



Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis...

In the Gospel of John, Jesus encounters a man at the pool of Bethesda, who had been ill for thirty-eight years. At this pool, the Gospel tells us, an angel of the Lord would come periodically and stir the water and whoever stepped in first after the troubling of the water, was healed of whatever disease he or she had. When Jesus asked the man if he wanted to be healed, the man said *"Sir, I have no one man to put me into the pool when the water is troubled, and while I am going, another steps down before me."* (John 5:7)

Let's pause for a moment and put ourselves in the shoes of this man. Thirty-eight years is a long time to be ill. Many of us reading this message are not thirty-eight years old! So, imagine thirty-eight years of suffering from an illness. Back in the time of Christ, they didn't have large hospitals and trauma centers. They didn't have rehabilitation centers or skilled nursing homes. Many people thought those who were sick were forsaken by God, and that their disease was of their own making. So those who were sick were forgotten, left to sit around the fringes of the city, relegated to begging for food and struggling just to survive. Imagine sitting in one place for thirty-eight years and living like this.

Then, to make it worse, there is a remedy for sickness only a few feet away. An angel comes to trouble the water in the pool several times a year. We are not told if these times are set times or random times but we are told that at certain seasons (so those are predictable) an angel would do this. Whoever got into the pool first was healed from whatever disease afflicted him or her. So, imagine this very sick man can be healed only a few feet away, but lacks someone to put him into the pool. He doesn't have one friend, one family member, anyone. So, when Jesus comes to him and asks if he wants to be healed, his first response is a cry of loneliness and despair, *"I have no one."*

In our world today, there are lots of people who make this cry, *"I have no one."* Your first thought perhaps is of the panhandlers on the street corners who sit by themselves and beg for money or food. And yes, there are probably a fair number of them who are alone, like the man by the pool. We don't know their names and perhaps we should. There are agencies in every city that can provide resources for those who want and need them—and we can all do a better job of supporting these agencies.

But let's leave this thought aside for the moment and think about someone you know well who is "paralyzed" by a life circumstance – a struggling marriage, a difficult child, lack of success at a job, depression, grief, etc. This circumstance has brought the idea of a joyful life to a halt. Do you know someone like that? Many people in these circumstances feel isolated – they either feel ashamed to talk about their circumstance, or feel like no one will understand it, or they feel guilty for feeling bad or think that others will not validate their feelings. To put it simply, there are many people all around us who feel just like this paralyzed man in the Gospel lesson who says: *"I have no one. I have no one who understands me. I have no one who really cares for ME. Perhaps they like what I do but they don't care for ME. I have no one who will accept me as I am, faults and all."*

In this Gospel lesson, Jesus healed the man immediately. It didn't matter that it was the Sabbath. He didn't want the man to be paralyzed any longer. The man, when asked by Jesus if he wanted to be healed, didn't say to Jesus "go away, I've been neglected for so long, there is no chance of me being healed." Rather, he looked at Jesus as perhaps the man who would put him in the pool, the man who he needed to help him, the man who could be his "someone." He looked at Jesus first and foremost with hope, not with cynicism. And Jesus rewarded the man's trust with healing.

There are lots of people who need a "someone" to help them "get into the pool and not be paralyzed anymore." This can happen with simple conversation, with some empathy, compassion, genuine concern, and a little help. "I have no one" is a statement we need to eradicate from our society. "I have no one" contributes to the mass violence we read about in the paper nearly every day. Yes, there are people in our society who need professional medical or psychological help. Someone who is physically paralyzed or mentally ill needs a good doctor in addition to a good friend. A good friend may not be able to be a healer, but can be a conduit between someone who needs healing and someone who can provide it. In the instance where the paralyzed person needs a sympathetic ear, we are all in the position to provide that.

Let's think carefully about this phrase, *"I have no one."* Think of people in your life to whom this may apply. Think of specific ways that you can be a "someone" to that person who has "no one."

Let's work to eliminate this phrase *"I have no one"* from our society, starting with our little corner of it!

any Christians are asked to be sponsors at the Baptism of a newlyborn child. This is looked upon as an HONOR, as indeed it is; but it is also a solemn RESPONSIBILITY which lasts a lifetime.

Our Lord called Baptism a second birth. Just as an infant is born physically of a father and mother, so a child is born again spiritually, having spiritual parents called sponsors. And just as natural parents have serious obligations for the care and upbringing of their child, so Godparents have important duties to their Godchildren. In particular, it is to see to it that the child receives a Christian upbringing in the bosom of the Church.


This means, then, that Godparents are not to forget their Godchildren after the Baptism and Chrismation. Sponsors can remember them on their "spiritual birthdays" and can give them gifts or tokens having religious significance, such as an icon, prayerbook, Bible or Cross.

Surely there must be prayer for the Godchild. And if parents themselves neglect the spiritual nurture of their children, then it behooves the Godparents to bring every effort to bear to see to it that the child receives a good Christian education. It is obvious from all this that Godparents themselves must be baptized and good members of their parishes. They must know the Faith and live it. It is the duty of parents, therefore, to choose Godparents with considerable care.

