



HOLY COMMUNION PROCEDURE

For the benefit of our Sunday School students, their teachers and the TIMELY start of their Sunday School Classes...

- *The children will be receiving Holy Communion first.
- *The ushers will release the children by pew from Front to Back.
- *Only parents of the smallest, youngest Sunday School children, who need assistance, should receive Holy Communion with their children.
- *If you are not seated when Holy Communion begins, please take a seat in the back rows, quietly. Your children will be released in turn.
- *Please do not attempt to send your children down the side aisles to the front alone or down the center aisle.
- *After all children have received, the ushers will release the adults, again from the front pews.
- *Please cooperate with our ushers. Please do not ask to be allowed to proceed ahead of others.
- *Please remember this new procedure is for the benefit of our children and their Sunday School experience.



The second half of our Sunday School year is upon us. Aligning with our theme - Walk in the Way of the Lord - we will continue to explore the Sunday Gospel with our students each week. We have found this to be an incredibly meaningful theme and have watched our students grow closer to our Lord Jesus Christ and really understand his teachings through our lessons each week. Students, from kindergarten through teenagers, engage in important conversations and draw on real-life examples of living their faith and walking the way of our Lord.

Eaton Fire Relief Response

Our Philoptochos Board responded quickly to the devastation created by the Eaton Fire. We provided highly needed essential items to the distribution site, organized by the YMCA and located at Pasadena City College. The pallet of water, below, was delivered to PCC where it was distributed to the fire victims needing assistance.

The Philoptochos Board also partnered with the City of Pasadena and assisted individuals who evacuated to the Pasadena Civic Center. We delivered hygiene wipes, baby wipes, underclothing, socks, wash cloths, totes and duffle bags. The City of Pasadena personnel at the Civic Center were very appreciative for our delivery of the vitally needed items for use by the many area residents who relocated to the Pasadena Civic Center.





The St. Anthony Community joined the disaster relief efforts spearheaded by Philoptochos. The Community generously donated highly needed new and unused items which were collected in the Trinity Ballroom in January. Cash donations were also accepted and used to purchase needed supplies. All items were collected, sorted and quickly delivered to several local fire relief centers directly serving those affected by the Eaton Fire. Some of our partner organizations are: City of Pasadena, St. Philip the Apostle, Union Station Fire Relief Efforts, YMCA and St Elizabeth in Altadena where 60% of the community was affected and 40% of school children lost their homes,

Our St. Anthony ministries joined us in supporting our efforts by emailing their members the list of needed donation items. Philoptochos also received generous donations from individuals and the groups including Anchorites of St. Paul Greek Orthodox Church in Irvine; multiple large boxes of new items from St. John the Baptist Greek Orthodox Church in Anaheim; six cases of essential items and clothing personally delivered by donors from Las Vegas, Nevada; and Saints Constantine and Helen Greek Orthodox Church in Cardiff-by-the-Sea.

Please accept our deepest appreciation to all of the St. Anthony Community for your generosity and assistance with this essential work. Once more, our Panagia Chapter and community have acted admirably at a time of crisis. *Thank you!!*

Archpastoral Visit of His Eminence Archbishop Elpidophoros of America to the Southern California Fires Saint Anthony Philoptochos/Eaton Canyon Fire

In response to the devastating wildfires that impacted our communities of Altadena, Pasadena and Pacific Palisades, His Eminence Archbishop Elpidophoros of America visited first-hand the devastation left behind by these fires. On Monday morning, January 27, His Eminence led a delegation of visiting dignitaries to the fire affected community of Altadena and to St. Anthony Church where Philoptochos has been working on fire response projects. The ongoing assistance provided by Philoptochos has been made possible with the support of the St. Anthony's community, neighboring Greek Orthodox communities, and Greek Orthodox communities from across the country as well as non-affiliated individuals.

At St. Anthony Church, our Philoptochos President, Judith Din, clearly described to the delegation the immediate needs of the local relief and recovery organizations in the Pasadena area and what Philoptochos has been doing to support them. That morning, the dignitaries joined volunteers organized by Philoptochos to assemble Rescue Relief buckets filled with donated materials for those either moving into rentals or cleaning a home in the affected area.

The visiting dignitaries, who accompanied His Eminence Archbishop Elpidophoros of America, came to give comfort and gather information in order to formulate a plan to help the people of Southern California devastated by the Eaton Canyon and Palisades Fires.

