

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Message from Father Peter

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We have reached that beautiful time of year when we offer devotions in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary, August 1st-August 15th.

Our Holy Orthodox Church has set four major Feast Days for the Mother of God. On August 15th we commemorate one of these holy days, The Dormition (falling asleep) of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

This great Feast Day of the Dormition is preceded by 15 days of devotions and prayers to the Blessed Mother of God. During this period we observe a strict period of fasting. We pray and attend Paraklesis (Supplication) Services to the Theotokos and we attend the Divine Liturgy on Tuesday August 15th. By following these disciplines of the Church, we will properly prepare ourselves for the sacrament of Holy Communion on that blessed day.

According to Holy Tradition, when the time came for the Mother of God to depart from this earth and join her Son in Heaven, she sent for all of the Apostles of Christ to be at her bedside. All the Apostles were present at the time of her burial, except for St. Thomas who returned too late for the funeral. He asked to visit her body, which had been buried for three days. When the tomb was opened, they were amazed to find that the body of Mary was gone. An Angel of the Lord appeared to the Apostles and announced that she had been taken into Heaven. This is the belief of all Orthodox Christians in accordance with Holy Tradition. This is why this period of time is so important to us!

The first 15 days of August are sacred for Orthodox Christians around the world, a special time that brings feelings of intensified reverence. Special prayers and services are held regularly during these 15 days. Please consult our calendar for dates and times to attend or watch via live stream. This is a special time half way between Pascha and Advent (Christmas), when we can all refocus our minds and souls on our faith. This is a golden opportunity for us to be in church to pray, fast, and participate in our blessed services. Join us so that we can proclaim together, Most Holy Theotokos Save Us!

FAQs

Frequently Asked Questions about Stewardship:

"As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's grace." (1 Peter 4:10)

Q: IS THERE A DIFFERENCE BETWEEN "DUES" & "STEWARDSHIP"?

A: Yes! Three or four generations ago, it was commonplace for families throughout our Archdiocese to pay their annual "dues" or required membership fee to be a member of their local parish. Over time it was clear that this was not the healthiest way of committing to a local church as giving remained stagnant and the authentic Christian commitment of sacrificial giving became an afterthought. (note: the annual "dues" of \$300-350 back then would equate to roughly \$2,500-\$3,000 today) Stewardship, however, offers us the chance to recognize our unique blessings from God, and to give back based on what we have received. Stewardship is management of another's property, and all our blessings and gifts we have been given ultimately belong to God. We are but his caretakers, his priests, his stewards on this earth.

Q: How much should I give?

A: The foundations of Christian stewardship is both from Scripture and the teachings of our Lord. You may have heard the term tithing (the word tithe literally means tenth in Hebrew), and this refers to the biblical giving goal of 10% of your household income to your local church (Lev. 27:30; Num. 18:25-28; Deut. 14:22-24; 2 Chron. 31:5-6). Yet, we also hear from our Lord Jesus Christ that true giving is when we offer sacrificially "all that we have" (Luke 21:4), "store up your treasures in heaven" (Matt. 6:20), "it is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35), "for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor. 9:7). With this in mind, you are invited to prayerfully reflect on your own household income, and make your sacrificial offering based on what you receive. Consider also what you offer to Christ's Church in comparison to your monthly utility/service payments. ("Am I giving my phone more than my Church?") Use the chart to the right as a guide.

Q: WHAT DOES MY STEWARDSHIP PAY FOR?

A: It costs approximately \$2,000/day to keep the church open. Most operating expenses are paid from stewardship. Some examples are mortgage, utilities, office staff and pastoral salaries, candles, permits, and facilities maintenance. Additional costs are directly related to church programs.

Q: WHAT IS THE EASIEST WAY TO FULFILL MY PLEDGE?

