

### Message from Father Peter

Dear Lord, we have promised to serve You to the end. Help us Lord, to understand the true meaning and spirit of "sacrifice" as we present our bodies, our minds, and our hearts for Your service. May Your Holy Cross always be our strength and inspiration. Amen.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Sunday April 7 we commemorate the Veneration of the Holy Cross. This special day marks the midpoint of Great Lent. It offers us a unique opportunity to pause and reflect. When our Lord carried His Cross to Golgotha, He paused at the midpoint of His excruciating climb, in order to regain His strength and refresh His spirit so that He could continue. We too, now, pause and think about how our Lenten journey is progressing. Are we disciplined with our prayer, fasting, study of scripture and almsgiving? If we have slipped, are we starting over with a renewed strength and are we trying to incorporate these disciplines again? As St John Chrysostom addresses us in his Paschal message, even those who have arrived at the 11th hour are welcome. All are welcome, and all are called by Christ, as we proceed towards Holy Week and the celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord God and Savior Jesus Christ.

A prayer from the Vesper Service for the Veneration of the Cross describes the great significance of Christ willingly accepting crucifixion so that we may be saved:

"O Christ our God, You willingly accepted crucifixion that all humankind might be raised up to life. Out of love for us You took up the Cross; and with fingers covered with Your precious blood You signed our absolution like a King—granting us forgiveness of sins. O Lord, we are in danger of being separated from You by our sins. Have mercy on your people. Rise up by your almighty power and help us in our adversities that we may glorify You, together with Your Father and Your Holy Spirit, now and forever. Amen."

This Sunday, the Third Sunday of Lent, we celebrate the veneration of the precious and life giving Cross. It is presented to us on this day for refreshment and support, for remembrance of the passion of our Lord Jesus Christ, and for encouragement. We are like those following a long and difficult path, who become tired, see a beautiful tree with many leaves, sit in its shadow and rest for a while. When rejuvenated, we continue on our journey. Additionally, during this season of fasting and spiritual labor, the life-giving Cross was set in our midst by the holy Fathers to give us comfort and spiritual strength, to make us ready and eager for the remaining journey.

May our Lord continue to strengthen us all through the power of His life-giving Cross.

"Through Your Cross, O Christ, establish us firmly on the rock of faith and let not our minds be shaken by the adversary. For You alone are holy, now and forever. Amen."





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#### Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis

#### **ON FORGIVENESS...**

Then Peter came up and said to Him, "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?" Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you seven times, but seventy times seven."

Matthew 18:21-22

But the steadfast love of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting upon those who fear Him, and His righteousness to children's children, to those who keep His covenant and remember to do His commandments.

Psalm 103:17-18

The biggest weight I carry in my soul is the weight of past failure. Whether I failed another person or failed myself, in either case I have failed God. As we get older, the résumé of our successes gets longer and so does the list of our failures. On the day of my ordination, I had not failed any parishioner. I had never had a parishioner up to that point. Now twenty-six years in, I have failed many parishioners. I have burned friendships, there are people who dislike me, people who avoid me, people I dislike and people who I avoid. I suppose there are a lot of people in the secular world who don't care what others think of them. Politicians on both sides come to mind. But this isn't about what others think of themselves. It's about what we think of ourselves.

The greatest weight we carry cannot be quantified on a scale. This is not weight we can remove with diet & exercise. The greatest weight we carry is the burden of sin and shame. And the most effective way to lose that weight is through a beautiful thing called *forgiveness*.

Frederick Buechner, a well-known author and Presbyterian minister, offered one of the best quotes on forgiveness that I have ever read:

When somebody you've wronged forgives you, you're spared the dull and self-diminishing throb of a guilty conscience. When you forgive somebody who has wronged you, you're spared the dismal corrosion of bitterness and wounded pride. For both parties, forgiveness means the freedom again to be at peace inside their own skins and to be glad in each other's presence.

The opposite of this quote holds true as well. When we have wronged someone and are unforgiven, there is a dull and self-diminishing throb of shame and sadness, and for some, a guilty conscience. When we are unable to forgive someone, it corrodes our own souls. Lack of forgiveness diminishes, and often extinguishes relationships.

