Message from Father Peter

Before Your voluntary Passion, Christ our God, You have given to all men an assurance of the General Resurrection; for at Bethany You have raised by Your almighty power, Lazarus who was four-days dead, and as Giver of Light, O Savior, You have made the blind to see. With Your disciples You have entered the Holy City, seated upon a colt, as though upon the cherubim, and so You have fulfilled the preaching of the prophets. The children of the Hebrews with palms and branches came to meet You. Therefore, we also bearing palms and olive branches cry aloud to You in thanksgiving: Hosanna in the Highest; blessed is He that comes in the Name of the Lord! ...From Saturday of Lazarus Matins Service

Dear Faithful,

"Therefore, we also bearing palms and olive branches cry aloud to You in thanksgiving!"

With these inspiring words, we approach another glorious Holy Week. This is the time of the year that we all need to come together as a Christian Family, to embrace these beautiful services of Holy Week, as they lead us, through participation and worship, to His Glorious Resurrection.

In an effort to prepare our faithful for a better understanding of the significance of each day of Holy Week, we are providing the Synaxarion Reading of each Great and Holy Day beginning with Palm Sunday. The daily Synaxarion, can be described as a collection of short descriptions of the lives of saints and martyrs, but also of accounts of important events that are commemorated that day. Here is a compilation of these important daily events:

Palm Sunday:

"The Savior has come today to the city of Jerusalem, to fulfill the Scriptures: and all have taken palms into their hands and spread their garments before Him, knowing that He is our God, to whom the cherubim sing without ceasing: Hosanna in the highest. Blessed are You who shows great compassion: have mercy upon us."

Great and Holy Monday:

"On Monday in Holy Week commemoration is made of the blessed and noble Joseph, and of the fig tree which was cursed and withered by the Lord.

The wise Joseph showed himself a just ruler. Praise to Thee O giver of grain.

The synagogue of the Hebrews is thought by Christ a fig tree destitute of spiritual fruit, and He withers it with His curse. Let us flee from a similar fate."

Great and Holy Tuesday:

"On this Holy and Great Tuesday we make remembrance of the Parable on the Ten Virgins written in the Holy Gospel.

Wherefore, O Christ the Bridegroom number us with the wise virgins and have mercy upon us. Amen."

Great and Holy Wednesday:

"On Wednesday in Holy Week it has been ordained by the Holy Fathers that commemoration should be made of the anointing of the Lord with myrrh by the woman who was a sinner, for this occurred shortly before the Passion of the Savior."

Great and Holy Thursday:

"The Divine Father, having given good order to all things and in proper succession of readings from the Sacred Epistles and the Holy Gospels, gives us four events to commemorate on Holy and Great Thursday; the sacred act of the feet washing, the mystical supper (that is the tradition of our practice concerning the awesome mysteries) the most wonderful and extraordinary prayer, and the betrayal."

Message from Father Peter

Great and Holy Friday:

"On Great Friday is celebrated the Holy saving, and awful Passion of our Lord and God and Savior Jesus Christ. For us He willingly endured the spitting, the scourging, the buffeting, the scorn, the mocking, and the purple robe; the reed, the sponge, the vinegar, the nails, the spear, and above all, the Cross and Death. Also celebrated is the confession on the cross unto salvation of the penitent thief, who was crucified with Him."

Great and Holy Saturday:

On the Great and Holy Saturday we celebrate the Burial of the Divine Body, and the descent of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ to Hades, through which He restored our kind, from corruption and transplanted it to eternal life. Wherefore, by Thine ineffable condescension, O Christ our God, have mercy upon us. Amen.

Great Sunday of Pascha:

On the Holy and Great Sunday of Pascha, we celebrate the life giving Resurrection of our Lord, God and Savior Jesus Christ.

With much anticipation and love, our Lord is welcoming us all back into His Holy Church. Come and see! Come and pray! Come and receive! Come and taste! Come and participate! Come and experience all the beauty of Holy Week and the joy of Christ's Holy Resurrection!

FAQs

Frequently Asked Questions about Stewardship:

"As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's grace." (1 Peter 4:10)

Q: IS THERE A DIFFERENCE BETWEEN "DUES" & "STEWARDSHIP"?

