

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The Nativity Gospel According To St. Matthew The Evangelist

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, Magi came from the East to Jerusalem saying, "Where is the newborn King of the Jews? For we have seen his star in the East and have come to worship him." But when King Herod heard this, he was troubled, and so was all Jerusalem with him. And gathering together all the chief priests and Scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. And they said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for thus it is written by the prophet. And you, Bethlehem, of the land of Judah are by no means least among the princes of Judah; for from you shall come forth a leader who shall shepherd my people Israel." Then Herod summoned the Magi secretly, and carefully ascertained from them the time when the star had appeared to them. And sending them to Bethlehem he said, "Go and make careful inquiry concerning the child, and when you have found him, bring me word, that I too may go and worship him." Now they, having heard the king, went their way. And behold, the star they had seen in the East went before them, until it came and stood over the place where the child was. And when they saw the star they rejoiced exceedingly. And entering the house, they found the child with Mary his mother, and falling down they worshipped him. And opening their treasures, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. And being warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they went back to their own country by another way.

Your nativity, O Christ our God, has caused the light of knowledge to rise upon the world. For therein the worshippers of the stars were by a star instructed to worship You, the Sun of Righteousness, and to know You as Orient from on high. Glory to You, O Lord.

On this day the Virgin gives birth to the Super-essential. To the Unapproachable, earth is providing the grotto. Angels sing and with the shepherds offer up glory. Following a star the Magi are still proceeding. He was born for our salvation, a newborn Child the pre-eternal God.

Parish Council

Members of the Community:

Καλά Χριστούγεννα!

The Christmas season is upon us and with it, another year is drawing to a close. As I mentioned in my remarks during the recent General Assembly, it has been a pleasure to serve as Parish Council President the past four years (2020-2023). This new year will bring with it a new leader for our board.

General Assembly

Thank you to all who attended the General Assembly on November 19. We held nominations for Parish Council and other community offices, heard a report from our Treasurer Christian Balas, and approved the 2024 budget.

Mortgage Loan

The mortgage loan has been secured by 3791 Locksley (corner of Locksley Dr. and Michigan Blvd.). As discussed during the General Assembly, the community's mortgage loan secured by the property located at 3791 Locksley Drive is due December 27, 2023. The current loan balance is \$356,485.75. The monthly payment is \$3600 with a variable rate of 8%. Mortgage interest rates are highly unfavorable at this time. At the November meeting, the Parish Council discussed at length whether to refinance the loan or to pay it off in part and refinance the remainder. Ultimately, the Parish Council determined that the community would pay off a minimum of \$125,000, plus whatever amount could be raised from the parish. If you are able to contribute, please contact me, Pete Gallanis, Perry Vidalakis, or Father Peter. We have raised approximately \$28,000 through the generous donations of two parish families. All gifts are of course tax-deductible.

<u>Upcoming Parish Council Elections</u>

Parish Council elections will be this Sunday, **December 3**. You will receive a sample ballot before the election. Please come and cast your vote.

Successful Festival

The financial results from the 2023 festival showed a profit of approximately \$98,000 in spite of the rain and only a two-day festival. Many thanks to all who contributed to a successful festival. The 2024 festival will be a three-day festival and is scheduled for **September 20-22**.

Facilities Repairs

In the near future, we will need to replace the roof of the church building. The Parish Council is presently obtaining bids for the new roof and is also obtaining bids for replacing the carpet in the Trinity Ballroom.

Another memorable class session this past month was when we had weddings in our classrooms! Polly and Chris taught their middle school class about the Orthodox Sacrament of Holy Matrimony with a bride and groom, Alexis and John. In Sophia and Andrianna's class, "Father" Vasili officiated at Sia V. and Myles' wedding with their Koumbari, Sia M. and Zachary. This was definitely a Sunday School lesson that we will always remember! Oh- and we are saving the date for a wedding in Noula and Mary's class on Sunday, December 3rd!:)

This month, I'd like to highlight the littlest members of our ministry..

