

## Message from Father Peter

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

**Χρόνια Πολλα!** On the evening of January 16 and the morning of January 17 we celebrated the Feast Day of our Church named for **St. Anthony the Great.** Our feast days are always special but this year we received even greater blessings.

His Eminence Metropolitan Gerasimos of San Francisco, His Grace Bishop Ioannis of Phocaea, and Archdeacon Justin Bosl traveled to our Parish to celebrate Great Vespers in the evening and a Hierarchical Divine Liturgy the next morning. Also, we welcomed a large contingency of Southern California clergy who came to pray with us on both days. What a tremendous blessing for our community to host our hierarchs, priests and deacons. The Holy Spirit was everywhere present and filling all things.

Another special blessing took place at the conclusion of the Hierarchical Liturgy. His Eminence bestowed the (Offikion) office of Protopresbyter on me. It was a special blessing that I received with humility. Of course I was happy to receive this spiritual honor from His Eminence, however I was more pleased for our St. Anthony Community. It is important that we all share in the blessings that God provides us. We pray for everyone and everything, in all and for all.

In 2013, I received the Offikion of Economos from His Eminence and now in January 2024 the Offikion of Protopresbyter. People have asked what this means? Sacramentally, all Priests are equal. The titles such as: Archimandrite, Protopresbyter, Economos, etc. denote honorary titles, administrative authority and responsibility. Priests with these titles have precedence over other priests of lower ranks when they perform services together.

The official Offikion Certificate received that day, gives a good description of the newly installed protopresbyter: Accordingly, the Reverend Protopresbyter Peter Stratos is entitled to wear the Epigonation and a Pectoral Cross and take his place among the senior clergy according to both his Offikion and his date of Ordination to the Sacramental Priesthood.

What is an Epigonation? It is literally, something upon the knee. It is a rectangular piece of stiff cloth suspended from the belt and reaching to the knee. This vestment is one of distinction, and is worn by the bishop and priests of title, with an office. It signifies the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

What is a Pectoral Cross? This Cross is an adornment made of special metal and can be decorated with precious stones. It is worn over vestments and hangs by a gold or silver chain upon the breast. This is a reminder that those who wear the cross are carrying Christ in their heart. It also represents the symbol of our Faith.

As we look back on January, the first month of 2024 we are filled with joy and happiness. We as a community have received abundant blessings. These include our blessed services of Theophany and the Blessing of the Waters. Additionally we are blessed by our Spiritual Father His Eminence Metropolitan Gerasimos conferring his spiritual blessings upon us, God is with us. There are many more opportunities for us to look forward and grow spiritually in the coming months. This indeed will be a tremendous year for our beloved community. I encourage all to worship and take part. Thank you to all for your well wishes. I keep you all in my prayers and ask that you remember me in yours. May God bless us all.

## Chapter 1... The Founding of Philoptochos

Service to Humanity

The Greek Orthodox Ladies Philoptochos Society, Inc. is the separately incorporated philanthropic arm of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America. It is the only women's organization recognized in the Uniform Parish Regulations, and a non-governmental organization registered with the United Nations. Our purpose is reflected in our **Mission Statement**.

The endeavors of the Society are a genuine expression of *philanthropia*, reflecting an enormous manifestation of love. This *agape* is evident not only in the millions of dollars of charity disbursed annually to our ministries, commitments, and special projects but also in the multitude of meaningful programs and activities, which have been undertaken over nearly ninety years.

St. James exhorts all Christians in his Epistle, James 1:22 to be, "Doers of the Word." Members of Philoptochos are indeed doers, and their accomplishments can be found in the annals of more than 400 Philoptochos chapters across the United States.



The very beginnings of Philoptochos can be traced to the late 1880s when hundreds of immigrants were arriving daily from Greece, Asia Minor and Constantinople. At that time, women's clubs formed in the churches in major cities across the US to tackle the formidable task of welcoming immigrants and assisting them in acclimating to their new environment. These clubs continued in various forms until the first part of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

Philoptochos was officially founded and organized in its current form in 1931 by then Archbishop, and later, Ecumenical Patriarch Athenagoras I. From its inception, Archbishop Athenagoras charged Philoptochos not only with assisting the needy in their communities, but also with planning family events of music, educational lectures, and performances.

The Vasilopites, which were baked to celebrate the name day of St. Basil, were auctioned off to raise funds to care for the orphans of the community. Education was another priority of the Archbishop, and he asked the chapters to support Holy Cross Theological School, which was founded in 1937. All of these programs which the Archbishop promoted in the 1930s, continue to inspire programs of Philoptochos to this day.

Established in the midst of an historic depression, Philoptochos responded vigorously to the needs of its community. Over the decades, Philoptochos chapters continue to respond wherever the need arises, in their local communities, the community at large and the throughout the world.

### Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis

#### Christianity Is Supposed to Change Us

When Christ who is our life appears, then you also will appear with Him in glory. Put to death therefore what is earthly in you: fornication, impurity, passion, evil desire, and covetousness, which is idolatry. On account of these the wrath of God is coming. In these you once walked, when you lived in them.