A: Yes! Three or four generations ago, it was commonplace for families throughout our Archdiocese to pay their annual "dues" or required membership fee to be a member of their local parish. Over time it was clear that this was not the healthiest way of committing to a local church as giving remained stagnant and the authentic Christian commitment of sacrificial giving became an afterthought. (note: the annual "dues" of \$300-350 *back then* would equate to roughly \$2,500-\$3,000 *today*) Stewardship, however, offers us the chance to recognize our unique blessings from God, and to give back based on what we have received. Stewardship is management of another's property, and all our blessings and gifts we have been given ultimately belong to God. We are but his caretakers, his priests, his *stewards* on this earth.

Q: HOW MUCH SHOULD I GIVE?

A: The foundations of Christian stewardship is both from Scripture and the teachings of our Lord. You may have heard the term tithing (the word tithe literally means tenth in Hebrew), and this refers to the biblical giving goal of 10% of your household income to your local church (Lev. 27:30; Num. 18:25-28; Deut. 14:22-24; 2 Chron. 31:5-6). Yet, we also hear from our Lord Jesus Christ that true giving is when we offer sacrificially "all that we have" (Luke 21:4), "store up your treasures in heaven" (Matt. 6:20), "it is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35), "for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor. 9:7). With this in mind, you are invited to prayerfully reflect on your own household income, and make your sacrificial offering based on what you receive. Consider also what you offer to Christ's Church in comparison to your monthly utility/service payments. ("Am I giving my phone more than my Church?") Use the chart to the right as a guide.

Q: WHAT DOES MY STEWARDSHIP PAY FOR?

A: It costs approximately \$2,000/day to keep the church open. Most operating expenses are paid from stewardship. Some examples are mortgage, utilities, office staff and pastoral salaries, candles, permits, and facilities maintenance. Additional costs are directly related to church programs.

Q: WHAT IS THE EASIEST WAY TO FULFILL MY PLEDGE?

A: The easiest way is online! Pledging and paying online is fast and EASY and is the preferred method for many of our families. Simply go to our website saint-anthonys.org and click the DONATE button and this will take you to our online giving platform. Under "Regular" click the Make a Donation button, then click Create a Recurring Donation, enter your weekly/monthly/semi-annually amount and fill in the necessary information. You can always call the church office for assistance in setting up easy recurring giving payments. Paying your pledge can also be done by check, envelopes, or credit card payments, though these are not as convenient for you.

Q: WHEN SHOULD I MAKE MY ANNUAL PLEDGE?

A: We would ask you to turn in your pledge card by January 31*. Our church budget is based on our expected annual income and expenses. Forecasting stewardship in January helps meet our parish goals.

Q: I DON'T LIKE TO PAY MY PLEDGE UNTIL DECEMBER. SHOULD I STILL PLEDGE IN JANUARY?

A: Yes. January pledging allows for effective fiscal budgeting. Pledge your annual amount, then pay weekly, monthly, semi-annually or annually.

Q: WHY DO I HAVE TO UPDATE MY INFORMATION EVERY YEAR?

A: We ask for updated information to provide you the opportunity to review your pledge for the upcoming year. As cost of living increases every year, so do our own parish expenses, and our giving to the church needs to adjust accordingly. We anticipate automatic online giving to become the standard in order to simplify the process.

Q: DOESN'T THE GREEK FESTIVAL BRING IN MOST OF THE FUNDING FOR THE CHURCH?

A: No. While the annual Pasadena Greek Fest is an important source of funding and support, it actually accounts for less than 15% of the total revenue brought in each year. Stewardship raises four times as much and is our primary source of funding for operating expenses. Ultimately, the goal is to have zero reliance on outside sources of funding, which would then make the Festival an outreach and community building opportunity, thus greatly alleviating the stress and dependency of this event.

Q: I ALREADY PAY FOR GREEK DANCE, GREEK LANGUAGE SCHOOL, BASKETBALL, ETC. WHY DO I HAVE TO PAY STEWARDSHIP TOO?

A: These programs operate independently from the church operating budget. The church provides the facility in addition to expenses enabling their operation and receives no money from these organizations. *It is also important to know that families participating in our children's ministries must be currently pledged stewards.*

Q: IF I DONATE TO A MEMORIAL FUND, BUILDING FUND, FESTIVAL, OR EVENT, DOES THAT COUNT AS PART OF MY STEWARDSHIP?

A: No. Your stewardship is represented entirely by your stated pledge.

Q: IF I MAKE A NON-MONETARY DONATION TO THE CHURCH, CAN THIS REPRESENT MY STEWARDSHIP?