A: The easiest way is online! Pledging and paying online is fast and EASY and is the preferred method for many of our families. Simply go to our website saint-anthonys.org and click the DONATE button and this will take you to our online giving platform. Under "Regular" click the Make a Donation button, then click Create a Recurring Donation, enter your weekly/monthly/semi-annually amount and fill in the necessary information. You can always call the church office for assistance in setting up easy recurring giving payments. Paying your pledge can also be done by check, envelopes, or credit card payments, though these are not as convenient for you.

Q: WHEN SHOULD I MAKE MY ANNUAL PLEDGE?

A: We would ask you to turn in your pledge card by January 31*. Our church budget is based on our expected annual income and expenses. Forecasting stewardship in January helps meet our parish goals.

Q: I DON'T LIKE TO PAY MY PLEDGE UNTIL DECEMBER. SHOULD I STILL PLEDGE IN JANUARY?

A: Yes. January pledging allows for effective fiscal budgeting. Pledge your annual amount, then pay weekly, monthly, semi-annually or annually.

Q: WHY DO I HAVE TO UPDATE MY INFORMATION EVERY YEAR?

A: We ask for updated information to provide you the opportunity to review your pledge for the upcoming year. As cost of living increases every year, so do our own parish expenses, and our giving to the church needs to adjust accordingly. We anticipate automatic online giving to become the standard in order to simplify the process.

Q: DOESN'T THE GREEK FESTIVAL BRING IN MOST OF THE FUNDING FOR THE CHURCH?

A: No. While the annual Pasadena Greek Fest is an important source of funding and support, it actually accounts for less than 15% of the total revenue brought in each year. Stewardship raises four times as much and is our primary source of funding for operating expenses. Ultimately, the goal is to have zero reliance on outside sources of funding, which would then make the Festival an outreach and community building opportunity, thus greatly alleviating the stress and dependency of this event.

Q: I ALREADY PAY FOR GREEK DANCE, GREEK LANGUAGE SCHOOL, BASKETBALL, ETC. WHY DO I HAVE TO PAY STEWARDSHIP TOO?

A: These programs operate independently from the church operating budget. The church provides the facility in addition to expenses enabling their operation and receives no money from these organizations. It is also important to know that families participating in our children's ministries must be currently pledged stewards.

Q: If I donate to a memorial fund, building fund, festival, or event, does that count as part of my stewardship?

A: No. Your stewardship is represented entirely by your stated pledge.

Q: IF I MAKE A NON-MONETARY DONATION TO THE CHURCH, CAN THIS REPRESENT MY STEWARDSHIP?

A: No. Your stewardship pledge cannot be substituted for non-monetary donations. However, your various donations to the festival and the church are always greatly appreciated and are tax-deductible.

Q: WHEN SHOULD MY CHILDREN BECOME STEWARDS?

A: As the principles of stewardship is that of sacrificial giving from what we have received, everyone is encouraged to become a "cheerful giver" as soon as one begins to generate his/her own income.

Q: WHAT IF I OR MY FAMILY EXPERIENCE A FINANCIAL HARDSHIP OR SEVERE CHANGE IN INCOME?

A: Parishioners who are experiencing financial hardships and are unable to fulfill their stewardship obligation, but still want to be considered in "good standing", can always contact the church office, and you may always speak with one of our priests.

Fact: With our congregation at roughly 300 families, to fully cover our operating expenses our goal is to have average stewardship be \$2,000 per family or above. Right now, <u>83% of our stewards are under that goal.</u>



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Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis...

Fear not, for I am with you, be not dismayed, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my victorious right hand.

Isaiah 41:10

We've all had our moments when we want to throw up our hands and say, "enough is enough," or walk away and quit something. Sometimes our frustration comes from our workings with others. Sometimes it comes from feeling isolated and alone. But we all feel frustrated at times—in our marriages, with our children, in our jobs, with our friends, with life in general, and sometimes even with God.

In Isaiah 41:40, God tells us:

Fear not, for I am with you, be not dismayed, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with My victorious right hand.

The first part of this verse reminds us of Psalm 23:4, where we read:

Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I fear no evil; for Thou art with me, Thy rod and Thy staff they comfort me.