The lovely icon of the Birthgiver of God and Child Jesus serves to remind us of the need for Christian nurture of children. Parents and sponsors must coordinate their efforts in this vital holy task.

Feasts and Saints for this month

Saint Romanos the Melodist

October 01

Romanos was a Syrian Christian who lived in the beginning of the 6th century. A convert to Orthodoxy from Judaism, he was ordained a deacon and served in the Church of Beirut. His talent was great. Unlike others, he wrote his hymns in simple language and produced a pleasant meter in the verse by the way he accented words. The hymns he composed appealed to the hearts of the people and are still sung today.

Romanos has been called "Sweet Singer" (Ghlykophonos), "Melodist" (Melodhos), and "Righteous Chanter" (Psaltis Dhikeosinis). He wrote hundreds of hymns celebrating the mystery of the Incarnation, the Crucifixion, the Resurrection and the living of a Christian life. One of the most famous compositions is the hymn celebrating the Nativity of our Lord, *"Today the Virgin gives birth to the One who is above all living things….."* St. Romanos is said to have composed the Akathist Hymn, a kontakion that we still chant during the Friday evening Heretismoi services of Great Lent.

Romanos died on October 1st in 510 AD. He was a productive genius and artist, writing and accenting thousands of kontakia. He has been called the patron saint of all who sing for the Church. Others say he is the leader in the world of religious hymnology. Surely he has made a profound contribution to divine worship and deserves to be recognized by all who sing and by all who listen to the hymnology of our services.



Saint Thomas the Apostle

October 06

The Holy and Glorious Apostle Thomas was born in the Galilean city of Pansada. He was a fisherman. Hearing the good tidings of Jesus Christ, he left all and followed after Him. The Apostle Thomas is included in the number of the Twelve Apostles of the Savior.

According to Holy Scripture, the holy Apostle Thomas did not believe the reports of the other disciples about the Resurrection of Jesus Christ: *"Unless I see in His hands the print of the nails, and put my finger into the print of the nails, and thrust my hand into His side, I will not believe."* John 20:25

On the eighth day after the Resurrection, the Lord appeared to the Apostle Thomas and showed him His wounds. *"My Lord and my God,"* the Apostle cried out (John 20:28). *"Thomas, being once weaker in faith than the other apostles,"* says St John Chrysostom, "toiled through the grace of God more bravely, more zealously and tirelessly than them all, so that he went preaching over nearly all the earth, not fearing to proclaim the Word of God to savage nations."



Feasts and Saints for this month continued

Saint Thomas the Apostle – continued..

Some icons depicting this event are inscribed "The Doubting Thomas." This is incorrect. In Greek, the inscription reads, "The Touching of Thomas." In Slavonic, it says, "The Belief of Thomas." When St Thomas touched the Life-giving side of the Lord, he no longer had any doubts.

According to Church Tradition, the holy Apostle Thomas founded Christian churches in Palestine, Mesopotamia, Parthia, Ethiopia and India. Preaching the Gospel earned him a martyr's death. For having converted the wife and son of the prefect of the Indian city of Meliapur, the holy apostle was locked up in prison, suffered torture, and finally, pierced with five spears, he departed to the Lord. Part of the relics of the holy Apostle Thomas are in India, Hungary and on Mt. Athos.

Saint Philip the Apostle of the 70

October 11

Saint Philip, who had four daughters that prophesied, was from Caesarea of Palestine. He preached throughout Samaria; it was he also who met the eunuch of Candace, the Queen of the Ethiopians, as the eunuch was reading the Prophet Esaias, and he instructed and baptized him (Acts 8:26-39). He reposed in Tralles of Asia Minor while preaching the Gospel.



October 18

Luke was a native of Syrian Antioch, a companion of the holy Apostle Paul (Phil.1:24, 2 Tim. 4:10-11), and a physician enlightened in the Greek medical arts. Hearing about Christ, Luke arrived in Palestine and fervently accepted the preaching of salvation from the Lord Himself. As one of the Seventy Apostles, St Luke was sent by the Lord with the others to preach the Kingdom of Heaven during the Savior's earthly life (Luke 10:1-3). After the Resurrection, the Lord Jesus Christ appeared to Saints Luke and Cleopas on the road to Emmaus.

Luke accompanied St Paul on his second missionary journey, and from that time they were inseparable. When Paul's co-workers had forsaken him, only Luke remained to assist him in his ministry (2 Tim. 4:10-11). After the martyric death of the First-Ranked Apostles Peter and Paul, St Luke left Rome to preach in Achaia, Libya, Egypt and the Thebaid. He ended his life by suffering martyrdom in the city of Thebes.

Tradition credits St Luke with painting the first icons of the Mother of God. "Let the grace of Him Who was born of Me and My mercy be with these Icons," said the All-Pure Virgin after seeing the icons. St Luke also painted icons of the First-Ranked Apostles Peter and Paul. St Luke's Gospel was written in the years 62-63 at Rome, under the guidance of the Apostle Paul. In the preliminary verses (Luke 1:1-3), St Luke precisely sets forth the purpose of his work. He proposes to record, in chronological order, everything known by Christians about Jesus Christ and His teachings. By doing this, he provided a firmer historical basis for Christian teaching (Luke 1:4).