A: No. Your stewardship pledge cannot be substituted for non-monetary donations. However, your various donations to the festival and the church are always greatly appreciated and are tax-deductible.

Q: WHEN SHOULD MY CHILDREN BECOME STEWARDS?

A: As the principles of stewardship is that of sacrificial giving from what we have received, everyone is encouraged to become a "cheerful giver" as soon as one begins to generate his/her own income.

Q: WHAT IF I OR MY FAMILY EXPERIENCE A FINANCIAL HARDSHIP OR SEVERE CHANGE IN INCOME?

A: Parishioners who are experiencing financial hardships and are unable to fulfill their stewardship obligation, but still want to be considered in "good standing", can always contact the church office, and you may always speak with one of our priests.

Fact: With our congregation at roughly 300 families, to fully cover our operating expenses our goal is to have average stewardship be \$2,000 per family or above. Right now, <u>83% of our stewards are under that goal.</u>

Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis...

Many times, people in our church wonder, sometimes rather loudly, why we do the same thing all the time when it comes to our liturgical services and calendar for the year. Saint Paul helps provide an answer in his Epistle to the Hebrews, when he writes: *"Therefore we must pay the closer attention to what we have heard, lest we drift away from it."* (Hebrews 2:1)

Marketing specialists say that it takes at least seven "touches" to get people to remember things they see advertised. That is why companies run the same commercials again and again, hoping the product they are advertising will stick in our heads, especially the next time we go shopping.

The Church is very wise in setting up the Lent and Holy Week journey in the way that it does – as it repeats each year. That's because throughout life, we experience this special time of year in a different way. When I was a child, we thought Holy Week was great because we got to stay up late. We begged our parents to let us go to the late services, not because we knew who Christ is, or because we had an appreciation for what we were seeing or hearing. We wanted to go just to stay up late. Even then, however, we understood that Holy Week was something special.

When I got older and served in the altar, Holy Week was special because in this great "play" that the priest was putting on, the altar boys got to be on center stage with him. Again, not the holiest of thoughts about Holy Week, but the week still had a special feeling for us. I remember one year on Holy Thursday; I saw our priest kneeling at the cross and he started crying. That moment has always stuck with me. That was a very private moment in the middle of a very public service. Now that I serve as a priest, I realize that, that might have been his only private moment of worship the entire Holy Week. His tears told me that what we were doing is pretty important, serious and moving.

As I have come to know who Christ is, Holy Week takes on a different meaning. I know why Christ came, I know what He did, and I've read it enough times in the Bible. Now, I listen to the hymns and Scripture passages of Holy Week and pick up new and different layers of meaning. On Holy Tuesday, for instance, we hear of a harlot who anointed Jesus' feet with her tears contrasted to Judas, a trusted disciple who betrayed Jesus for 30 pieces of silver. This reminds us that it's not how we start but how we finish that matters. It makes me examine where I am in relationship to God as I run my "race" through life. Am I more like the repentant woman, or the fallen disciple?

Let's leave Holy Week for a minute and speak of the Divine Liturgy that we celebrate so often in our church. Why the repetition? There are three reasons.

First, the Divine Liturgy affords us a way to BE with Christ that is unique to the Liturgy–the opportunity to receive Holy Communion. This is as close to "perfection" as we can get, as Holy Communion affords us the opportunity to touch God, and for God to touch us. As is often said, "You cannot improve on perfection." So, we come again and again to experience perfection.

Second, the Divine Liturgy is the most complete prayer—it touches everything we can think of in prayer — for peace in the world, for our country, our city, our president, for those who are sick, for deliverance from any kind of affliction and need — these are things we may forget to pray about daily. If we come to the Divine Liturgy each Sunday, not a week will go by that we don't remember all of these things in prayer.

Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis...

Third, the Divine Liturgy recalls things of which I need constant reminding. For instance, when the priest prays for "*all that is good and beneficial to our souls and for peace in the world,"* it reminds me to make my decisions based on these two metrics:

Is it good for my soul?

Does it promote peace in the world?

Not a week in my life has passed where I've made every decision on these two standards. I'm still looking for my first perfect week. The Divine Liturgy is a reminder of the things I'm supposed to do, the things that help me show love for God and for my neighbor.