Jeremiah 1:19 reads:

They will fight against you; but they shall not prevail against you, for I am with you, says the Lord, to deliver you.

If God is with us, who can be against us!

Be not dismayed, for I am your God

The greatest joy in life is confidence that we have in God as His children. If He is with us, and we are with Him, then nothing can stand against us. If He is our Father, and we are His children, we know that He loves us and protects us, as a father loves and protects his children, except that God's love for us in unconditional and unending.

The final sentence of this verse tells us three things that God does for us — *strengthen, help and uphold.* He strengthens us as we face our challenges. He sharpens our minds, calms our anxieties, and gives us wisdom. These things are acquired through prayer. This is why we should pray daily and throughout the day. God helps us when we can't help ourselves. This happens through the gift of God's grace, a blessing from God which completes what is lacking in us. Grace closes gaps that we cannot close. Grace helps complete the things we cannot finish. Grace is received primarily through the sacraments of the Church — Holy Communion and Confession are sacraments we should be receiving with regularity. Grace also comes to us through our own personal prayers.

Finally, when all seems lost, God upholds us. I am reminded of the story in Exodus 17:11-12, when the Israelites were fighting Amalek.

Whenever Moses held up his hand, Israel prevailed; and whenever he lowered his hand, Amalek prevailed.

But Moses' hands grew weary; so they took a stone and put it under him, and he sat upon it, and Aaron and Hur held up his hands, one on one side and one on the other side; so his hands were steady until the going down of the sun.

I can't tell you how many times I have felt myself at a loss of something to say, or the right thing to do. And I have prayed to God to hold not my hands, but mind and my mouth, so that I can say the right thing. This doesn't mean I have procrastinated and am throwing up a prayer of desperation to God. In the normal course of life, even with the best of intentions, I sometimes find myself at a loss for what to do. Honestly, I find that when I go with "my own devices" and try to figure it out myself, I do not do as well, or as quickly or go with as much confidence as when I stop, pray and offer whatever the challenge is to God, asking Him to bless me in whatever endeavor I am doing. I have felt like Moses, like I can't go another step, like I can't make another decision, like I can't hold another thought. But I have also felt the grace of God propping up my mind, my soul, my spirit, and yes, even my body.

So, when you are annoyed, or just struggling to get through the day, remember today's verse. He's got you! He is with you. Don't get too dismayed. He will strengthen you, help you and when all hope seems lost, He will uphold you.

O God, Thou art my God, I seek Thee, my soul thirsts for Thee;

my flesh faints for Thee, as in a dry and weary land where no water is.

So I have looked upon Thee in the sanctuary, beholding Thy power and glory.

Because Thy steadfast love is better than life, my lips will praise Thee.

So I will bless Thee as long as I live; I will lift up my hands and call on Thy name.

My soul is feasted as with marrow and fat, and my mouth praises Thee with joyful lips, when I think of Thee upon my bed and meditate on Thee in the watches of the night;

for Thou hast been my help, and in the shadow of Thy wings I sing for joy.

My soul clings to Thee; Thy right hand holds me up.

Amen.

"He Who Has Ears, Let Him Hear"

There are certain passages in the Gospels that contain a serious warning for us. Several times Christ says, "He who has ears, let him hear" — in other words, be careful how you listen. In another place He reminds us that we shall answer for what we have heard, how we have listened, how we have reacted and what we have made of it in our lives.

At every Liturgy we listen to the Gospel, to the words of Christ Himself, or of His disciples, and we are faced with the question — how do we listen and what do we hear? Perhaps we listen attentively, our hearts may even be stirred and for a moment we may be inspired; but then, having admired the beauty and wisdom of Christ's sayings, we may leave the church and not put them into practice.

Are we capable of listening to Christ's words? Are we capable of hearing them, receiving them in our hearts, making an effort of will and incorporating them into our lives? Or are we not?

