


Before Your voluntary Passion, Christ our God, You have given to all men an assurance of the General Resurrection: for at Bethany You have raised by Your almighty power, Lazarus who was four-days dead, and as Giver of Light, O Savior, You have made the blind to see. With Your disciples You have entered the Holy City, seated upon a colt, as though upon the cherubim, and so You have fulfilled the preaching of the prophets. The children of the Hebrews with palms and branches came to meet You. Therefore, we also bearing palms and olive branches cry aloud to You in thanksgiving: Hosanna in the Highest; blessed is He that comes in the Name of the Lord! Saturday of Lazarus Matins Service

Dear Faithful,

*"Therefore, we also bearing palms and olive branches cry aloud to You in thanksgiving!"* With these inspiring words, we approach another glorious Holy Week. This is the year we all need to come together as a Christian Family, to embrace these beautiful services of Holy Week, as they lead us, through participation and worship, to His Glorious Resurrection.

In an effort to prepare our faithful for a better understanding of the significance of each day of Holy Week, please read the Synaxarion Reading of each Great and Holy Day beginning with Palm Sunday. The daily Synaxarion can be described as a collection of short descriptions of the lives of saints and martyrs, but also of accounts of important events that are commemorated that day. The Synaxarion Readings are as follows:

**Palm Sunday:** *"The Savior has come today to the city of Jerusalem, to fulfill the Scriptures; and all have taken palms into their hands and spread their garments before Him, knowing that He is our God, to whom the cherubim sing without ceasing; Hosanna in the highest. Blessed are You who shows great compassion: have mercy upon us."* 

**Great and Holy Monday:** "On Monday in Holy Week commemoration is made of the blessed and noble Joseph, and of the fig tree which was cursed and withered by the Lord. The wise Joseph showed himself a just ruler. Praise to Thee O giver of grain. The synagogue of the Hebrews is thought by Christ a fig tree destitute of spiritual fruit, and He withers it with His curse. Let us flee from a similar fate."

**Great and Holy Tuesday:** *"On this Holy and Great Tuesday we make remembrance of the Parable on the Ten Virgins written in the Holy Gospel. Wherefore, O Christ the Bridegroom number us with the wise virgins and have mercy upon us. Amen."* 

**Great and Holy Wednesday:** *"On Wednesday in Holy Week it has been ordained by the Holy Fathers that commemoration should be made of the anointing of the Lord with myrrh by the woman who was a sinner, for this occurred shortly before the Passion of the Savior."* 

**Great and Holy Thursday:** *"The Divine Father, having given good order to all things and in proper succession of readings from the Sacred Epistles and the Holy Gospels, gives us four events to commemorate on Holy and Great Thursday; the sacred act of the feet washing, the mystical supper (that is the tradition of our practice concerning the awesome mysteries) the most wonderful and extraordinary prayer, and the betrayal."* 

**Great and Holy Friday:** "On Great Friday is celebrated the Holy saving, and awful Passion of our Lord and God and Savior Jesus Christ. For us He willingly endured the spitting, the scourging, the buffeting, the scorn, the mocking, and the purple robe: the reed, the sponge, the vinegar, the nails, the spear, and above all, the Cross and Death. Also celebrated is the confession on the cross unto salvation of the penitent thief, who was crucified with Him."

**Great and Holy Saturday:** On the Great and Holy Saturday we celebrate the Burial of the Divine Body, and the descent of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ to Hades, through which He restored our kind, from corruption and transplanted it to eternal life. Wherefore, by Thine ineffable condescension, O Christ our God, have mercy upon us. Amen.



**Great Sunday of Pascha:** On the Holy and Great Sunday of Pascha, we celebrate the life giving Resurrection of our Lord, God and Savior Jesus Christ.

With much anticipation and love, our Lord is welcoming us all back into His Holy Church. Come and see! Come and pray! Come and receive! Come and taste! Come and participate! Come and participate!

His Eminence Metropolitan Gerasimos of San Francisco, His Grace Bishop Ioannis of Phocaea, His Grace Bishop Spyridon of Amastris, and Hierarchs and clergy of various other denominations were in attendance.

