

Message from Father Peter

The Christmas Fast begins November 15

Prayer: Let us rejoice! Let us celebrate with songs! The revelation of Christ is made manifest: the preachings of the prophets have received their fulfillment. The Coming of the Lord

For forty days the Church seeks to prepare us for the true meaning of Christmas. Most of us need time to prepare for special events. It takes time to plan for a trip, a vacation, for entering college, for a baptism or wedding. We need time to anticipate, to prepare for the practical aspects, to think about their significance for us. With adequate preparation we enjoy these events much more.

During the liturgical year the Church has several periods of preparation prior to great feast days. The first such period begins on November 15, the Christmas Fast, which is not as strict as Great Lent prior to Pascha. For forty days we anticipate and prepare for the coming (Advent) of Christ into the world and into our lives.

Some Practical Advice

As part of your preparation for Christmas resolve to give closer attention to the Word of God by reading, for example, one chapter a day from the Gospels for the forty days (November 15 thru December 24). You might read the Gospels of Mark and Luke which together have forty chapters. Getting to know more about the life of Christ will make you appreciate more deeply the significance of His coming which we celebrate on Christmas.

In your daily prayers include thanksgiving for the Lord's coming, invite Him to be at the center of your life and let your heart leap for joy as you meditate on God's gift of His Son to the world.

PARISH COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Information We All Need To Know

With the blessings of His Eminence Metropolitan Gerasimos, I am communicating with you regarding this year's election for 2025 Parish Council.

Each and every baptized Orthodox Christian must make some effort of active commitment to his or her Church. Some serve by participating in Church music; teaching Sunday school, joining the Ladies Philoptochos Society, and volunteering in other capacities, while others assist the Church by serving as members of the Parish Council.

Being a member of the Parish Council is a ministry of the Church and all those who serve are called to represent Christ and the Orthodox Faith. This is truly a responsible task that must be served by an individual committed to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. The role of a Parish Council member is a holy and spiritual one. In assisting in the administrative responsibilities of the Church, a Parish Council member acknowledges the importance of strengthening the earthly ministry of Christ through God's Church. Membership on Parish Council should not be for social reasons nor status in the Community; but rather as an act of humility and conviction to Christ our Lord.

In accordance with the 2019 Regulations of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America, all candidates seeking election to serve on the Parish Council must attend a PARISH COUNCIL SEMINAR organized by the local Parish Council and under the leadership of the Parish Priest. The purpose of the Seminar is to prepare candidates for the Parish Council, as well as making aware of the sacred responsibilities expected of a Council member.

Saint Anthony Church will hold a **PARISH COUNCIL SEMINAR** on Sunday, November 10, 2024, following Divine Liturgy in the boardroom. All potential Parish Council members, including those seeking re-election, must attend the Seminar. In order to be placed on the ballot, one must complete the Application for candidacy form and return it to the Parish Office by Monday, November 4, 2024, by 3:00 p.m. If an application has not been turned in by the designated date and time, the person will be ineligible.

December 15th: Christmas program





- *For the benefit of our Sunday School students, their teachers and the TIMELY start of their Sunday School Classes, the children will be receiving Holy Communion first.
- *The ushers will release the children by pew from Front to Back.
- *Only parents of the smallest, youngest Sunday School children, who need assistance, should receive Holy Communion with their children.
- *If you are not seated when Holy Communion begins, please take a seat in the back rows, quietly. Your children will be released in turn.
- *Please do not attempt to send your children down the side aisles to the front alone or down the center aisle.
- *After all children have received, the ushers will release the adults, again from the front pews.
- *Please cooperate with our ushers. Please do not ask to be allowed through ahead of others.
- *Please remember this new procedure is for the benefit of our children and their Sunday School experience.

Come join fellowship, faith, and challenging activities.







Church Etiquette

When are we NOT to enter the Nave of the Church?