Saint Paul's Epistle reading is a reminder that we must "*pay the closer attention to what we have heard, lest we drift away from it.*" It is a reminder that if we do not pay close attention to what we hear, either because we are not in attendance or we are not trying to comprehend what we are hearing, we are going to drift away from what God is calling us to be.

Plan to go to church this Sunday, and every Sunday.

Plan to attend some additional services now during Lent and Holy Week as well!

"How to Pray Properly"

Here is a of a number of points for the Christian to keep in mind concerning prayer:

When you pray you meet the holy God in person. In order to succeed in your life of prayer, try sincerely to make your conscience clear in relation to God, your neighbor and earthly possessions.

Nevertheless, do not hesitate to approach God in prayer, however bad you may feel yourself to be; all our sins are but a drop compared to the ocean of God's love.

Begin your prayers humbly every day as if you were doing it for the first time; prayer does not accumulate interest, the Fathers say.

Tune your mind to the sense of the presence of God and say the prayer unhurriedly, paying attention to every word; otherwise your prayer will be flung to the winds. When you notice that your thoughts have gone astray, simply bring them back to the words of the prayer without being disconcerted.

Repeat the Jesus Prayer in its longer or shorter form, whichever way feels better at the time:

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner! Lord Jesus Christ, our God, have mercy on us! or, Jesus, Son of God, have mercy on me When you are alone, sometimes recite the prayer aloud, and sometimes silently in your mind.

When you are praying do not form any mental image of God, heaven or anything else; imagination, according to the Fathers, is a coarse mental faculty which is not suited to prayer.

Pay no attention to impure or blasphemous thoughts or images that may appear while you are praying; they are not your own but come from the evil spirit and will disappear if you take no notice of them.

Do not try to find the place of your heart by any special methods; this is suitable only for those who live in the stillness of complete solitude; fix your attention on the words of the prayer, and your heart will come along in its own time.

We must force ourselves to pray throughout our lives; it is just this struggle to which Christ refers when He says that the kingdom of heaven has suffered violence, and men of violence take it by force. (Matthew 11:12)

The only feeling for which one should consciously strive in prayer is that of contrition and unworthiness; other feelings are gifts of God's grace which He grants to us according to the measure of our humility.

Beware of taking credit for the fruits of prayer, such as concentration, emotion, tears. Often God in His mercy permits us at first to taste the sweetness of prayer, but then leaves us on our own in order to test our faithfulness and to show us what we are, without the help of His grace.

You can also recite the Jesus Prayer in church during a service and then all that you hear and see is like oil for the flame of your inner prayer. During the Eucharist, however, it is better to concentrate on the words of common prayer. According to the Fathers, the most important communion with God is Holy Communion, and the Jesus Prayer comes next.

Every day read a chapter of the Bible and one from the writings of the Fathers concerning prayer. Such reading is important in a time when living models and guides are lacking.

Adopt a suitable rule of prayer and stick to it like a close friend; yet do not allow it to enslave you.

Lastly, the most important thing to remember: Keep your heart free from hatred, envy and condemning thoughts, so that God may hear your prayer. Forgive everyone so that God may forgive you, and be merciful to all, so that God may have mercy on you. It is with good reason that the Fathers say: Your neighbor is your salvation.

The Sign of the Cross

The Sign of the Cross is one of Christianity's most ancient customs. It is a sign of blessing and commitment to the Crucified Lord. A simple custom, it is a statement of Christian faith which incorporates the entire body. Like many ancient customs, it has been done in a variety of ways over the centuries.

Current Orthodox Christian practice, used by all since the 17th century, involves combining the thumb, pointer and middle finger while placing the ring finger and the pinky against the palm. The unity of the three fingers represents the unity of the undivided Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit, three persons but one God. The two fingers pressed against the palm represent the two natures of Christ: human and divine. It indicates our belief in Jesus, who is both fully God and fully human.

Our motion, of course, recalls the cross: forehead, stomach, right shoulder and left shoulder, but also the God who is Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

As one moves through the sign, one recites the following: At the forehead, "In the name of the Father" At the navel, "and of the Son" And across the shoulders, "and of the Holy Spirit, Amen."

It is as if to say "I love you Lord with all of my mind (forehead), with all my soul (navel), with all my strength (right shoulder) and with all my heart (left shoulder)"

Done at various times as a sign of reverence, it is traditionally made:

- before kissing an icon or the Gospel book
- during the Liturgy
- * whenever the Holy Trinity or the Virgin Mary is mentioned
- * before and after the Gospel is read
- when lighting candles
- * and during the Creed

In short, few actions are so simple and yet symbolize so much of our Christian life.

