





FAQs

Frequently Asked Questions about Stewardship:

"As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's grace." (1 Peter 4:10)

Q: IS THERE A DIFFERENCE BETWEEN "DUES" & "STEWARDSHIP"?

A: Yes! Three or four generations ago, it was commonplace for families throughout our Archdiocese to pay their annual "dues" or required membership fee to be a member of their local parish. Over time it was clear that this was not the healthiest way of committing to a local church as giving remained stagnant and the authentic Christian commitment of sacrificial giving became an afterthought. (note: the annual "dues" of \$300-350 back then would equate to roughly \$2,500-\$3,000 today) Stewardship, however, offers us the chance to recognize our unique blessings from God, and to give back based on what we have received. Stewardship is management of another's property, and all our blessings and gifts we have been given ultimately belong to God. We are but his caretakers, his priests, his stewards on this earth.

Q: How much should I give?

A: The foundations of Christian stewardship is both from Scripture and the teachings of our Lord. You may have heard the term tithing (the word tithe literally means tenth in Hebrew), and this refers to the biblical giving goal of 10% of your household income to your local church (Lev. 27:30; Num. 18:25-28; Deut. 14:22-24; 2 Chron. 31:5-6). Yet, we also hear from our Lord Jesus Christ that true giving is when we offer sacrificially "all that we have" (Luke 21:4), "store up your treasures in heaven" (Matt. 6:20), "it is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35), "for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor. 9:7). With this in mind, you are invited to prayerfully reflect on your own household income, and make your sacrificial offering based on what you receive. Consider also what you offer to Christ's Church in comparison to your monthly utility/service payments. ("Am I giving my phone more than my Church?") Use the chart to the right as a guide.

Q: WHAT DOES MY STEWARDSHIP PAY FOR?

A: It costs approximately \$2,000/day to keep the church open. Most operating expenses are paid from stewardship. Some examples are mortgage, utilities, office staff and pastoral salaries, candles, permits, and facilities maintenance. Additional costs are directly related to church programs.

Q: WHAT IS THE EASIEST WAY TO FULFILL MY PLEDGE?

A: The easiest way is online! Pledging and paying online is fast and EASY and is the preferred method for many of our families. Simply go to our website saint-anthonys.org and click the DONATE button and this will take you to our online giving platform. Under "Regular" click the Make a Donation button, then click Create a Recurring Donation, enter your weekly/monthly/semi-annually amount and fill in the necessary information. You can always call the church office for assistance in setting up easy recurring giving payments. Paying your pledge can also be done by check, envelopes, or credit card payments, though these are not as convenient for you.

Q: WHEN SHOULD I MAKE MY ANNUAL PLEDGE?

A: We would ask you to turn in your pledge card by January 31*. Our church budget is based on our expected annual income and expenses. Forecasting stewardship in January helps meet our parish goals.



Q: I DON'T LIKE TO PAY MY PLEDGE UNTIL DECEMBER. SHOULD I STILL PLEDGE IN JANUARY?

A: Yes. January pledging allows for effective fiscal budgeting. Pledge your annual amount, then pay weekly, monthly, semi-annually or annually.

Q: WHY DO I HAVE TO UPDATE MY INFORMATION EVERY YEAR?

A: We ask for updated information to provide you the opportunity to review your pledge for the upcoming year. As cost of living increases every year, so do our own parish expenses, and our giving to the church needs to adjust accordingly. We anticipate automatic online giving to become the standard in order to simplify the process.

Q: DOESN'T THE GREEK FESTIVAL BRING IN MOST OF THE FUNDING FOR THE CHURCH?

A: No. While the annual Pasadena Greek Fest is an important source of funding and support, it actually accounts for less than 15% of the total revenue brought in each year. Stewardship raises four times as much and is our primary source of funding for operating expenses. Ultimately, the goal is to have zero reliance on outside sources of funding, which would then make the Festival an outreach and community building opportunity, thus greatly alleviating the stress and dependency of this event.

Q: I ALREADY PAY FOR GREEK DANCE, GREEK LANGUAGE SCHOOL, BASKETBALL, ETC. WHY DO I HAVE TO PAY STEWARDSHIP TOO?

