


## Message from Father Peter

Let us Pray: Christ our God, Your kingdom is an everlasting one and your lordship is over all. You have made all things with wisdom and have established proper times and seasons for our lives. We give thanks to You in all circumstances and for all things. Lord bless the beginning of the Church year with Your goodness. Grant that this liturgical year be for all of us a year of grace. Make us worthy with purity of heart always to praise you. Lord glory to you! Matin Hymn, September 1.

Do you know why the first day of September marks the beginning of the Church year? We are accustomed to think of January 1st as the beginning of the year. But the tradition of computing the start of a new year with the fall season was common to the lands of the Bible, and to all the lands around the Mediterranean. The summer harvest was at an end, the crops were stored, and people prepared for a new agricultural cycle. It was an appropriate time to begin a new year.

The prayers and hymns of the Orthodox Church not only recite the wonderful works of God in creation and history for our salvation but also frequently offer guidance about how to make each year a year of grace, a year of the Lord. For example, the very first hymn of the liturgical year, chanted at Vespers in the joyful first tone, reminds us that prayerful daily dependence on God is the basic attitude of the Christian life. This hymn is also interesting because it refers to another key passage in the Bible and addresses all the Orthodox faithful.

O faithful, having learned true prayer from the very words and divine teachings of Christ, let us cry out to the Creator each day: *Our Father, who dwells in heaven, give us always daily bread, and forgive us our transgressions.* Of course the prayer in the Bible this hymn is referring to is the **Lord's Prayer**.

As we pray the Lord's Prayer daily, allow me to also offer a meditation for us all to reflect on, as we begin the new Church ecclesiastical year: Prayerful daily dependence on God sanctifies every moment of the day, whether we are at work, at play, at rest or in difficulty; it fills it with the presence of God and makes it God's moment. Reflect on this passage and concentrate on making a difference in your life this year through prayerful daily dependence on God.

As a community, refreshed from a restful summer, we are ready to begin our new Church year. We have numerous programs and ministries available to receive God's grace and grow in our faith. Our annual Greek Festival is also upon us. Come to church, participate, sign up with our ministries, participate in our Festival, in fact come to Church often and take part in the full life of the Church! Make this new Church year the very best it can be for us as individuals and as a spiritual family. Experience God's love and grace through this beautiful community, which He continues to greatly bless.





#### HOLY COMMUNION PROCEDURE

For the benefit of our Sunday School students, their teachers and the TIMELY start of their Sunday School Classes please all the children to receive Holy Communion first.

- Please remain standing while following the directions of the ushers.
- The ushers will release the children by pew from Front to Back.
- Only parents of the smallest, youngest Sunday School children, who need assistance, should receive Holy Communion with their children.
- If you are not in a pew when Holy Communion begins, please quietly find a spot in the back rows. Your children will be released in turn.
- Please do not attempt to send your children down the side aisles to the front alone or down the center aisle.
- After all children have received, the ushers will release the adults, again from the front pews.
- Please cooperate with our ushers. Please do not ask to be allowed to proceed ahead of others or enter the center aisle ahead of the pews in front of you.
- When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name) and naturally receive as if being fed.
- Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see your priest if you have any questions.

The August 12th meeting of the VIPs was called to order by President Irene Albeck at 11:00 am with an opening prayer led by Staurula Kiotas.

With her decades-long experience in the religious education of our children and grand children, Irene began her report with a passionate plea that we VIPs as grandparents should make a concerted effort to see that our grandchildren are brought to church to be exposed and to learn about our Orthodox faith. 





## **Church Etiquette**

When are we NOT to enter the Nave of the Church?

As we are entering God's Home, we must always keep in mind that during the following times, we should NOT enter the Nave of the Church nor come to the front of the Church to light a votive candle:

During the Small Entrance (when the procession with the Gospel takes place)

During the Epistle Reading

During the Gospel Reading

When the priest is censing and is facing the Congregation

During the Great Entrance (when the procession of the Holy Gifts takes place)

When the priest is blessing the Congregation

During the recitation of the Nicene Creed ("I believe...")

During the Consecration of the Holy Gifts

During the recitation of the Lord's Prayer ("Our Father...")

During the Priest's sermon

Also, during these times, we should avoid leaving the Nave unless it is for family needs, medical or some other necessary reason. If you are unsure when to enter or leave the church, ask a Parish Council member in the Narthex.

While in the Church, remember to...