After a day of witnessing the shocking devastation of entire neighborhoods, meeting with parishioners who lost their homes, and seeing our Philoptochos' immediate response efforts, area clergy and faithful gathered for a Dinner of Hope with His Eminence, hosted by St Sophia Cathedral.

Each member of the visiting delegation spoke, expressing their heartfelt commitment to stand shoulder to shoulder with the devastated communities of Southern California as we rebuild.



PHILOPTOCHOS SCHOLARSHIP AWARD - 2025 RULES & REGULATIONS

- The parents of the applicant (or the applicant him or herself) must be members in good standing of Saint Anthony Greek Orthodox Church for at least one year preceding the date of the scholarship application.
- A parent of the applicant must be a member of Philoptochos Society of Saint Anthony Greek Orthodox Church, Panagia Chapter.
- Applicant must be planning to continue their education for the upcoming 2025-2026 school year. Education goal may be a four-year institute, technical or career training program.
- 4. The applicant must have a minimum 3.0 GPA.
- 5. Applicants will be evaluated on the following criteria:
 - a. Academic achievement/and or merit
 - b. Church and participation in Saint Anthony youth activities
 - c. Community service and/or leadership qualities.
 - d. Citizenship

6. Applicants must:

- Complete and submit all required application documents by Friday, April 11, 2025. Documents may be submitted by conventional mail or through email.
- Arrange for his or her current academic transcript to be mailed from the academic institution to the church office (Attention: Philoptochos Scholarship Committee);
- Submit an autobiographical essay, approximately 300 words double spaced, 12-point font size, stating influences on the applicant's life and addresses future goals;
- Submit two (2) letters of recommendation, one of which must be from a high school counselor or teacher;
- e. Report for a personal interview if requested by the Scholarship Committee.
- Attach a recent photo of themselves to the application form.
- The Philoptochos Society of Saint Anthony Greek Orthodox Church is not obligated
 to grant any scholarships in a given year. The Scholarship Committee and Father
 Peter will carefully review all applications. The Committee's decision shall be final.
- Scholarship recipients will be notified by mail. Scholarships will be presented personally at the annual June Philoptochos General Meeting.



Words from St. Seraphim of Sarov (1759-1833)

"Establish yourself in God and then you will be helpful to others."

"Acquire the Spirit of Peace and a thousand souls around you will be saved."

"Nothing so aids the acquiring of interior peace as silence."

"Without humility there is nothing in a man but darkness."

"Keep silent and refrain from judging others."

"True faith cannot remain without works."

"Our life is but a minute in comparison to eternity."

"Where there is God, there is no evil. Everything coming from God is peaceful, healthy and leads a person to the judgment of his own imperfections and humility."

You cannot be too gentle, too kind. Shun even to appear harsh in your treatment of each other. All condemnation is from the devil. Never condemn each other. We condemn others only because we shun knowing ourselves. Someone who is busy trying to understand himself has no time to gaze at the shortcomings of others. When we gaze at our own failings, we see such a swamp that nothing in another person can equal it. That is why we turn away, and make much of the faults of others. Instead of condemning others, strive to reach inner peace.

One must not harbor anger or hatred towards a person that is hostile towards us. On the contrary, you must love him and do as much good as possible towards him, following the teaching of our Lord Jesus Christ: Love your enemies; do good to those who hate you (Matthew 5:44)."

"It is necessary that the Holy Spirit enter our heart. Everything good that we do, that we do for Christ, is given to us by the Holy Spirit, but prayer most of all, which is always available to us."

"Always ask yourself: Am I in the Spirit of God or not? And if you are in the Spirit, blessed be God!—there is nothing to grieve about."

"Prayer, fasting, vigil and all other Christian activities, however good they may be in themselves, do not constitute the aim of our Christian life, although they serve as the indispensable means of reaching this end. The true aim of our Christian life consists in the acquisition of the Holy Spirit of God. As for fasts, and vigils, and prayer, and almsgiving, and every good deed done for Christ's sake, they are only means of acquiring the Holy Spirit of God."

"The reading of the Word of God should be performed in solitude, in order that the whole mind of the reader might be plunged into the truths of the Holy Scripture."

"The soul has to be nourished with the Word of God. Most of all, one has to study the New Testament and the Book of Psalms."