Our Little Lambs!

Little Lambs, taught by Mrs. Teresa Argueta, provides a fun, interactive, and creative environment for babies, toddlers, and preschool-aged children to come together and learn about God and our church. This class is especially important due to the fact that it is the very first interaction that young children have in a ministry at St. Anthony. Little Lambs opens the door for faith, fellowship, and fun for both children and parents/caregivers alike.

Little Lambs is formerly known as Moms-n-Tots, which started at St. Anthony over 25 years ago. We are ever so grateful to Teresa for faithfully and enthusiastically leading this class. She is an amazing educator by profession and a lifelong member of our community who brings to class each week both her expertise in working with children as well as her passion for our church.

Under Teresa's guidance, our Little Lambs have been reading Bible stories about being thankful (specifically about Jonah and Noah) with crafts that her students take home as a reminder of the lesson. They have also been practicing how to receive communion as well as learning how to cross themselves, both very special and important practices in our Orthodox faith.

The age range for this class is for all babies, toddlers, and children who do not turn four years of age until <u>after</u> December 31st, 2023. Those who turn four years of age prior to this date can join Mrs. Albeck and Mrs. Larissa's PK/TK/K class.

Housekeeping Reminders:

- -Please fill out a registration form for your student(s) if you have not yet done so. Your child's teacher can give you a copy of the form. We would like to make sure that we have everyone's information for communication and safety purposes.
- -Class begins after Holy Communion and ends between 11:45 and 12:00. For the safety of our students, please do not enter the Parish Center or come to the classrooms prior to Holy Communion, as there is no supervision at this time.
- -Parents are welcome to come upstairs to pick up their child/children upon dismissal, otherwise students grade 3 and older will be excused on their own and those in grade 2 and younger will be escorted to the hall by their teacher.
- -For safety purposes, children should not be upstairs or in the classrooms unsupervised at any time.

We appreciate the cooperation of parents, grandparents, and caregivers as we work together as a community to ensure the safety of our children.

Christmas Sing-Along: Sunday, December 17th

Please join us in the Parish Center for our second annual Sunday School Christmas Sing Along! Each class will sing a special Christmas song and we will then sing a couple of songs together as a community. Our students are excited to share in this festive experience as we celebrate the season of the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ.







Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis

The "Nativity Story" is amazing for many reasons. The first and most obvious is that it is the Incarnation of the Son of God in the flesh. The Creator became part of His own creation. The second, and perhaps less obvious is that the story involves a "cast" of unlikely characters who would welcome the Lord into the world. The Magi were astrologers, not conquering kings as they are often portrayed. The shepherds were so low on the social scale that they weren't even counted in the census in Bethlehem. Joseph was an older man, who had been widowed and now was betrothed to Mary. And Mary was a teenager, probably 14-15 years old, and an orphan. And yet, these were the people who God chose to help bring His Son into the world.

Each of us has had the experience of asking ourselves "Why me?" and usually it involves something bad. All the people in the Nativity story probably asked themselves the same thing, "Why me?" but for good reasons.

God's motivation in creating the world and the human beings who inhabit it is **love**. God is love, so God's motivation in everything ultimately leads back to love. God's purpose in creating us is to share in His love. We often speak of how the purpose of life is to glorify God, which, if you think about it, might make us think that we are slaves or servants of God. The purpose of life is to share in God's love, and while we are to serve God, we are not His slaves, nor is He our cruel master. We are His children, and He is our Father. The purpose of this life is to share in God's love on a "trial basis", if you will. God gives each of us a span of life on earth and offers us an opportunity to share in His love. We share it in two ways—by sharing it directly with Him (loving God) and by sharing it with others (loving our neighbor, which means both serving our neighbor and sharing the Gospel with our neighbor). At the end of life, God will judge the totality of our lives at His awesome judgment seat and decide whether we are worthy to share in His love forever.

