

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# Message from Father Peter

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The Great Fast or Lent is a period of preparation leading up to Holy Week and Easter (Pascha). The Lenten Triodion governs the divine services of Great Lent as well as those of the Weeks of Preparation preceding Great Lent. Lent is an old English word meaning "spring." The Great Fast has come to be called Lent by association because it occurs during spring. It is also called "great" to distinguish it from the other fasts of the liturgical year.

Observance of Great Lent is characterized by abstention from many foods, intensified private and public prayer, personal improvement, and almsgiving. All of these disciplines are important, but I challenge each of us to focus on one in particular. I am encouraging us all to focus on our **personal prayer life** during this upcoming Lenten season and Holy Week.

As Orthodox Christians we are expected, and in fact instructed, to pay closer attention to our private prayers to God. Yes, we should practice and follow all of the disciplines during Great Lent, including fasting. However, we must heed the warning of our Fathers of our Church: fasting without prayer is considered "the fast of the demons" since the demons do not eat according to their incorporeal nature, and they also do not pray.

When the faithful approach for Holy Confession, quite often the first thing that they utter during their confession is... "I have not been praying." We all struggle with finding the time and the will to pray more, or even at all. That is why, this beautiful and peaceful time of the liturgical calendar is so important. God is inviting us back, waiting at the door as he waited for the Prodigal Son. We read in the Gospel of Matthew 7:7 "Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you."

When asked about prayer and how much we should be praying, I often explain what works for me. Rather than pray the entire Vesper Service in the evening, I focus on a shorter rule of prayer. In my personal experience, I find that my mind wonders when praying a full and long service. Everyone is different, but during my evening prayers I feel more fulfilled when I focus on the "quality" of my prayer life rather that the "quantity." With this in mind, I want each of us, man, woman, and child, single person and families to commit once again to praying the short prayer attributed to St Ephraim the Syrian. Of all Lenten hymns and prayers, this short prayer can be termed the "Lenten Prayer." It would be wonderful, if you could pray the "Lenten Prayer" twice a day: at the beginning of your day when you rise and at the conclusion of your day when you retire.

As we recite the prayer, we make a prostration after each petition of the prayer. These prostrations constitute one of the distinctive characteristics of the entire Lenten worship. As we all experience the difficult effort of spiritual recovery (returning to God), we understand that our Church does not consider our soul separate from our body. Our whole person has fallen away from God and must be restored. Our goal is to restore both body and soul, returning our entire person to God. For this reason the whole person, body and soul, repents. The body participates in the prayer of the soul just as the soul prays through and with the body. Prostrations are a sign of repentance, of humility, of adoration and obedience to God. Thus, this beautiful prayer is described as our "Lenten Prayer." Make this short but fulfilling prayer an important part of your Lenten experience. Pray twice a day. Follow all of the Lenten disciplines. Make this Great Lent a most special time as we all commit to daily private prayers to God in our homes. Have a fruitful and blessed Lenten season!

# Lenten Prayer of St. Ephrem the Syrian

O Lord and Master of my life!

Take from me the spirit of sloth,
faint-heartedness, lust of power, and idle talk.

But give rather the spirit of chastity,
humility, patience, and love to Thy servant.

Yea, Lord and King! Grant me to see my own errors
and not to judge my brother,

The Prayer of Saint Ephraim the Syrian is also called the "Lenten Prayer"? The Prayer of Saint Ephraim the Syrian is called the "Lenten Prayer" because it is a verbal icon and summation of the spirit of Great Lent – repentance, conversion, love of neighbor, and preparation for Pascha (Easter). The prayer is a petition to God asking to be purified of the sins of sloth (laziness), despair (hopelessness), lust of power (selfish ambition), and idle talk (inappropriate speech). In their place, we ask for the virtues of chastity (right-mindedness), humility, patience, and love. The prayer ends by asking God to help us to see our own sins instead of judging others. Though the prayer can be offered at all times of the year privately, it is recited liturgically during Lenten weekday services – namely in the services commonly celebrated in our parishes (such as Vespers and Great Compline). After each petition of the prayer, we make a full prostration – which is the making of the Sign of the Cross, falling to our knees, and bowing our heads to the floor (all in one continuous motion). Prostrations enable us to pray with our body as well as our heart and mind, all of which make up the image of Christ in man.