"Those who have truly decided to serve the Lord God should practice the remembrance of God and uninterrupted prayer to Jesus Christ, mentally saying: Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner."

"The fact that I am a monk and you are a layman is utterly beside the point. What God requires is true faith in Him and in His only-begotten Son. The Lord seeks a heart filled to overflowing with love for God and our neighbor. This is the throne on which He loves to sit and on which He appears in all His heavenly glory, for in the human heart the Kingdom of God can be contained."

"True hope seeks the one Kingdom of God and is sure that everything necessary for this mortal life will surely be given. The heart cannot have peace until it acquires this hope."

Church Etiquette

When are we NOT to enter the Nave of the Church?

As we are entering God's Home, we must always keep in mind that during the following times, we should NOT enter the Nave of the Church nor come to the front of the Church to light a votive candle:

During the Small Entrance (when the procession with the Gospel takes place)

During the Epistle Reading

During the Gospel Reading

When the priest is censing and is facing the Congregation

During the Great Entrance (when the procession of the Holy Gifts takes place)

When the priest is blessing the Congregation

During the recitation of the Nicene Creed ("I believe...")

During the Consecration of the Holy Gifts

During the recitation of the Lord's Prayer ("Our Father...")

During the Priest's sermon

Also, during these times, we should avoid leaving the Nave unless it is for family needs, medical or some other necessary reason. If you are unsure when to enter or leave the church, ask a Parish Council member in the Narthex.

While in the Church, remember to...

Wear appropriate attire to enter God's House

Silence your mobile devices

Refrain from chewing gum, mints, or candy

Remove lipstick when receiving Holy Communion $\boldsymbol{\vartheta}$ when venerating $\boldsymbol{\vartheta}$ kissing the icons

Follow the direction of the Priest for standing & sitting

Maintain quiet in the Sanctuary

Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis

Then Peter came up and said to Him, "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?" Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you seven times, but seventy times seven." Matthew 18:21-22

Being a Christian is challenging. If being a Christian is not a challenge for someone, we might wonder what kind of Christian that person is, because for the person who is really striving to be a Christian, that effort is going to become a struggle and a challenge. Following the teachings of Jesus fully, and not selectively, will challenge even the most devout and well-intentioned Christian. And one of the greatest challenges of Christianity has to do with the subject of forgiveness.

To forgive does not mean that we forget. In fact, remembering our mistakes hopefully keeps us from repeating them. What forgiveness means is that we stop talking about the wrong, we stop bringing it up and holding it over someone. We either move on in the relationship, or we move on from the relationship. However, whether the relationship continues or not, past transgressions aren't continually brought up and talked about. Forgiveness also means that we don't talk about sins someone has committed against us with other people. If we are talking about the transgressions of others, then we haven't truly forgiven them.

No relationship works for any amount of time without forgiveness. It is impossible to have any relationship that is perfect, simply because we are not perfect. Someone is going to say or do something wrong in every relationship. Ironically, the closer the relationship, the greater the opportunity to do something wrong. Why? Because when we see someone all the time, we have so many more chances to say or do something wrong.

When I think about my ministry, and the number of things I've done wrong, the number of sins out there is astronomical. If I say something insensitive in a sermon, that could be a sin against 300 people in one moment. If I've committed even one sin against every member of the Prayer Team, that's 5,000 sins. If I commit one sin against each of the 1,200 people in my congregation per year times the twenty years I've been here, that's 24,000 sins. Then we get to close friends, and then to family, and the sins pile up. If there is no forgiveness, and if those sins are continually spoken about, none of us would have any reason for any hope. Every sin we commit is also a sin against God. While our total sins may be a lot towards each other, they are incalculable against God. We read in Psalm 130:3, "If Thou, O Lord, shouldst mark iniquities, Lord who could stand?" That is true with the Lord and also true with one another. The Psalmist also writes "For with the Lord there is steadfast love and with Him is plenteous redemption." (Psalm 130:7) We would be wise to offer the same generosity when it comes to forgiving others.

It's hard to know what is more difficult, to forgive someone who has done something really wrong, or to carry the weight of knowing one hasn't truly been forgiven. This is an incentive to forgive. We should be motivated to loosen the burden of sin from someone else, because we hope that others will loosen the burden of sin someone else might hold over us. The weight of not being forgiven can truly be crippling. This is actually the thing I struggle with the most in my life and in my priesthood. It's both the sorrow over sin I have done and the weight of carrying the sins that have not been forgiven. This is why I humbly ask for forgiveness, with a contrite heart, hoping for anything that might weigh down my relationship with you can be forgiven and lifted.