Before the Fall, humanity shared Paradise with God, and the human beings lived in a permanent and blissful state of love. The Fall severed that state of bliss and perfection. Sin entered the world because of a choice that we made, not a choice that God made. Yes, it was a choice that He allowed because He gave us the gift of free will. When sin entered the world, the state of perfect love with God was distorted. And Paradise was destroyed because it was now tainted with sin, with action that didn't reflect the perfect love of God. So, God expelled man from Paradise, and we now live a life in a fallen and imperfect world where we can still experience God's love, but it is experienced in a state of constant tension and temptation. Hopefully, we've all each had a moment where we've experienced God's perfect love. I know I have. But I also have moments where I turn my back on God and His love—that's when we sin and fall prey to temptation.

God does not want us to live like this. He wants to restore that relationship that we once had with Him, in Paradise. He wants us to live in that permanent and blissful state of perfection that humanity once enjoyed. But how to bridge that gap?

Remember that before Christ, there was no expectation of heaven. To the contrary, there was an understanding that when life on earth ended, everyone went to Hades, a place where God was absent. This was confirmed, and commanded by God, in Genesis 3, where God speaks to Adam and Eve saying, "In the seat of your face you shall eat bread till you return to the ground for out of it you were taken; you are dust, and to dust you shall return." (Genesis 3:19)

God didn't immediately provide a path back after the Fall. Humanity was too new to its state of sin to fully comprehend repentance and return. We read in the New Testament how the Incarnation happened in the "fulness of time." In Ephesians 1:9-10, St. Paul writes "For He has made known to us in all wisdom and insight the mystery of His will, according to His purpose which He set forth in Christ, as a plan for the fulness of time, to unite all things in Him, things in heaven and things on earth." The only way to right the Fall was for God to send His Son into the world as a "new Adam," to show humanity how to live in the face of temptation and how to stay loyal to God and abide in God's love in a world filled with sinful enticements. This is why Christ experienced all kinds of temptations, even the temptation to make a deal to avoid death, so that He could pay our debt of sin, which is death, and could show us that it is possible to stay faithful to God, which is the path one needs to follow to get back to Paradise.

Galatians 4:4-5 reads: "But when the time had fully come, God sent for His Son, born of woman, born under the Law, to redeem those who were under the Law, so that we might receive adoption as sons." God chose a time at which the Incarnation would happen. But He also made a logical plan for how this would happen. Jesus didn't suddenly appear, no one does that. Everyone has a mother, a hometown, a family. In God's plan, Jesus would have all these things. First, God needed a woman to entrust to carry Christ and to be His mother. He chose a virgin named Mary, who was visited by an angel who made the biggest and grandest request ever, for Mary to carry in her womb, the Son of God, and that her conception would be by the Holy Spirit. The Archangel Gabriel, who delivered the message, prefaced it with the words "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God." (Luke 1:30)

The Virgin Mary was born to elderly parents, Joachim and Anna. They were righteous people, who stayed close to God, even though they did not have children. Back in Biblical times, to not have children was a sign that one did not have the favor of God. This is not our understanding now. Joachim and Anna lived very faithful lives, but under the "dark cloud" of not having a child of their own. They were told by God that they would bear a child, and in their very old age, they conceived the Virgin Mary. When she was three years old, she was taken to the temple and left there to be raised by the priests of the temple. Shortly thereafter, both Joachim and Anna passed away. They had fulfilled their role, giving birth to the one who would give birth to the Christ. As an aside, one probably looks at the life of Joachim and Anna as if they got the short end of the stick, so to speak. Their faithfulness had been rewarded with a child they only enjoyed for three years. And yet, when we look at the Divine Liturgy in the Orthodox Church, in the dismissal prayer, they are two of the five people that are always mentioned—The Lord, the Virgin Mary, St. John the Baptist and "the holy and righteous ancestors of the Lord Joachim and Anna." This is how important, in the eyes of God and of the Church, was the role that Joachim and Anna played in the story of salvation. Imagine the trust that they had!