Feasts and Saints for this month

Sunday of Saint Mary of Egypt 2 April

The memory of this Saint is celebrated on April 1, where her life is recorded. This was a woman in all of human history who stood on air at the moment of her prayer.

Since this is during the holy Forty Days, it has been appointed for this day also, so that if we think it hard to practice a little abstinence for forty days, we might be roused by the heroism of her who fasted in the wilderness forty seven years; and also that the great loving-kindness of God, and His readiness to receive the repentant, might be demonstrated in every deed.



Her whole life is a living expression of the words said by Saint Paul:

"All the more the blood of Christ, Who through the Eternal Spirit offered Himself without blemish to God, will purify your conscience from dead works to serve the living God." (Hebrews 9:14)

St. Paul's words are Divinely inspired and verified by the Most Holy Mother of God Herself. She guided St. Mary of Egypt to repentance and Eternal Life.

As much as we know about St. Mary of Egypt, we can understand that it is, in reality, the stark truth that Christ is the True God and that all of the false gods of the world then and now are idols who do not save humanity, but can truly harm us.

Feasts and Saints for this month

Lazarus Saturday

8 April

Lazarus and his sisters Martha and Mary, the friends of the Lord Jesus, had given Him hospitality and served Him many times (Luke 10:38-42; John 12:2-3). They were from Bethany, a village of Judea. This village is situated in the eastern parts by the foothills of the Mount of Olives, about two Roman miles from Jerusalem. When Lazarus, whose name is a Hellenized form of "Eleazar," which means "God has helped," became ill some days before the saving Passion, his sisters had this report taken to our Saviour, Who was then in Galilee. Nonetheless, He tarried yet two more days until Lazarus died: then He said to His disciples, *"Let us go into Judea that I might awake My friend who sleepeth."* By this, of course, He meant the deep sleep of death.

On arriving at Bethany, He consoled the sisters of Lazarus, who was already four days dead. Jesus groaned in spirit and was troubled at the death of His beloved friend. He asked, "Where have ye laid his body?" and He wept over him. When He drew nigh to the tomb, He commanded that they remove the stone, and He lifted up His eyes, and giving thanks to God the Father, He cried out with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come forth." And he that had been dead four days came forth immediately, bound hand and foot with the grave clothes, and Jesus said to those standing there, "Loose him, and let him go." This is the supernatural wonder wrought by the Saviour that we celebrate on this day.

According to an ancient tradition, it is said that Lazarus was thirty years old when the Lord raised him; then he lived another thirty years on Cyprus and there reposed in the Lord. It is furthermore related that after he was raised from the dead, he never laughed till the end of his life, but that once only, when he saw someone stealing a clay vessel, he smiled and said, "Clay stealing clay." His grave is situated in the city of Kition, having the inscription: *"Lazarus the four days dead and friend of Christ."*

In 890 his sacred relics were transferred to Constantinople by Emperor Leo the Wise, at which time the Emperor composed his stichera for Vespers, "Wishing to behold the tomb of Lazarus . ."



Palm Sunday

9 April

On Sunday, five days before the Passover of the Law, the Lord came from Bethany to Jerusalem. Sending two of His disciples to bring Him a foal of an ass, He sat thereon and entered into the city. When the multitude there heard that Jesus was coming, they straight-away took up the branches of palm trees in their hands, and went forth to meet Him. Others spread their garments on the ground, and yet others cut branches from the trees and strewed them in the way that Jesus was to pass; and all of them together, especially the children, went before and after Him, crying out: "Hosanna: Blessed is He that cometh in the Name of the Lord, the King of Israel" (John 12:13). This is the radiant and glorious festival of our Lord's entry into Jerusalem that we celebrate today.

The branches of the palm trees symbolize Christ's victory over the devil and death. The word Hosanna means "Save, I pray," or "Save, now." The foal of an ass, and Jesus' sitting thereon, and the fact that this animal was untamed and considered unclean according to the Law, signified the former uncleanness and wildness of the nations, and their subjection thereafter to the holy Law of the Gospel.