The Honorable Victor Gordo, Mayor of Pasadena presented His Eminence Archbishop Elpidophoros with a Proclamation honoring the Centennial Celebration of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America 1922-2022.

The St. Anthony Philoptochos Panagia Chapter and the Parish Council presented His Eminence with gifts to support the Greek Orthodox Theological Seminary in Halki. His Eminence presented our previous Parish Council Presidents Pete Gallanis and Ted Attalla with an Icon of the Hospitality of Abraham, representing the Holy Trinity.

The Philoptochos of St Anthony provided a beautiful Lenten breakfast during the opening dialogue of the faith leaders. We thank the host committee, specifically Lisa Xanthos, Archdiocesan Philoptochos Board Member; Maria Kypreos, Metropolis Philoptochos Board Member; and Judith Din, Panagia Chapter President.






































# Church History

# History of Saint Anthony Church 1954-2004

### Parish Programs

As in the early 1960s, the early 1990s saw large growth. The generation of children born when our church was founded, was having its own children. In 1997, in order to accommodate the spiritual needs of these new mothers and their toddlers, a Moms N Tots program was created. Meeting once a week throughout the year, Moms N Tots teaches Bible stories to young children through art, music and prayer. Shortly thereafter, Vacation Bible School was started in order to bring together children between the ages of four and twelve to spend a week during summer to have fun in classes centered on Bible lessons.

A Senior Citizens Group was formed in 1996 to encourage fellowship and spiritual enrichment for seniors. To help with fundraising efforts at Saint Anthony's, an annual Golf Tournament was initiated in 2001, which has become popular as well as very successful. In 2002, after thirty years at other locations, the 42<sup>nd</sup> Annual Saint Anthony Greek Festival returned home to the church grounds with resounding success, thanks to the participation and hard work of dedicated parishioners. Along with the Pentahiliariko, the Golf Tournament, the Greek Festival, and the Ladies Philoptochos Society, the life of Saint Anthony Greek Orthodox Church in Pasadena is fast approaching 60 blessed years.

What started out as a handful of dedicated Orthodox Christians with the dream of starting their own church in the Pasadena area, has grown into a vibrant community blessed by God. Today, third generations of young Greek Orthodox children call Saint Anthony Church their spiritual home. Beginning with only the Panagia Chapter of the Ladies Philoptochos Society, Saint Anthony's has hosted numerous organizations over the years, including Parish Council and Past Presidents, Greek School, Sunday School, Alter Boys, Choir, AHEPA, Daughters of Penelope, Sons of Pericles, Maids of Athena, Mr. & Mrs. Club, GOYA, YAL, Greek Dance, JOY, HOPE and Senior Citizens. St. Anthony's also offers many exciting programs such as bowling, basketball, Bible Study, Moms N Tots and Vacation Bible School.

Successful yearly events include the Greek Festival, Pentahiliariko, Philoptochos Christmas Benefit, Softball, Volleyball and Tennis Tournaments, Talent Shows, Oratorical Festival, Bible Bowl and Golf Tournament.

Upon completion of the Hellenic Cultural Center in 1965, a marble cornerstone was embedded into the southwest corner of the church hall. Sealed inside the marble cornerstone is a time capsule. Among other pertinent information included in the time capsule was a note that was written by the men who helped found Saint Anthony Greek Orthodox Church. Although most of our church founders have fallen asleep in the Lord, they did not forget, amidst all their hard work, to leave us a written message explaining how much we meant to all of them.


To generations of our descendants yet unknown to you, who some day in the dim and distant future will read this account of the dramatic history of the Hellenic community, we who have written this account not only on paper, but in the blood, sweat and tears of our daily lives make this statement:

*We have built this community with its hopes and its fears, and its land and its buildings because we believe, as did our forefathers, in the soul's immortality, and its eventual union with God.* 

We believe that whether or not we have amassed a great deal of personal wealth or fame, it matters little, since we couldn't take that with us. What does matter is how we have discharged our obligation to pass on to you the faith and ideals that have sustained us through our lives... and we venture the hope that as you read these lines, you may breathe a prayer that what we have done here may have found favor in the eyes of God.

# Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis...

In the morning, as He was returning to the city, He was hungry. And seeing a fig tree by the wayside He went to it, and found nothing on it but leaves only. And He said to it, "May no fruit ever come from you again!" And the fig tree withered at once.

#### Matthew 21:18-19

In the Gospel that is read on Palm Sunday night, Jesus curses a fig tree. He didn't curse the fig tree because it was dead. It was, in fact, very much alive. Those who know fig trees know that they have very large, very green leaves. They are majestic, if not imposing. And here was a tree that was these things, except that it had no fruit. Without fruit, it had no purpose. So Jesus cursed the fig tree, and it withered at once.

A two-fold message is to be taken from this. The first and most obvious is directed at the Jewish temple leadership. They had a beautiful temple, impeccable furnishings, and grandeur and they carried themselves as imposing figures. Yet, they bore no spiritual fruit from within. Their lives were about the outward trappings, rather than the inward continual turning towards God, which is what repentance is. Therefore, He cursed the fig tree, and in turn condemned the fruitlessness of these "followers" of God, who were, in fact, not following at all.

The second message is directed towards us. We also are followers of God. We also have beautiful temples, many of them adorned with breath-taking iconography. We hear majestic choirs, listen to inspiring sermons, and make grandiose plans to "make a difference" in the world. However, is that what we are really doing? As churches? As individual believers? Are we the grand, beautiful, and imposing tree that bears no fruit?

The Holy Week journey is not there just for us to check off boxes and go through rituals. Time and time again, this journey is meant to challenge us, to strike us all the way to our core. And what can be more penetrating than this question: Am I a fruitless fig tree that outwardly appears beautiful but produces no fruit—no fruit of love, no fruit of repentance?

We know that there are several ingredients that help a tree bear fruit—sunlight, water, fertilizer, and regular exposure to these things. These are the same ingredients that help our souls to bear fruit:

First, there is the **sunlight**, spending time with the **Son of God**. This is supposed to happen daily when we pray, when we simply pause to be with the Lord.

**Water** represents **God's grace**, and for us, this is found principally in the sacraments, like Holy Communion, Holy Unction, and confession.

**Fertilizer** is something that releases slowly on a plant and provides nutrients over a period of time. The fertilizer for Christians, I believe, is the **Scriptures**, and also acts of charity.

# Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis continued

When we read the Scriptures, we may not have an immediate understanding of them. Just like when we do an act of kindness, it may not move us. If you spend enough time reading Scripture, diving deeply into it, unraveling its layers of depth and meaning, it changes you. It's like the student who spends a lot of time studying—they get smarter, and better, and understand more deeply what they are studying. No one spends a lot of time studying and has less knowledge. Similarly, when we are charitable towards one another, even small acts of kindness translate into us being more loving, more caring, more aware of others, and also more aware of God.

The fourth ingredient when it comes to growing a tree is **consistency**. Occasional sunlight, water, and fertilizer will not allow a tree to grow. Overwatering and too much fertilizer can damage a tree. I don't think that too much prayer or worship can damage us. However, if we are only working on our salvation occasionally, even if we get a giant infusion of it at Holy Week but are away the rest of the year, we are not going to bear fruit either. We need time with the Son, the water of grace, and the fertilizer of Scripture and charity, but we need them regularly and consistently.

I was speaking recently to my Spiritual Father, who said to me that a genuine relationship with Jesus Christ is supposed to change us. It is supposed to excite us to want to follow even more closely. It made me wonder if the reason why our churches struggle, is because the relationship isn't as genuine as we say it is. It made me wonder personally if the reason I struggle so much with many things, is because MY own relationship with Jesus Christ isn't as strong as it could or should be. Am I the beautiful tree that doesn't bear fruit? Are we beautiful trees that don't bear fruit? Are we beautiful churches that don't bear fruit? Or don't bear enough fruit?