A: These programs operate independently from the church operating budget. The church provides the facility in addition to expenses enabling their operation and receives no money from these organizations. It is also important to know that families participating in our children's ministries must be currently pledged stewards.

Q: If I donate to a memorial fund, building fund, festival, or event, does that count as part of my stewardship?

A: No. Your stewardship is represented entirely by your stated pledge.

Q: IF I MAKE A NON-MONETARY DONATION TO THE CHURCH, CAN THIS REPRESENT MY STEWARDSHIP?

A: No. Your stewardship pledge cannot be substituted for non-monetary donations. However, your various donations to the festival and the church are always greatly appreciated and are tax-deductible.

Q: WHEN SHOULD MY CHILDREN BECOME STEWARDS?

A: As the principles of stewardship is that of sacrificial giving from what we have received, everyone is encouraged to become a "cheerful giver" as soon as one begins to generate his/her own income.

Q: WHAT IF I OR MY FAMILY EXPERIENCE A FINANCIAL HARDSHIP OR SEVERE CHANGE IN INCOME?

A: Parishioners who are experiencing financial hardships and are unable to fulfill their stewardship obligation, but still want to be considered in "good standing", can always contact the church office, and you may always speak with one of our priests.

Fact: With our congregation at roughly 300 families, to fully cover our operating expenses our goal is to have average stewardship be \$2,000 per family or above. Right now, <u>83% of our stewards are under that goal.</u>

This is the second time a person has gone away after having been ignored by the community.







- You must be of the Greek Orthodox Faith. To participate in the Junior Division you must be in grades 7-9. To participate in the Senior Division you must be in grades 10-12. Your topic must be selected from the list of topics in the corresponding division.
- The speech must be original and delivered in English. Previously used material is not eligible. Quotations must be used effectively as supportive material, and sources must be identified.
- No audio-visual material (slides, charts, etc.) may be used. The speech must be delivered from the lectern. The contents and/or delivery of the speech should not be dramatically presented.
- A parent or teacher may serve as a "coach" in preparation and delivery, but the speech must reflect your own writing and speaking style.
- 5. A speaker can present his/her speech at only one parish oratorical festival.
- 6. Topics must be chosen from the official list compiled by the Department of Religious Education. The speech delivered at the parish level must be the same one given at the district, metropolis and national finals levels with only minor revisions (i.e., grammatical corrections, deleting a paragraph if speech is over time limit, correcting syntax).
- 7. Speech time limits for each division are:

JUNIOR- minimum 3 minutes, maximum 4

SENIOR - minimum 4 minutes, maximum 5

A 15-second grace period will be given to speakers whose talks run over or under time. Speeches that run over or under the 15-second grace period will lose 1 point for each additional five seconds.

- 8. A copy of the speech must be given to the chairperson before or during the orientation session. Your name, full address, phone number, email, and division (junior or senior) should appear in the upper right-hand corner, along with the name and location of your church. Place the title of your speech (taken from the official list of topics) right above the opening statement. Speakers who advance to the district, metropolis and national finals festivals must also present a copy to the chairperson at these events.
- Speakers should dress in clothing that is professional and appropriate for Sunday church services.

JUNIOR DIVISION

(GRADES 7-9)



TOPIC 1

Orthodox tradition teaches that the saints remain spiritually active beyond their earthly life. Discuss how we ask the Saints to intercede and pray for us and why.

TOPIC 2

Orthodox Christians honor the Virgin Mary, the Most Holy Theotokos. What does the Orthodox Church believe about her and her role in our salvation?

TOPIC 3

The sacraments are the mysteries of the Church through which God gives us His grace by actions, words, and material objects (for example, oil, wine, and bread). Pick one sacrament and explain its meaning.

TOPIC 4

Jesus models and teaches humility throughout His life and ministry. Discuss the challenges of living according to Jesus' teachings in a society that does not necessarily emphasize humility.

TOPIC 5

Consider and discuss why and how icons are central to our faith and Orthodox practice.