# A Prayer of Repentance

O Lord our God, good and merciful, I acknowledge all my sins which I have committed every day of my life, in thought, word and deed; in body and soul alike. I am heartily sorry that I have ever offended you, and I sincerely repent; with tears I humbly pray to You, O Lord: of Your mercy forgive me all my past transgressions and absolve me from them. I firmly resolve, with the help of Your Grace, to amend my way of life and to sin no more; that I may walk in the way of the righteous and offer praise and glory to the Name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Amen.







# **Prayers for Great Lent**

## Trisagion Prayers

Holy God, Holy Mighty, Holy Immortal, have mercy on us. (3) Glory to the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. Both now and ever and to the ages of ages. Amen. All-holy Trinity, have mercy on us. Lord, forgive our sins. Master, pardon our transgressions. Holy One, visit and heal our infirmities for Your name's sake. Lord, have mercy. Lord, have mercy. Lord, have mercy. Glory to the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. Both now and ever and to the ages of ages. Amen. Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name. Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For Yours is the kingdom and the power and the glory, of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, now and forever and to ages of ages. Amen.

# Lenten Prayer of St. Ephrem the Syrian

O Lord and Master of my life!

Take from me the spirit of sloth,
faint-heartedness, lust of power, and idle talk.

But give rather the spirit of chastity,
humility, patience, and love to Thy servant.

Yea, Lord and King! Grant me to see my own errors
and not to judge my brother,
for Thou art blessed unto ages of ages. Amen.

The Prayer of Saint Ephraim the Syrian is also called the "Lenten Prayer"? The Prayer of Saint Ephraim the Syrian is called the "Lenten Prayer" because it is a verbal icon and summation of the spirit of Great Lent – repentance, conversion, love of neighbor, and preparation for Pascha (Easter). The prayer is a petition to God asking to be purified of the sins of sloth (laziness), despair (hopelessness), lust of power (selfish ambition), and idle talk (inappropriate speech). In their place, we ask for the virtues of chastity (right-mindedness), humility, patience, and love. The prayer ends by asking God to help us to see our own sins instead of judging others. Though the prayer can be offered at all times of the year privately, it is recited liturgically during Lenten weekday services – namely in the services commonly celebrated in our parishes (such as Vespers and Great Compline). After each petition of the prayer, we make a full prostration – which is the making of the Sign of the Cross, falling to our knees, and bowing our heads to the floor (all in one continuous motion). Prostrations enable us to pray with our body as well as our heart and mind, all of which make up the image of Christ in man.

# A Prayer of Repentance

O Lord our God, good and merciful, I acknowledge all my sins which I have committed every day of my life, in thought, word and deed; in body and soul alike. I am heartily sorry that I have ever offended you, and I sincerely repent; with tears I humbly pray to You, O Lord: of Your mercy forgive me all my past transgressions and absolve me from them. I firmly resolve, with the help of Your Grace, to amend my way of life and to sin no more; that I may walk in the way of the righteous and offer praise and glory to the Name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Amen.

# Byzantine Chant Lenten Journey



Our chanters will be hosting a free series of **Byzantine Chant classes**, starting the first week of the Triodion and continuing through Holy Week.

This is a wonderful opportunity for anyone—young and old, current and future Orthodox Christians—to explore the rich musical tradition of the Greek Orthodox Church.

- When: Wednesdays at 7pm (or immediately following the Pre-Sanctified Liturgies during Lent)
- Where: Inside the Church

Anyone can attend! If you simply want to learn and listen, feel free to observe. But if you might be interested in chanting during the Orthros or Liturgy services, we especially encourage you to join!

No prior experience of Byzantine Chant, the Greek language, or any form of musical performance is required! Open to all ages — children, teenagers, young-adults, adults, seniors. You will need to be an Orthodox Christian to participate in the services, but these classes are open to all — even those not yet baptized or chrismated.

Our short-term goal is to offer an introductory level knowledge of this rich musical tradition with our parish, and encourage the ability to participate in the services by Pascha. Our long-term hope is to possibly establish the first Byzantine Chant Choir in the Los Angeles area.

Whether you're musically inclined or simply curious about this sacred tradition, we welcome you on this Lenten journey.

# **Church Etiquette**

When are we NOT to enter the Nave of the Church?

