in public. The Emperor, filled with joy at these tidings, gave command that Theodore's request be fulfilled.

When the Saint had taken the idols home, he broke them in pieces and distributed the gold and silver to the poor by night. The next day a centurion named Maxentius told Licinius that he had seen a pauper pass by carrying the head of Artemis. Saint Theodore, far from repenting of this, confessed Christ boldly. Licinius, in an uncontainable fury, had the Saint put to many torments, then crucified. While upon the cross, the holy Martyr was further tormented --his privy parts were cut off, he was shot with arrows, his eyes were put out and he was left on the cross to die. The next day Licinius sent men to take his corpse and cast it into the sea; but they found the Saint alive and perfectly whole. Through this, many believed in Christ. Seeing his own men turning to Christ and the city in an uproar, Licinius had Theodore beheaded, about the year 320. The Saint's holy relics were returned to his ancestral home on June 8, which is also a feast of the Great Martyr Theodore.

Heiromartyr Haralambos 10 February

This Saint was a priest of the Christians in Magnesia, the foremost city of Thessaly, in the diocese having the same name. He contested during the reign of Alexander Severus (222-235), when Lucian was Proconsul of Magnesia. At the time of his martyrdom this Saint was 103 years of age.

Triodion Begins—Sunday of the Publican & the Pharisee 13 February

The Pharisees were an ancient and outstanding sect among the Jews known for their diligent observance of the outward matters of the Law. Although, according to the word of our Lord, they "did all their works to be seen of men" (Matt. 23:5), and were hypocrites (ibid. 23: 13, 14, 15, etc.). Because of the apparent holiness of their lives they were thought by all to be righteous and separate from others, which is what the name Pharisee means. On the other hand, Publicans, collectors of the royal taxes, committed many injustices and extortions for filthy lucre's sake and all held them to be sinners and unjust. It was therefore according to common opinion that the Lord Jesus in His parable signified a virtuous person by a Pharisee and a sinner by a Publican, to teach His disciples the harm of pride and the profit of humble-mindedness.

Since the chief weapon for virtue is humility and the greatest hindrance to it is pride, the divine Fathers have set these three weeks before the Forty-day Fast as a preparation for the spiritual struggles of virtue. This present week they have called Harbinger, since it declares that the Fast is approaching; and they set humility as the foundation for all our spiritual labors by appointing that the parable of the Publican and the Pharisee be read on this day, even before the Fast begins, to teach, through the vaunting of the Pharisee, that the foul smoke of self-esteem and the stench of boasting drives away the grace of the Spirit, strips man of all his virtue and casts him into the pits of Hades; and, through the repentance and contrite prayer of the Publican, that humility confers upon the sinner's forgiveness of all his wicked deeds and raises him up to the greatest heights. No fasting the week that follows this Sunday.



Theodore the Tyro & Martyr

17 February

Saint Theodore who was from Amasia of Pontus, contested during the reign of Maximian (286-305). He was called Tyro, from the Latin *Tiro*, because he was a newly enlisted recruit. When it was reported that he was a Christian, he boldly confessed Christ. The ruler, hoping that he would repent, gave him time to consider the matter more completely and then give his answer. Theodore gave his answer by setting fire to the temple of Cybele, the "mother of the gods," and for this he suffered a martyr's death by fire.

Triodion - Sunday of the Prodigal Son

20 February

Through the parable of today's Gospel, our Saviour has set forth three things for us: the condition of the sinner, the rule of repentance, and the greatness of God's compassion. The divine Fathers have put this reading the week after the parable of the Publican and Pharisee so that, seeing in the person of the Prodigal Son our own wretched condition -- inasmuch as we are sunken in sin, far from God and His Mysteries -- we might at last come to our senses and make haste to return to Him by repentance during these holy days of the Fast.

Furthermore, those who have wrought many great iniquities and have persisted in them for a long time, oftentimes fall into despair, thinking that there can no longer be any forgiveness for them; so being without hope, they fall every day into the same and even worse iniquities. Therefore, the divine Fathers, that they might root out the passion of despair from the hearts of such people, and rouse them to the deeds of virtue, have set the present parable at the forecourts of the Fast, to show them the surpassing goodness of God's compassion, and to teach them that there is no sin -- no matter how great it may be -- that can overcome at any time His love for man.



Triodion - Judgment Sunday - Meatfare Sunday 27 February

The foregoing two parables -- especially that of the Prodigal Son -- have presented to us God's extreme goodness and love for man. But lest certain persons, putting their confidence in this alone, live carelessly, squandering upon sin the time given them to work out their salvation and death suddenly snatch them away, the most divine Fathers have appointed this day's feast commemorating Christ's impartial Second Coming, through which we bring to mind that God is not only the Friend of man, but also the most righteous Judge, Who recompenses to each according to his deeds.

It is the aim of the holy Fathers, through bringing to mind that fearful day, to rouse us from the slumber of carelessness unto the work of virtue and to move us to love and compassion for our brethren. Besides this, even as on the coming Sunday of Cheese-fare we commemorate Adam's exile from the Paradise of delight -- which exile is the beginning of life as we know it now -- it is clear that today's is reckoned the last of all feasts, because on the last day of judgment, truly, everything of this world will come to an end.

All foods, except meat and meat products, are allowed during the week that follows this Sunday.