SENIOR DIVISION

(GRADES 10-12)



TOPIC 1

The Ecumenical Patriarchate in Constantinople is the highest seat and the Mother Church of Orthodox Christians. The Ecumenical Patriarch is the spiritual leader of 300 million Orthodox Christians worldwide. Discuss how the Patriarchate has been a symbol of unity, a source of missionary growth, an advocate of dialogue among Christians, and a defender of the historical Orthodox Faith.

TOPIC 2

During times of crisis, our faith is tested. How are Orthodox Christians taught to understand and manage pain and suffering?

TOPIC 3

The Christian message in C.S. Lewis's *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe* has influenced many believers of Christ. How has another work of fiction inspired people to seek Jesus Christ?

TOPIC 4

We have lived through a pandemic and emerged with deep societal divides. How can our faith in Christ heal us and take us forward together?

TOPIC 5

The Resurrection of Jesus Christ both transforms the relationship between God and humanity and alters the course of history. How would you explain its significance to someone who has not heard about it or is unsure if God exists?

Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis...

Saluation = Faith + Works + Grace

Yet who know that a man is not justified by works of the law but through faith in Jesus Christ, even we have believed in Christ Jesus, in order to be justified by faith in Christ, and not by works of the law, because by works of the law shall no one be justified. But if, in our endeavor to be justified in Christ, we ourselves were found to be sinners, is Christ then an agent of sin? Certainly not! But if I build up again those things which I tore down, then I prove myself a transgressor. For I through the law died to the law, that I might live to God. I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me; and the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me.

Galatians 2:16-20

How, exactly are we "saved"?

Is it in one finite moment? Are we judged based on our whole life, or just how we are at the end? Is there a moment where we can say our salvation is guaranteed?

These are questions that many Christians ask, and even try to answer. The answers are found in various places in Scripture, so we don't have to guess, we can go right to the Scriptures.

In his letter to the Galatians, Saint Paul tells us that we "know that a man is not justified by works of the law but through faith in Jesus Christ." (Galatians 2:16) And in the Epistle of St. James, he writes to us that "faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead." (James 2:17) We know then that our salvation is based on both faith and works. Ultimately, salvation is an act of God's grace and mercy. For no amount of faith or works can make us worthy of salvation. No one can approach the Judgment Seat of Christ and proclaim themselves worthy to enter the Kingdom of God. Ultimately, our entrance into the Kingdom of God is an act of mercy on the part of the Lord, which will be affected by both our faith and our works.

There are some churches that espouse the notion of "once saved, always saved," with the idea that one is "saved" in a finite moment in time. This notion does not account for works, nor does it account for spiritual struggle that defines each Christian life. If I was "saved" years ago, then what is the incentive to struggle today?

One way to look at the saluation equation is to take a cup, rocks and water. The cup represents faith. It is the structure of what we believe. The rocks represent our works. If we have faith with no works, our faith is as empty as the empty cup. For faith without works is dead. On the other hand, if we have works without faith, it is like pouring a bunch of rocks on a table. They have no order, no structure, and ultimately no purpose.

How do we get grace?

One spoonful of Communion at a time is the best way to get it. One prayer at a time. One confession at a time. And over time, these "spoonfuls" of grace begin to truly fill the cup. The ultimate expression of grace, however, is God granting us His Kingdom at the end of our lives. And His judgment of our lives will be based on the "cup" we present Him. Will we have a large cup of faith? Will we have an empty cup, meaning we did no works to support the faith we claim to have? Will we have an impressive amount of rocks but no cup in which to keep them, meaning we did lots of good things but not in His name?

Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis...

The problem with works that are not in His name is, that - in whose name are they in? Ultimately good works not done for God end up being done for ourselves. Finally, how much grace did we seek through prayer and the sacraments

There is a finite equation for salvation:


It is faith plus works plus grace. The challenge is that faith, works and grace are things that cannot be quantified. There isn't a certain amount of each one that guarantees salvation. So we work each day to deepen our experience of each so that we can make our "case" before His Judgment Seat and ultimately leave it to God's Providence to judge us worthy of Paradise.