As we are entering God's Home, we must always keep in mind that during the following times, we should NOT enter the Nave of the Church nor come to the front of the Church to light a votive candle:

During the Small Entrance (when the procession with the Gospel takes place)

During the Epistle Reading

During the Gospel Reading

When the priest is censing and is facing the Congregation

During the Great Entrance (when the procession of the Holy Gifts takes place)

When the priest is blessing the Congregation

During the recitation of the Nicene Creed ("I believe...")

During the Consecration of the Holy Gifts

During the recitation of the Lord's Prayer ("Our Father...")

During the Priest's sermon

Also, during these times, we should avoid leaving the Nave unless it is for family needs, medical or some other necessary reason. If you are unsure when to enter or leave the church, ask a Parish Council member in the Narthex.

While in the Church, remember to...

Wear appropriate attire to enter God's House

Silence your mobile devices

Refrain from chewing gum, mints, or candy

Remove lipstick when receiving Holy Communion & when venerating & kissing the icons

Follow the direction of the Priest for standing & sitting

Maintain quiet in the Sanctuary

Enter God's House with reverence and respect

Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis

A Lesson from Father Stauros..

For I received from the Lord what I also delivered to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when He was betrayed took bread, and when He had given thanks, He broke it, and said, "This is My body which is for you. Do this in remembrance of Me." In the same way also the cup, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in My blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until He comes. Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty of profaning the body and blood of the Lord. Let a man examine himself, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup. For any one who eats and drinks without discerning the body eats and drinks judgment upon himself. That is why many of you are weak and ill, and some have died. But if we judged ourselves truly, we should not be judged. But when we are judged by the Lord, we are chastened so that we may not be condemned along with the world. | Corinthians 11:23-32

The Covid-19 pandemic brought up the question of "Is Holy Communion Safe?" This question has come up in other times of illness, like the AIDS crisis in the 1980s, SARS or other widespread diseases. People who are outside of our faith are sometimes critical of how we distribute Holy Communion and for those seeking to come into our faith, this can be a stumbling block as well. We will answer this question in two ways, both answers taken from I Corinthians 11:23-32.

When Jesus instituted the Eucharist, He did so by consecrating bread and wine and revealing them as "This is My Body," (v. 24) and "This cup is the new covenant in My blood." (v. 25) We believe, as Orthodox Christians, that in the Divine Liturgy, we present ordinary offerings of bread and wine, and through the descent of the Holy Spirit, these ordinary substances are consecrated, becoming the Body and Blood of Christ. We receive them in a way that we can handle them. Think of the sun outside. We receive the sun in a way we can handle it—its rays and its warmth. We cannot look at it, we would burn up if we got in a spaceship and flew to it, but we receive its energies in a way we can handle them. None of us can handle the essence of God, at least not in our fallen state in this fallen world. We can handle Christ revealed in the Eucharist. Verse 26 reminds us that "as often as you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until He comes."

There is a benefit in partaking of the Eucharist, in that is strengthens faith, fills us with the real presence of Christ, and prepares us to participate in the fullness of Christ in the Kingdom of heaven. On a practical level, Holy Communion is received after careful preparation, and so the exercise of preparing to receive should bring us into a state of heightened vigilance and focus on Christ, on loving Him, and serving others. Preparing to receive Holy Communion requires commitment to the Christian faith (why we always recite the Creed before receiving as part of the Divine Liturgy), a relationship with Christ (prayer), obedience to the commandments (moral living, and when we fail at this, going to confession to talk about our failures and to repent), reconciliation with our fellow man (not being angry with others), worship at the Divine Liturgy (Holy Communion is received in the context of the Divine Liturgy) and fasting (getting control over our passion for food so that we in turn gain control over our other passions like greed, lust, ego, etc. that cause us to sin).

