

Message from Father Peter

Beloved Parishioners:

What is the most precious gift you have ever received? For Christians, two gifts rank as the most important gifts we can receive - the **gift of Christ** and the **gift of the Spirit**. Most frequently we talk about the gift of Christ. A verse we probably quote the most is John 3:16: "For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son." But the gift of the Spirit also has tremendous significance for the life of the Church as well as our personal lives.

Christ taught that if earthly fathers like to give gifts to their children, "how much more, then, will the Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask Him" (Luke 11:13). When Christ was speaking to His disciples, of His departure from the world, He promised them the gift of the Spirit as the Paraclete (Advocate, Comforter, Helper, and Guide, (John 14:16,26; 15:26; 16:7). The Father gives the Spirit. Christ also in His divine nature gives the Spirit. "And I myself will send upon you what my Father has promised. But you must wait in the city until the power from above comes down upon you" (Luke 24:49). The apostles could carry on Christ's mission only by being empowered by the Holy Spirit.

The Church Fathers and Saints have much to say about the person and work of the Holy Spirit. St. Basil taught that the whole life of the Church was energized and guided by the Spirit. St. Symeon the New Theologian spoke of the necessity of a new birth, a "second baptism" of the Holy Spirit as the real basis of adult Christian life, particularly for those Christians who have covered over baptismal grace with many sins. St. Seraphim of Sarov used to say that acquiring the Holy Spirit is the main goal of Christian life and that by acquiring the Spirit thousands of others are converted.

Let me conclude with a beautiful prayer (hymn) which describes the gifts of Christ and the Holy Spirit after His glorious Resurrection:

In the latter times, late in the evening of the Sabbath, You came and stood amidst Your friends O Christ, and by wondrous deeds, the entrance doors being closed,

You confirmed the miracle of Your Resurrection from the dead.

And you filled the disciples with joy.

You gave them the Holy Spirit and dispensed to them the power of forgiveness of sins.

And You did not leave Thomas to be overcome by turbulent waters of unbelief.

Therefore, O Merciful Lord grant us also true knowledge and forgiveness of our transgressions.

Amen.



HOLY COMMUNION PROCEDURE

For the benefit of our Sunday School students, their teachers and the TIMELY start of their Sunday School Classes please all the children to receive Holy Communion first.

- Please remain standing while following the directions of the ushers.
- The ushers will release the children by pew from Front to Back.
- Only parents of the smallest, youngest Sunday School children, who need assistance, should receive Holy Communion with their children.
- If you are not in a pew when Holy Communion begins, please quietly find a spot in the back rows. Your children will be released in turn.
- Please do not attempt to send your children down the side aisles to the front alone or down the center aisle.
- After all children have received, the ushers will release the adults, again from the front pews.
- Please cooperate with our ushers. Please do not ask to be allowed to proceed ahead of others or enter the center aisle ahead of the pews in front of you.
- When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name) and naturally receive as if being fed.
- Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see your priest if you have any questions.





Church Etiquette

When are we NOT to enter the Nave of the Church?

As we are entering God's Home, we must always keep in mind that during the following times, we should NOT enter the Nave of the Church nor come to the front of the Church to light a votive candle:

During the Small Entrance (when the procession with the Gospel takes place)

During the Epistle Reading

During the Gospel Reading

When the priest is censing and is facing the Congregation

During the Great Entrance (when the procession of the Holy Gifts takes place)

When the priest is blessing the Congregation

During the recitation of the Nicene Creed ("I believe...")

During the Consecration of the Holy Gifts

During the recitation of the Lord's Prayer ("Our Father...")

During the Priest's sermon

Also, during these times, we should avoid leaving the Nave unless it is for family needs, medical or some other necessary reason. If you are unsure when to enter or leave the church, ask a Parish Council member in the Narthex.

While in the Church, remember to...