As we are entering God's Home, we must always keep in mind that during the following times, we should NOT enter the Nave of the Church nor come to the front of the Church to light a votive candle:

During the Small Entrance (when the procession with the Gospel takes place)

During the Epistle Reading

**During the Gospel Reading** 

When the priest is censing and is facing the Congregation

During the Great Entrance (when the procession of the Holy Gifts takes place)

When the priest is blessing the Congregation

During the recitation of the Nicene Creed ("I believe...")

During the Consecration of the Holy Gifts

During the recitation of the Lord's Prayer ("Our Father...")

During the Priest's sermon

Also, during these times, we should avoid leaving the Nave unless it is for family needs, medical or some other necessary reason. If you are unsure when to enter or leave the church, ask a Parish Council member in the Narthex.

While in the Church, remember to...

Wear appropriate attire to enter God's House

Silence your mobile devices

Refrain from chewing gum, mints, or candy

Remove lipstick when receiving Holy Communion & when venerating & kissing the icons


Follow the direction of the Priest for standing & sitting

# Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis

#### A Lesson from Father Stauros...

And Peter answered Him, "Lord, if it is you, bid me to come to You on the water." He said, "Come." So Peter got out of the boat and walked on the water and came to Jesus; but when he saw the wind, he was afraid, and beginning to sink he cried out, "Lord, save me." Jesus immediately reached out His hand and caught him, saying to him, "O man of little faith, why did you doubt?" And when they got into the boat, the wind ceased. Matthew 14:28-32

It's easy for us, as we read the Bible, in the safety of our homes and offices, to criticize people like Thomas the Apostle, who doubted the Resurrection of Christ or to criticize Peter, for taking his eyes off Jesus and getting scared while walking on water. I've never walked on water, but I've been scared plenty of times when I've been doing a normal activity like swimming at the beach and a big wave comes along. Jesus challenged Peter to step off of a boat into a raging stormy sea of waves and to not be afraid. I'm not sure how many of us would have taken that challenge. I'm not sure I would have.

Even though Jesus admonishes Peter a little bit to not having more faith, it is easy to forget that it actually took a bit of faith for Peter to get out of the boat. We forget that all the disciples were in the boat. All must have been scared by the raging waves in the stormy sea. And yet it was Peter who actually had the courage to get out of the boat and start walking to Jesus. The lesson here, of course, is that as long as he kept his eyes on the Lord, he was able to do the seemingly impossible task of walking on water. But when he took his eyes off the Lord, the problems started.

Life is filled with challenges. The sea is often stormy. The waves are often scary. We know that Jesus can bring calm into the storm. Even if the storm still rages on, there is peace from God that comes in the midst of the storm. Faith is also filled with challenges. These challenges to faith, whether it is lack of understanding or own guilt and shame, are met in the same way that Peter walked on water. When we keep our eyes on the Lord in our challenges, whatever challenges they may be, we will find a clear path to the Lord. So before we get too critical of Peter, we've got to give him credit for actually getting out of the boat and at least beginning the journey to Christ.

Peter sinking in the water is also part of the faith journey, and a challenge in itself. Many people think that once we commit our lives to Christ that it is smooth sailing, no more storms. To the contrary, the storms continue, and in some cases, they even get worse. The last thing the devil wants is committed Christians and he will often throw himself in front of us with temptations and doubts, trying to knock us off our journey and make us take our eyes off of Christ, hoping we will sink. We all fall to temptation in ways large and small. Sometimes we even fall when trying to do something good and wholesome. We lose focus and the devil is there, preying on us. We take our eyes off of Christ and we start to sink. Peter, again to his credit, shouted to Jesus, "Lord, save me." He didn't succumb to failure. He actually didn't stop believing. His momentary failure was met with a statement of faith, that Jesus was still Lord, and still had the power to save him, and not only the power, but the desire to save Peter. When we fall, redemption is as close as a call to Christ, "save me," followed by the courage to reach out and take His hand, combined with trust that He will, and hopeful eyes that refocus on Him.

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There is no challenge to faith to which there isn't an answer from Christ. We just need to keep our eyes on Him, and when we lose sight, to refocus. This is why it is so important to belong to a church community. Because when we lose focus, there is someone in the community—a priest, a friend, someone in a ministry, or just someone in the pews—who can be a voice of encouragement. At a recent Orthodoxy 101 class, I was telling the participants that one of the most important ministries in a church community is that of encouragement, and recognizing when someone has stopped coming. And to call that person, who most likely is having some challenge to faith, and encourage them to come back. This is one of the most important, and also the most overlooked ministry in the church. Please know that I am praying for you as you face your challenges to faith. Please pray for me, as I still have challenges in my faith.