Back to the question of safety from a physical health perspective. There has never been a documented link between receiving Holy Communion and transmitting disease. Every priest in the world, after the completion of the Divine Liturgy, consumes the remainder of the Holy Gifts. That means, the priest eats and drinks all of whatever remains in the chalice at the end of the Divine Liturgy. He then rinses out the chalice with water which he also drinks. On a given Sunday in my parish, I commune hundreds of people. Some of those people undoubtedly are sick. I rarely get sick. After everyone has received, after I have put the spoon in the chalice hundreds of times, I put the spoon in my own mouth to consume the Gifts. If a person could get sick from Holy Communion, every priest in the world would be perpetually sick from consuming the Gifts, and we aren't. I've consumed the Gifts for over 27 years, and I'm just fine. So are the thousands of other priests who do this regularly.

What is **NOT** safe in regards to Holy Communion, is receiving it improperly from a spiritual perspective. St. Paul writes "For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body eats and drinks judgment upon himself. This is why many of you are weak and ill, and some have died." I Corinthians 29-30 The far greater threat to our health comes from partaking of the Eucharist without proper preparation.

All of us are guilty of this to a certain extent, and some are very guilty—they receive Holy Communion in almost a flippant manner. This would be people who only come to church once a year and receive Holy Communion, completely out of context when compared to the rest of their Christian life. This would include people who come into the Divine Liturgy extremely late, i.e. during the Lord's Prayer, who receive Holy Communion but not in the context of worshipping, they basically "drive through." This would include people who are living in habitual sin, like cohabitating before marriage, or cohabitating with no intention to be married.

Receiving Holy Communion should be done with some self-examination, and I can't say I do this each time I receive. As a priest, I am required to receive, and so I receive habitually but not necessarily with proper self-examination each time. And I would venture to say that many of us do it in this same way.

The Prayer of Consecration from the Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom offers six potential benefits from receiving Holy Communion:

-So that they may be for those who partake of them for vigilance of soul, remission of sins, communion of Your Holy Spirit, fullness of the Kingdom of Heaven, boldness before You, not for judgment or condemnation."

And Jesus Himself, in speaking of the Eucharist, said in John 6:54,

"He who eats My flesh and drinks My blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up at the last day."

There is great benefit from receiving the Eucharist, however, it must be received with proper preparation, or there is a danger.

How shall I, who am unworthy, enter into the splendor of Your saints?

If I should dare to enter into the bridal chamber, my vesture will condemn me, since it is not a wedding garment; and being bound up, I shall be cast out by the angels.

Cleanse, O Lord, the filth of my soul, and save me, as You are the one Who loves mankind.

In Your love, Lord, cleanse my soul, and save me.

Master Who loves mankind, Lord Jesus Christ, my God, let not these Holy Gifts be to my judgment because I am unworthy, but rather for the purification and sanctification of both soul and body and the pledge of the life and Kingdom to come.

It is good for me to cleave unto God and to place in Him the hope of my salvation.

(Prayers in Preparation for Holy Communion, from the Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom)

Holy Communion is safe from a physical perspective.

It is only dangerous from a spiritual perspective if it is received without proper reverence, manifested in how we prepare to receive, and how we are living outside the context of the Divine Liturgy.



Pastoral Reflection Fr. Timothy Pavlatos St. Katherine. Chandler. Arizona

A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:34–35).

The above passage is the heart of the Gospel message and the fact that it is a commandment speaks volumes, for a commandment is only given when something is absent or greatly lacking. When we hear the word "commandments" our first thought is usually The Ten Commandments, also known as the Decalogue, which constitute the ethical code by which the human race on the one hand, will come to believe in the true God, and on the other hand, to sustain a godly society in the attainment and application of God's will on earth.

According to the tradition of our Orthodox faith, the first four commandments pertain to our relationship with God, while the rest pertain to our neighbor. This division is testified to by our Lord Jesus Christ Himself when He was asked by a lawyer, "Teacher, which is the great commandment in the law" (Matt. 22:36)? The Lord replied, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment. And a second is like it, You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments depend all the law and the prophets" (Matt. 22:37-40; cf. Luke 10:25-28).