Forgiveness doesn't necessarily mean we have to trust someone again, or confide in someone, or even be friends with them. However, in relationships that matter, in marriages, in families, in close friendships and in work environments, forgiveness is essential. I have served in my parish for twenty years. There have been hundreds of families that have belonged to this parish during my time here. If I wronged each family one time per year for twenty years, that would add up to an astronomical amount of sins, thousands upon thousands of them. One sin against each of one thousand parishioners times twenty years would be twenty thousand sins. The weight of that, without forgiveness, would be crushing. The shame of all that sin would be unbearable. There is no way I would make it in a parish for any amount of time without forgiveness.

Let's talk for a moment about the relationships that have been severed by sin. Some of those are unredeemable. To release someone from the burden of sin actually gives you freedom. Some of these relationships probably are redeemable but stubborn pride on both sides has put a wall there. A gesture of forgiveness by one party might salvage something good that was lost.

In relationships that matter, forgiveness is what allows them to continue. Take a marriage of 25 years. If each spouse sins once a week against the other—an unkind word, a moment of anger, just common things — 52 weeks a year times 25 years, that's 1,300 sins. And that's if there is only ONE sin a week. No relationship would hold up under the weight of that much sin. That's why it is essential to forgive as we go, to learn from mistakes, but to release one another from the weight of sin and failure.

Forgiveness and repentance work hand in hand. Forgiveness involves asking someone to overlook a mistake, and overlooking someone else's mistake. Repentance means working hard to make sure the mistake doesn't happen again, even though it often does. Thus, we are continually in need of this cycle of forgiveness and repentance, whether it is with another person or with God. This cycle is not just done one time.

I want to share three quotes from Scripture on forgiveness:

The first is Psalm 130:3-4:

If Thou, O Lord, shouldst mark iniquities, Lord, who could stand? But there is forgiveness with Thee.

Every time we sin against someone, we are sinning against God. If I have committed one sin a week against my wife, one sin a week against my son, and one sin a year against every parishioner—perhaps that is a manageable number of sins against people, but the total number of sins against God would be enormous, even unquantifiable. If God marked our iniquities, no one could stand before Him. Just like if we mark every iniquity against one another, we'd have no relationships.

Second, we read in Psalm 103:17-18:

But the steadfast love of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting upon those who fear Him, and His righteousness to children's children, to those who keep His covenant and remember to do His commandments.

This means that the mercy of God is without ending. His capacity to forgive is never exceeded by our sins that need forgiveness.

Third, in Matthew 18:21-22, we read:

"Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?" Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you seven times, but seventy times seven."

That's a lot of forgiveness, nearly five hundred times. Seven is seen as a number of completion in the Bible, and seventy times what is complete is basically an infinite number. If God has an infinite capacity to forgive, He is telling us that we should have an infinite capacity to forgive as well.

There is a difference between saying "I'm sorry" and "forgive me." It's like the difference between saying "I'm a little short on money" and "Can I have ten dollars?" If someone says "I'm a little short on money," the other person might just shrug their shoulders. But when a person asks "Can I have \$10," it forces the other one to participate with an answer - either "Yes" or "No". "I'm sorry" might result in a shoulder shrug or a "Don't worry about it" response.

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Asking for forgiveness, actually saying the words "Can you forgive me?" requires the other person to answer "Yes, I forgive you," or "No, but here's the path to forgiveness." And hopefully there is one. Notice I said *forgiveness*, not *restoration* necessarily. Of course in relationships that matter, forgiveness needs to mean restoration

There is a gesture in the Divine Liturgy, which was part of the ancient church but in modern days is restricted only to the clergy when multiple priests are celebrating, and that is the kiss of peace. Part of this gesture is that each priest grabs the hand of the other and kisses it, which requires both to bow to the other at the same time. Metaphorically speaking, this is how forgiveness ideally happens, when two people bow to the other at the same time. Imagine in a marriage, or with a child, or with a close friend, if periodically you paused and bowed to the other and kissed their hand, asking for forgiveness. Imagine if you did it at the same time.

Finally, on a personal note, I need forgiveness. There are people who read this message who I consider friends; people I have wronged through these writings; people who I have wronged in our day-to-day interactions. There are people who perhaps read these messages who I have wronged and we are no longer interacting. There are people who no longer read these messages because I have wronged them. The weight of carrying these sins, the feeling of needing forgiveness, the feeling of shame associated with sin, is a heavy weight that I carry not only through my life, but I carry it especially to the altar. I'm not perfect. Far from it. If God were to mark my iniquities, forget it.