When restoration of a relationship is possible, which it usually is, with family, friends and co-workers, then forgiveness actually serves to bring people closer together. The words "forgive me" and "I forgive you" or "forgiven," become almost as strong as "I love you." One good analogy about forgiveness is two people holding a string between them. When someone sins, the string is cut. Forgiveness is when people tie the string together. However, if each person is holding onto the string with one hand, that leaves only one hand to tie the string together. Both people have to work at tying the string together. The resulting knot will lessen the distance between the two people. It will actually bring them closer together. And this is how forgiveness is supposed to work. It takes effort on the part of both people.

The biggest incentive to forgive comes from the prayer we offer most often, the Lord's Prayer. We pray to the Lord "forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." In other words, we are asking the Lord to forgive us in the same way we forgive one another. Wow, do we actually really mean that?! I hope the Lord will do a better job at forgiving me than how I've done forgiving others. I sure hope He isn't going to bring up all my past sins when I stand before Him. And if this is my hope, then it stands to reason that I should do a better job at forgiving others.

Lord, I pray so often for You to forgive us our trespasses in the same way we forgive those who trespass against us.

Help me to live out this prayer, to be generous with forgiveness and mercy towards one another, and for others to be generous with forgiveness and mercy towards me.

When it is possible to reconcile a relationship, lead me down that path.

And when it is not possible, help me not to hold animosity towards others, or to speak ill of them.

Help me to trust that You are the judge of all.

Most important, forgive me Lord for all the times I have sinned against You, for if You Lord were to keep track of all my sins, there is no way I could stand before You.

Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner.

Amen.

Forgiveness is like a form of art. It is delicate, fragile and sensitive. When it is done right and done well, it is a thing of beauty. Asking for forgiveness, offering forgiveness, and not speaking about the things that have been forgiven are challenges for every Christian.

The Presentation of the Lord

2 February

When the most pure Mother and Ever-Virgin Mary's forty days of purification had been fulfilled, she took her first-born Son to Jerusalem on this, the fortieth day after His birth, that she might present Him in the temple according to the Law of Moses, which teaches that every first-born male child be dedicated to God, and also that she might offer the sacrifice of a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons, as required by the Law.


(Luke 2:22-24; Exod. 13:2; Lev. 12:6-8)

On this same day, a just and devout man, the greatly aged Symeon, was also present in the temple, being guided by the Holy Spirit. For a long time, this man had been awaiting the salvation of God and he had been informed by divine revelation that he would not die until he beheld the Lord's Christ. Thus, when he beheld Him at that time and took Him up into his aged arms, he gave glory to God, singing:

"Now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace, O Master. . ." And he confessed that he would close his eyes joyfully, since he had seen the Light of Revelation for the nations and the Glory of Israel.

(Luke 2:25-32)

From ancient times, the Holy Church has retained this tradition of the churching of the mother and new-born child on the fortieth day and of the reading of prayers of purification.



Saint Theodore Commander and Great Martyr 8 February

The Holy Martyr Theodore was from Euchaita of Galatia and dwelt in Heraclea of Pontus. He was a renowned commander in the military. Emperor Licinius was told that he was a Christian and abominated the idols. Licinius therefore sent certain men to him from Nicomedia, to honor him and ask him to appear before him. Through them, however, Saint Theodore sent back a message that it was necessary for various reasons, that Licinius come to Heraclea. Licinius, seeing in this a hope of turning Saint Theodore away from Christ did as was asked of him.

When the Emperor came to Heraclea, Saint Theodore met him with honor and the Emperor in turn gave Theodore his hand, believing that through him he would be able to draw the Christians to the worship of his idols. Seated upon his throne in the midst of the people, he publicly bade Theodore offer sacrifice to the gods. But Theodore asked that the emperor entrust him with the most venerable of his gods, those of gold and silver, that he might take them home and himself attend upon them that evening, promising that the following day he would honor them in public. The Emperor, filled with joy at these tidings, gave command that Theodore's request be fulfilled.

