

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Message from Father Peter

Dear Faithful,

On Sunday June 11 we will celebrate **The Feast of All Saints** in our Holy Orthodox Church. The Feast of All Saints marks the beginning of a new season in the ecclesiastical calendar of our Church. The season from Easter to Pentecost occurs in the springtime, while the Feast of All Saints ushers us into the beautiful season of summer.

Summertime! Students and teachers have completed another school year and people are thinking about their vacations. Many have already begun to enjoy outdoor activities, sports, cookouts, and trips to the beach.

To be sure, responsibilities do not end. Some painting may have to be done and landscaping continues. Their is always something to be done. Nevertheless, summertime is a time of sun, enjoyment, and a more relaxed pace.

In our culture the change of seasons creates a paradox for the new liturgical cycle. From Easter to Pentecost the local parish is usually vibrant with activities. But after Pentecost and the Feast of All Saints, with the beginning of summer, the pace usually slows down. Church Schools end. Meetings are less frequent. Bible classes and other study groups take a break. Even worship is drastically affected. As I often say in Church: "God does not take the summer off!"

Is this what the Lord truly desires for His people during the summer? How can we in our personal, family, and parish lives harmonize the summer change of pace with the orthodox spiritual values of the Church? How can we truly enjoy a rightful measure of fun and relaxation and still be mindful of our prayer life and worship to God?

An understanding of the word "Saint" would help us to relate our Christian faith to our summer activities. It is not an exaggeration to say that, if we truly understand the full meaning of sainthood, we would have the key to the most enjoyable summer of them all: A Christian summer! It may be that by God's providence, the timing of the Feast of All Saints is exactly what we need, after all! What greater spiritual challenge is there for us at the beginning of the summer than to think about the Saints and to emulate their lives of growing closer to God. I challenge us all to keep God in our mind, in our heart, and in our soul during this beautiful time of year. If you are traveling find an Orthodox Church to visit. If you are staying home continue to come to church on the Sundays of summer.

Make God the priority in your life this summer! Have a blessed summer with our Lord!

FAQs

Frequently Asked Questions about Stewardship:

"As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God"s grace." (1 Peter 4:10)

Q: IS THERE A DIFFERENCE BETWEEN "DUES" & "STEWARDSHIP"?

A: Yes! Three or four generations ago, it was commonplace for families throughout our Archdiocese to pay their annual "dues" or required membership fee to be a member of their local parish. Over time it was clear that this was not the healthiest way of committing to a local church as giving remained stagnant and the authentic Christian commitment of sacrificial giving became an afterthought. (note: the annual "dues" of \$300-350 back then would equate to roughly \$2,500-\$3,000 today) Stewardship, however, offers us the chance to recognize our unique blessings from God, and to give back based on what we have received. Stewardship is management of another's property, and all our blessings and gifts we have been given ultimately belong to God. We are but his caretakers, his priests, his stewards on this earth.

Q: How much should I give?

A: The foundations of Christian stewardship is both from Scripture and the teachings of our Lord. You may have heard the term tithing (the word tithe literally means tenth in Hebrew), and this refers to the biblical giving goal of 10% of your household income to your local church (Lev. 27:30; Num. 18:25-28; Deut. 14:22-24; 2 Chron. 31:5-6). Yet, we also hear from our Lord Jesus Christ that true giving is when we offer sacrificially "all that we have" (Luke 21:4), "store up your treasures in heaven" (Matt. 6:20), "it is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35), "for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor. 9:7). With this in mind, you are invited to prayerfully reflect on your own household income, and make your sacrificial offering based on what you receive. Consider also what you offer to Christ's Church in comparison to your monthly utility/service payments. ("Am I giving my phone more than my Church?") Use the chart to the right as a guide.

Q: WHAT DOES MY STEWARDSHIP PAY FOR?

A: It costs approximately \$2,000/day to keep the church open. Most operating expenses are paid from stewardship. Some examples are mortgage, utilities, office staff and pastoral salaries, candles, permits, and facilities maintenance. Additional costs are directly related to church programs.

Q: WHAT IS THE EASIEST WAY TO FULFILL MY PLEDGE?