#### Saint Paul writes in I Corinthians 9:25-27:

Every athlete exercises self-control in all things. They do it to receive a perishable wreath, but we an imperishable. Well, I do not run aimlessly, I do not box as one beating the air; but I pommel my body and subdue it, lest after preaching to others I myself should be disqualified.

Saint Paul sets a high bar here. Honestly, in the busy-ness and confusion of the world, I sometimes forget about the imperishable wreath. I do run seemingly without aim, and I lack self-control in many things. The added stress of all of this is going to the altar and preaching about things that I'm struggling to do - to ostensibly represent Christ even though I often fail to act in a Christ-like way. The weight of this shame becomes more crushing the older I get. It is harder and harder to go to the altar with its weight around me. Yes, I go to confession and own up before God for my sins. But even this doesn't seem to take the weight of shame I feel when I've wronged another human being, especially the ones who matter. So, for what it's worth, please forgive me, for anything I have done, anything I have failed to do, and anything I should have done. And if you are someone who I see on a regular basis, please allow me the opportunity to ask that in person.

We all have the need to be forgiven. We all have the capacity to forgive.

#### ON CONFESSION...

But now thus says the Lord, He who created you, O Jacob, He who formed you, O Israel: "Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are Mine. When you pass through the waters I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior. Isaiah 43:1-3

God does not want us to live in shame He wants us to live with joy, to feel a sense of freedom and hope. That is why the church offers us the sacrament of confession, to get rid of shame and to reclaim hope. If you've never been to confession, or it's been a while, I encourage you to make an appointment with your priest, so that you can rid yourself of shame and reclaim joy.

The best way to think of confession is to imagine your life as a book, filled with all the things you have done in your life history. There will be joyful things, challenging things, sad things, and some shameful things. The weight of sin wears on us, it weighs us down. Confession provides a way in this life to shed the weight of guilt and failure. It provides a way to own up to things we've done before God in this life, so that we won't have to own up for them at the last judgment. It gives us a way to get direction and counsel on how to change bad habits. It gives us a way to tear the pages of shame out of our book of life and to replace them with pages of repentance, ways to correct things we've done to hopefully avoid doing them in the future. I'm frequently asked what is the thing I like most about being an Orthodox Christian. And I answer "confession," not because I enjoy going to confession, but because I'm just glad we have the opportunity to shed sin, shame and guilt as we go, rather than having it accumulate for a lifetime. However I get nervous just like everyone else, because no one likes admitting their sins and shortcomings.

If you have never been to confession before or it's been a long time, the best way to approach the sacrament is to address things that are in the far past that you feel ashamed of. I often tell middle-aged people who have never gone to confession, just look back at your life and take out the big ticket items—if you drank too much in college, just say I drank too much in college – no need for specific details. Many people will have drinking, drugs, and promiscuity in their past. They aren't a present problem. Thus, own up to these things from the past, be as specific as you need to be, and then you move on from this. Next, bring to mind the things that are weighing you down at present, the current struggles, and this is where a conversation will take place about repentance, and how to work on the current challenges to bring one's life more into alignment with the way Christ wants us to live.

At the end of confession, the priest offers a prayer of absolution, which indicates to the person going to confession, that they need not have any further anxiety about the things that they have confessed, but are to go away in peace. Many people find peace and indeed go away feeling lighter. Others struggle with this - they struggle with forgiving themselves. I counter this with a few simple, logical questions:

- Who is greater, you or God? The answer obviously is God.
- Do you believe that God can forgive you? Hopefully, a person who has come to confession believes
  that that they can be saved, or they would not have come. For the person who is not sure if God can
  forgive them, the answer is that He can. He preached about forgiveness. He offered forgiveness,
  even during His Crucifixion.
- If God who is greater than you can forgive you, can you forgive yourself? If this is true. then you must be able to forgive yourself. Part of our faith in God's ability to forgive us means that we must accept His forgiveness and also forgive ourselves.

It is true that even confessing certain things doesn't always rid us of our personal guilt and shame. Sometimes this is a process that takes time. It takes time to feel washed by the grace of God.

Thankfully the church offers two other sacraments that we are to receive regularly, which aid us in being cleansed not only of sin, but of associated guilt over sin.