At age fourteen, the Virgin Mary emerged from the Temple where she had lived and was educated for over ten years. She had no parents by this time. Immediately, she was betrothed to an older man named Joseph. Many marriages two thousand years ago were arranged. A man and woman were brought together and betrothed. Then they "dated" for a year and then the marriage was consummated, in both spiritual terms with a formal prayer and in sexual terms. Sex before marriage and children outside of marriage would have been unacceptable, unlike today where we practically expect it. So when Mary was told by the angel that she would bear a child, by the Holy Spirit, imagine the thoughts that would have been running through her head: How will I explain this to Joseph, that I'm pregnant with a child and it's not his? Will he still marry me? How will I explain this to family and friends, that I am pregnant and not married? How will I explain how I spent ten-plus years being raised in the temple and having left the temple, in short order I have done something that goes against the commandments of God? How will I ever show myself in the temple again? What will this do to Joseph's reputation? LOTS of questions must have gone through her head.

As the angel gave her the message from God, the overwhelming response was not one of fear or doubt or confusion or even inadequacy at the request. It was a yes. However, it was not only a yes to the angel and his request, it was a yes to trust in God, to abide in His love, and to sacrifice everything for Him—her future, her reputation, whatever she had to lose, she was willing to lose in order to serve and glorify God.

Mary's response in Luke 1:46-48 is chanted in almost every Orthros service in the Orthodox Church:

"My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for He has regarded the low estate of His handmaiden. For behold, henceforth all generations will call me blessed."

Rather than fearing the Lord, Mary's yes was one of purpose, humility and joy. There was humility in recognizing her "low estate" when compared to the magnificence of the Lord. There was humility in saying that her soul would magnify the Lord, not her own accomplishment of carrying Christ. There was joy, as she said her spirit would rejoice in God. And there was a sense of purpose.

The "henceforth all generations will call me blessed" was not an arrogant, "look at me, I've made it to the hall of fame of human beings who will be remembered forever." Rather it was an acknowledgement of a holy and humanity-changing responsibility that she knew would affect every human being to come after her.

This is why we might say that her answer to God's call and her trust in the unknown was the greatest YES ever to be offered. Her yes changed the course of humanity. None of us will ever be called to this level of responsibility. However, we will be presented with opportunities to change our corner of the world. We will be presented with opportunities to magnify the Lord, and at the same time we will have temptations to sin against Him. We will have opportunities to affect the generations that come after us. If we raise our children poorly, then they will raise their children poorly, and a vicious cycle will ensue.

It takes great trust to listen for the call of the Lord and even greater trust to answer it. When we say "Trust like Mary," we are talking about listening to God's call and answering it. We are talking about trusting in God even if that call seems difficult or even impossible. We are talking about trusting God and playing the role HE has called us to, which may or may not be a role we would have chosen for ourselves. Imagine how different the world would be if Mary had said "no." We know how it is affected because she said "yes."

Imagine how the world can be changed for the better if we listen for and follow God's call for our own lives, if we seek to magnify the Lord as Mary did.



Saints & Feasts

Saint Barbara

4 December


Saint Barbara was from Heliopolis of Phoenicia and lived during the reign of Maximian. She was the daughter of a certain idolater named Dioscorus. When Barbara came of age, she was enlightened in her pure heart and secretly believed in the Holy Trinity. About this time Dioscorus began building a bath-house; before it was finished he was required to go away to attend to certain matters and in his absence Barbara directed the workmen to build a third window in addition to the two her Father had commanded. She also inscribed the sign of the Cross with her finger upon the marble of the bath-house, leaving the saving sign cut as deeply into the marble as if it had been done with an iron tool. (When the Synaxarion of Saint Barbara was written, the marble of the bath-house and the cross inscribed by Saint Barbara were still preserved and many healings were worked there.) When Dioscorus returned, he asked why the third window had been added; Barbara began to declare to him the mystery of the Trinity. Because she refused to renounce her faith, Dioscorus tortured Barbara inhumanely and after subjecting her to many sufferings he beheaded her with his own hands, in the year 290.