A: The easiest way is online! Pledging and paying online is fast and EASY and is the preferred method for many of our families. Simply go to our website saint-anthonys.org and click the DONATE button and this will take you to our online giving platform. Under "Regular" click the Make a Donation button, then click Create a Recurring Donation, enter your weekly/monthly/semi-annually amount and fill in the necessary information. You can always call the church office for assistance in setting up easy recurring giving payments. Paying your pledge can also be done by check, envelopes, or credit card payments, though these are not as convenient for you.

Q: WHEN SHOULD I MAKE MY ANNUAL PLEDGE?

A: We would ask you to turn in your pledge card by January 31*. Our church budget is based on our expected annual income and expenses. Forecasting stewardship in January helps meet our parish goals.

Q: I DON'T LIKE TO PAY MY PLEDGE UNTIL DECEMBER. SHOULD I STILL PLEDGE IN JANUARY?

A: Yes. January pledging allows for effective fiscal budgeting. Pledge your annual amount, then pay weekly, monthly, semi-annually or annually.

Q: WHY DO I HAVE TO UPDATE MY INFORMATION EVERY YEAR?

A: We ask for updated information to provide you the opportunity to review your pledge for the upcoming year. As cost of living increases every year, so do our own parish expenses, and our giving to the church needs to adjust accordingly. We anticipate automatic online giving to become the standard in order to simplify the process.

Q: DOESN'T THE GREEK FESTIVAL BRING IN MOST OF THE FUNDING FOR THE CHURCH?

A: No. While the annual Pasadena Greek Fest is an important source of funding and support, it actually accounts for less than 15% of the total revenue brought in each year. Stewardship raises four times as much and is our primary source of funding for operating expenses. Ultimately, the goal is to have zero reliance on outside sources of funding, which would then make the Festival an outreach and community building opportunity, thus greatly alleviating the stress and dependency of this event.

Q: I ALREADY PAY FOR GREEK DANCE, GREEK LANGUAGE SCHOOL, BASKETBALL, ETC. WHY DO I HAVE TO PAY STEWARDSHIP TOO?

A: These programs operate independently from the church operating budget. The church provides the facility in addition to expenses enabling their operation and receives no money from these organizations. It is also important to know that families participating in our children's ministries must be currently pledged stewards.

Q: If I donate to a memorial fund, building fund, festival, or event, does that count as part of my stewardship?

A: No. Your stewardship is represented entirely by your stated pledge.

Q: IF I MAKE A NON-MONETARY DONATION TO THE CHURCH, CAN THIS REPRESENT MY STEWARDSHIP?

A: No. Your stewardship pledge cannot be substituted for non-monetary donations. However, your various donations to the festival and the church are always greatly appreciated and are tax-deductible.

Q: WHEN SHOULD MY CHILDREN BECOME STEWARDS?

A: As the principles of stewardship is that of sacrificial giving from what we have received, everyone is encouraged to become a "cheerful giver" as soon as one begins to generate his/her own income.

Q: WHAT IF I OR MY FAMILY EXPERIENCE A FINANCIAL HARDSHIP OR SEVERE CHANGE IN INCOME?

A: Parishioners who are experiencing financial hardships and are unable to fulfill their stewardship obligation, but still want to be considered in "good standing", can always contact the church office, and you may always speak with one of our priests.

Fact: With our congregation at roughly 300 families, to fully cover our operating expenses our goal is to have average stewardship be \$2,000 per family or above. Right now, 83% of our stewards are under that goal.



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Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis...

Now in these days when the disciples were increasing in number, the Hellenists murmured against the Hebrews because their widows were neglected in the daily distribution. And the twelve summoned the body of the disciples and said, "It is not right that we should give up preaching the word of God to serve tables. Therefore, brethren, pick out from among you seven men of good repute, full of the Spirit and of wisdom, whom we may appoint to this duty. But we will devote ourselves to prayer and to the ministry of the word." And what they said pleased the whole multitude, and they chose Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Spirit, and Philip, and Prochorus, and Nicanor, and Timon, and Parmenas, and Nicolaus, a proselyte of Antioch. These they set before the apostles, and they prayed and laid their hands upon them. And the word of God increased; and the number of the disciples multiplied greatly in Jerusalem, and a great many of the priests were obedient to the faith. Acts 6:1-7

The Bible is not only a source of spiritual inspiration but in many cases gives us a good view into our history. Such is the case with chapter 6 in the book of Acts. From this short passage, we glean the two very important and essential works of the church — preaching the Word of God and giving food to the poor. The "daily distribution" was the giving of food to the widows. As the church began to grow, the Apostles could not keep up with preaching the word of God and also the daily distribution. People who were used to receiving food began to murmur against the Apostles because they felt neglected. The Apostles threw their hands up and said there wasn't enough time to pray, spread the Word of Christ and feed the hungry and they needed help to do so.