Many people think that Jesus asking Peter "Why did you doubt?" was a voice of admonition and disappointment. The answer to that question is "Because I am human and got distracted." The follow up question could have been, "then why did you leave the boat in the first place, and why when you were sinking did you cry out 'Lord'?" The answer to that is "Because I have faith." Being a Christian doesn't mean we don't have challenges. It means that when we have challenges, we still move forward with faith.

Lord, thank You for the compassion that You showed to St. Peter - Your voice of encouragement that beckoned him to come to You in the storm, and Your voice of reassurance when You raised him up from the stormy sea as it engulfed him.

Please be a voice of encouragement to me in the storms of my life.

Be a voice of reassurance when I succumb to challenges to faith and take my eyes off of You that there is always a way back.

Help me to be a voice of encouragement and reassurance for others.

Be the source of comfort in the times when I feel challenged in my faith, and be the source of joy and confidence that helps me overcome the challenges.

To Him be the glory, the dominion and the power, to the ages of ages.

# Triodion – Forgiveness Sunday – Cheesefare Sunday 2 March

The Holy Fathers have appointed the commemoration of Adam's exile from the Paradise of delight, here, on the eve of the holy Forty-day Fast, demonstrating to us not by simple words, but by actual deeds, how beneficial fasting is for man, and how harmful and destructive are insatiety and the transgressing of the divine commandments.

For the first commandment that God gave to man was that of fasting, which the first-fashioned received but did not keep; and not only did they not become gods, as they had imagined, but they lost even that blessed life which they had, and they fell into corruption and death, and transmitted these and innumerable other evils to all of mankind.

The God-bearing Fathers set these things before us today, that by bringing to mind what we have fallen from, and what we have suffered because of the insatiateness and disobedience of the first-fashioned, we might be diligent to return again to that ancient bliss and glory by means of fasting and obedience to all the divine commands.

Taking occasion from the Gospel of Matthew 6:14-21 to begin the Fast unencumbered by enmity, we also ask forgiveness this day, first from God, then from one another and all creation.



# Clean Monday / Kathara Deftera

#### 3 March

Today we begin the 40-day Lenten Fast with a strict fast from meat, fish, oil, wine, dairy, and eggs.

O Lord and Master of my life! Take from me the spirit of sloth, faintheartedness, lust of power, and idle talk. (prostration and +)

But give rather the spirit of purity, humility, patience and love to Your servant. (prostration and +)


Yes, O Lord and King! Grant me to see my own errors and not to judge my brothers and sisters. For You are blessed to ages of ages. Amen. (prostration and +)

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# **Sunday of Orthodoxy**

# 9 March

For more than one hundred years the Church of Christ was troubled by the persecution of the Iconoclasts of evil belief, beginning in the reign of Leo the Isaurian (717-741) and ending in the reign of Theophilus (829-842). After Theophilus's death, his widow the Empress Theodora (celebrated February 11), together with the Patriarch Methodius (June 14), established Orthodoxy anew. This ever-memorable Queen venerated the icon of the Mother of God in the presence of the Patriarch Methodius and the other confessors and righteous men, and openly cried out these holy words: "If anyone does not offer relative worship to the holy icons, not adoring them as though they were gods, but venerating them out of love as images of the archetype, let him be anathema." Then with common prayer and fasting during the whole first week of the Forty-day Fast, she asked God's forgiveness for her husband. After this, on the first Sunday of the Fast, she and her son, Michael the Emperor, made a procession with all the clergy and people and restored the holy icons, and again adorned the Church of Christ with them. This is the holy deed that all we the Orthodox commemorate today, and we call this radiant and venerable day the Sunday of Orthodoxy, that is, the triumph of true doctrine over heresy.