Since the Garden of Eden, man has rebelled against God. To help free humanity from the propensity to sin, which is to miss the mark of God, the Ten Commandments were given to guide mankind in living in such a way that would lead him back to how God always intended him to live. Ultimately, the Ten Commandments represent God's personal interest in bringing mankind back to Him so that all may live life to the fullest. To this end, all commandments are an expression of God's love so that we may have true life in and through Him. As our Lord said, "I came so that people may have life, and have it in abundance" (John 10:10). Therefore, the commandments of God, are not rules to follow but rather signposts that lead us into a right relationship with Him and with all the people with whom we share this present life, and the two are interrelated.

We show our love for God when we show our love for one another. A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." Love for God and love for others are interrelated as we see in St. Paul's definition of love: Love suffers long and is kind; love does not envy; love does not parade itself, is not puffed up; does not behave rudely, does not seek its own, is not provoked, thinks no evil; does not rejoice in iniquity, but rejoices in the truth; bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails. (I Corinthians 13:4–8).

When we read this we need to look at each part carefully, understand what it means, what it looks like in our everyday relationships and strive to live them in all our interactions with others, otherwise, we do not love.

Love: According to St. Paul, love is described by action words, not by lofty concepts. Paul is not writing about how love feels, he is writing about how it can be seen in action. True love is always demonstrated by action.

Love suffers long: Love will endure a long time. It is the heart shown in God when it is said of the Lord, The Lord is not slack concerning His promise, as some count slackness, but is longsuffering toward us, not willing that any should perish but that all should come to repentance (2 Peter 3:9). If God's love is in us, we will show longsuffering to those who annoy us and hurt us. St. John Chrysostom said this is the word used of the man who is wronged, and who easily has the power to avenge himself, but will not do it out of mercy and patience.

Love is kind: When we have and show God's love, it will be seen in simple acts of kindness. Being kind is most often better than wanting to be right, to prove one's point.

Love does not envy: Envy is one of the least productive and most damaging of all sins. It accomplishes nothing, except hurt. Love keeps its distance from envy, and does not resent it when someone else is promoted or blessed. Love desires that others should be preferred before one's self. Fr. Zacharias says that when we give thanks to God for the gifts that others have, those gifts become ours.

Love does not parade itself: Love in action must work anonymously. It doesn't need to have the limelight or the attention to do a good job, or to be satisfied with the result. Love gives because it loves to give, not for the purpose of praise or recognition.

Love does not behave rudely: Where there is love, there will be kindness. Love puts others above oneself and does not wound the conscious of others, but rather is gentle in behavior and speech.

Love does not seek its own: Paul communicates the same idea in Romans 12:10: in honor giving preference to one another. Philippians 2:4 communicates the same: Let each of you look out not only for his own interests, but also for the interests of others. This is being like Christ in a most basic way, being an others-centered person instead of a self-centered person. Love is never satisfied but in the welfare, comfort, and salvation of all people.

Love does not provoke: It's not difficult to find ourselves being provoked or irritated with others. But it is a sin to be provoked, and it isn't love. In fact, Moses was kept from the Promised Land because he became provoked at the people of Israel (Numbers 20:2-11).

Love thinks no evil (keeps no account of wrongs): This means that love does not store up the memory of any wrongs it's received. Love will put away the hurts of the past instead of clinging to them and Love does not supposes that a good action may have a bad motive.

Love does not rejoice in iniquity (unrighteousness): Love always wants the best for others, and refuses to color things against others. Instead, love rejoices in the truth. Love can always stand with and on Truth, because both are found in the Person of Jesus Christ.

Love believes all things: We are never to believe a lie, but choose to believe the best of others. Love believes in her fellows. Some habitually believe that others always have an ulterior motive, and therefore they speak about them as such, but they are not the children of love. Imagine if chatterers would begin to speak of other people's virtues instead of gossiping about them.