Indeed, the journey of Holy Week has a happy ending, from the liturgical point of view. The hymns at points are harsh, and in the end, they are glorious. In life, we need to ask ourselves the harsh questions, and work through the spiritual struggles, so that we can indeed find spiritual glory. The end of the Bridegroom Service on Palm Sunday evening calls on us to remember what happened to the fruitless fig tree, and in so doing, bear fruits of repentance, deliberate actions that will turn our hearts towards Christ. It is a harsh message but helps us stay on the road to eternal glory.

We need to be concerned not only about the outward appearance of our "trees" but whether they bear fruit. And the fruit is found under the leaves that everyone sees. It is in our hearts. The fruit is repentance, a deliberate disposition, and intentional actions that turn our hearts more deeply to Christ.



### Saturday and Sunday, April 9th and 10th

Hunger Strike is a pan-Orthodox Lenten Youth retreat for students and friends 6th-12th grade.

This year it is connected to our Mission IS Possible ministry and will raise funds for students in Tanzania to attend secondary schools affiliated with the Orthodox Church: The Orthodox boarding schools are the St. Sosthenes School and the Aristotle School.

The tuition, books, room and board are \$600 a year. We'd like to send at least 20 of the neediest kids to school. We're asking Hunger Strike participants to raise funds for scholarships by asking family, friends, teachers, neighbors to support our fund-raising efforts.



# Feasts and Saints for this month

#### Sunday of St John Calmicus

### 3 April

The memory of this Saint is celebrated on March 30, where his biography may be found. He is celebrated today because his book, The **Ladder of Divine Ascent**, is a sure guide to the ascetic life, written by a great man of prayer experienced in all forms of the monastic polity; it teaches the seeker after saluation how to lay a sound foundation for his struggles, how to detect and war against each of the passions, how to avoid the snares laid by the demons, and how to rise from the rudimental virtues to the heights of Godlike love and humility. It is held in such high esteem that it is universally read in its entirety in monasteries during the Great Fast.



## Sunday of Saint Mary of Egypt

### 10 April

The memory of this Saint is celebrated on April 1, where her life is recorded. This was a woman in all of human history who stood on air at the moment of her prayer.

Since this is during the holy Forty Days, it has been appointed for this day also, so that if we think it hard to practice a little abstinence for forty days, we might be roused by the heroism of her who fasted in the wilderness forty seven years; and also that the great loving-kindness of God, and His readiness to receive the repentant, might be demonstrated in every deed.

Her whole life is a living expression of the word said by St. Paul, *"All the more the blood of Christ, Who through the Eternal Spirit offered Himself without blemish to God, will purify your con-science from dead works to serve the living God."* (Hebrews 9:14).

That St. Paul's words are Divinely inspired is verified by the Most Holy Mother of God Herself. She guided St. Mary of Egypt to repentance and Eternal Life. As much as we know about St. Mary of Egypt, we can understand that it is, in reality, the stark truth that Christ is the True God and that all of the false gods of the world then and now are idols who do not save humanity, but can truly harm us.



# Lazarus Saturday

### 16 April

Lazarus and his sisters Martha and Mary, the friends of the Lord Jesus, had given Him hospitality and served Him many times (Luke 10:38-42; John 12:2-3). They were from Bethany, a village of Judea. This village is situated in the eastern parts by the foothills of the Mount of Olives, about two Roman miles from Jerusalem. When Lazarus, whose name is a Hellenized form of "Eleazar," which means "God has helped," became ill some days before the saving Passion, his sisters had this report taken to our Saviour, Who was then in Galilee. Nonetheless, He tarried yet two more days until Lazarus died; then He said to His disciples, "Let us go into Judea that I might awake My friend who sleepeth." By this, of course, He meant the deep sleep of death.