# Sunday of St. Gregory Palamas

# 16 March

This divine Father, who was from Asia Minor, was from childhood reared in the royal court of Constantinople, where he was instructed in both religious and secular wisdom. Later, while still a youth, he left the imperial court and struggled in asceticism on Mount Athos, and in the Skete at Beroea. He spent some time in Thessalonica being treated for an illness that came from his harsh manner of life. He was present in Constantinople at the Council that was convened in 1341 against Barlaam of Calabria, and at the Council of 1347 against Acindynus, who was of like mind with Barlaam; Barlaam and Acindynus claimed that the grace of God is created. At both these Councils, the Saint contended courageously for the true dogmas of the Church of Christ, teaching in particular that divine grace is not created, but is the uncreated energies of God which are poured forth throughout creation: otherwise it would be impossible, if grace were created, for man to have genuine communion with the uncreated God. In 1347 he was appointed Metropolitan of Thessalonica.

He tended his flock in an apostolic manner for some twelve years, and wrote many books and treatises on the most exalted doctrines of our Faith; and having lived for a total of sixty-three years, he reposed in the Lord in 1359.

His holy relics are kept in the Cathedral of Thessalonica. A full service was composed for his feast day by Patriarch Philotheus in 1368, when it was established that his feast be celebrated on this day. Since works without right faith avail nothing, Orthodoxy of faith is the foundation of all that we accomplish during the Fast, celebrating the Triumph of Orthodoxy the Sunday prior and the great defender of teachings of Holy Fathers on this day.



# Sunday of the Holy Cross

#### 23 March

With the help of God, we have almost reached the middle of the course of the Fast, where our strength has been worn down through abstinence, and the full difficulty of the labor set before us becomes apparent. Therefore our holy Mother, the Church of Christ, now brings to our help the all-holy Cross, the joy of the world, the strength of the faithful, the staff of the just, and the hope of sinners, so that by venerating it reverently, we might receive strength and grace to complete the divine struggle of the Fast.



#### **Annunciation of the Theotokos**

#### 25 March

Six months after John the Forerunner's conception, the Archangel Gabriel was sent by God to Nazareth, a town of Galilee, unto Mary the Virgin, who had come forth from the Temple a mature maiden (see Nov. 21). According to the tradition handed down by the Fathers, she had been betrothed to Joseph four months.

On coming to Joseph's house, the Archangel declared: "Rejoice, thou Full of Grace, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women." After some consideration, and turmoil of soul, and fear because of this greeting, the Virgin, when she had finally obtained full assurance concerning God's unsearchable condescension and the ineffable dispensation that was to take place through her, and believing that all things are possible to the Most High, answered in humility: "Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to thy Word."

And at this, the Holy Spirit came upon her, and the power of the Most High overshadowed her all-blameless womb, and the Son and Word of God, Who existed before the ages, was conceived and became flesh in her immaculate body (Luke 1:26-38).

Bearing in her womb the Uncontainable One, the blessed Virgin went with haste from Nazareth to the hill country of Judea, where Zacharias had his dwelling; for she desired to find Elizabeth her kinswoman and rejoice together with her, because, as she had learned from the Archangel, Elizabeth had conceived in her old age. Furthermore, she wished to tell her of the great things that the Mighty One had been well-pleased to bring to pass in her, and she greeted Elizabeth and drew nigh to her. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, she felt her six-month-old babe, jump in her womb.

Saint John the Baptist, prophesied of the dawning of the spiritual Son. Immediately, the aged Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and recognized her as the Mother of her Lord. The Virgin also, moved by a supernatural rejoicing in the spirit, glorified her God and Savior, saying: "My soul doth magnify the Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Savior," Luke 1:39-55




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# Sunday of St. John Climacus

#### 30 March

The memory of this Saint is celebrated on March 30, where his biography may be found. He is celebrated today because his book, The Ladder of Divine Ascent, is a sure guide to the ascetic life, written by a great man of prayer experienced in all forms of the monastic polity; it teaches the seeker after salvation how to lay a sound foundation for his struggles, how to detect and war against each of the passions, how to avoid the snares laid by the demons, and how to rise from the rudimental virtues to the heights of Godlike love and humility. It is held in such high esteem that it is universally read in its entirety in monasteries during the Great Fast.





Lord, You have said that You are the way and the truth and the life.

You know the truth about me.

Deep down I know the truth about me.

I know that there is a gap between who I want to be and who I really am.

Help me to have the wisdom, the humility, the patience and the discipline to close that gap, so that I can be not only the person I want to be, but to especially be the person You want me to be.