Saint Paul tells us that we should "live to God" (Galatians 2:19), and that the best way to live our lives is to not live for ourselves but for Him. He says in Galatians 2:20 "It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me" and consequently our lives are not lived for ourselves, but as St. Paul says:

"the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loves me and gave Himself for me. (Galatians 2:20)

Faith plus works plus grace equals salvation.

A life lived in Christ and for Christ bolsters faith, works and grace.

"How to Pray Properly"

Here is a of a number of points for the Christian to keep in mind concerning prayer:

When you pray you meet the holy God in person. In order to succeed in your life of prayer, try sincerely to make your conscience clear in relation to God, your neighbor and earthly possessions.

Nevertheless, do not hesitate to approach God in prayer, however bad you may feel yourself to be; all our sins are but a drop compared to the ocean of God's love.

Begin your prayers humbly every day as if you were doing it for the first time; prayer does not accumulate interest, the Fathers say.

Tune your mind to the sense of the presence of God and say the prayer unhurriedly, paying attention to every word; otherwise your prayer will be flung to the winds. When you notice that your thoughts have gone astray, simply bring them back to the words of the prayer without being disconcerted.

Repeat the Jesus Prayer in its longer or shorter form, whichever way feels better at the time:

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner!

Lord Jesus Christ, our God, have mercy on us! or, Jesus, Son of God, have mercy on me

When you are alone, sometimes recite the prayer aloud, and sometimes silently in your mind.

When you are praying do not form any mental image of God, heaven or anything else; imagination, according to the Fathers, is a coarse mental faculty which is not suited to prayer.

"How to Pray Properly" continued

Pay no attention to impure or blasphemous thoughts or images that may appear while you are praying; they are not your own but come from the evil spirit and will disappear if you take no notice of them.

Do not try to find the place of your heart by any special methods; this is suitable only for those who live in the stillness of complete solitude; fix your attention on the words of the prayer, and your heart will come along in its own time.

We must force ourselves to pray throughout our lives; it is just this struggle to which Christ refers when He says that the kingdom of heaven has suffered violence, and men of violence take it by force. (Matthew 11:12)

The only feeling for which one should consciously strive in prayer is that of contrition and unworthiness; other feelings are gifts of God's grace which He grants to us according to the measure of our humility.

Beware of taking credit for the fruits of prayer, such as concentration, emotion, tears. Often God in His mercy permits us at first to taste the sweetness of prayer, but then leaves us on our own in order to test our faithfulness and to show us what we are, without the help of His grace.

You can also recite the Jesus Prayer in church during a service and then all that you hear and see is like oil for the flame of your inner prayer. During the Eucharist, however, it is better to concentrate on the words of common prayer. According to the Fathers, the most important communion with God is Holy Communion, and the Jesus Prayer comes next.

Every day read a chapter of the Bible and one from the writings of the Fathers concerning prayer. Such reading is important in a time when living models and guides are lacking.

Adopt a suitable rule of prayer and stick to it like a close friend; yet do not allow it to enslave you.

Lastly, the most important thing to remember: Keep your heart free from hatred, envy and condemning thoughts, so that God may hear your prayer. Forgive everyone so that God may forgive you, and be merciful to all, so that God may have mercy on you. It is with good reason



The Sign of the Cross

The Sign of the Cross is one of Christianity's most ancient customs. It is a sign of blessing and commitment to the Crucified Lord. A simple custom, it is a statement of Christian faith which incorporates the entire body. Like many ancient customs, it has been done in a variety of ways over the centuries.

Current Orthodox Christian practice, used by all since the 17th century, involves combining the thumb, pointer and middle finger while placing the ring finger and the pinky against the palm. The unity of the three fingers represents the unity of the undivided Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit, three persons but one God. The two fingers pressed against the palm represent the two natures of Christ: human and divine. It indicates our belief in Jesus, who is both fully God and fully human.

Our motion, of course, recalls the cross: forehead, stomach, right shoulder and left shoulder, but also the God who is Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

As one moves through the sign, one recites the following:

At the forehead, "In the name of the Father"

At the navel, "and of the Son"

And across the shoulders, "and of the Holy Spirit, Amen."