On arriving at Bethany, He consoled the sisters of Lazarus, who was already four days dead. Jesus groaned in spirit and was troubled at the death of His beloved friend. He asked, "Where have ye laid his body?" and He wept over him. When He drew nigh to the tomb, He commanded that they remove the stone, and He lifted up His eyes, and giving thanks to God the Father, He cried out with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come forth." And he that had been dead four days came forth immediately, bound hand and foot with the grave clothes, and Jesus said to those standing there, "Loose him, and let him go." This is the supernatural wonder wrought by the Saviour that we celebrate on this day.

According to an ancient tradition, it is said that Lazarus was thirty years old when the Lord raised him; then he lived another thirty years on Cyprus and there reposed in the Lord. It is furthermore related that after he was raised from the dead, he never laughed till the end of his life, but that once only, when he saw someone stealing a clay vessel, he smiled and said, "Clay stealing clay." His grave is situated in the city of Kition, having the inscription: "Lazarus the four days dead and friend of Christ."

In 890 his sacred relics were transferred to Constantinople by Emperor Leo the Wise, at which time the Emperor composed his stichera for Vespers, "Wishing to behold the tomb of Lazarus . ."



#### Palm Sunday

### 17 April

On Sunday, five days before the Passover of the Law, the Lord came from Bethany to Jerusalem. Sending two of His disciples to bring Him a foal of an ass, He sat thereon and entered into the city. When the multitude there heard that Jesus was coming, they straight-away took up the branches of palm trees in their hands, and went forth to meet Him. Others spread their garments on the ground, and yet others cut branches from the trees and strewed them in the way that Jesus was to pass; and all of them together, especially the children, went before and after Him, crying out: "Hosanna: Blessed is He that cometh in the Name of the Lord, the King of Israel" (John 12:13). This is the radiant and glorious festival of our Lord's entry into Jerusalem that we celebrate today.


The branches of the palm trees symbolize Christ's victory over the devil and death. The word Hosanna means "Save, I pray," or "Save, now." The foal of an ass, and Jesus' sitting thereon, and the fact that this animal was untamed and considered unclean according to the Law, signified the former uncleanness and wildness of the nations, and their subjection thereafter to the holy Law of the Gospel.

### Holy Monday

### 18 April

The Holy Passion of our Savior begins today, presenting Joseph the all-comely as a prefiguring of Christ. He was the eleventh son of Jacob, and his first son by Rachel; because he was so beloved of his father, his own brethren came to envy him and cast him into a pit. Later they sold him to foreigners for thirty pieces of silver, who later sold him again in Egypt. Because of his virtue, his master gave him much authority in governing his house; because he was fair of countenance, his master's wife sought to draw him into sin with her; because of his chastity, he refused her, and through her slanders was cast into prison. Finally, he was led forth again with great glory and was honored as a king. He became lord over all Egypt and a provider of wheat for all the people. Through all this, he typifies in himself the betrayal, Passion, death, and glorification of our Lord

To the commemoration of Patriarch Joseph is added also the narration concerning the fig tree, which on this day was cursed and subsequently dried up because of its unfruitfulness. It portrayed the Jewish synagogue, which had not produced the fruit demanded of it – obedience to God and faith in Him. It was stripped of all spiritual grace by means of the curse.





### Holy Tuesday

### 19 April

Today we bring to mind the parable of the ten virgins, which our Savior related as He was coming to His Passion. This parable teaches us that the accomplishment of the great work of virginity should not make us careless in other matters, especially in almsgiving, wherewith the lamp of virginity is made radiant.

Furthermore, it teaches us that we should not be remiss about the end of our life, but should be prepared for it at every moment, like the wise virgins, so that we may meet the Bridegroom, lest He come suddenly and the doors of the heavenly bride chamber be shut, and we also, like the foolish virgins, hear that dread sentence: "Amen, I say unto you, I know you not" (Matthew 25:1-13).



### Holy Wednesday

#### 20 April

Two women - the more discerning interpreters of the Gospel - anointed the Lord with myrrh; the one, a long time before His Passion; the other, a few days before. One was a harlot and sinner; the other, chaste and virtuous. The Church commemorates this reverent act today. While mentioning herein the person of the harlot, it also mentions Judas' betrayal; for, according to the account in Matthew, both of these deeds took place two days before the Passover, on Wednesday.