So, they found seven men whom they "ordained" deacons, to assist in distributing food to the poor. From this brief passage, we see the rudimentary structure of our modern ordination service — it involves the laying on of hands and is done in the presence and with the consent of the people. In the Orthodox service of ordination, whether it be a deacon, priest or bishop, the ordaining bishop (in the case of an episcopal ordination, at least three bishops) lays his hands over the candidate being ordained and offers the prayer of ordination over him. The people present agree by saying "Axios," "Worthy." If the people say "Anaxios" or "unworthy" then the ordination cannot be completed.

Going back to the purpose of the church, it seems like it is very simple — preach the Word of God and distribute food to the poor. These are the earliest stated works of the church. I've spent over twenty years of my life working for the church as a priest, and I know first-hand that we don't do either of these things as well as we should, and that we have other things on which we focus. The majority of effort in most churches goes toward fundraising to keep the churches open. The idea of giving money to the poor is looked down upon in many places. "Charity begins at home" is a motto many really believe. Our church at present gives 7% of its income to charity. We are hopefully working our way up to 10%. That will be a challenge. It should be automatic.

Same thing with serving the poor. Our parish helps to staff a soup kitchen on the third Saturday of each month. Some of our members go regularly to help, but most have not gone even once. If we were doing this right, we should be able to staff it every Saturday, perhaps even have our own soup kitchen.

When we make our churches about Greek dancing and sports for our children, it is any wonder that they grow up not knowing the Word of God or have any desire to serve the poor because we have not taught them the two basic things. Greek festivals are a great opportunity to sell food to pay our bills, but the early church wasn't selling food to festival patrons, it was giving food to the poor.

Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis...

Please don't read today's message as a rant. I hope it serves as motivation for each of us to think and to reflect on how we individually and as a whole can do a better job doing the two things outlined in the book of Acts — spread the Word of God and feed the hungry.

The Bible can't be any more specific about what we are doing. Festivals, fundraiser and fancy buildings were not on the agenda for the Apostles and while these things are part of the modern parish life, they should not be the things that define it.

The church is always looking for people to step forward to help in its ministries, and the church is looking for everyone to contribute more in terms of financial stewardship, so that we can meet the needs of the parish and still have a good amount left over to help the poor. Ideally, we each set aside the first fruits of our income for the church and the church sets aside its first fruits to distribute to the poor.

Individually and collectively, we need to make a greater effort to spread the Word of God and feed the hungry!

As we navigate our lives and challenges befall us, as they do everyone, St Maximus reminds us to look at these challenges is a different and unique way. Not as punishments from God, He loves us and allows everything for us out of love (remember we have free will), but as an opportunity to improve spiritually. St Maximus points out that misfortunes can lead to beautiful outcomes and accomplishments both in this world and the next. Unfortunately in the process of complaining about what has happened to us, or worrying about it, we take no action and lose or squander the opportunity. When we are beset with misfortune, let us with prayer, meet it head-on, recognizing it as an opportunity to grow. Many of these challenges, in retrospect, become central to our growth and development as an individual and are looked at as the "best thing that ever happened to me".



YOUTH EQUIPPED TO SERVE. YES creates formative opportunities that equip participants to serve each person as the image of Christ. The 3 core opportunities we offer are YES Trips, Series, and Internships.

YES Day Trips: YES Trips are experiences of service designed by YES and facilitated by YES leaders for local students and young adults. Participants are taken through a four-step service-learning process known as E4: EXPOSE, ENGAGE, EQUIP, ENTRUST.



We first *EXPOSE* them to the reality of poverty in the world through interactive curriculum. Students are presented with questions: What is the church's true mission, and what does it mean for us as members of the body of Christ? What are the stereotypes within us that prevent us from putting others' needs before our own? Is poverty a complex or simple problem, and what is our place in the solution?

We then **ENGAGE** the students with the people of their city through interactive

service opportunities. Each opportunity is chosen and designed based on the unique needs of the city and the participants. By creating formative experiences that bring the participants together with people in need, walls are broken down and bridges are built. Meaningful

connections are made with local organizations and the people they serve.