Wear appropriate attire to enter God's House

Silence your mobile devices

Refrain from chewing gum, mints, or candy


Remove lipstick when receiving Holy Communion & when venerating & kissing the icons

Follow the direction of the Priest for standing & sitting

Maintain quiet in the Sanctuary

Enter God's House with reverence and respect

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Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis

Lord, how manifold are Thy works!

In wisdom hast Thou made them all; the earth is full of Thy creatures.

Psalm 104:24

The distractions and disappointments of life can sometimes leave us wondering **if there is a God?** Most of us are surrounded by man-made things all day long. In my office right now, I am surrounded with computers designed by people, furniture built by people, books written by people, and in a building constructed by people. Out my window I see other buildings as well as cars. I see only a sliver of sky. Surrounded by man-made things, it would be easy to see man as the center of the universe.

One great place to connect with God is in nature. Get away from all the man-made stuff for a little while and experience a natural environment. Put your feet in the ocean. Who made the water? How did it get cold? How did waves start? Look at the stars. There are more than we can count. Who put them there? Who created clouds? Who made rain? Who created planets? Who decided that the earth should rotate, or that the sun would shine in the day and the moon at night?

Once we start to look at these and a myriad of other questions that come from experiencing nature, we will quickly realize that no human being could have created all of these things. A human being can build a house, but he can't make a star. A human being can write a book, but he can't make a tall mountain. A human being can create a fan, but can't make wind gust over an entire city. Once we place God at the center of creation, as its Creator, then we can find our proper place in creation, which is that we are not the center. He is. And if He is the center, then it should be Him that we serve. We should revolve around Him. Many times we design our lives so that God fits into them, rather than us fitting around Him.

One of the best ways to have an experience of God is to get away from all the man-made, man-focused stuff and get around God's stuff. Spend some time in nature. Look at the intricacies of the plants and flowers, of trees and bushes. Look at mountains, gaze at the stars. Our cities often don't afford us a good look at the stars. So make it a point at least once a year to go someplace far from a city and enjoy nature, in as pure of a form as you can. And while in the city, in our busy life, take time to appreciate nature. This can be as simple as smelling the fragrance of flowers. Or holding some soil in your hand. Or appreciating the coolness of water.



Psalm 104, the Psalm from which today's verse comes, is sometimes called "The Psalm of Creation." It is read at Vespers each night, as one day ends and a new one begins. It reminds us that our beginning came from God our Creator. When I have to a chance to be in nature, I often find myself saying today's verse over and over again:

How great are Your works o Lord!

In wisdom You have made them all!

Make it a point to get out into nature as often as possible. For in nature we not only see beauty, but we see God. In nature we get away from our mentality that "we are the center of the universe" and again rediscover Who God is the Creator of the Universe.

May the glory of the Lord endure forever;

May the Lord rejoice in His works, who looks on the earth and it trembles, who touches the mountains and they smoke!

I will sing to the Lord as long as I live;

I will sing praise to my God while I have being.

May my meditation be pleasing to Him, for I rejoice in the Lord.

Let sinners be consumed from the earth, and let the wicked be no more!



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Saints & Feasts

Cosmas & Damian, Unmercenaries

1 July

These Saints, who are different from those who are celebrated on the 1st of November, were from Rome. They were physicians, freely bestowing healing upon beasts and men, asking nothing from the healed other than that they confess and believe in Christ. They ended their life in martyrdom in the year 284, under the Emperors Carinus and Numerian.



Kyriaki the Great Martyr

7 July

Saint Kyriaki was the daughter of Christian parents, Dorotheus and Eusebia. She was given her name because she was born on Sunday, the day of the Lord (in Greek, Kyriaki). She contested in Nicomedia during the reign of Diocletian, in the year 300. After many bitter torments she was condemned to suffer beheading, but being granted time to pray first, she made her prayer and gave up her holy soul in peace.