But now put them all away: anger, wrath, malice, slander, and foul talk from your mouth. Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have put off the old nature with its practices and have put on the new nature, which is being renewed in knowledge after the image of its creator. Here there cannot be Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave, free man, but Christ is all, and in all.

Colossians 3:4-11

Is there anything that distinguishes the life of a Christian from the life of a non-Christian? Is there anything that distinguishes your life as a Christian from those who aren't? This is not about being distinguished in the sense of a Christian is better than a non-Christian. This is more about behavior. Can anyone tell the difference between the behavior of a person who is Christian from one who is not Christian? If a Christian is still filled with anger, wrath, malice, slander and foul talk, what really makes them different from non-Christians who are doing the same thing?

Saint Paul, in the Epistle to the Colossians, points us to the new life in Christ. There are earthly desires which are attractive to every person, in this fallen world. And these earthly desires are not congruent with a life in Christ. If heaven is going to be an eternal life with Christ, then while on earth, we need to be living a life in Christ.

In fact, our entrance into the heavenly kingdom will be based on our earthly life in Christ. To make this more understandable, a person will get into college based largely on his or her high school grades. If a person is a good student in high school, a college will have an incentive to admit them to the college reasoning that their good studies will continue. If a person is not a good student in high school, a college will not want to admit them, reasoning that they are unprepared for college based on their poor studies in high school. In like fashion, our life on earth is a preparation for eternal life. So, if we are living an ungodly life, we will be unprepared to be with God in heaven

In this Epistle lesson, St. Paul talks about the kind of life we are supposed to be living in preparation for the Kingdom of God. He tells us that we need to put to death the things that are of an earthly nature—sexual immorality, impurity, lust, evil desires and greed. (Colossians 3:5) He says that these things are idolatry. What does idolatry mean? It means that these things become our idols, our gods. They get our attention and our desire. And if these things become our idols, then where is our room for God? Only one person or entity can take the first place in our lives. Is it God? Or something ungodly?

The point of the Christian life then isn't to live an error-free life. No one can do that. The goal of the Christian life is continual repentance, a continuous recognition of the ways we miss the mark and a continued work at correcting our path and centering it on Christ.

A large icon of Christ is on the right side of every icon screen in every Orthodox Church. Let's say that our goal is to stand with that icon, with nothing else distracting us When a person stands in the back of the church, there is a lot going on visually. There are icons, cars passing by that can be seen through the windows, lots of distractions from Christ. If a person takes ten steps forward in the church, ten steps towards the icon of Christ in the front, there are still lots of distractions, but the person is ten steps closer.

Take one step at a time, walk closer towards Christ, and there will still be distractions and other things to take our attention off of Him, but those things will lesson. If we take no steps, there will be no progress, nothing will change. One step at a time eventually leads us to be standing directly in front of the icon of Christ, where there are no distractions, where, as St. Paul writes, "Christ is all and in all." (Colossians 3:11) And this is how we want to end our lives—with Christ as our all. This is ideally how we want to live our lives, but in some ways, that is impossible in this fallen world. The work then becomes taking steps closer to Christ, and when we have a setback, when we've fallen back a few steps, to still continue to walk towards Christ even if we have to retrace steps we'd already taken.

This Epistle lesson gives us a list of concrete things to avoid—sexual immorality, impurity, lust, evil desires, greed, anger, rage, malice, slander, foul language and lying. Instead we are to "put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge in the image of its Creator." (Colossians 3:10) This starts with a daily decision to follow after Christ, regardless of how one might have failed yesterday.

So if you are reading this message at the beginning of the day, make an effort to be Christ-centered today. If you are reading the message at the end of the day and its been a bad day, wake up focused tomorrow, because any day offers us the possibility of taking steps towards Christ, and that's what this life is ultimately all about.

Walk towards Christ today!

# SPIRITUAL THOUGHTS by Deacon Euthym Kontaxis

"Nothing else drives patience out of the soul as does prideful thinking."

St. Ignatius

When we are short with others, impatient, judgmental, and lack compassion and mercy for others we need to look inside. The tendency is to blame others for our impatience and their shortcomings. Rather, it is our pride that does not let us have compassion for others. One of the early signs of pride is impatience with others. This is a good warning sign for us to remember. When we lose patience easily, it may be time to look at ourselves, confess and examine the root of pride in our soul. Christ our God showed the ultimate patience with us. Can't we be a bit patient with others? Remember the parable of the man who was forgiven the 10,000 talents by the Master, but could not forgive another for the little he owed him? Let us not forget the patience and mercy God has for us.

"I realized that we all worry about ourselves too much and that only he who leaves everything to the will of God can feel truly joyous, light, and peaceful."