It is as if to say "I love you Lord with all of my mind (forehead), with all my soul (navel), with all my strength (right shoulder) and with all my heart (left shoulder)"

Done at various times as a sign of reverence, it is traditionally made:

- * before kissing an icon or the Gospel book
- during the Liturgy
- whenever the Holy Trinity or the Virgin Mary is mentioned
- \ast before and after the Gospel is read
- * when lighting candles
- * and during the Creed

In short, few actions are so simple and yet symbolize so much of our Christian life.

Forgiveness Sunday - February 26

LETTING GO!

There is a story of a man walking down a narrow path along a cliff. He suddenly slips and finds himself clinging to a branch as he plummeted down. He spent most of the day crying out for help but to no avail, no one was there. Then he heard the voice of God say, 'I am here to rescue you, do exactly as I tell you.' The man answered back, 'Whatever you say I will do.' And God said in a thundering voice, 'Let go!' The man clinging for his life did not respond but then said, 'Is anyone else up there?' Humorous yet profound is the message of this story; we often rather suffer hanging onto a branch for our lives than *let go*. As we enter Great and Holy Lent on Forgiveness Sunday we heard, "For if you forgive men their transgressions, your heavenly Father will also forgive you; "but if you forgive not men their transgressions, neither will your Father forgive your transgressions [Mt. 6:14,15]." In the New Testament the Greek word being employed to forgive is *aphiémi* which means to *send away* or to *let go*, to *let things be*. To forgive can be the most difficult thing for us to do yet it is the most important for us on our Lenten journey.

Great Lent is a journey towards the healing of our life in Christ. Nothing can take place unless we begin with ourselves, with the things we are holding on to that are preventing us from loving. Until we are able to let go of things that have enslaved us, we will never be free. Such a task is not easy nor is it possible to have an awareness of all the things we are holding on to without the Holy Spirit and a desire to be free from the burdens we are carrying. The teaching may seem rather transactional that if I forgive others then God will forgive me and if I don't forgive others neither will God forgive me but it is much deeper than that. It is about loving people and seeing them as God sees them.



Just take a look at this passage from John's gospel when they were testing his teaching on mercy. "And the scribes and the Pharisees brought to Him a woman who had been caught in adultery. And after they made her stand in the midst, they say to Him, 'Teacher, this woman was caught committing adultery, in the very act. 'Now Moses, in the law, commanded us to stone such women. What do you say?' But this they were saying, putting Him to the test, in order that they may have an accusation against Him. But Jesus, having stooped down, was writing with His finger on the ground. And as they continued questioning Him, He lifted up Himself and

said to them, 'The *one who is* without sin among you, let him first cast the stone at her.' And again He stooped down and was writing on the ground. But after they heard and were convicted by *their own* conscience, they were going out one by one, beginning from the eldest. And Jesus was left alone, and the woman being in *the* midst. And after Jesus lifted up Himself, He said to her, 'Woman, where are those accusers of thine? Did no one condemn you?' And she said, 'No one, Sir.' And Jesus said, 'Neither do I condemn you; go, and henceforth no longer go on sinning [Jn. 8:3-11].' Metropolitan Anthony Bloom once said, "Unless we look at a person and see the beauty there is in this person, we can contribute nothing to him. One does not help a person by discerning what is wrong, what is ugly, what is distorted. Christ looked at everyone he met, at the prostitute, at the thief, and saw the beauty hidden there...and what He did was to call out this beauty." What a radical departure from our rush to judgment which is really nothing less than a failure to love. When we fail to love we certainly will neglect to pray for them so that they may come to the knowledge of the Truth and be saved and healed by Christ Himself. Great Lent is meant to awaken our conscience and allow it to convict us of our own failings and weakness and not focus on the sins of others.