Euphemia the Great Martyr

11 July

In 451, during the reign of the Sovereigns Marcian and Pulcheria, the Fourth Ecumenical Council was convened in Chalcedon against Eutyches and those of like mind with him. After much debate, the Fathers who were the defenders of Orthodoxy, being 630 in number, agreed among themselves and with those who were of contrary mind, to write their respective definitions of faith in separate books, and to ask God to confirm the truth in this matter. When they had prepared these texts, they placed the two tomes in the case that held Saint Euphemia's relics, sealed and departed. After three daus of supplications, they opened the reliquary in the presence of the Emperor,



Saint Olga, Equal to the Apostles

11 July

Saint Olga, renowned for her wisdom and sobriety, in her youth became the wife of Igor, Great Prince of Kiev, who ruled during the tenth century. After her husband's death, she herself ruled capably, and was finally accepted the Faith of Christ. She traveled to Constantinople to receive Holy Baptism. The Emperor, seeing her outward beauty and inward greatness, asked her to marry him. She said she could not do this before she was baptized; she asked him to be her Godfather at the font, which he agreed to do. After she was baptized the Emperor repeated his proposal of marriage. She answered that now he was her father, through holy Baptism, it was unheard of for a man to marry his daughter. Gracefully accepting to be outwitted by her, he sent her back to her land with priests and sacred texts and holy icons. Her son Suyatoslav remained a pagan, but she planted the seed of faith in her grandson Vladimir. She reposed in peace in 969.



Marina Holy & Great Martyr

17 July

This Martyr lived during the reign of Claudius II (268-270). She was from Pisidia of Cilicia and was the only daughter of a certain priest of the idols. On being orphaned by her mother, she was handed over to a certain woman who instructed her in the Faith of Christ. When she was fifteen years old, she was apprehended by the ruler of Olmbrius, and when asked her name, homeland, and faith, she answered: "My name is Marina; I am the offspring of the Pisidia; I call upon the Name of my Lord Jesus Christ." Because of this she endured bonds, imprisonment, and many whippings, and was finally beheaded in the year 270. Saint Marina is especially invoked for deliverance from demonic possession.



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Glorious Prophet Elias (Elijah)

20 July

Elias of great fame was from Thisbe, a town beyond the Jordan. He was of priestly lineage, a man of a solitary and ascetical character, clothed in a mantle of sheep skin, and girded about his loins with a leather belt. His name means "Yah is my God." His zeal for the glory of God was compared to fire, and his speech for teaching and rebuke was likened unto a burning lamp. From this too he received the name Zealot.

Therefore, set aflame with such zeal, he sternly reproved the impiety and lawlessness of Ahab and his wife Jezebel. He shut up heaven by means of prayer, and it did not rain for three years and six months. Ravens brought him food for his need when, at God's command, he was hiding by the torrent of Horrath. He multiplied the little flour and oil of the poor widow of Sarephtha of Sidon, who had given him hospitality in her home, and when her son died, he raised him up. He brought down fire from Heaven upon Mount Carmel, and it burned up the sacrifice offered to God before all the people of Israel, that they might know the truth. At the torrent of Kisson, he slew 450 false prophets and priests who worshipped idols and led the people astray. He received food wondrously at the hand of an Angel, and being strengthened by this food he walked for forty days and forty nights.

He beheld God on Mount Horeb, as far as this is possible for human nature. He foretold the destruction of the house of Ahab, and the death of his son Ohozias; and as for the two captains of fifty that were sent by the king, he burned them for their punishment, bringing fire down from Heaven.

He divided the flow of the Jordan, and he and his disciple Elisseus passed through as it were on dry land; and finally, while speaking with him, Elias was suddenly snatched away by a fiery chariot in the year 895 B.C., and he ascended as though into heaven, whither God most certainly translated him alive, as He did Enoch.

But from thence also, after seven years, by means of an epistle he reproached Joram, the son of Josaphat, as it is written:

"And there came a message in writing to him from Elias the Prophet, saying, Thus saith the Lord God of David thy father, Because thou hast not walked in the way," and so forth (II Chron. 21:12).

According to the opinion of the majority of the interpreters, this came to pass either through his disciple Elisseus, or through another Prophet when Elias appeared to them, even as he appeared on Mount Tabor to the disciples of Christ.