The sacrament of **Holy Unction**, which will be offered on Holy Wednesday, affords us the opportunity to receive cleansing through prayer and oil, and to remember the stories of great saints who at one point were great sinners.

The sacrament of Holy Communion, is offered by the church for sustenance. St. Peter received Holy Communion from Jesus at the last supper, and shortly after denied Him three times. The rest of the disciples received Communion and all except for John abandoned Jesus only hours later.

Holy Communion is not the reward for the perfect but the medicine for the sick and imperfect. That's why we approach with fear of God, a recognition of our sinfulness, but also with faith and with love, and our hope in His mercy. God knows we will fall again and again. Holy Communion hopefully gives us the strength and the motivation to get up each time we fall. We have the opportunity to receive Holy Communion every Sunday, and on feast days. During Great Lent, there are also opportunities to receive Holy Communion at the Pre-Sanctified Liturgy offered on Wednesdays and Fridays during Great Lent.

Reading the Bible is important for many reasons. I've heard the Bible called "God's love letter to us." Yes, it is filled with history, theology and guidance. It is also a great source of encouragement. There are so many instances of short passages that provide comfort and reassurance. One comes from Isaiah 43:1-3.

Isaiah was a prophet who prophesied between the 8<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> centuries B.C. This was a time when the Northern and Southern Kingdoms of Israel were under attack from the Assyrians and eventually were exiled to Babylon. Chapters 40-55 of Isaiah reassure the exiled Israelites that better days will be ahead, and that they have not been forgotten by God. The Prophet writes with conviction but also with reassurance:

But now thus says the Lord, He who created you, O Jacob, He who formed you, O Israel: "Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are Mine. When you pass through the waters I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior.

Psalm 147:4 says He determines the number of the stars, He gives to all of them their names. Each of us has a name that is known to God. We may cross off names of people from our list of friends, but God will not cross us off His list, at least not as long as we are alive. However, if we are numbered among the goats at the judgment (Matthew 25:31-46) we will be sent away into eternal punishment, but right now, if we are alive to read this message, there is still time to correct things. He knows our names. We are His.

You are worthy of God's love.

God knows your name.

You are His.

## Saints & Feasts

#### Sunday of the Holy Cross

#### 07 April

With the help of God, we have almost reached the middle of the course of the Fast, where our strength has been worn down through abstinence, and the full difficulty of the labor set before us becomes apparent. Therefore our holy Mother, the Church of Christ, now brings to our help the all-holy Cross, the joy of the world, the strength of the faithful, the staff of the just, and the hope of sinners, so that by venerating it reverently, we might receive strength and grace to complete the divine struggle of the Fast.



#### Sunday of St. John Climacus

#### 14 April

The memory of this Saint is celebrated on March 30, where his biography may be found. He is celebrated today because his book, The Ladder of Divine Ascent, is a sure guide to the ascetic life, written by a great man of prayer experienced in all forms of the monastic polity; it teaches the seeker after salvation how to lay a sound foundation for his struggles, how to detect and war against each of the passions, how to avoid the snares laid by the demons, and how to rise from the rudimental virtues to the heights of Godlike love and humility. It is held in such high esteem that it is universally read in its entirety in monasteries during the Great Fast.



#### Sunday of St. Mary of Egypt

#### 21 April

The memory of this Saint is celebrated on April 1, where her life is recorded. This was a woman in all of human history who stood on air at the moment of her prayer.

Since this is during the holy Forty Days, it has been appointed for this day also, so that if we think it hard to practice a little abstinence for forty days, we might be roused by the heroism of her who fasted in the wilderness forty seven years; and also that the great loving-kindness of God, and His readiness to receive the repentant, might be demonstrated in every deed.

Her whole life is a living expression of the word said by St. Paul, "All the more the blood of Christ, Who through the Eternal Spirit offered Himself without blemish to God, will purify your con-science from dead works to serve the living God." (Hebrews 9:14).

St. Paul's words are Divinely inspired and verified by the Most Holy Mother of God Herself. She guided St. Mary of Egypt to repentance and Eternal Life. As much as we know about St. Mary of Egypt, we can understand that in reality, the truth is that Christ is the True God and that all of the false gods of the world then and now are idols who do not save humanity, but can truly harm us.