Therefore Christ warns us to take care how we listen and how we care, because a time will come when the words we have heard will judge us — not because we have heard the word of truth, God's word, but because having responded to it as truth and beauty and inspiration and having admired it we put it aside in order to attend to it sometime later, at leisure. And that is exactly how such words become the empty, inert words of which our lives are so full. And we shall answer for them.

Let us then listen to the words of the Gospel, even to the words of a sermon, in such a way that they should penetrate not only our minds and hearts but our whole lives, so that what we have heard may become living, that through us someone may see the light of Christ's light, may feel the warmth of Christ's love, and everything be renewed around us.



Feasts and Saints for this month

Dormition Fast

1 August—14 August

The commemoration of the **Dormition of the Theotokos** and the preparation for the Feast begin on August 1 with a period of fasting. A strict fast is followed on most of the days (no meat, dairy, oil, or wine), with the exceptions of fish on the Feast of the Transfiguration (August 6) and the day of the Dormition. Oil and Wine are allowed on Saturdays and Sundays.

On the weekdays before the Feast, Paraklesis services are held in most parishes. These consist of the Great Paraklesis and the Small Paraklesis, both services of supplication and prayer for the intercessions of the Theotokos.

Transfiguration of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ

6 August

Our Lord had spoken to His disciples many times not only concerning His Passion, Cross, and Death, but also concerning the coming persecutions and afflictions that they themselves would endure. Since all these evils were near at hand, but the enjoyment of good things which they hoped to receive in their stead was yet to come, our Savior desired to give them full assurance, evidently and openly, concerning that glory which is prepared for those who endure to the end. Therefore, fulfilling that which He had promised shortly before, that:

"there be some standing here which shall not taste of death, till they see the Son of man coming in His Kingdom" (Matthew 16:28),

He took His three foremost disciples and ascended Mount Tabor, where He was transfigured before them. His face shone like the sun, and His clothes became white as the light. Suddenly, together with this dread and marvelous effulgence of light, there appeared those pinnacles of the Prophets, Moses and Elias, who spoke with the Lord Jesus concerning His saving Passion which was about to take place. Standing before Him as reverent servants, they showed that He is the Lord of both the living and the dead, for Moses came forth from Hades, having died many centuries before, and Elias, as it were from heaven, whither he had been taken up while yet alive. After a little while a radiant cloud overshadowed them and out of the cloud they heard that same voice which had been heard at the Jordan at the Baptism of Christ, testifying to the Divinity of Jesus saying:

"This is My beloved Son, in Whom I am well-pleased; Listen to Him" (Matthew 17: 5).

Transfiguration of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ - continiued


Such are the marvels, truly worthy of God, celebrated in this present feast, which is an image and prefiguring of the future state of the righteous, whose splendor the Lord spoke of, saying: "Then shall the righteous shine forth as the sun" (Matt. 13:43). According to tradition, the Lord's Transfiguration came to pass forty days before His Crucifixion; this is why the Transfiguration is celebrated forty days before the Exaltation of the Cross.

The Dormition of our Most Holy Lady the Theotokos and Ever Virgin Mary

15 August

Concerning the Dormition of the Theotokos, this is what the Church has received from ancient times from the tradition of the Fathers. When the time drew nigh that our Savior was well-pleased to take His Mother to Himself, He declared unto her through an Angel that three days hence, He would translate her from this temporal life to eternity and bliss. On hearing this, she went up with haste to the Mount of Olives, where she prayed continuously. Giving thanks to God, she returned to her house and prepared whatever was necessary for her burial. While these things were taking place, clouds caught up the Apostles from the ends of the earth, where each one happened to be preaching, and brought them at once to the house of the Mother of God, who informed them of the cause of their sudden gathering. As a mother, she consoled them in their affliction and then raised her hands to Heaven and prayed for the peace of the world. She blessed the Apostles, and, reclining upon her bed with seemliness, gave up her all-holy spirit into the hands of her Son and God.

