

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### Message from Father Peter

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Καλή Τεσσαρακοστή! Blessed Lenten Season! We have reached the liturgical season of "Great Lent," a time for self-examination. It is the beautiful season when we have the opportunity to take a "personal inventory" of our Christian living. We endeavor to take a sincere and honest look at our inner self and our relationship with God. We take the time to see where we can improve, grow and enrich our spiritual life.

Lent is also a time to turn away from self indulgence, to follow and hold the Great Fast to the best of our ability. The purpose of fasting during Great Lent is to instill in Orthodox Christians an increased awareness of Christ's presence and His importance in our lives. The Church Fathers taught the importance of fasting. However, they also taught that this discipline must be performed in conjunction with prayer. Consider this warning: fasting without prayer is considered "the fast of the demons" since the demons do not eat according to their incorporeal nature, and also they do not pray. St Nektarios of Aegina wrote the following about fasting and prayer: "In the New Testament fasting is recommended as a means of preparing the mind and the heart for divine worship, for long prayer, for rising from the earthly, and for spiritualization."

Fasting and focusing on our prayer life, both privately and with our church family, strengthens us and thus we are better able to give our attention to works of mercy and charity for those less fortunate. We can live the compassion of Christ by visiting and praying for the sick. We can give time for helpful deeds and generosity to the poor. We can approach all the people we encounter daily in our lives with a joyful countenance and a loving manner: our families, our colleagues, our friends, our fellow parishioners, and those people we don't really know. The more Christ is in our hearts, the easier this becomes. When we live in Christ, this way of living and being in the world comes naturally.

Finally, Great Lent is a time of joy! An opportunity for a "new beginning," a cleansing of body and soul in preparation and anticipation of the "Feast of Feasts" - Pascha! - the glorious Resurrection of Jesus Christ our Lord! We should approach Great Lent with joy in our hearts for the Resurrection of our Lord.

Last year for Great Lent I encouraged each of us, man, woman, child, single person, and families, to commit to praying the edifying prayer attributed to St. Ephraim the Syrian. Of all the Lenten hymns and prayers, this prayer can be termed the "Lenten Prayer." In fact, many Christians around the world pray this prayer every day during Great Lent. We should join them again this year!

The prayer begins by asking God to take away various sins, replacing them with corresponding virtues. This is a very important part of Lent, as Lent is not a season solely focused on purging oneself of bad habits and sins. Great Lent is a time which should also bring each of us closer to virtuous living, good habits, kindness and all things pleasing to God.

St. Ephraim also asks God to help him see his own sins - that he may turn away from sin. And, he asks God to help him refrain from judging his brothers and sisters. Lent is a time when we do not seek to change others, but only to change ourselves.

Last year we mailed a laminated copy of the "Lenten Prayer to each household. It was a two sided prayer card with English on one side and Greek on the other. Hopefully you still have your prayer card. If not, the prayer will be included on the next page of this Newsletter.

Le us all pray the "Lenten Prayer" twice a day: at the beginning of our day when we rise in the morning, and at the conclusion of our day when we retire. As we recite the prayer, after each petition of the prayer make a prostration. Prostrations are a sign of repentance, of humility, of adoration and obedience to God. I pray that you have a fruitful and blessed Lenten Season.



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


### Next Parish Council Meeting Tuesday, March 8th



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### Church History

### History of Saint Anthony Church 1954-2004

#### Into the Millennium (1985-2004)

In June 1986 Father John Zanetos retired from the priesthood after more than forty years of dedicated ministry in the Greek Orthodox Church. Besides unifying Saint Anthony's at a difficult time in her history, Father John will also be remembered for his inspiring sermons, his Sunday lessons given to the Sunday School children and his love for the people of Saint Anthony Church.

On July 1, 1986 Father Efstathios V. Mylonas, having served in Modesto, California, replaced Father John Zanetos and began assuming full time pastoral duties at Saint Anthony Church. Father Efstathios V. Mylonas was educated at the Patriarchal Theological School of Halki, Constantinople, Turkey. Later while serving in Concord, New Hampshire and Brockton, Massachusetts, he pursued graduate studies, receiving his M.A. degree from Boston College, S.T.M. degree from Boston University School of Theology and his Ph.D. degree from Boston University Graduate School. For his many contributions to the Greek Orthodox Church in the Americas, His Eminence Metropolitan Anthony of San Francisco bestowed Father Mylonas, the Offikion of the Protopresbyter of the Metropolis of San Francisco. In 1995, His all Holiness Bartholomew Ecumenical Patriarch bestowed upon Father Mylonas the Offikion of Protopresbyter of the Ecumenical Patriarchate.