That woman, then, anointed Jesus' head and feet with very precious myrrh, and wiped them with the tresses of her hair. The disciples, especially the avaricious Judas, were scandalized, supposedly because of the waste of the myrrh, which could be sold for a great price and given to the poor. The Lord Jesus reproved them and told them not to trouble the woman.

Indignant, Judas went to the high priests, who were gathered in the court of Caiaphas and were already taking counsel against Jesus. On agreeing with them to betray his Teacher for thirty pieces of silver, Judas sought from that time opportunity to betray Him (Matt. 26:14-16). Because the betrayal took place on Wednesday, we have received the tradition from Apostolic times to fast on Wednesday throughout the year.



# Holy Thursday 21 April

On the evening of this day, which was the eve of the feast of unleavened bread (that is, the Passover), our Redeemer supped with His twelve disciples in the city. He blessed the bread and the wine, and gave us the Mystery of the Divine Eucharist. He washed the feet of the disciples as an example of humility. He said openly that one of them was about to betray Him, and He pointed out the betrayer by revealing that it was he "*that dippeth his hand with Me in the dish.*" And after Judas had straight-away gone forth, Jesus gave the disciples His final and sublime instructions, which are contained in the first Gospel Reading of the Holy Passion (John 13:31-18:1 known as the Gospel of the Testament).

After this the God-man went forth to the Mount of Olives, and there He began to be sorrowful and in anguish. He went off alone, and on His knees He prayed fervently. From His great anguish, His sweat became as it were great drops of blood falling to the ground. As soon as He had completed that anguished prayer, Judas came with a multitude of soldiers and a great crowd; on greeting the Teacher guilefully with a kiss, he betrayed Him.

The Lord Jesus was then apprehended and taken prisoner to the high priests Annas and Caiaphas. The disciples were scattered, but Peter, who was more fervent than the others, followed Him even into the court of the high priest, but in the end denied three times that he was His disciple.

Then our divine Teacher was brought before the lawless Sanhedrin and was interrogated concerning His disciples and His teaching. The high priest adjured Him before God that He tell them whether He was truly the Christ. And having spoken the truth, He was judged guilty of death, supposedly as one who had blasphemed. Then they spat in His face, beat Him, smote Him with the palms of their hands, and mocked Him in every way, throughout the whole night until the morning.



### **Holy Friday**

### 22 April

When Friday dawned, Christ was sent bound from Caiaphas to Pontius Pilate, who was then Governor of Judea. Pilate interrogated Him in many ways, and once and again acknowledged that He was innocent, but to please the Jews, he later passed the sentence of death against Him. After scourging the Lord of all as though He were a runaway slave, he surrendered Him to be crucified.

Thus the Lord Jesus was handed over to the soldiers, was stripped of His garments, was clothed in a purple robe, was crowned with a wreath of thorns, had a reed placed in His hand as though it were a scepter, was bowed before in mockery, was spat upon, and was buffeted in the face and on the head. Then they again clothed Him in His own garments, and bearing the cross, He came to Golgotha, a place of condemnation.

There, about the third hour, He was crucified between two thieves. Although both blasphemed Him at the first, the thief at His right hand repented, and said: *"Remember me, O Lord, when Thou comest in Thy Kingdom*," to which our Savior answered, *"Today shalt thou be with Me in Paradise*." As He hung upon the Cross, He was blasphemed by those who were passing by, was mocked by the high priests and by the soldiers was given vinegar to drink mixed with gall.

About the ninth hour, He cried out with a loud voice, saying, *"It is finished."* And the Lamb of God "*Which taketh away the sin of the world"* (John 1:29) expired on the day when the moon was full, and at the hour when, according to the Law, was slain the Passover lamb, to which He was referred in the time of Moses—the Lamb of God.