When we fail to forgive it creates a distressful state for the soul and refusing to — takes our peace away. St. Paul points out the darkness created when our refusal to forgive leads to hatred. "The one who says he is in the light, and hates his brother or sister, is in the darkness until now. The one loving his brother or sister abides in the light, and

there is not an occasion of stumbling in him. But the one hating his brother is in darkness, and walks in the darkness, and knows not where he goes, because the darkness blinded his eyes [1 Jn. 2:9-11]." Forgiveness for others begins with allowing ourselves to be forgiven by God; this is what it means to walk in the Light of His Love. Holding on to personal sins and replaying them in our memories is a form of despising oneself and darkens the soul. In turn, not at peace with ourselves we find fault in others and project our self-hatred upon them. It is indeed a vicious cycle that leads us further into isolation and darkness. Great Lent is an invitation to let go of the past and allow the loving kindness and mercy of God to heal our wounds and restore us as children of Light

Great Lent begins with also this passage from St. Paul about arming ourselves with love for our neighbor and taking up the *weapons* of light. "Cease owing even one person even one thing, except to be loving one another. For the one who loves the other has fulfilled the law ... it is summed up in this phrase, namely, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' Love works no ill to a neighbor ... And also this, knowing the time, that it is an hour now to be awakened out of sleep; for now our salvation is nearer than when we believed. The night is advanced, and the day has drawn near. Let us therefore put away from ourselves the works of darkness, and let us put on the weapons of light. [Rom. 13:8-12]." The use of spiritual warfare language best describes the right mind-set for repentance which is necessary to reclaim love for all people and the means of victory. The *weapons of light* are many but Great Lent puts forth fasting, prayer, acts of mercy, worship and confession as the primary armaments for the battle before us.

Fasting is not about perfecting the art of vegan cuisine. Fasting is about experiencing *hunger* and asking ourselves what does my life really depend? It is to restore a proper balance in our lives. Instead of *living to eat* a prolonged period of fasting teaches us how to *eat to live*. Fasting is always connected with worship and receiving Christ in the Eucharist. Frequent communion through Great Lent is prescribed in order to strengthen us in our battle with sin. We fast and wait upon the Lord every Wednesday and Friday at the Presanctifed liturgies precisely because without the strength of Christ in us we will think we can conquer sin in our lives by trying *harder* on our own. Setting time aside daily and persevering in prayer, seeking union with Christ sets us on the right path and allows the Holy Spirit to act in our lives and awaken the conscience. Prayer and fasting assist us in entering into the love of Christ which allows us to see people as God does, through the lens of love and mercy. The more we fast, pray and love others, the deeper our love grows and the deeper our experience of God becomes and the more clearly we see the truth about ourselves and our sins. Using these spiritual disciplines leads to confession which is a desire to come before the presence of Christ through the priest. The priest is not an interrogator of sins but a vehicle of God's grace, mercy, forgiveness and love. As a sacrament it is not dependent upon the perceived holiness of your priest but upon the presence of the Holy Spirit within the Church who makes all things valid.

As we continue on our Lenten journey let us mediate on these words from St. Paul.


"Let love be without hypocrisy. Abhor the evil, and cleave to the good. Be kindly affectionate with brotherly love toward one another, in honor giving precedence to one another; in zeal, hesitate not; fervent in spirit, serving the Lord; rejoicing in hope, patient in tribulation, persevering in prayer, contributing to the needs of the saints, pursuing hospitality. Keep on blessing those who persecute you; keep on blessing, and not cursing. Be rejoicing with those who rejoice, and be weeping with those who weep. Be of the same mind toward one another. Mind not high things, but bring yourselves down to associate with the humble. Cease becoming wise in your own conceits. Render to

no one evil for evil. Provide for yourselves right things before all men. If possible, as to that which depends on you, be at peace with all men. Avenge not yourselves, beloved, but give place to wrath; for it has been written: 'Vengeance is Mine; I will repay,' said the Lord. Therefore, 'If your enemy should hunger, be feeding him; if he should thirst, be giving him drink; for in doing this you shalt heap coals of fire on his head.' Cease being conquered by the bad, but keep on conquering the bad with the good [Rom. 12:9-21]."