#### Honored for Service

The highest honor given by the Archdiocese of America to Greek Orthodox parishioners is the Medal of Saint Paul. The medal is given only to individuals who have given extraordinary amounts of time, brought forth and developed unique ideas, formulated important events, managed large complex endeavors, and exhibited outstanding dedication to their parish for a least twenty-five years. On June 10, 1989, Leon Argyros and Louis Tripodes were awarded the Medal of Saint Paul. In June of 1993, George Mavredakis, Andrew Demopulos, George Gianopulos, James Hagelis, Byron Mechalas, John Tarazi, and Pantele Xanthos received the Medal of Saint Paul as did George Skandale and James Drulias in 1997. This award is indeed a great tribute to them and to our community. They have been instrumental in pursuing a dream for Greek Orthodox in Pasadena. Their vision, dedication, and tenacity are inspirational, and for this, the community of Saint Anthony is forever indebted.

### Church History continued

On January 17, 2004, Saint Anthony's community celebrated the 41<sup>st</sup> Anniversary of Father Mylonas' ordination to the priesthood in the Greek Orthodox Church. He had served nearly twenty years of dedicated ministry to Saint Anthony Church, making him the longest serving priest in our history. Saint Anthony's beloved Father Stathis had tirelessly offered exceptional Christian spirituality and devotion to our community. He was highly respected among clergymen of other religions, always representing his Orthodox faith in Ecumenical Services, Conferences and Dialogues. Our community was very blessed and fortunate to have him as our spiritual leader.

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### Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis...

We've all had the experience of prayer going unanswered. We've even offered prayers that we thought were worthy prayers for worthy causes and had them go unanswered. It begs the question: Does God test us by not answering our prayers?

Many people think of prayer as some kind of vending machine. We insert request, and Christ gives us an answer. Prayer is when we speak to God, and said even more simply, it is being with God. In prayer, we enter into intimate conversation with God, a conversation that is joyful, vulnerable, and humble. God always hears our prayers, but answers them in His way and in His time.

Let's give a contemporary example. My son asks me to buy him French fries for the fourth time in a week. I say no. He begs and implores me. I don't give in to his request out of control or meanness. In this case, I do it out of love. I love my son and want him to grow up to live a long and healthy life. Four servings of French fries in a week is not good for him. In this case, I have to say no.

But what about this Canaanite woman, who was asking for healing for her daughter, certainly a worthy request? Certainly, Christ knew He was going to heal the woman's daughter, but first, there was a teaching moment both for the woman and for the crowd that was there. First of all, the woman was a Canaanite woman, a Gentile. She was not a Jew, one of God's chosen people. Jews didn't go out of their way to help Gentiles.

When the woman's initial prayer was not heard, she kept crying out after Jesus. Even the disciples were annoyed and wanted Him to send her away.

Jesus told her:

"I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house is Israel." (Mathew 15:24)

Obviously, Jesus had come for everyone, but He wanted to see what she would do, and He wanted her to serve as a witness for the Jews who were nearby.

Jesus told her:

"It is not fair to take the children's bread and throw it to the dogs." (Matthew 15:26)

And she replied:

"Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their master's table." (Matthew15:27)

In saying this, she was showing humility, comparing herself with a dog, and acknowledging Jesus as her master.

Jesus indeed healed the woman's daughter and at the same time gave us two lessons.

First, a lesson in **faith**. Faith is when we don't know the outcome but we continue to show up and believe. If every prayer was answered instantly, if prayer was like a vending machine, it wouldn't take any faith at all to pray. It takes faith to offer a prayer, knowing that Christ will answer all requests, but in His way.

# Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis continued

The second lesson in the miraculous encounter was that Jesus was going to be the Savior of not just the Jews, but of the Gentiles as well. And that the **faith of the Gentiles** was going to be greater than the faith of the Jews. Remember that it was the Jews that were going to reject Jesus as the Messiah.

There is one troubling thing that lingers from this story for which there is no answer. In my ministry, I've had the experience of burying many children and young adults, children of faithful parents who prayed and all they prayed for was their children to be healed and to extend their life. They acknowledged Jesus as Lord. They were persistent like the Canaanite woman. I'm proud to say that just about all of them still go to church every Sunday and are very involved in the life of the Church and live a life of faith. So why did these prayers not get answered? And the simple answer is, I don't know. There are certain things that happen in life that make no sense. I still believe in God, even in the face of senseless tragedy. When I meet the Lord, I will certainly have some questions, or maybe I won't. Maybe at that moment it will all make sense. It's just that some things don't make sense in my very human mind.