Even lifeless creation mourned the death of the Master, and it trembled and was altered out of fear. Yet, even though the Maker of creation was already dead, they pierced Him in His immaculate side, and forthwith there came out Blood and Water. Finally, at about the setting of the sun, Joseph of Arimathea came with Nicodemus (both secret disciples of Jesus), and they took down the all-holy Body of the Teacher from the Cross and anointed it with aromatic spices, and wrapped it in a clean linen cloth. When they had buried Him in a new tomb, they rolled a great stone over its entrance.

Such are the dread and saving sufferings of our Lord Jesus Christ commemorated today, and in remembrance of them, we have received the Apostolic commandment that a fast be observed every Friday.



### Holy Saturday

### 23 April

On Saturday, the high priests and Pharisees gathered together before Pilate and asked him to have Jesus' tomb sealed until the third day; because, as those enemies of God said, "We suspect that His disciples will come and steal His buried body by night, and then proclaim to the people that His resurrection is true, as that deceiver Himself foretold while He was yet alive; and then the last deception shall be worse than the first." After they had said these things to Pilate and received his permission, they went and sealed the tomb, and assigned a watch for security, that is, guards from among the soldiers under the supervision of the high priests (Matt. 27:62–66).

While commemorating the entombment of the holy Body of our Lord today, we also celebrate His dread descent with His soul, whereby He destroyed the gates and bars of Hades, and made His light to shine where only darkness had reigned (Job 3 8 : 17; Esaias 49:9; 1 Peter 3:18-20). Death was put to death, Hades was stripped of all its captives, our first parents and all the righteous who died from the beginning of time ran to Him Whom they had awaited and the holy angelic orders glorified God for the restoration of our fallen race.



### **Great and Holy Pascha**

### 24 April

Mary Magdalene, and the other women who were present at the burial of our Savior on Friday evening, returned from Golgotha to the city and prepared fragrant spices and myrrh, so that they might anoint the body of Jesus. On the morrow, because of the law which forbids work on the day of the Sabbath, they rested for the whole day. But at early dawn on the Sunday that followed, almost thirty-six hours since the death of the Life-giving Redeemer, they came to the sepulcher with the spices to anoint His body. While they were considering the difficulty of rolling away the stone from the door of the sepulcher, there was a fearful earthquake; and an Angel, whose countenance shone like lightning and whose garment was white as snow, rolled away the stone and sat upon it. The guards that were there became as dead from fear and took to flight. The women, however, went into the sepulchre, but did not find the Lord's body. Instead, they saw two other Angels in the form of youths clothed in white, who told them that the Saviour was risen, and they sent forth the women, who ran to proclaim to the disciples these gladsome tidings. Then Peter and John arrived, having learned from Mary Magdalene what had come to pass, and when they entered the tomb, they found only the winding sheets.

Therefore, they returned again to the city with joy, as heralds now of the supernatural Resurrection of Christ, Who in truth was seen alive by the disciples on this day on five occasions. Our Lord, then, was crucified, died, and was buried on Friday, before the setting of the sun, which was the first of His "three days" in the grave; observing the mystical Sabbath, that "seventh day" in which it is said that the Lord "rested from all His works" (Gen. 2:2-3), He passed all of Saturday in the grave; and He arose "while it was yet dark, very early in the morning" on Sunday, the third day, which, according to the Hebrew reckoning, began after sunset on Saturday.

As we celebrate today this joyous Resurrection, we greet and embrace one another in Christ, thereby demonstrating our Savior's victory over death and corruption, and the destruction of our ancient enmity with God, and His reconciliation toward us, and our inheritance of life everlasting. The feast itself is called Pascha, which is derived from the Hebrew word which means "Passover"; because Christ, Who suffered and arose, has made us to pass over from the curse of Adam and slavery to the devil and death unto our primal freedom and blessedness. In addition, this day of this particular week, which is the first of all the rest, is dedicated to the honor of the Lord; in honor and remembrance of the Resurrection, the Apostles transferred to this day the rest from labor that was formerly assigned to the Sabbath of the ancient Law.

All foods are allowed during Renewal/Bright Week - April 25-30.



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
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