The Presentation of the Lord 2 February

When the most pure Mother and Ever-Virgin Mary's forty days of purification had been fulfilled, she took her first-born Son to Jerusalem on this, the fortieth day after His birth, that she might present Him in the temple according to the Law of Moses, which teaches that every first-born male child be dedicated to God, and also that she might offer the sacrifice of a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons, as required by the Law.

(Luke 2:22-24; Exod. 13:2; Lev. 12:6-8)

On this same day, a just and devout man, the greatly aged Symeon, was also present in the temple, being guided by the Holy Spirit. For a long time, this man had been awaiting the salvation of God and he had been informed by divine revelation that he would not die until he beheld the Lord's Christ. Thus, when he beheld Him at that time and took Him up into his aged arms, he gave glory to God, singing: "Now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace, O Master. . ." And he confessed that he would close his eyes joyfully, since he had seen the Light of Revelation for the nations and the Glory of Israel. (Luke 2:25-32)

From ancient times, the Holy Church has retained this tradition of the churching of the mother and new-born child on the fortieth day and of the reading of prayers of purification.



Feasts and Saints for this month

Triodion Begins— Sunday of the Publican & the Pharisee

5 February

The Pharisees were an ancient and outstanding sect among the Jews known for their diligent observance of the outward matters of the Law. Although, according to the word of our Lord, they "did all their works to be seen of men" (Matt. 23:5), and were hypocrites. Because of the apparent holiness of their lives they were thought by all to be righteous and separate from others, which is what the name Pharisee means. On the other hand, Publicans, collectors of the royal taxes, committed many injustices and extortions for filthy lucre's sake and all held them to be sinners and unjust. It was therefore according to common opinion that the Lord Jesus in His parable signified a virtuous person by a Pharisee and a sinner by a Publican, to teach His disciples the harm of pride and the profit of humble-mindedness.

Since the chief weapon for virtue is humility and the greatest hindrance to it is pride, the divine Fathers have set these three weeks before the Forty-day Fast as a preparation for the spiritual struggles of virtue. This present week they have called Harbinger, since it declares that the Fast is approaching; and they set humility as the foundation for all our spiritual labors by appointing that the parable of the Publican and the Pharisee be read on this day, even before the Fast begins, to teach, through the vaunting of the Pharisee, that the foul smoke of self-esteem and the stench of boasting drives away the grace of the Spirit, strips man of all his virtue and casts him into the pits of Hades; and, through the repentance and contrite prayer of the Publican, that humility confers upon the sinner's forgiveness of all his wicked deeds and raises him up to the greatest heights. No fasting the week that follows this Sunday.



Saint Theodore Commander and Great Martyr 8 February

The Holy Martyr Theodore was from Euchaita of Galatia and dwelt in Heraclea of Pontus. He was a renowned commander in the military. Emperor Licinius was told that he was a Christian and abominated the idols. Licinius therefore sent certain men to him from Nicomedia, to honor him and ask him to appear before him. Through them, however, Saint Theodore sent back a message that it was necessary for various reasons, that Licinius come to Heraclea. Licinius, seeing in this a hope of turning Saint Theodore away from Christ did as was asked of him.

When the Emperor came to Heraclea, Saint Theodore met him with honor and the Emperor in turn gave Theodore his hand, believing that through him he would be able to draw the Christians to the worship of his idols. Seated upon his throne in the midst of the people, he publicly bade Theodore offer sacrifice to the gods. But Theodore asked that the emperor entrust him with the most venerable of his gods, those of gold and silver, that he might take them home and himself attend upon them that evening, promising that the following day he would honor them in public. The Emperor, filled with joy at these tidings, gave command that Theodore's request be fulfilled.

When the Saint had taken the idols home, he broke them in pieces and distributed the gold and silver to the poor by night. The next day a centurion named Maxentius told Licinius that he had seen a pauper pass by carrying the head of Artemis. Saint Theodore, far from repenting of this, confessed Christ boldly. Licinius, in an uncontainable fury, had the Saint put to many torments, then crucified. While upon the cross, the holy Martyr was further tormented — his privy parts were cut off, he was shot with arrows, his eyes were put out and he was left on the cross to die. The next day Licinius sent men to take his corpse and cast it into the sea; but they found the Saint alive and perfectly whole. Through this, many believed in Christ. Seeing his own men turning to Christ and the city in an uproar, Licinius had Theodore beheaded, about the year 320. The Saint's holy relics were returned to his ancestral home on June 8, which is also a feast day of the Great Martyr Theodore.