The self becomes our "god" and then we have stress and heaviness. When we remove the self, and rely only on God's will, we feel joy and peace, beyond comprehension. So, if we find ourselves troubled, stressed, upset, let us inquire, am I focusing on myself too much? Have I forgotten to seek God's will and, instead, seek to exercise only my own? By even asking ourselves such a question, we begin to allow God to enter and clean the "inside of the cup". Self-will is the Pharisaical effort to clean the "outside of the cup". God's will is to clean the "inside of the cup." This is the inner peace we seek and desire and, if we abide in Christ, we will be with Him in eternity.

# The Presentation of the Lord

#### 2 February


When the most pure Mother and Ever-Virgin Mary's forty days of purification had been fulfilled, she took her first-born Son to Jerusalem on this, the fortieth day after His birth, that she might present Him in the temple according to the Law of Moses, which teaches that every first-born male child be dedicated to God, and also that she might offer the sacrifice of a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons, as required by the Law.

(Luke 2:22-24; Exod. 13:2; Lev. 12:6-8)

On this same day, a just and devout man, the greatly aged Symeon, was also present in the temple, being guided by the Holy Spirit. For a long time, this man had been awaiting the salvation of God and he had been informed by divine revelation that he would not die until he beheld the Lord's Christ. Thus, when he beheld Him at that time and took Him up into his aged arms, he gave glory to God, singing: "Now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace, O Master. . ." And he confessed that he would close his eyes joyfully, since he had seen the Light of Revelation for the nations and the Glory of Israel.

(Luke 2:25-32)

From ancient times, the Holy Church has retained this tradition of the churching of the mother and new-born child on the fortieth day and of the reading of prayers of purification.



# Saint Theodore Commander and Great Martyr 8 February

The Holy Martyr Theodore was from Euchaita of Galatia and dwelt in Heraclea of Pontus. He was a renowned commander in the military. Emperor Licinius was told that he was a Christian and abominated the idols. Licinius therefore sent certain men to him from Nicomedia, to honor him and ask him to appear before him. Through them, however, Saint Theodore sent back a message that it was necessary for various reasons, that Licinius come to Heraclea. Licinius, seeing in this a hope of turning Saint Theodore away from Christ did as was asked of him.

When the Emperor came to Heraclea, Saint Theodore met him with honor and the Emperor in turn gave Theodore his hand, believing that through him he would be able to draw the Christians to the worship of his idols. Seated upon his throne in the midst of the people, he publicly bade Theodore offer sacrifice to the gods. But Theodore asked that the emperor entrust him with the most venerable of his gods, those of gold and silver, that he might take them home and himself attend upon them that evening, promising that the following day he would honor them in public. The Emperor, filled with joy at these tidings, gave command that Theodore's request be fulfilled.

When the Saint had taken the idols home, he broke them in pieces and distributed the gold and silver to the poor by night. The next day a centurion named Maxentius told Licinius that he had seen a pauper pass by carrying the head of Artemis. Saint Theodore, far from repenting of this, confessed Christ boldly. Licinius, in an uncontainable fury, had the Saint put to many torments, then crucified. While upon the cross, the holy Martyr was further tormented — his privy parts were cut off, he was shot with arrows, his eyes were put out and he was left on the cross to die. The next day Licinius sent men to take his corpse and cast it into the sea; but they found the Saint alive and perfectly whole. Through this, many believed in Christ. Seeing his own men turning to Christ and the city in an uproar, Licinius had Theodore beheaded, about the year 320. The Saint's holy relics were returned to his ancestral home on June 8, which is also a feast day of the Great Martyr Theodore.



# Triodion Begins— Sunday of the Publican & the Pharisee

#### 25 February

The Pharisees were an ancient and outstanding sect among the Jews known for their diligent observance of the outward matters of the Law. Although, according to the word of our Lord, they "did all their works to be seen of men" (Matt. 23:5), and were hypocrites. Because of the apparent holiness of their lives they were thought by all to be righteous and separate from others, which is what the name Pharisee means. On the other hand, Publicans, collectors of the royal taxes, committed many injustices and extortions for filthy lucre's sake and all held them to be sinners and unjust. It was therefore according to common opinion that the Lord Jesus in His parable signified a virtuous person by a Pharisee and a sinner by a Publican, to teach His disciples the harm of pride and the profit of humble-mindedness.

Since the chief weapon for virtue is humility and the greatest hindrance to it is pride, the divine Fathers have set these three weeks before the Forty-day Fast as a preparation for the spiritual struggles of virtue. This present week they have called Harbinger, since it declares that the Fast is approaching; and they set humility as the foundation for all our spiritual labors by appointing that the parable of the Publican and the Pharisee be read on this day, even before the Fast begins, to teach, through the vaunting of the Pharisee, that the foul smoke of self-esteem and the stench of boasting drives away the grace of the Spirit, strips man of all his virtue and casts him into the pits of Hades; and, through the repentance and contrite prayer of the Publican, that humility confers upon the sinner's forgiveness of all his wicked deeds and raises him up to the greatest heights. No fasting the week that follows this Sunday.