Love hopes all things: Love has confidence in the future, not pessimism. When hurt, it does not say, "it will be this way forever, and even get worse." It hopes for the best, as it hopes in God who can work in a person who desires to change and live in the love of Christ.

Love endures all things: Many can bear all things, and believe all things, and hope all things, but only for a while. The greatness of agape love is it keeps on bearing, believing, and hoping. It doesn't give up since endurance is supported by hope and believes in the power of Christ and the work of the Holy Spirit on those who repent in order to live their life in Christ. If your brethren are angry without a cause, pity them and do not let them conquer you by driving you into despair. Stand fast in love; endure not some things, but all things for Christ's sake and you will prove yourself to be a follower of the Most High.

"Only humble love that forgives everyone, that "bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things," can give one the courage to offer his gift on the altar of God, For it is this humble enduring love that makes your sacrifice possible".

Love never fails: Paul addresses the over-emphasis the Corinthian Christians had on the gifts of the Holy Spirit. He shows that they should emphasize love more than the gifts, because the gifts are temporary "containers" of God's work; love is the work itself. The gifts of the Holy Spirit were appropriate for a time, but were not meant to be permanent. They are imperfect gifts for an imperfect time. Now that the One Who is perfect has come, the gifts of the Spirit are no longer necessary. That which is perfect is fulfilled in the Person of Jesus Christ who abides in us and us in His love.

Since Jesus Christ is Love itself, perhaps the way to understand each of these is to see them in the life of Christ and replace the word love with Christ:

Jesus Christ is long-suffering and kind; Jesus Christ does not envy, does not parade Himself. He is not puffed up but humble. Jesus Christ does not behave rudely, does not seek His own way, but does the will of His Father. Jesus Christ never provokes or thinks evil of others. He does not rejoice in iniquity but rejoices in the truth. He bore all things, even to the point of death on the Cross. He believes, hopes, and endured all things for our sake and for our salvation.

His love never fails.

We can measure our own spiritual maturity by seeing how it sounds when we put our name in place of the word love. St. Athansius said, "God became man so that man may become god." That is to say, Jesus Christ was incarnate so that we can become as we are truly meant to be, that is, like Him. St. Paul placed this chapter in the midst of his discussion of spiritual gifts because he wants us to remember that giftedness is not the measure of our spiritual maturity, but love, to become love as Christ is love.

A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another".



Saints & Feasts

Cosmas and Damianos

1 November

These Saints were from Asia Minor. After the death of their father, their Christ -loving mother Theodota reared them in piety and in all manner of virtue and had them instructed in every science, especially that of medicine. This became their vocation, and they went about healing every illness and malady, bestowing healing freely on both men and beasts alike. Because of this, they are called "Unmercenaries" and thus, having completed the course of their life, they reposed in peace.




Synaxsis of Archangel Michael & other Bodiless Powers

8 November

All the Angels, according to the Apostle Paul, are ministering spirits, - sent forth to minister to them who shall be heirs of salvation - (Hebrews 1:14). God sent them as overseers of every nation and people and guides to that which is profitable (Deuteronomy 32:8); and while one Angel is appointed to oversee each nation as a whole, one is also appointed to protect each Christian individually. He commands them to guard those who hope on Him, that nothing should harm them, neither should any evil draw nigh to their dwelling (Psalms 90:10-12). In the Heavens they always behold the face of God, sending up to Him the thrice-holy hymn and interceding with Him on our behalf, seeing they rejoice over one sinner that repents (Matthew 18:10; Luke 15:7).

In a word, they have served God in so many ways for our benefit, that the pages of Holy Scripture are filled with the histories thereof. It is for these reasons that the Orthodox Church, wisely honoring these divine ministers, our protectors and guardians, celebrates today the present Synaxis that is, our coming together in assembly for their common feast to chant their praises, especially for the Archangels Michael and Gabriel, who are mentioned in the Scriptures by name.