Wear appropriate attire to enter God's House

Silence your mobile devices

Refrain from chewing gum, mints, or candy


Remove lipstick when receiving Holy Communion & when venerating & kissing the icons

Follow the direction of the Priest for standing & sitting

Maintain quiet in the Sanctuary

Enter God's House with reverence and respect

#### Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis

#### Faith Can Move a Mountain

And when they came to the crowd, a man came up to Jesus and kneeling before Him said, "Lord, have mercy on my son, for he is an epileptic and he suffers terribly; for often he falls into the fire, and often into the water. And I brought him to your disciples, and they could not heal him." And Jesus answered, "O faithless and perverse generation, how long am I to be with you? How long am I to bear with you? Bring him here to Me." And Jesus rebuked him, and the demon came out of him, and the boy was cured instantly. Then the disciples came to Jesus privately and said, "Why could we not cast it out?" He said to them, "Because of your little faith. For truly, I say to you, if you have faith as a grain of mustard seed, you will say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move; and nothing will be impossible to you." As they were gathering in Galilee, Jesus said to them, "The Son of man is to be delivered into the hands of men, & they will kill Him, & He will be raised on the third day."

Matthew 17:14-23 (Gospel from the Tenth Sunday of Matthew)

I remember growing up in my hometown of Whittier, California, on a clear day we could see the San Gabriel Mountains northeast of Los Angeles. In the summer they would be brown and in winter they would be covered in snow. I remember hearing today's Gospel passage when I was probably eight or nine, and I thought, maybe if I pray hard enough, I could pick up these mountains and move them, the same way that Luke Skywalker, a Jedi Knight in the Star Wars movies could move rocks by using his mind.

No matter how hard I tried, thought or prayed, the mountains never moved. Now that I'm older, when I read today's Gospel passage about faith moving mountains, I realize that this is a metaphor for life. The mustard seed is one of the smallest seeds there is, yet this seed produces one of the biggest trees. The lesson of this passage is that only a small amount of faith is needed to move a mountain. Notice the Gospel doesn't say we can move a whole mountain range. Faith can move mountains.

What kind of mountains are we talking about? Mountains in geography are found in "ranges." The Rocky Mountains split the United States into two pieces. East of the Rockies are the flat plains and west of them are the relatively flat states of Utah and Nevada. If you want to cross the United States, the journey is pretty easy until it comes time to pass through the mountains. Then the terrain gets steep and challenging. The idea of moving mountains means that with faith, we can clear aside or keep at bay the things that threaten our belief in God, our joy, our peace and our hope. Faith doesn't move mountain ranges, but it can certainly help in moving mountains, or getting over mountains.

Faith doesn't take care of all of life's circumstances. Faith doesn't necessarily make a poor person rich or make a sick person whole again. It doesn't necessarily save the old person from dying or get the young person into college. What faith does is it allows us to cope with the mountains we face by helping us to put life into perspective. The person of faith sees each challenge as a means to show God's glory on the path to salvation. The person of faith sees each day as a gift. The person of faith sees each setback as an opportunity to grow. The person of faith faces mountains, but never feels like he faces them alone. The person of faith feels the presence of God, walks with God in the valleys, and allows God to carry Him through the mountain passes. Faith helps us conquer mountains of stress and sadness, pain and anxiety.

One doesn't need to be a priest or a monk or a nun to be a person of faith. One doesn't need to memorize the Bible or sing in the choir or teach Sunday School. If a person has even the smallest amount of faith, as a grain of a mustard seed, they will have what they need to negotiate the mountains of this life, so that they can reach the fertile fields of Paradise.

Over my years of ministry, I've had the opportunity to meet many people who have had deep faith, even faith much deeper than my own. Not all of these people have had material success, in fact some were very poor. Not all of these people lived to see old age – in fact several have died young. But what their faith brought them was an ability to see God even in the challenges of the mountains of their lives. And to give glory to Him along the way to negotiating them. Faith indeed can move a mountain. And even faith as small as a grain of mustard seed is all you need to begin your journey to conquer your mountain.

Go at your mountain with faith today!

#### Beginning of the Ecclesiastical Year

#### September 01

Saint Constantine the Great introduced the Indiction decrees in 312A.D. after he beheld the sign of the Cross in heaven and was proclaimed Emperor in the West. Some, however (and this seems more likely), ascribe the institution of the Indiction to Augustus Caesar, three years before the birth of Christ. There are three types of Indictions:

- ◆That which was introduced in the West, and which is called Imperial, or Caesarean, or Constantinian, which begins on the 24th of September
- ◆The so-called Papal Indiction, which begins on the 1st of January
- •The Constantinopolitan, which was adopted by the Patriarchs of that city after the fall of the Eastern Empire in 1453. This Indiction is indicated in their own hand on the decrees they issue.