Our Leadership Trainings *EQUIP* students with tools to guide others in service. Selected Trip and Series participants are invited to go through our Leadership Training, which equips them to facilitate our Trips, lead small groups in our Series, and bring the YES mission to their own communities.

Lastly, they are *ENTRUSTED* with various leadership roles on trips, and most importantly, with continuing the mission of YES in their communities, to inspire, lead, and educate others.



YES Series: The YES Series provides an intentional community for youth and young adults across the country to engage with relevant, meaningful topics. The online gatherings provide a space for people to come as they are and work towards their true identities in Christ. Led by Steve Christoforou and Katrina Bitar, participants receive practical guidance on living life in Christ and reflect in small groups led by YES Leaders.

YES Internship: Over 3 months, interns work to bring the YES mission to their communities through an individualized project designed to meet a local need. Interns are empowered to identify their values, strengthen their voice, and explore their vocation. They conclude their experience with

self-reflection and looking ahead to being servants of Christ in all aspects of their lives.

The YES Program aims to present to young people, the one true Way of life- living for the sake of the other. Our prayer for the students that come through our program is that they embrace life in Christ themselves and are empowered to live it!



Feasts and Saints for this month

Pentecost 4 June

After the Savior's Ascension into the Heavens, the eleven Apostles and the rest of His disciples, the God-loving women who followed after Him from the beginning, His Mother, the most holy Virgin Mary, and His brethren. All together about 120 souls returned from the Mount of Olives to Jerusalem. Entering into the house where they gathered, they went into the upper room, and there they persevered in prayer and supplication, awaiting the coming of the Holy Spirit, as their Divine Teacher had promised them. In the meanwhile, they chose Matthias, who was elected to take the place of Judas among the Apostles.

Thus, on this day, the seventh Sunday of Pascha, the tenth day after the Ascension and the fiftieth day after Pascha, at the third hour of the day from the rising of the sun, there suddenly came a sound from Heaven, as when a mighty wind blows, and it filled the whole house where the Apostles and the rest with them were gathered. Immediately after the sound, there appeared tongues of fire that divided and rested upon the head of each one. Filled with the Spirit, all those present began speaking not in their native tongue, but in other tongues and dialects, as the Holy Spirit instructed them.

The multitudes that had come together from various places for the feast, most of whom were Jews by race and religion, were called Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and so forth, according to the places where they dwelt. Though they spoke many different tongues, they were present in Jerusalem by divine dispensation. When they heard that sound that came down from Heaven to the place where the disciples of Christ were gathered, all ran together to learn what had taken place. But they were confounded when they came and heard the Apostles speaking in their own tongues. Marveling at this, they said one to another, "Behold, are not all these which speak Galileans? And how hear we every man in our own tongue, wherein we were born?" But others, because of their foolishness and excess of evil, mocked the wonder and said that the Apostles were drunken.

Then Peter stood up with the eleven, and raising his voice, spoke to all the people, proving that that which had taken place was not drunkenness, but the fulfillment of God's promise that had been spoken by the Prophet Joel: "And it shall come to pass in the last days, that I shall pour out of My Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and daughters shall prophesy" (Joel 2:28), and he preached Jesus of Nazareth unto them, proving in many ways that He is Christ the Lord, Whom the Jews crucified but God raised from the dead.

Pentecost - continued

On hearing Peter's teaching, many were smitten with compunction and received the word. Thus, they were baptized, and on that day about three thousand souls were added to the Faith of Christ.

Such, therefore, are the reasons for today's feast: the coming of the All-holy Spirit into the world, the completion of the Lord Jesus Christ's promise, and the fulfillment of the hope of the sacred disciples, which we celebrate today. On this last, and great, and saving day of Pentecost, the Apostles of the Savior, who were unlearned fishermen, made wise now of a sudden by the Holy Spirit, clearly and with divine authority spoke the heavenly doctrines. They became heralds of the truth and teachers of the whole world. They were ordained and began their apostleship, of which the salvation of those 3000 souls in one day was the comely and marvelous first fruit.