Saint Nektarios

9 November


Saint Nektarios was born in Selyvria of Thrace on October 1, 1846. After putting himself through school in Constantinople he became a monk on Chios in 1876, receiving the monastic name of Lazarus. Because of his virtue, a year later he was ordained deacon, receiving the new name of Nektarios. Nektarios went to Athens to study in 1882. Completing his theological studies in 1885, he went to Alexandria, where he was ordained a priest in 1886 at the Cathedral of Saint Sabbas. In August of the same year, in the Church of Saint Nicholas in Cairo, he was ordained an Archimandrite. Archimandrite Nektarios showed much zeal both for preaching the word of God, and for the beauty of God's house. He greatly beautified the Church of Saint Nicholas in Cairo. Years later, when Nektarios was in Athens, Saint Nicholas appeared to him in a dream, embracing him and telling him he was going to exalt him very high.

In 1889, in the same Church of Saint Nicholas, Nektarios was consecrated Metropolitan of the Pentapolis in eastern Libya, which was under the jurisdiction of Alexandria. This office did not affect his modesty and childlike innocence, but it aroused the envy of lesser men, who slandered him. In 1890, Sophronius relieved Metropolitan Nektarios of his duties; in July of the same year, he commanded Nektarios to leave Egypt.

Without seeking to avenge or even to defend himself, the innocent Metropolitan left for Athens. Because his good name had been soiled, he was unable to find a position worthy of a bishop, and in February of 1891 accepted the position of provincial preacher in Euboia; then, in 1894, he was appointed Dean of the Rizarios Ecclesiastical School in Athens. Through his eloquent sermons, his generous alms deeds despite his own poverty, and the holiness, meekness and fatherly love that were manifest in him, he became a shining light and a spiritual guide to many.

At the request of certain pious women, in 1904 he began the building of his convent of the Holy Trinity on the island of Aegina while still Dean of the Rizarios School. Finding later that his presence there was needed, he took up his residence on Aegina in 1908, where he spent the last years of his life, devoting himself to the direction of his convent and to very intense prayer; he was sometimes seen lifted above the ground while rapt in prayer.

He became the protector of all Aegina, through his prayers, delivering the island from drought, healing the sick and casting out demons. Although he had already worked wonders in life, an innumerable multitude of miracles have been wrought after his repose in 1920 through his holy relics, which for many years remained incorrupt. There is hardly a malady that has not been cured through his prayers; but Saint Nektarios is especially renowned for his healings of cancer for sufferers in all parts of the world.




Saint John Chrysostom

13 November

This greatest and most beloved of all Christian orators was born in Antioch in the year 344; his pious parents were Secundus and Anthusa. After his mother was widowed at the age of twenty, she devoted herself to bringing up John and his elder sister in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. John received his literary training under Anthragathius the philosopher, and Libanius the sophist, who was the greatest Greek scholar and rhetorician of his day. Libanius was a pagan. With such a training, and with such gifts as he had by nature, John had before him a brilliant career as a rhetorician. But through the good example of his godly mother Anthusa and of the holy Bishop Meletius of Antioch, by whom he was ordained reader about the year 370, he chose instead to dedicate himself to God.

From the years 374 to 381 he lived the monastic life in the hermitages that were near Antioch. His extreme asceticism undermined his health, compelling him to return to Antioch, where Saint Meletius ordained him deacon about the year 381. Saint Meletius was called to Constantinople later that year to preside over the Second Ecumenical Council, during which he fell asleep in the Lord. In 386 Bishop Flavian ordained John presbyter of the Church of Antioch. Upon his elevation to the priesthood his career as a public preacher began, and his exceptional oratorical gifts were made manifest through his many sermons and commentaries. They are distinguished by their eloquence and the remarkable ease with which rich imagery and scriptural allusions are multiplied; by their depth of insight into the meaning of Scripture and the workings of God's providence; and not least of all, by their earnestness and moral force, which issue from the heart of a blameless and quileless man who lived first what he preached to others. Because of his fame, he was chosen to succeed Saint Nectarios as Patriarch of Constantinople. He was taken away by stealth, to avoid the opposition of the people, and consecrated Patriarch of Constantinople in 398, by Theophilus, Patriarch of Alexandria, who was to prove to be his mortal enemy.