With reverence and many lights, and chanting burial hymns, the Apostles took up that God-receiving body and brought it to the sepulcher, while the Angels from Heaven chanted with them, and sent forth her who is higher than the Cherubim. But one Jew, moved by malice, audaciously stretched forth his hand upon the bed and immediately received from divine judgment the wages of his audacity. Those daring hands were severed by an invisible blow. But when he repented and asked forgiveness, his hands were restored. When they had reached the place called Gethsemane, they buried there with honor the all-immaculate body of the Theotokos, which was the source of Life. But on the third day after the burial, when they were eating together, and raised up the artos (bread) in Jesus' Name, as was their custom, the Theotokos appeared in the air, saying "Rejoice" to them. From this they learned concerning the bodily translation of the Theotokos into the Heavens.

Saint Phanourios

27 August


Little is known of the holy Martyr Phanourios, except that which is depicted concerning his martyrdom on his holy icon, which was discovered in the year 1500 among the ruins of an ancient church on Rhodes, when the Moslems ruled there. Thus he is called "the Newly Revealed." The faithful pray to Saint Phanourios especially to help them recover things that have been lost, and because he has answered their prayers so often, the custom has arisen of baking a Phaneropita ("Phanourios-Cake") as a thank you-offering.



Beheading of John the Baptist

29 August

The divine Baptist, the Prophet born of a Prophet, the seal of all the Prophets and beginning of the Apostles, the mediator between the Old and New Covenants, the voice of one crying in the wilderness, the God-sent Messenger of the incarnate Messiah, the forerunner of Christ's coming into the world who by many miracles was both conceived and born; who was filled with the Holy Spirit while yet in his mother's womb; who came forth like another Elias the Zealot, whose life in the wilderness and divine zeal for God's Law he imitated: this divine Prophet, after he had preached the baptism of repentance according to God's command; had taught men of low rank and high how they must order their lives; had admonished those whom he baptized and had filled them with the fear of God, teaching them that no one is able to escape the wrath to come if he does not do works worthy of repentance; had, through such preaching, prepared their hearts to receive the evangelical teachings of the Savior; finally, after he had pointed out to the people the very Savior, and said,



"Behold the Lamb of God, Which taketh away the sin of the world" (Luke 3:2-18; John 1: 29-36)

After all this, John sealed with his own blood the truth of his words and was made a sacred victim for the divine Law at the hands of a transgressor. This was Herod Antipas, the Tetrarch of Galilee, the son of Herod the Great. This man had a lawful wife, the daughter of Arethas (or Aretas), the King of Arabia (that is, Arabia Petraea, which had the famous Nabatean stone city of Petra as its capital. This is mentioned by Saint Paul in 2 Corinthians 11:32).

Beheading of John the Baptist - continued

Without any cause, and against every commandment of the Law, he put her away and took to himself Herodias, the wife of his brother Philip, to whom Herodias had borne a daughter, Salome. He would not desist from this unlawful union even when John, the preacher of repentance, the bold and austere accuser of the lawless, censured him and told him:

"It is not lawful for thee to have thy brother's wife" (Mark 6: 18).

Thus Herod, besides his other unholy acts, added yet this, that he apprehended John and shut him in prison; and perhaps he would have killed him immediately, had he not feared the people, who had extreme reverence for John. Certainly, in the beginning, he himself had great reverence for this just and holy man. But finally, being pierced with the sting of a mad lust for the woman Herodias, he laid his defiled hands on the teacher of purity on the very day he was celebrating his birthday.

When Salome, Herodias' daughter, had danced in order to please him and those who were supping with him, he promised her -- with an oath more foolish than any foolishness -- that he would give her anything she asked, even unto the half of his kingdom. And she, consulting with her mother, immediately asked for the head of John the Baptist on a plate. Hence this transgressor of the Law, preferring his lawless oath above the precepts of the Law, fulfilled this godless promise and filled his loathsome banquet with the blood of the Prophet. So it was that the all-venerable head, revered by the Angels, was given as a prize for an abominable dance, and became the plaything of the dissolute daughter of a debauched mother.

As for the body of the divine Baptist, it was taken up by his disciples and placed in a tomb.