Some erroneously hold that Pentecost is the "birthday of the Church." But this is not true, for the teaching of the holy Fathers is that the Church existed before all other things. Saint Gregory the Theologian speaks of "the Church of Christ ... both before Christ and after Christ". Saint Epiphanius of Cyprus writes, "The Catholic Church, which exists from the ages, is revealed most clearly in the incarnate advent of Christ". Saint John Damascene observes, "The Holy Catholic Church of God, therefore, is the assembly of the holy Fathers, Patriarchs, Prophets, Apostles, Evangelists, and Martyrs who have been from the very beginning, to whom were added all the nations who believed with one accord". According to Saint Gregory the Theologian, "The Prophets established the Church, the Apostles conjoined it, and the Evangelists set it in order". The Church existed from the creation of the Angels, for the Angels came into existence before the creation of the world, and they have always been members of the Church. Saint Clement, Bishop of Rome, says in his second epistle to the Corinthians, the Church "was created before the sun and moon"; and a little further on, "The Church existeth not now for the first time, but hath been from the beginning" (II Cor. 14).

That which came to pass at Pentecost, then, was the ordination of the Apostles, the commencement of the apostolic preaching to the nations, and the inauguration of the priesthood of the new Israel. Saint Cyril of Alexandria says that "Our Lord Jesus Christ herein ordained the instructors and teachers of the world and the stewards of His divine Mysteries ... showing together with the dignity of Apostleship, the incomparable glory of the authority given them ... Revealing them to be splendid with the great dignity of the Apostleship and showing them forth as both stewards and priests of the divine altars . . . they became fit to initiate others through the enlightening guidance of the Holy Spirit". Therefore, together with the baptism of the Holy Spirit which came upon them who were present in the upper chamber, which the Lord had foretold as recorded in the Acts, "ye shall be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days hence" (Acts 1:5), the Apostles were also appointed and raised to the high priestly rank, according to Saint John Chrysostom . On this day commenced the celebration of the Holy Eucharist by which we become "partakers of the Divine Nature" (II Peter 1:4). For before Pentecost, it is said of the Apostles and disciples only that they abode in "prayer and supplication" (Acts 1:14); it is only after the coming of the Holy Spirit that they persevered in the "breaking of bread, "that is, the communion of the Holy Mysteries-"and in prayer" (Acts 2:42).


The feast of Holy Pentecost, therefore, determined the beginning of the priesthood of grace, not the beginning of the Church. All foods are allowed during the week following Pentecost.

Day of the Holy Spirit

5 June

As it is the custom of the Church, on the day after every great Feast, to honor those through whom it came to pass — our Lady on the day after the Lord's Nativity, Joachim and Anna after our Lady's Nativity, the holy Baptist the day after Theophany, and so forth. So on this day after Pentecost we honor our God the All-Holy Spirit, the Comforter promised by our Savior to His disciples (John 14:16), Who descended upon them at holy Pentecost and guided them "into all truth" and through them, us.



On this day we rest from labor.

Nativity of Saint John the Baptist Elizabeth, mother of the Forerunner 24 June

He that was greater than all who are born of women, the Prophet who received God's testimony that he surpassed all the Prophets, was born of the aged and barren Elizabeth (Luke 1: 7) and filled all his kinsmen, and those that lived round about, with gladness and wonder. But even more wondrous was that which followed on the eighth day when he was circumcised, that is, the day on which a male child receives his name. Those present called him Zacharias, the name of his father. But the mother said, "Not so, but he shall be called John." Since the child's father was unable to speak, he was asked, by means of a sign, to indicate the child's name. He then asked for a tablet and wrote. "His name is John." And immediately Zacharias' mouth was opened, his tongue was loosed from its silence of nine months, and filled with the Holy Spirit, he blessed the God of Israel, Who had fulfilled the promises made to their fathers, and had visited them that were sitting in darkness and the shadow of death, and had sent to them the light of saluation. Zacharias prophesied concerning the child also, saying that he would be a Prophet of the Most High and Forerunner of Jesus Christ. And the child John, who was filled with grace, grew and waxed strong in the Spirit; and he was in the wilderness until the day of his showing to Israel (Luke 1:57-80).