Triodion - Sunday of the Prodigal Son

12 February

Through the parable of today's Gospel, our Saviour has set forth three things for us: the condition of the sinner, the rule of repentance, and the greatness of God's compassion. The divine Fathers have put this reading the week after the parable of the Publican and Pharisee so that, seeing in the person of the Prodigal Son our own wretched condition — inasmuch as we are sunken in sin, far from God and His Mysteries — we might at last come to our senses and make haste to return to Him by repentance during these holy days of the Fast.

Furthermore, those who have wrought many great iniquities and have persisted in them for a long time, oftentimes fall into despair, thinking that there can no longer be any forgiveness for them; so being without hope, they fall every day into the same and even worse iniquities. Therefore, the divine Fathers, that they might root out the passion of despair from the hearts of such people, and rouse them to the deeds of virtue, have set the present parable at the forecourts of the Fast, to show them the surpassing goodness of God's compassion, and to teach them that there is no sin -- no matter how great it may be -- that can overcome at any time His love for man.



Theodore the Tyro & Martyr

17 February


Saint Theodore who was from Amasia of Pontus, contested during the reign of Maximian (286-305). He was called Tyro, from the Latin *Tiro*, because he was a newly enlisted recruit. When it was reported that he was a Christian, he boldly confessed Christ. The ruler, hoping that he would repent, gave him time to consider the matter more completely and then give his answer. Theodore gave his answer by setting fire to the temple of Cybele, the "mother of the gods," and for this he suffered a martyr's death by fire.



Triodion - Judgment Sunday - Meatfare Sunday 19 February

The foregoing two parables — especially that of the Prodigal Son — have presented to us God's extreme goodness and love for man. But lest certain persons, putting their confidence in this alone, live carelessly, squandering upon sin the time given them to work out their salvation and death suddenly snatch them away, the most divine Fathers have appointed this day's feast commemorating Christ's impartial Second Coming, through which we bring to mind that God is not only the Friend of man, but also the most righteous Judge, Who recompenses to each according to his deeds.

It is the aim of the holy Fathers, through bringing to mind that fearful day, to rouse us from the slumber of carelessness unto the work of virtue and to move us to love and compassion for our brethren. Besides this, even as on the coming Sunday of Cheese-fare we commemorate Adam's exile from the Paradise of delight -- which exile is the beginning of life as we know it now -- it is clear that today's is reckoned the last of all feasts, because on the last day of judgment, truly, everything of this world will come to an end.





Triodion – Forgiveness Sunday – Cheesefare Sunday 26 February

The Holy Fathers have appointed the commemoration of Adam's exile from the Paradise of delight, here, on the eve of the holy Forty-day Fast, demonstrating to us not by simple words, but by actual deeds, how beneficial fasting is for man, and how harmful and destructive are insatiety and the transgressing of the divine commandments.

For the first commandment that God gave to man was that of fasting, which the first-fashioned received but did not keep; and not only did they not become gods, as they had imagined, but they lost even that blessed life which they had, and they fell into corruption and death, and transmitted these and innumerable other evils to all of mankind.



Triodion-Forgiveness Sunday-Cheesefare Sunday Continued...

The God-bearing Fathers set these things before us today, that by bringing to mind what we have fallen from, and what we have suffered because of the insatiateness and disobedience of the first-fashioned, we might be diligent to return again to that ancient bliss and glory by means of fasting and obedience to all the divine commands.

Taking occasion from the Gospel of Matthew 6:14-21 to begin the Fast unencumbered by enmity, we also ask forgiveness this day, first from God, then from one another and all creation.

Clean Monday / Kathara Deftera

27 February

Today we begin the 40-day Lenten Fast with a strict fast from meat, fish, oil, wine, dairy, and eggs.