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## Saturday of Lazarus

#### 27 April

Lazarus and his sisters Martha and Mary, the friends of the Lord Jesus, had given Him hospitality and served Him many times (Luke 10:38-42 and John 12:2-3). They were from Bethany, a village of Judea. This village is situated in the eastern parts by the foothills of the Mount of Olives, about two Roman miles from Jerusalem. When Lazarus, whose name is a Hellenized form of "Eleazar," which means "God has helped," became ill some days before the saving Passion, his sisters had this report taken to our Saviour, Who was then in Galilee. Nonetheless, He tarried yet two more days until Lazarus died; then He said to His disciples, "Let us go into Judea that I might awake My friend who sleepeth." By this, of course, He meant the deep sleep of death.

On arriving at Bethany, He consoled the sisters of Lazarus, who was already four days dead. Jesus groaned in spirit and was troubled at the death of His beloved friend. He asked, "Where have ye laid his body?" and He wept over him. When He drew nigh to the tomb, He commanded that they remove the stone, and He lifted up His eyes, and giving thanks to God the Father, He cried out with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come forth." And he that had been dead four days came forth immediately, bound hand and foot with the grave clothes, and Jesus said to those standing there, "Loose him, and let him go." This is the supernatural wonder wrought by the Saviour that we celebrate on this day.


According to an ancient tradition, it is said that Lazarus was thirty years old when the Lord raised him; then he lived another thirty years on Cyprus and there reposed in the Lord. It is furthermore related that after he was raised from the dead, he never laughed till the end of his life, but that once only, when he saw someone stealing a clay vessel, he smiled and said, "Clay stealing clay." His grave is situated in the city of Kition, having the inscription: "Lazarus the four days dead and friend of Christ."

In 890 his sacred relics were transferred to Constantinople by Emperor Leo the Wise, at which time the Emperor composed his stichera for Vespers, "Wishing to behold the tomb of Lazarus . ."



#### Palm Sunday 28 April

On Sunday, five days before the Passover of the Law, the Lord came from Bethany to Jerusalem. Sending two of His disciples to bring Him a foal of an ass, He sat thereon and entered into the city. When the multitude there heard that Jesus was coming, they straight-away took up the branches of palm trees in their hands, and went forth to meet Him. Others spread their garments on the ground, and yet others cut branches from the trees and strewed them in the way that Jesus was to pass; and all of them together, especially the children, went before and after Him, crying out: "Hosanna: Blessed is He that cometh in the Name of the Lord, the King of Israel" (John 12:13). This is the radiant and glorious festival of our Lord's entry into Jerusalem that we celebrate today.





#### Holy Monday 29 April

The Holy Passion of our Savior begins today, presenting Joseph the all-comely as a prefiguring of Christ. He was the eleventh son of Jacob, and his first son by Rachel; because he was so beloved of his father, his own brethren came to envy him and cast him into a pit. Later they sold him to foreigners for thirty pieces of silver, who later sold him again in Egypt. Because of his virtue, his master gave him much authority in governing his house; because he was fair of countenance, his master's wife sought to draw him into sin with her; because of his chastity, he refused her, and through her slanders was cast into prison. Finally, he was led forth again with great glory and was honored as a king. He became lord over all Egypt and a provider of wheat for all the people. Through all this, he typifies in himself the betrayal, Passion, death, and glorification of our Lord

To the commemoration of Patriarch Joseph is added also the narration concerning the fig tree, which on this day was cursed and subsequently dried up because of its unfruitfulness. It portrayed the Jewish synagogue, which had not produced the fruit demanded of it - obedience to God and faith in Him. It was stripped of all spiritual grace by means of the curse.



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#### Holy Tuesday 30 April

Today we bring to mind the parable of the ten virgins, which our Savior related as He was coming to His Passion. This parable teaches us that the accomplishment of the great work of virginity should not make us careless in other matters, especially in almsgiving, wherewith the lamp of virginity is made radiant.

Furthermore, it teaches us that we should not be remiss about the end of our life, but should be prepared for it at every moment, like the wise virgins, so that we may meet the Bridegroom, lest He come suddenly and the doors of the heavenly bride chamber be shut, and we also, like the foolish virgins, hear that dread sentence: "Amen, I say unto you, I know you not" (Matthew 25:1-13).