If you are struggling to make sense of things, don't despair. I'm sure that the Canaanite woman struggled also to make sense of things. What she did that serves as an example for all of us, is that she didn't go away the first time her prayer wasn't heard, or the second or the third. She stayed with Christ, and eventually, her prayer was answered - in His way, in His time.

The ultimate thing we pray for is salvation. This is a prayer that God will answer in His way, in His time. The route for each person will be different in length and in challenges along the way. The important thing is that we continue to walk the path He has chosen for us in faith and not to be discouraged even when life doesn't go as we wish, even when we feel like dogs begging for crumbs. It was in her great humility that her prayer was answered. A life lived with humility, as in the Parable of the Publican and the Pharisee, will lead to great exultation.

So stay humble and stay focused, no matter how difficult the path gets.

Spend time in prayer with the Lord today!

Often people want solutions to their struggles in the world by looking for quick answers, shortcuts, and instant satisfaction. The answer always is **prayer**, **deep prayer**, **regular prayer**... we hesitate, whether it is out of doubt, or impatience or distraction with the cares of this world. We are missing out on that which gives us life, comfort, and ultimately salvation. Let us commit to prayer, daily communication with God, first to glorify Him, next to give thanks, then to ask for what He already knows we need, and finally to declare...."Thy will be done". If we align our will with His will, we will have complete peace and experience His grace fully.

### "How many Saturdays of Souls are there?"

Clearing up some misconceptions...

Mourning for, remembering, and praying for the deceased does not stop when an Orthodox funeral service ends, but those who pass are commemorated through a series of memorials (40 days, six months, annually, etc.).

Yet many Orthodox are not aware that each day of the week carries a specific commemoration, and every **Saturday is the day in which we are called to remember all those who have passed before us**. Additionally, there are specific Saturdays in which the Church calls ALL the faithful together in specific commemoration of the memory and eternal repose of all who have fallen asleep in the hope of the resurrection and for the forgiveness of all their sins.

## These are known as the Saturdays of the Souls and are offered on TWO occasions:

Saturday before Judgment Sunday (this year: Feb. 26, 2022)
Saturday before Pentecost Sunday (this year: June 11, 2022)
in which the Divine services are structured in a specific way to pray for the deceased.

#### "But aren't there FOUR Saturdays of Souls?"

This is a common misconception because it has become custom to offer the Memorial Prayers on the two Saturdays that follow the first Saturday of Souls, and have commonly referred to these Saturdays as the "2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturdays of Souls" when, in actuality:

The Saturday of Cheesefare (this year: March 5, 2022) is a day the Church commemorates the Memory of all the God-bearing Ascetics.

The 1st Saturday of Great Lent (this year: March 12, 2022) is the Commemoration of the Miracle of Kolyva wrought by Saint Theodore.

So, while these other two Saturdays are not structured as proper "Saturdays of Souls," seeing that they are still days that our parishes come together for Liturgical worship, and that Saturday is the day of the week in which we are called to pray for the deceased, the Memorial Prayers can still be, and often are, offered on these two Saturdays as well.



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### Feasts and Saints for this month

Forgiveness Sunday

#### 6 March

The Holy Fathers have appointed the commemoration of Adam's exile from the Paradise of delight, here, on the eve of the holy Forty-day Fast, demonstrating to us not by simple words, but by actual deeds, how beneficial fasting is for man, and how harmful and destructive are insatiety and the transgressing of the divine commandments.

For the first commandment that God gave to man was that of fasting, which the first-fashioned received but did not keep; and not only did they not become gods, as they had imagined, but they lost even that blessed life which they had, and they fell into corruption and death, and transmitted these and innumerable other evils to all of mankind.

The God-bearing Fathers set these things before us today, that by bringing to mind what we have fallen from, and what we have suffered because of the insatiateness and disobedience of the first-fashioned, we might be diligent to return again to that ancient bliss and glory by means of fasting and obedience to all the divine commands.

Taking occasion from the Gospel of Matthew 6:14-21 to begin the Fast unencumbered by enmity, we also ask forgiveness this day, first from God, then from one another and all creation.



#### Clean Monday

#### 7 March

Today we begin the 40-day Lenten Fast with a strict fast from meat, fish, oil, wine, dairy, and eggs.