This Indiction begins on the **1st of September** and is observed with special ceremony in the Church. Since the completion of each year takes place, as it were, with the harvest and gathering of the crops into storehouses, and we begin the sowing of seed in the earth for the production of future crops, September is considered the beginning of the New Year.

The Church also keeps festival this day, beseeching God for fair weather, seasonable rains, and an abundance of the fruits of the earth. The Holy Scriptures (Lev. 23:24-5 and Num. 29:1-2) also testify that the people of Israel celebrated the feast of the Blowing of the Trumpets on this day, offering hymns of thanksgiving.

In addition to all the aforesaid, on this feast we also commemorate our Savior's entry into the synagogue in Nazareth, where He was given the book of the Prophet Esaias to read, and He opened it and found the place where it is written, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me, for which cause He hath anointed Me..." (Luke 4:16-30).

It should be noted that to the present day, the Church has always celebrated the beginning of the New Year on September 1. This was the custom in Constantinople until its fall in 1453 and in Russia until the reign of Peter I. September 1 is still festively celebrated as the New Year at the Patriarchate of Constantinople; among the Jews also the New Year, although reckoned according to a moveable calendar, usually falls in September.


The service of the Menaion for January 1 is for our Lord's Circumcision and for the memorial of Saint Basil the Great, without any mention of its being the beginning of a new year.



#### The Nativity of the Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary

#### September 08

According to the ancient tradition of the Church, the Theotokos was born of barren and aged parents, Joachim and Anna, about the year 16 or 17 before the birth of Christ. Joachim was descended from the royal line of David, of the tribe of Judah. Anna was of the priestly tribe of Levi, a daughter of the priest Matthan and Mary, his wife.

On the day following the Nativity of the most holy Theotokos, we celebrate the Synaxis of Saints Joachim and Anna, honoring them as her parents.



#### Exaltation of the Holy Cross / Saint Stauros

#### September 14

Saint Helen, the mother of Saint Constantine the Great, already advanced in years, undertook, in her great piety, the hardships of a journey to Jerusalem in search of the cross, about the year 325. After finding the Tomb of our Lord, and three crosses, it was believed that one must be that of our Lord, the other two of the thieves crucified with Him; but Saint Helen was at a loss which one might be the Wood of our salvation.

At the inspiration of Saint Macarius, Archbishop of Jerusalem, a lady of Jerusalem, who was already at the point of death from a certain disease, was brought to touch the crosses, and as soon as she came near the Cross of our Lord, she was made perfectly whole. Consequently, the precious Cross was lifted on high for all to venerate.



#### Sophia, Faith, Hope, Love

#### September 17

These Saints were from Italy and contested for the Faith about the year 126, during the reign of the Emperor Hadrian. Faith was twelve years old, Hope, ten, and Love, nine; each was tormented and then beheaded, from the eldest to the youngest. Their mother Sophia mourned at their grave for three days, where she also fell asleep in peace; because of her courageous endurance in the face of her daughters' sufferings, she is also counted a martyr. The name Sophia means "wisdom" in Greek; as for her daughters' names, Faith, Hope, and Love (Charity), they are Pistis, Elpis, and Agape in Greek.



#### Falling Asleep of Saint John the Theologian

#### September 26


This Apostle was from Bethsaida of Galilee, and was the son of Zebedee and Salome, and the brother of James the elder. First a fisherman by trade, he became an Apostle and the beloved Disciple of Christ. Only he of all the Disciples followed Him even to the Cross, and was entrusted with the care of our Savior's Mother, as it were another son to her, and a brother of Christ the Teacher.

After this, he preached throughout Asia Minor, especially in Ephesus. When the second persecution against the Christians began in the year 96 during the reign of Domitian, he was taken in bonds to Rome, and there was cast into a vat filled to the brim with boiling oil. Coming forth unharmed, he was exiled to the island of Patmos, where he wrote the Book of Revelation. Returning again to Ephesus after the death of the tyrant, he wrote his Gospel (after the other Evangelists had already written theirs) and his three Catholic Epistles.

In all, he lived ninety-five years and fell asleep in the Lord during the reign of Trajan in the year 100. He was called Theologian because he loftily expounded in his Gospel the theology of the inexpressible and eternal birth of the Son and Word of God the Father. It is for this cause that an eagle is a symbol of the Holy Spirit.

Saint Irenaeus says: It is depicted in his icon, for this was one of the four symbolic living creatures that the Prophet Ezekiel saw.