Saint Nicholas

6 December

This Saint lived during the reign of Saint Constantine the Great, and reposed in 330. As a young man, he desired to espouse the solitary life. He made a pilgrimage to the holy city Jerusalem, where he found a place to withdraw to devote himself to prayer. It was made known to him, however, that this was not the will of God for him, but that he should return to his homeland to be a cause of salvation for many. He returned to Myra, and was ordained bishop. He became known for his abundant mercy, providing for the poor and needy, and delivering those who had been unjustly accused. No less was he known for his zeal for the truth. He was present at the First Ecumenical Council of 318 and in 325 at Nicaea; upon hearing the blasphemies that Arius brazenly uttered against the Son of God, Saint Nicholas struck him on the face. Since the canons of the Church forbid the clergy to strike any man at all, his fellow bishops were in perplexity as to what disciplinary action was to be taken against this hierarch whom all revered. In the night, our Lord Jesus Christ and our Lady Theotokos appeared to certain bishops, informing them that no action was to be taken against him, since he had acted not out of passion, but extreme love and piety. The Dismissal Hymn for holy hierarchs, The truth of things hath revealed thee to thy flock ... was written originally for Saint Nicholas. He is the patron of all travelers and of sea-farers in particular. He is one of the best known and best loved Saints of all time.



The Conception of the Holy Theotokos

9 December

According to the ancient tradition of the Church, since Saint Anna, the Ancestor of God, was barren, she and her husband Joachim remained without children until old age. Therefore, sorrowing over their childlessness, they be sought God with a promise that, if He were to grant them the fruit of the womb, they would offer their offspring to Him as a gift. And God, hearkening to their supplication, informed them through an Angel concerning the birth of the Virgin. And thus, through God's promise, Anna conceived according to the laws of nature, and was deemed worthy to become the mother of the Mother of our Lord.



Saint Spyridon

12 December

Spyridon, the God-bearing Father of the Church, the great defender of Corfu and the boast of all the Orthodox, had Cyprus as his homeland. He was simple in manner and humble of heart, and was a shepherd of sheep. When he was joined to a wife, he begat of her a daughter whom they named Irene. After his wife's departure from this life, he was appointed Bishop of Trimythus and thus became also a shepherd of rational sheep. When the First Ecumenical Council was assembled in Nicaea, he also was present and by means of his most simple words stopped the mouths of the Arians who were wise in their own conceit. By the divine grace which dwelt in him, he wrought such great wonders that he received the surname 'Wonderworker." So it is that, having tended his flock piously and in a manner pleasing to God, he reposed in the Lord in the year 350, leaving his country his sacred relics as a consolation and source of healing for the faithful.

About the middle of the seventh century, because of the incursions made by the barbarians at that time, his sacred relics were taken to Constantinople, where they remained, being honored by the emperors themselves. But before the fall of Constantinople, which took place on May 29, 1453, a certain priest named George Kalokhairetes, the parish priest of the church where the Saint's sacred relics, as well as those of Saint Theodora the Empress, were kept, took them away due to the impending peril. Travelling by way of Serbia, he came as far as Arta in Epirus, a region in Western Greece opposite to the isle of Corfu. From there, while the misfortunes of the Christian people were increasing with every day, he passed over to Corfu in the year 1460. The relics of Saint Theodora were given to the people of Corfu but those of Saint Spyridon remain, according to the rights of inheritance, the most precious treasure of the priest's own descendants and they continue to be a staff for the faithful in Orthodoxy and a supernatural wonder for those who behold him; for even after the passage of 1,500 years, they have remained incorrupt, and even the flexibility of his flesh has been preserved. Truly wondrous is God in His Saints!