Saint Luke the Evangelist - continued

He carefully investigated the facts, and made generous use of the oral tradition of the Church and of what the All-Pure Virgin Mary Herself had told him.

In St Luke's Gospel, the message of the saluation made possible by the Lord Jesus Christ, and the preaching of the Gospel, are of primary importance. St Luke also wrote the Acts of the Holy Apostles in Rome around 62–63 A.D. The Book of Acts, which is a continuation of the four Gospels, speaks about the works and the fruits of the holy Apostles after the Ascension of the Savior. At the center of the narrative is the Council of the Holy Apostles at Jerusalem in the year 51, a Church event of great significance, which resulted in the separation of Christianity from Judaism and its independent dissemination into the world (Acts 15:6-29). The theological focus of the Book of Acts is the coming of the Holy Spirit, Who will guide the Church "into all truth" (John 16:13) until the Second Coming of Christ.


The holy relics of St Luke were taken from Constantinople and brought to Padua, Italy at some point in history. The Roman Catholic bishop of Padua, noting that Orthodox pilgrims came to Padua to venerate the relics, while many Catholics did not even know that the relics were there, appointed a committee to investigate the relics in Padua, and the skull of St Luke in the Catholic Cathedral of Prague. The skeleton was determined to be that of an elderly man of strong build. A rib from the relics of Saint Luke resides in St Luke's original tomb in the Orthodox cathedral at Thebes.

Saint James the Apostle

October 23

According to some, this Saint was a son of Joseph the Betrothed, born of the wife to whom Joseph was married, before he was betrothed to the Ever-Virgin. Hence he was the brother of the Lord, Who was also thought to be the son of Joseph (Matthew 13:55). But some say that he was a nephew of Joseph and the son of his brother Cleopas, who was also called Alphaeus and his wife, Mary, who was the first cousin of the Theotokos. But even according to this genealogy, he was still called, according to the idiom of the Scriptures, the Lord's brother, because of their kinship.

This lakouos is called the Less (Mark 15:40) by the Euangelists to distinguish him from lakovos, the son of Zebedee, who was called the Great. He became the first Bishop of Jerusalem, elevated to this Episcopal rank by the Apostles, according to Eusebius, and was called Obliah, that is, the Just, because of his great holiness and righteousness. Having ascended the crest of the Temple on the day of the Passover at the prompting of all, he bore testimony from there concerning his belief in Jesus and he proclaimed with a great voice that Jesus sits at the right hand of the great power of God and shall come again upon the clouds of heaven. On hearing this testimony, many of those present cried, "Hosanna to the Son of David." But the Scribes and Pharisees cried, "So, even the just one hath been led astray," and at the command of Ananias the high priest, the Apostle was cast down headlong and stoned. While he prayed for his slayers, his head was crushed by the wooden club by a certain scribe. The first of the Catholic (General) Epistles written to the Jews in the Diaspora who believed in Christ was written by this lakovos.

Saint Demetrios the Myrrh-Streamer

October 26

Saint Demetrius was a Thessalonian, a most pious son of pious and noble parents, and a teacher of the Faith of Christ. When Maximian first came to Thessalonica in 290, he raised the Saint to the rank of Duke of Thessaly. But when it was discovered that the Saint was a Christian, he was arrested and kept bound in a bath-house. While the games were under way in the city, Maximian was a spectator there. A certain friend of his, a barbarian who was a notable wrestler, Lyaeus by name, waxing haughty because of the height and strength of his body, boasted in the stadium and challenged the citizens to a contest with him. All that fought with him were defeated. Seeing this, a certain youth named Nestor, acquaintance of Demetrius, came to the Saint in the bath-house and asked his blessing to fight Lyaeus single-handed. Receiving this blessing and sealing himself with the sign of the precious Cross, he presented himself in the stadium, and said, "O God of Demetrius, help me!" and straightway he engaged Lyaeus in combat and smote him with a mortal blow to the heart, leaving the former boaster lifeless upon the earth. Maximian was sorely grieved over this, and when he learned who was the cause of this defeat, he commanded that Demetrius be pierced with lances while he was yet in the bath-house, As for Nestor, Maximian commanded that he be slain with his own sword.



The Holy Protection of the Theotokos

October 28

The Feast of the Protection commemorates the appearance of the most holy Theotokos in the Church of Blachernae in Constantinople in the tenth century, as recorded in the life of Saint Andrew the Fool for Christ's sake. While the multitudes of the faithful were gathered in church, Epiphanius, the friend of Saint Andrew, through the Saint's prayers, beheld the Virgin Mary above the faithful and spreading out her veil over them, signifying her unceasing protection of all Christians. Because of this we keep a yearly feast of gratitude, imploring our Lady never to cease sheltering us in her mighty prayers.