Holy Monday

10 April

The Holy Passion of our Savior begins today, presenting Joseph the all-comely as a prefiguring of Christ. He was the eleventh son of Jacob, and his first son by Rachel; because he was so beloved of his father, his own brethren came to envy him and cast him into a pit. Later they sold him to foreigners for thirty pieces of silver, who later sold him again in Egypt. Because of his virtue, his master gave him much authority in governing his house; because he was fair of countenance, his master's wife sought to draw him into sin with her; because of his chastity, he refused her, and through her slanders was cast into prison. Finally, he was led forth again with great glory and was honored as a king. He became lord over all Egypt and a provider of wheat for all the people. Through all this, he typifies in himself the betrayal, Passion, death, and glorification of our Lord

To the commemoration of Patriarch Joseph is added also the narration concerning the fig tree, which on this day was cursed and subsequently dried up because of its unfruitfulness. It portrayed the Jewish synagogue, which had not produced the fruit demanded of it - obedience to God and faith in Him. It was stripped of all spiritual grace by means of the curse.





Holy Tuesday

11 April

Today we bring to mind the parable of the ten virgins, which our Savior related as He was coming to His Passion. This parable teaches us that the accomplishment of the great work of virginity should not make us careless in other matters, especially in almsgiving, wherewith the lamp of virginity is made radiant.

Furthermore, it teaches us that we should not be remiss about the end of our life, but should be prepared for it at every moment, like the wise virgins, so that we may meet the Bridegroom, lest He come suddenly and the doors of the heavenly bride chamber be shut, and we also, like the foolish virgins, hear that dread sentence: "Amen, I say unto you, I know you not" (Matthew 25:1-13).



Holy Wednesday

12 April

Two women - the more discerning interpreters of the Gospel - anointed the Lord with myrrh; the one, a long time before His Passion; the other, a few days before. One was a harlot and sinner; the other, chaste and virtuous. The Church commemorates this reverent act today. While mentioning herein the person of the harlot, it also mentions Judas' betrayal; for, according to the account in Matthew, both of these deeds took place two days before the Passover, on Wednesday.

That woman, then, anointed Jesus' head and feet with very precious myrrh, and wiped them with the tresses of her hair. The disciples, especially the avaricious Judas, were scandalized, supposedly because of the waste of the myrrh, which could be sold for a great price and given to the poor. The Lord Jesus reproved them and told them not to trouble the woman.

Indignant, Judas went to the high priests, who were gathered in the court of Caiaphas and were already taking counsel against Jesus. On agreeing with them to betray his Teacher for thirty pieces of silver, Judas sought from that time opportunity to betray Him (Matt. 26:14-16). Because the betrayal took place on Wednesday, we have received the tradition from Apostolic times to fast on Wednesday throughout the year.



Holy Thursday 13 April

On the evening of this day, which was the eve of the feast of unleavened bread (that is, the Passover), our Redeemer supped with His twelve disciples in the city. He blessed the bread and the wine, and gave us the Mystery of the Divine Eucharist. He washed the feet of the disciples as an example of humility. He said openly that one of them was about to betray Him, and He pointed out the betrayer by revealing that it was he "*that dippeth his hand with Me in the disc.*" And after Judas had straight-away gone forth, Jesus gave the disciples His final and sublime instructions, which are contained in the first Gospel Reading of the Holy Passion (John 13:31-18:1 known as the Gospel of the Testament).

After this the God-man went forth to the Mount of Olives, and there He began to be sorrowful and in anguish. He went off alone, and on His knees He prayed fervently. From His great anguish, His sweat became as it were great drops of blood falling to the ground. As soon as He had completed that anguished prayer, Judas came with a multitude of soldiers and a great crowd; on greeting the Teacher guilefully with a kiss, he betrayed Him.

The Lord Jesus was then apprehended and taken prisoner to the high priests Annas and Caiaphas. The disciples were scattered, but Peter, who was more fervent than the others, followed Him even into the court of the high priest, but in the end denied three times that he was His disciple.

Then our divine Teacher was brought before the lawless Sanhedrin and was interrogated concerning His disciples and His teaching. The high priest adjured Him before God that He tell them whether He was truly the Christ. And having spoken the truth, He was judged guilty of death, supposedly as one who had blasphemed. Then they spat in His face, beat Him, smote Him with the palms of their hands, and mocked Him in every way, throughout the whole night until the morning.