Peter & Paul, Holy Apostles

29 June

The divinely-blessed **Peter** was from Bethsaida of Galilee. He was the son of Jonas and the brother of Andrew the First-called. He was a fisherman by trade, unlearned and poor, and was called Simon; later he was renamed Peter by the Lord Jesus Christ Himself, Who looked at him and said, "Thou art Simon the son of Jonas; thou shalt be called Cephas (which is Peter)" (John 1:42). On being raised by the Lord to the dignity of an Apostle and becoming inseparable from Him as His zealous disciple, he followed Him from the beginning of His preaching of salvation up until the very Passion, when, in the court of Caiaphas the high priest, he denied Him thrice because of his fear of the Jews and of the danger at hand. But again, after many bitter tears, he received complete forgiveness of his transgression. After the Resurrection of Christ and the descent of the Holy Spirit, he preached in Judea, Antioch, and certain parts of Asia, and finally came to Rome, where he was crucified upside down by Nero, and thus he ascended to the eternal habitations about the year 66 or 68, leaving two Catholic (General) Epistles to the Church of Christ.

Paul, the chosen vessel of Christ, the glory of the Church, the Apostle of the Nations and teacher of the whole world, was a Jew by race, of the tribe of Benjamin, having Tarsus as his homeland. He was a Roman citizen, fluent in the Greek language, an expert in knowledge of the Law, a Pharisee, born of a Pharisee, and a disciple of Gamaliel, a Pharisee and notable teacher of the Law in Jerusalem. For this cause, from the beginning, Paul was a most fervent zealot for the traditions of the Jews and a great persecutor of the Church of Christ; at that time, his name was Saul (Acts 22:3-4). In his great passion of rage and fury against the disciples of the Lord, he went to Damascus bearing letters of introduction from the high priest. His intention was to bring the disciples of Christ back to Jerusalem in bonds. As he was approaching Damascus, about midday there suddenly shone upon him a light from Heaven. Falling on the earth, he heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou Me?" And he asked, "Who art Thou, Lord?" And the Lord said, "I am Jesus Whom thou persecutest; it is hard for thee to kick against the pricks."

And that heavenly voice and brilliance made him tremble, and he was blinded for a time. He was led by the hand into the city, and on account of a divine revelation to the Apostle Ananias, he was baptized by him, and both his bodily and spiritual eyes were opened to the knowledge of the Sun of Righteousness.

Peter & Paul - continued

And thru transformation beyond all expectation, he spoke with boldness in the synagogues, proclaiming that "Christ is the Son of God" (Acts 9:1-21). As for his zeal in preaching the Gospel after these things had come to pass, as for his un-abating labors and afflictions of diverse kinds, the wounds, the prisons, the bonds, the beatings, the stoning, the shipwrecks, the journeys, the perils on land, on sea, in cities, in wildernesses, the continual vigils, the daily fasting, the hunger, the thirst, the nakedness, and all those other things that he endured for the Name of Christ, and which he underwent before nations and kings and the Israelites, and above all, his care for all the churches, his fiery longing for the salvation of all, whereby he became all things to all men, that he might save them all if possible, and because of which, with his heart aflame, he continuously traveled throughout all parts, visiting them all, and like a bird of heaven flying from Asia and Europe, the West and East, neither staying nor abiding in any one place - all these things are related incident by incident in the Book of the Acts, and as he himself tells them in his Epistles.

His Epistles, being fourteen in number, are explained in 250 homilies by the divine Chrysostom and make manifest the loftiness of his thoughts, the abundance of the revelations made to him, the wisdom given to him from God, wherewith he brings together in a wondrous manner the Old with the New Testaments, and expounds the mysteries thereof which had been concealed under types; he confirms the doctrines of the Faith, expounds the ethical teaching of the Gospel, and demonstrates with exactness the duties incumbent upon every rank, age, and order of man. In all these things his teaching proved to be a spiritual trumpet, and his speech was seen to be more radiant than the sun, and by these means he clearly sounded forth the word of truth and illumined the ends of the world.

Having completed the work of his ministry, he likewise ended his life in martyrdom when he was beheaded in Rome during the reign of Nero, at the same time, when Peter was crucified.

Synaxis of 12 Apostles

30 June

The names of the Twelve Apostles are these: Simon, who was called Peter, and his brother Andrew, the First-called; James the son of Zebedee, and his brother John, who was also the Evangelist and Theologian; Philip, and Bartholomew; Thomas, and Matthew the publican, who was also called Levi and was an Evangelist; James the son of Alphaeus, and Jude (also called Lebbaeus, and surnamed Thaddaeus), the brother of James, the Brother of God; Simon the Cananite ("the Zealot"), and Matthias, who was elected to fill the place of Judas the traitor.