At that time the Emperor of the East was Arcadius, who had had Saint Arsenius the Great as his tutor. Arcadius was a man of weak character, and much under the influence of his wife Eudoxia. The zealous and upright Chrysostom's unsparing censures of the lax morals in the imperial city stung Theophilus' vain Eudoxia: through plottings the collaboration, Saint John was banished to Pontus in 403. The people were in an uproar, and the following night an earthquake shook the city; this so frightened the Empress Eudoxia that she begged Arcadius to call Chrysostom back. While his return was triumphant, his reconciliation with the Empress did not last long. When she had a silver statue of herself erected in the forum before the Church of the Holy Wisdom (Saint Sophia) in 403, Saint John thundered against her, and she could not forgive him.

In June of 404 he was exiled to Cucusus, on the borders of Cilicia and Armenia. From here he exchanged letters with Pope Innocent of Rome, who sent bishops and priests to Constantinople requesting that a council be held. Saint John's enemies, dreading his return, prevailed upon the Emperor and had John taken to a more remote place of banishment called Pityus near the Caucasus. The journey was filled with bitter sufferings for the aged bishop, both because of the harshness of the elements and the cruelty of one of his 310 guards. He did not reach Pityus, but gave up his soul to the Lord near Comana in Pontus, at the chapel of the Martyr Basiliscus, who had appeared to him shortly before, foretelling the day of his death, which came to pass on September 14, 407. His last words were "Glory be to God for all things."


His holy relics were brought from Comana to Constantinople thirty-one years later by the Emperor Theodosius the Younger and Saint Pulcheria his sister, the children of Arcadius and Eudoxia, with fervent supplications that the sin of their parents against him be forgiven.

Saint John was surnamed Chrysostom ("Golden-mouth") because of his eloquence. He made exhaustive commentaries on the divine Scriptures and was the author of more works than any other Church Father, leaving us complete commentaries on the Book of Genesis, the Gospels of Saints Matthew and John, the Acts, and all the Epistles of Saint Paul. His extant works are 1,447 sermons and 240 epistles. Twenty-two teachers of the Church have written homilies of praise in his honor. Besides his feast day, he is celebrated as one of the Three Hierarchs on January 30, together with Saint Basil the Great and Saint Gregory the Theologian.

Saint Philip

14 November

Saint Philip one of the Twelve, was from Bethsaida of Galilee, and was a compatriot of Andrew and Peter. He was instructed in the teachings of the Law and devoted himself to the study of the prophetic books. Therefore, when the Lord Jesus called him to the dignity of apostleship, he immediately sought out and found Nathanael and said to him, "We have found Him of Whom Moses in the Law and the Prophets did write, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph" (John 1.45). Having preached Jesus the God-man throughout many parts of Asia Minor and having suffered many things for His Name's sake, he was finally crucified upside down in Hierapolis of Phrygia.



Advent Fast for the Feast of the Nativity

15 November - 24 December

In the Orthodox Church the Feast of Christmas is called "The Nativity". As with Pascha, the Feast of the Nativity begins with a period of preparation known as Advent or the Nativity Fast. It is proceeded by a fast corresponding to Lent and lasting for forty days. The fast begins on November 15, 40 days prior to the Birth of Christ.