Prophet Daniel

17 December

The Prophet Daniel and the Three Children were all descended from the royal tribe of Judah. In the year 599 before Christ, in the reign of Joachim, these righteous children were led away as captives into Babylon together with the other Jews by Nabuchodonosor. He singled them out from among the other captives to serve him, and renamed them thus: Daniel was named Baltazar; Ananias was named Sedrach; Misail was named Misach; and Azarias was named Abednago. They were reared in the royal court and taught the wisdom of the Chaldeans; after the passage of three years, they surpassed all the Chaldean sages (Daniel 1).

Thereafter, Daniel, being still a lad, interpreted a mysterious image seen by Nabuchodonosor in a dream, It was an image that was composed of different metals, but was shattered and ground to dust by a certain stone which had been hewn out of a mountain without the hand of man. This vision clearly portrayed through the mountain the height of the Virgin's holiness and the power of the Holy Spirit which overshadowed her. Through the image of the Stone, Christ was portrayed, Who was seedlessly born of her, and Who by His coming as the God-man would shatter and destroy all the kingdoms of the world, which were portrayed through the image; and He would raise them who believe in Him, into His Heavenly Kingdom, which is eternal and everlasting., thereupon, signifying the prophecy.

Daniel (whose name means "God is judge") was called "man of desires" by the Angels that appeared, because he courageously disdained every desire of the body, even the very bread that is necessary for nourishment. He also received this name because, in his longing for the freedom of those of his tribe and his desire to know their future condition, he ceased not supplicating God, fasting and bending the knee three times a day. Because of this prayer, he was cast into the den of lions, after he had been accused by his enemies as a transgressor of the decree issued through the proclamation of the king, that no one should worship or ask for anything from God or from men for thirty days, but only from the king. But having stopped the mouths of the lions by divine might and appearing among them as though he were a shepherd of sheep, Daniel showed the impious, the might of godliness.

As for the Three Children, Ananias ("Yah is gracious"), Misail ("Who is what God is?) and Azarias ("Yah is keeper").. since they refused to offer adoration to Nabuchodonosor's image, they were cast into the furnace of fire. They were preserved unharmed amidst the flames, even their hair was untouched, by the descent of the Angel of the Lord, that is, the Son of God.



Walking about in the furnace, as though in the midst of dew, they sang the universal hymn of praise to God, which is found in the Seventh and Eighth Odes of the Holy Psalter. And coming forth there from, without even the smell of the fire on their clothes (Daniel 3), they prefigured in themselves the Virgin's incorrupt giving of birth; for she, on receiving the Fire of the Godhead within her womb, was not burned, but remained virgin, even as she was before giving birth.

Therefore the Church celebrates the Three Children and Daniel on this day, on the Sunday of the Forefathers, and on the Sunday before the Nativity of Christ, since they prefigured and proclaimed His Incarnation. Furthermore, they were of the tribe of Judah, wherefrom, Christ sprang forth according to the flesh. The holy Three Children completed their lives full of days. As for the Prophet Daniel, he lived until the reign of Cyrus, King of Persia, whom he also petitioned that his nation be allowed to return to Jerusalem and that the Temple be raised up again. His request was granted. He reposed in Peace, having lived about eighty-eight years. His prophetical book, which is divided into twelve chapters, is ranked fourth among the greater Prophets.

Anastasia

22 December

This Saint, the daughter of Praepextatus and Fausta, was from Rome and was a most comely, wealthy and virtuous maiden. It was her mother who instructed her in the Faith of Christ. The Saint was joined to a man named Publius Patricius, who was prodigal in life and impious in disposition, but she was widowed after a short time. Henceforth, she went about secretly to the dwellings of the poor and the prisons where the Martyrs of Christ were, and brought them whatever was needed for their daily subsistence. She washed their wounds, loosed them from their fetters and consoled them in their anguish.