Holy Friday

14 April

When Friday dawned, Christ was sent bound from Caiaphas to Pontius Pilate, who was then Governor of Judea. Pilate interrogated Him in many ways, and once and again acknowledged that He was innocent, but to please the Jews, he later passed the sentence of death against Him. After scourging the Lord of all as though He were a runaway slave, he surrendered Him to be crucified.

Thus the Lord Jesus was handed over to the soldiers, was stripped of His garments, was clothed in a purple robe, was crowned with a wreath of thorns, had a reed placed in His hand as though it were a scepter, was bowed before in mockery, was spat upon, and was buffeted in the face and on the head. Then they again clothed Him in His own garments, and bearing the cross, He came to Golgotha, a place of condemnation.

There, about the third hour, He was crucified between two thieves. Although both blasphemed Him at the first, the thief at His right hand repented, and said: *"Remember me, O Lord, when Thou comest in Thy Kingdom*," to which our Savior answered, *"Today shalt thou be with Me in Paradise*." As He hung upon the Cross, He was blasphemed by those who were passing by, was mocked by the high priests and by the soldiers was given vinegar to drink mixed with gall.

About the ninth hour, He cried out with a loud voice, saying, *"It is finished."* And the Lamb of God "*Which taketh away the sin of the world*" (John 1:29) expired on the day when the moon was full, and at the hour when, according to the Law, was slain the Passover lamb, to which He was referred in the time of Moses—the Lamb of God.

Even lifeless creation mourned the death of the Master, and it trembled and was altered out of fear. Yet, even though the Maker of creation was already dead, they pierced Him in His immaculate side, and forthwith there came out Blood and Water. Finally, at about the setting of the sun, Joseph of Arimathea came with Nicodemus (both secret disciples of Jesus), and they took down the all-holy Body of the Teacher from the Cross and anointed it with aromatic spices, and wrapped it in a clean linen cloth. When they had buried Him in a new tomb, they rolled a great stone over its entrance.

Such are the dread and saving sufferings of our Lord Jesus Christ commemorated today, and in remembrance of them, we have received the Apostolic commandment that a fast be observed every Friday.



Holy Saturday

15 April

On Saturday, the high priests and Pharisees gathered together before Pilate and asked him to have Jesus' tomb sealed until the third day; because, as those enemies of God said, "We suspect that His disciples will come and steal His buried body by night, and then proclaim to the people that His resurrection is true, as that deceiver Himself foretold while He was yet alive; and then the last deception shall be worse than the first." After they had said these things to Pilate and received his permission, they went and sealed the tomb, and assigned a watch for security, that is, guards from among the soldiers under the supervision of the high priests (Matt. 27:62–66).

While commemorating the entombment of the holy Body of our Lord today, we also celebrate His dread descent with His soul, whereby He destroyed the gates and bars of Hades, and made His light to shine where only darkness had reigned (Job 38:17 and 1 Peter 3:18–20). Death was put to death, Hades was stripped of all its captives, our first parents and all the righteous who died from the beginning of time ran to Him Whom they had awaited and the holy angelic orders glorified God for the restoration of our fallen race.



Great and Holy Pascha

16 April

Mary Magdalene, and the other women who were present at the burial of our Savior on Friday evening, returned from Golgotha to the city and prepared fragrant spices and myrrh, so that they might anoint the body of Jesus. On the morrow, because of the law which forbids work on the day of the Sabbath, they rested for the whole day. But at early dawn on the Sunday that followed, almost thirty-six hours since the death of the Life-giving Redeemer, they came to the sepulcher with the spices to anoint His body. While they were considering the difficulty of rolling away the stone from the door of the sepulcher, there was a fearful earthquake; and an Angel, whose countenance shone like lightning and whose garment was white as snow, rolled away the stone and sat upon it. The guards that were there became as dead from fear and took to flight. The women, however, went into the sepulcher, but did not find the Lord's body. Instead, they saw two other Angels in the form of youths clothed in white, who told them that the Savior was risen, and they sent forth the women, who ran to proclaim to the disciples these gladsome tidings. Then Peter and John arrived, having learned from Mary Magdalene what had come to pass, and when they entered the tomb, they found only the winding sheets.

Therefore, they returned again to the city with joy, as heralds now of the supernatural Resurrection of Christ, Who in truth was seen alive by the disciples on this day on five occasions. Our Lord, then, was crucified, died, and was buried on Friday, before the setting of the sun, which was the first of His "three days" in the grave; observing the mystical Sabbath, that "seventh day" in which it is said that the Lord "rested from all His works" (Gen. 2:2-3), He passed all of Saturday in the grave; and He arose "while it was yet dark, very early in the morning" on Sunday, the third day, which, according to the Hebrew reckoning, began after sunset on Saturday.