The Nativity Fast is one of four main fast periods throughout the ecclesiastical year. Beginning on November 15 and concluding on December 24, the Nativity Fast gives individuals the opportunity to prepare for the Feast of the Nativity of Our Lord and Savior in the Flesh on December 25. By abstaining from certain food and drink, particularly from meat, fish, dairy products, olive oil, and wine, as well as focusing more deeply on prayer and almsgiving, we can find that the primary aim of fasting is to make us conscious of our dependence upon God.


As we go thru the next 40 days, let us reflect on how we can make ourselves better Christians. Let us change our habits for the next 40 days and focus on the true meaning of Thanksgiving and Christmas. Beginning with Christmas Day, the Feast of the Nativity is celebrated for twelve days of fast-free (except on January 5), culminating in the Feast of Epiphany on January 6.



Saint Matthew

16 November

Saint Matthew who was also called Levi, was the son of Alphaeus and had Galilee as his homeland. A publican before being called by Christ, he became one of the Twelve Apostles, and an Evangelist. While still in Palestine, he wrote his Gospel first in Hebrew, being also the first of all to write the Gospel. When he is depicted in icons, there is portrayed next to him the likeness of a man, one of the symbolic living creatures mentioned by Ezekiel (1.10), which, as Saint Irenaeus writes, is a symbol of our Savior's Incarnation.



Gregory the Wonderworker 17 November

Saint Gregory was born in Neocaesarea of Pontus to parents who were not Christians. He studied in Athens, in Alexandria, in Beirut, and finally for five years in Caesarea of Palestine under Origen, by whom he was also instructed in the Faith of Christ. Then, in the year 240, he became bishop of his own city, wherein he found only seventeen Christians. By the time the Saint reposed about the year 265, there were only seventeen unbelievers left there. Virtually the whole duration of his episcopacy was a time of continual, marvellous wonders worked by him. Because of this, he received the surname "Wonderworker"; even the enemies of the truth called him a second Moses.

21 November

According to the tradition of the Church, the Theotokos was brought to the Temple at three years of age, where she was consecrated to God and spent her days until she was fourteen or fifteen years old; and then, as a mature maiden, by the common counsel of the priests (since her parents had reposed some three years before), she was betrothed to Joseph.



Saint Katherine

25 November

Saint Katherine who was from Alexandria, was the daughter of Constas. She was an exceedingly beautiful maiden, most chaste and illustrious in wealth, lineage. and learning. By her understanding, she utterly vanquished the passionate and unbridled soul of Maximinus, the tyrant of Alexandria; and by her eloquence, she stopped the mouths of the so-called philosophers who had been gathered to dispute with her. She was crowned with the crown of martyrdom in the year 305. Her holy relics were taken by Angels to the holy mountain of where thev were discovered manv vears later: the famous monastery of Saint Katherine was originally dedicated to the Holy Transfiguration of the Lord and the Burning Bush, but later was dedicated to Saint Katherine. According to the ancient usage, Saints Katherine and Mercurius were celebrated on the 24th of this month, whereas the holy Hieromartyrs Clement of Rome and Peter of Alexandria were celebrated on the 25th. The dates of the feasts of these Saints were interchanged at the request of the Church and Monastery of Mount Sinai, so that the festival of Saint Katherine, their patron, might be celebrated more festively together with the Apodosis of the Feast of the Entry of the Theotokos.



Saint Andrew

30 November

Saint Andrew was from Bethsaida of Galilee; he was the son of Jonas and the brother of Peter, the chief of the Apostles. He had first been a disciple of John the Baptist; afterwards, on hearing the Baptist's witness concerning Jesus, when he pointed Him out with his finger and said, "Behold the Lamb of God, Which taketh away the sin of the world." (Book of John 1:29,36), he straightway followed Christ, and became His first disciple; wherefore he is called the First-called of the Apostles. After the Ascension of the Saviour, he preached in various lands; and having suffered many things for His Name's sake, he died in Patras of Achaia, where he was crucified on a cross in the shape of an "X," the first letter of "Christ" in Greek; this cross is also the symbol of Saint Andrew.