#### Sunday of Orthodoxy

#### 13 March


For more than one hundred years the Church of Christ was troubled by the persecution of the Iconoclasts of evil belief, beginning in the reign of Leo the Isaurian (717-741) and ending in the reign of Theophilus (829-842). After Theophilus's death, his widow the Empress Theodora (celebrated Feb. 11), together with the Patriarch Methodius (June 14), established Orthodoxy anew. ever-memorable Queen venerated the icon of the Mother of God in the presence of the Patriarch Methodius and the other confessors and righteous men, and openly cried out these holy words: "If anyone does not offer relative worship to the holy icons, not adoring them as though they were gods, but venerating them out of love as images of the archetype, let him be anathema." Then with common prayer and fasting during the whole first week of the Forty-day Fast, she asked God's forgiveness for her husband. After this, on the first Sunday of the Fast, she and her son, Michael the Emperor, made a procession with all the clergy and people and restored the holy icons, and again adorned the Church of Christ with them. This is the holy deed that all we the Orthodox commemorate today, and we call this radiant and venerable day the Sunday of Orthodoxy, that is, the triumph of true doctrine over heresy.



#### Sunday of St. Gregory Palamas

#### 20 March

This divine Father, who was from Asia Minor, was from childhood reared in the royal court of Constantinople, where he was instructed in both religious and secular wisdom. Later, while still a youth, he left the imperial court and struggled in asceticism on Mount Athos, and in the Skete at Beroea. He spent some time in Thessalonica being treated for an illness that came from his harsh manner of life. He was present in Constantinople at the Council that was convened in 1341 against Barlaam of Calabria, and at the Council of 1347 against Acindynus, who was of like mind with Barlaam; Barlaam and Acindynus claimed that the grace of God is created. At both these Councils, the Saint contended courageously for the true dogmas of the Church of Christ, teaching in particular that divine grace is not created, but is the uncreated energies of God which are poured forth throughout creation: otherwise it would be impossible, if grace were created, for man to have genuine communion with the uncreated God. In 1347 he was appointed Metropolitan of Thessalonica.

#### Sunday of St. Gregory Palamas—continued

He tended his flock in an apostolic manner for some twelve years, and wrote many books and treatises on the most exalted doctrines of our Faith; and having lived for a total of sixty-three years, he reposed in the Lord in 1359.

His holy relics are kept in the Cathedral of Thessalonica. A full service was composed for his feast day by the Patriarch Philotheus in 1368, when it was established that his feast be celebrated on this day. Since works without right faith avail nothing, we set Orthodoxy of faith as the foundation of all that we accomplish during the Fast, by celebrating the Triumph of Orthodoxy the Sunday before, and the great defender of the teachings of the Holy Fathers today.

#### Annunciation of the Theotokos

#### 25 March

Six months after John the Forerunner's conception, the Archangel Gabriel was sent by God to Nazareth, a town of Galilee, unto Mary the Virgin, who had come forth from the Temple a mature maiden (see Nov. 21). According to the tradition handed down by the Fathers, she had been betrothed to Joseph four months.

On coming to Joseph's house, the Archangel declared: "Rejoice, thou Full of Grace, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women." After some consideration, and turmoil of soul, and fear because of this greeting, the Virgin, when she had finally obtained full assurance concerning God's unsearchable condescension and the ineffable dispensation that was to take place through her, and believing that all things are possible to the Most High, answered in humility: "Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to thy word."

And at this, the Holy Spirit came upon her, and the power of the Most High overshadowed her all-blameless womb, and the Son and Word of God, Who existed before the ages, was conceived and became flesh in her immaculate body (Luke 1:26-38).

Bearing in her womb the Uncontainable One, the blessed Virgin went with haste from Nazareth to the hill country of Judea, where Zacharias had his dwelling; for she desired to find Elizabeth her kinswoman and rejoice together with her, because, as she had learned from the Archangel, Elizabeth had conceived in her old age. Furthermore, she wished to tell her of the great things that the Mighty One had been well-pleased to bring to pass in her, and she greeted Elizabeth and drew nigh to her. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, she felt her six-month-old babe,

#### Annunciation of the Theotokos-continued


Saint John the Baptist, prophesied of the dawning of the spiritual Sun. Immediately, the aged Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and recognized her as the Mother of her Lord. The Virgin also, moved by a supernatural rejoicing in the spirit, glorified her God and Savior, saying: "My soul doth magnify the Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Saviour," Luke 1:39-55

#### Sunday of the Holy Cross

#### 27 March

With the help of God, we have almost reached the middle of the course of the Fast, where our strength has been worn down through abstinence, and the full difficulty of the labor set before us becomes apparent. Therefore our holy Mother, the Church of Christ, now brings to our help the all-holy Cross, the joy of the world, the strength of the faithful, the staff of the just, and the hope of sinners, so that by venerating it reverently, we might receive strength and grace to complete the divine struggle of the Fast.