When the Saint had taken the idols home, he broke them in pieces and distributed the gold and silver to the poor by night. The next day a centurion named Maxentius told Licinius that he had seen a pauper pass by carrying the head of Artemis. Saint Theodore, far from repenting of this, confessed Christ boldly. Licinius, in an uncontainable fury, had the Saint put to many torments, then crucified. While upon the cross, the holy Martyr was further tormented — his privy parts were cut off, he was shot with arrows, his eyes were put out and he was left on the cross to die. The next day Licinius sent men to take his corpse and cast it into the sea; but they found the Saint alive and perfectly whole. Through this, many believed in Christ. Seeing his own men turning to Christ and the city in an uproar, Licinius had Theodore beheaded, about the year 320. The Saint's holy relics were returned to his ancestral home on June 8, which is also a feast day of the Great Martyr Theodore.




Triodion Begins— Sunday of the Publican & the Pharisee

9 February

The Pharisees were an ancient and outstanding sect among the Jews known for their diligent observance of the outward matters of the Law. Although, according to the word of our Lord, they "did all their works to be seen of men" (Matt. 23:5), and were hypocrites. Because of the apparent holiness of their lives they were thought by all to be righteous and separate from others, which is what the name Pharisee means. On the other hand, Publicans, collectors of the royal taxes, committed many injustices and extortions for filthy lucre's sake and all held them to be sinners and unjust. It was therefore according to common opinion that the Lord Jesus in His parable signified a virtuous person by a Pharisee and a sinner by a Publican, to teach His disciples the harm of pride and the profit of humble-mindedness.

Since the chief weapon for virtue is humility and the greatest hindrance to it is pride, the divine Fathers have set these three weeks before the Forty-day Fast as a preparation for the spiritual struggles of virtue. This present week they have called Harbinger, since it declares that the Fast is approaching; and they set humility as the foundation for all our spiritual labors by appointing that the parable of the Publican and the Pharisee be read on this day, even before the Fast begins, to teach, through the vaunting of the Pharisee, that the foul smoke of self-esteem and the stench of boasting drives away the grace of the Spirit, strips man of all his virtue and casts him into the pits of Hades; and, through the repentance and contrite prayer of the Publican, that humility confers upon the sinner's forgiveness of all his wicked deeds and raises him up to the greatest heights. No fasting the week that follows this Sunday.



Triodion - Sunday of the Prodigal Son 16 February

Through the parable of today's Gospel, our Savior has set forth three things for us: the condition of the sinner, the rule of repentance, and the greatness of God's compassion. The divine Fathers have put this reading the week after the parable of the Publican and Pharisee so that, seeing in the person of the Prodigal Son our own wretched condition — inasmuch as we are sunken in sin, far from God and His Mysteries — we might at last come to our senses and make haste to return to Him by repentance during these holy days of the Fast.

Furthermore, those who have wrought many great iniquities and have persisted in them for a long time, oftentimes fall into despair, thinking that there can no longer be any forgiveness for them; so being without hope, they fall every day into the same and even worse iniquities. Therefore, the divine Fathers, that they might root out the passion of despair from the hearts of such people, and rouse them to the deeds of virtue, have set the present parable at the forecourts of the Fast, to show them the surpassing goodness of God's compassion, and to teach them that there is no sin -- no matter how great it may be -- that can overcome at any time His love for man.

The foregoing two parables -- especially that of the Prodigal Son -- have presented to us God's extreme goodness and love for man. But lest certain persons, putting their confidence in this alone, live carelessly, squandering upon sin the time given them to work out their salvation and death suddenly snatch them away, the most divine Fathers have appointed this day's feast commemorating Christ's impartial Second Coming, through which we bring to mind that God is not only the Friend of man, but also the most righteous Judge, Who recompenses to each according to his deeds.

It is the aim of the holy Fathers, through bringing to mind that fearful day, to rouse us from the slumber of carelessness unto the work of virtue and to move us to love and compassion for our brethren. Besides this, even as on the coming Sunday of Cheese-fare we commemorate Adam's exile from the Paradise of delight -- which exile is the beginning of life as we know it now -- it is clear that today's is reckoned the last of all feasts, because on the last day of judgment, truly, everything of this world will come to an end.

All foods, except meat and meat products, are allowed during the week that follows this Sunday.




Triodion - Judgment Sunday - Meatfare Sunday 23 February