As we celebrate today this joyous Resurrection, we greet and embrace one another in Christ, thereby demonstrating our Savior's victory over death and corruption, and the destruction of our ancient enmity with God, and His reconciliation toward us, and our inheritance of life everlasting. The feast itself is called Pascha, which is derived from the Hebrew word which means "Passover"; because Christ, Who suffered and arose, has made us to pass over from the curse of Adam and slavery to the devil and death unto our primal freedom and blessedness. In addition, this day of this particular week, which is the first of all the rest, is dedicated to the honor of the Lord; in honor and remembrance of the Resurrection, the Apostles transferred to this day the rest from labor that was formerly assigned to the Sabbath of the ancient Law.



Sunday of Thomas

23 April

Though the doors were shut at the dwelling where the disciples were gathered for fear of the Jews on the evening of the Sunday after the Passover, our Savior wondrously entered and stood in their midst, and greeted them with His customary words, "*Peace be unto you*."

Then He showed unto them His hands and feet and side; furthermore, in their presence, He took some fish and a honeycomb and ate before them, and thus assured them of His bodily Resurrection. But Thomas, who was not then present with the others, did not believe their testimony concerning Christ's Resurrection, but said in a decisive manner:

"*Except I shall see in His hands the print of the nails, and put my finger into the print of the nails, and thrust my hand into His side, I will not believe.*"

Wherefore after eight days, that is, on this day, when the disciples were again gathered together and Thomas was with them, the Lord Jesus came while the doors were shut, as He did formerly. Standing in their midst,

He said, "Peace be unto you"; then He said to Thomas, "Bring hither thy finger, and behold my hands; and bring hither thy hand, and thrust it into My side: and be not unbelieving, but believing."

And Thomas, beholding and examining carefully the hands and side of the Master, cried out with faith, "*My Lord and my God*." Thus he clearly proclaimed the two natures – human and divine – of the God–man (Luke 24:36–49; John 20:19–29).

This day is called Antipascha (meaning "in the stead of Pascha," not "in opposition to Pascha") because with this day, the first Sunday after Pascha, the Church consecrates every Sunday of the year to the commemoration of Pascha, that is, to the Resurrection.



Sunday of Myrrh Bearing Women

30 April

About the beginning of His thirty-second year, when the Lord Jesus was going throughout Galilee, preaching and working miracles, many women who had received of His beneficence left their own homeland and from then on followed after Him. They ministered unto Him out of their own possessions, even until His crucifixion and entombment; and afterwards, neither losing faith in Him after His death, nor fearing the wrath of the Jewish rulers, they came to the sepulcher, bearing the myrrh-oils they had prepared to anoint His body. It is because of the myrrh-oils, that these God-loving women brought to the tomb of Jesus that they are called the Myrrh-bearers. Of those whose names are known are the following: first of all, the most holy Virgin Mary, who in Matthew 27:56 and Mark 15:40 is called "the mother of James and Joses" (these are the sons of Joseph by a previous marriage, and she was therefore their step-mother); Mary Magdalene (celebrated July 22); Mary, the wife of Clopas; Joanna, wife of Chouza, a steward of Herod Antipas; Salome, the mother of the sons of Zebedee, Mary and Martha, the sisters of Lazarus; and Susanna. As for the names of the rest of them, the evangelists have kept silent.

Together with them we also celebrate the secret disciples of the Savior, Joseph and Nicodemus. Of these, Nicodemus was probably a Jerusalemite, a prominent leader among the Jews and of the order of the Pharisees, learned in the Law and instructed in the Holy Scriptures. He had believed in Christ when, at the beginning of our Savior's preaching of saluation, he came to Him by night. Furthermore, he brought some one hundred pounds of myrrh-oils and an aromatic mixture of aloes and spices out of reverence and love for the divine Teacher (John 19:39). Joseph, who was from the city of Arimathea, was a wealthy and noble man, and one of the counselors who were in Jerusalem. He went boldly unto Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus, and together with Nicodemus he gave Him burial. Since time did not permit the preparation of another tomb, he placed the Lord's body in his own tomb which was hewn out of rock, as the Evangelist says (Matthew 27:60).