Mary Magadelene, the Holy Myrrh Bearer, Equal to the Apostles

22 July

Saint Mary was from Magdala in Galilee on the Sea of Tiberias, and for this was named Magdalene. When the Lord Jesus cast out seven demons from her, she became His faithful disciple, following Him and ministering unto Him even to the time of His crucifixion and burial. Then, returning to Jerusalem together with the rest of the Myrrh-bearers, she prepared the fragrant spices for anointing the body of the Lord. And on the Lord's day they came very early to the tomb, even before the Angels appeared declaring the Resurrection of the Lord. When Mary Magdalene saw the stone taken away from the tomb, she ran and proclaimed it to Peter and John. And returning immediately to the tomb and weeping outside, she was deemed worthy to be the first of the Myrrh-bearers to behold the Lord arisen from the dead, and when she fell at His feet, she heard Him say, "Touch Me not." After the Lord's Ascension, nothing certain is known concerning her. Some accounts say that she went to Rome and later returned to Jerusalem, and from there proceeded to Ephesus, where she ended her life, preaching Christ. "Madeleine" is a form of Magdalene.



Saint Christina

24 July


Saint Christina was from Tyre in Syria, the daughter of a pagan named Urban. Enlightened in her heart to believe in Christ, she broke her father's idols, made of gold and silver, and distributed the pieces to the poor. When her father learned this, he punished her ruthlessly, then cast her into prison. The rulers subjected her to imprisonments, hunger, torments, the cutting off of her breasts and tongue, and finally impalement, in the year 200, during the reign of the Emperor Septimius Severus.



Dormition of Saint Anna, mother of Theotokos

25 July

According to tradition, Anna, the ancestor of God, lived for sixty-nine years, and her spouse Joachim, for eighty: according to one account, Saint Joachim died two years before Saint Anna. The Theotokos had been orphaned of both her parents already when she was eleven years of age, when she was living in the Temple. Saint Anna is invoked for conceiving children, and for help in difficult childbirth.



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Saint Paraskeve

26 July


Saint Paraskeve, who was from a certain village near Rome, was born to pious parents, Agatho and Politia. Since she was born on a Friday (in Greek, Paraskeve), she was given this name, which means "preparation" or "preparedness" (compare Matt. 27:62, Mark 15:42, Luke 23:54, and John 19:31, where 'Friday' is called "the day of the preparation"). From childhood she was instructed in the sacred letters and devoted herself to the study of the divine Scriptures, while leading a monastic life and guiding many to the Faith of Christ. During the reign of the Emperor Antoninus Pius, she was apprehended because she was a Christian and was urged to worship the idols, but she answered with the words of Jeremias: "Let the gods that have not made heaven and the earth perish from off the earth" (Jer. 10:11). Because of this she endured exceedingly painful torments, and was beheaded year 140. The faithful pray to her for the healing of eye ailments.




Panteleimon, Great Martyr and Healer

27 July

This Saint, who had Nicomedia as his homeland, was the son of Eustorgius and Eubula. His father was an idolater, but his mother was a Christian from her ancestors. It was through her that he was instructed in piety, and still later, he was catechized and baptized in the Faith of Christ by Saint Hermolaus baptized by him. Being proficient in the physician's vocation, he practiced in a philanthropic manner, healing every illness more by the grace of Christ than by medicines. Thus, although his parents had named him Pantoleon ("in all things a lion"), because of the compassion he showed for the souls and bodies of all, he was worthily renamed Panteleimon, meaning "all-merciful." On one occasion, when he restored the sight of a certain blind man by calling on the Divine Name, he enlightened also the eyes of this man's soul to the knowledge of the truth. This also became the cause for the martyrdom of him who had been blind, since when he was asked by whom and in what manner his eyes had been opened. As did the blind man of the Gospel, this man confessed with boldness to both who the physician was and the manner of his healing. For this he was put to death immediately. Panteleimon was arrested also, and having endured many wounds, he was finally beheaded in the year 305, during the reign of Maximian.