Because the Saint, through her intercessions, has healed many from the ill effects of spells, potions, poisons, and other harmful substances, she has received the name "Deliverer from Potions." Since the fame of her deeds had spread about, she was arrested by Diocletian's minions and after enduring many torments she was put to death by fire in the year 290.



Nativity of Christ

25 December

The incomprehensible and inexplicable Nativity of Christ came to pass when Herod the Great was reigning in Judea; the latter was an Ascalonite on his fathers's side and an Idumean on his mother's. He was in every way foreign to the royal line of David; rather, he had received his authority from the Roman emperors and had ruled tyrannically over the Jewish people for some thirty-three years. The tribe of Judah, which had reigned of old, was deprived of its rights and stripped of all rule and authority. Such was the condition of the Jews when the awaited Messiah was born and truly thus was fulfilled the prophecy which the Patriarch Jacob had spoken 1,807 years before:

"A ruler shall not fail from Judah, nor a prince from his loins, until there come the things stored up for him and he is the expectation of the nations" (Genesis 49:10).


Thus, our Savior was born in Bethlehem, a city of Judea. Joseph had come from Nazareth of Galilee, taking Mary his betrothed, who was great with child. According to the decree issued in those days by the Emperor Augustus, they must be registered in the census of those subject to Rome. Therefore, when the time came for the Virgin to give birth, and since because of the great multitude there was no place in the inn, the Virgin's circumstance constrained them to enter a cave which was near Bethlehem. Having as shelter a stable of irrational beasts, she gave birth there and swaddled the Infant and laid Him in the manger (Luke 2:1-7). From this, the tradition has come down to us that when Christ was born He lay between an ox and ass, that words of the Prophets might be fulfilled:

"Between two living creatures shalt Thou be known" (Abbacum 3:2).

"The ox knoweth his owner & the ass his master's crib" (Esaias 1: 3).

But while the earth gave the new-born Savior such a humble reception, Heaven on high celebrated majestically His world-saving coming. A wondrous star, shining with uncommon brightness and following a strange course, led Magi from the East to Bethlehem, to worship the new-born King. Certain shepherds who were in the area of Bethlehem, who kept watch while tending their sheep, were suddenly surrounded by an extraordinary light and they saw before them an Angel who proclaimed to them the good tidings of the Lord's joyous Nativity. And straightway, together with this Angel, they beheld and heard a whole host of the Heavenly Powers praising God and saying:

"Glory to God in the highest, and peace on earth , good will towards men" .



Saint Stephen

27 December

Saint Stephen was a Jew by race and, as some say, a disciple of Gamaliel, the teacher of the Law mentioned in Acts 5:34 and 22:3. He was the first of the seven deacons whom the Apostles established in Jerusalem to care for the poor and to distribute alms to them. Being a man full of faith and of the Holy Spirit, he performed great signs and wonders among the people.

While disputing with the Jews concerning Jesus and wisely refuting their every contradiction, so that no one was able to withstand the wisdom and the spirit whereby he spoke, he was slandered as a blasphemer and was dragged off to the Sanhedrin of the elders. There with boldness he proved from the divine Scriptures the coming of the Just One (Jesus), of Whom they had become the betrayers and murderers and he reproved their faithless and hardheartedness. And finally, gazing into Heaven and beholding the divine glory, he said:

"Lo, I see the Heavens opened and the Son of man standing at the right hand of God."

But when they heard this, they stopped up their ears, and with anger cast him out of the city and stoned him, while he was calling out and saying:


"Lord Jesus, receive my spirit."


Then, imitating the long-suffering of the Master, he bent his knees and prayed in a loud voice for them that were stoning him, and he said,

And saying this, he fell asleep, thus becoming the first among the Martyrs of the Church of Christ.
