

For forty days the Church seeks to prepare us for the true meaning of Christmas. Most of us need time to prepare for special events. It takes time to plan for a trip, a vacation, for entering college, for a baptism or wedding. We need time to anticipate, to prepare for the practical aspects, to think about their significance for us. With adequate preparation we enjoy these events much more.

During the liturgical year the Church has several periods of preparation prior to great feast days. The first such period begins on **November 15**, the **Christmas Fast**, which is not as strict as the Great Lent prior to Easter. For forty days we anticipate and prepare for the coming (**Advent**) of Christ into the world and into our lives.

Some practical advice for Advent:

As part of your preparation for Christmas.. resolve to give closer attention to the Word of God by reading for example, one chapter a day from the Gospels for the forty days of Advent. You might read the Gospels of Mark and Luke which together have forty chapters. Getting to know more about the life of Christ will make you appreciate more deeply the significance of His coming which we celebrate on Christmas. In your daily prayers include thanksgiving for the Lord's coming, invite Him to be at the center of your life and let your heart leap for joy as you meditate on God's gift of His Son to the world.

THE GOALS OF THE NATIVITY FAST & ADVENT

1. SEEING GOD. The first thing our church-traditions are helping us work on right now is our vision. More specifically, to behold or "see God" being born to us in Bethlehem. For this, my heart, mind, and body need a house-cleaning. The LORD said: "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." The fastingdiscipline. including attentiveness and tender-loving-care of my spiritual and physical health, helps me to re-focus on the presence of the tender-loving-and-caring of God in my life.

2. SPIRITUAL AWAKENING. I'm being awakened from my indifference and complacency to the Advent or coming of Christ into my world, and into my heart amidst the concerns and fears that creep into



me when I lose focus, lose God-reliance, and get self-reliant and self-centered. This spiritual awakening to God, others, and myself is helped through:

- 3. HUNGER & THIRST. The kind of hunger and thirst that the Prophets had for the coming of the Messiah, is one I re-embrace when we celebrate the Prophets and immerse ourselves in their prophecies this season. I turn away from my not-healthy desires and aspirations, either physical or spiritual, which infect me with the "More" Disease: always demanding "more" and never satisfied. This season I let myself join the blessed, those who are satisfied: "Blessed are they that hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied."
- **4. JOY & PEACE**. Joy takes work. Peace takes work. Ultimately, the bit of daily, consistent "work" on my spiritual and physical health this season frees me to experience true joy and peace, coming to all of us from an unexpected, unassuming place, a little cave in Bethlehem. I need to begin in my own little "cave." Let me take up this work today, as I clean house, that I may see more clearly the abundant Light pouring out on all of us from the most unexpected places: a cave in Bethlehem.

HOLY COMMUNION PROCEDURE

For the benefit of our Sunday School students, their teachers and the TIMELY start of their Sunday School Classes please all the children to receive Holy Communion first.

- Please remain standing while following the directions of the ushers.
- The ushers will release the children by pew from Front to Back.
- Only parents of the smallest, youngest Sunday School children, who need assistance, should receive Holy Communion with their children.
- If you are not in a pew when Holy Communion begins, please quietly find a spot in the back rows. Your children will be released in turn.
- Please do not attempt to send your children down the side aisles to the front alone or down the center aisle.
- After all children have received, the ushers will release the adults, again from the front pews.
- Please cooperate with our ushers. Please do not ask to be allowed to proceed ahead of others or enter the center aisle ahead of the pews in front of you.
- When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name) and naturally receive as if being fed.
- Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see your priest if you have any questions.

Church Etiquette

When are we NOT to enter the Nave of the Church?

As we are entering God's Home, we must always keep in mind that during the following times, we should NOT enter the Nave of the Church nor come to the front of the Church to light a votive candle:

During the Small Entrance (when the procession with the Gospel takes place)

During the Epistle Reading

During the Gospel Reading

When the priest is censing and is facing the Congregation

During the Great Entrance (when the procession of the Holy Gifts takes place)

When the priest is blessing the Congregation

During the recitation of the Nicene Creed ("I believe...")

During the Consecration of the Holy Gifts

During the recitation of the Lord's Prayer ("Our Father...")

During the Priest's sermon

Also, during these times, we should avoid leaving the Nave unless it is for family needs, medical or some other necessary reason. If you are unsure when to enter or leave the church, ask a Parish Council member in the Narthex.

While in the Church, remember to...

Wear appropriate attire to enter God's House

Silence your mobile devices

Refrain from chewing gum, mints, or candy

Remove lipstick when receiving Holy Communion & when venerating & kissing the icons


Follow the direction of the Priest for standing & sitting

Monthly Lesson from Father Stavros Akrotirianakis

The Fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control. Galatians 5:22-23

If we live by the Spirit, let us also walk by the Spirit. Galatians 5:25

I'm a nice jerk. I'm a truthful liar. Can these be true statements? It would seem not. Either a person is classified as "nice" or as a "jerk." Someone either tells the truth all the time or they are a liar.

As Orthodox Christians, we were given the gift of the Holy Spirit at Chrismation, and we continually receive the Holy Spirit through prayer and Holy Communion. Today's Scripture verse reminds us that if we claim to live by the Spirit, if we claim to be filled with the Holy Spirit, then our lives need to reflect this. How can we be "Spirit-filled" or "Spirit-led" or "Spirit-centered" if we lack **love**, **joy**, **peace**, **patience**, **kindness**, **goodness**, **faithfulness**, **gentleness and self-control**? Going back to yesterday's reflection, it's not an either/or proposition. Being filled with the Spirit means that we genuinely strive to grow the Fruit of the Spirit in us. We can't seek after or experience the power of the Holy Spirit without seeking to grow His Fruit. There are certainly points in every life, probably in every day of every life, that we are not loving, or patient, or kind or we lack self-control. We all have these moments. I have these moments.

How do you grade yourself on each of these Fruit? More importantly, how do you think God would grade you on these Fruit and how they are present in your life?

In school, an "A" was given for excellent, a "B" was good but had room for improvement, a "C" was average, a "D" was "passing," and an "F" was failing. If you were to give yourself a grade on how well what you say you believe falls in line with how you live your life, what kind of grade would you give yourself? What kind of grade do you think God would give you?

In Orthodox circles, we hear the term "spiritual warfare." While described in different ways, this essentially means that there is a battle for our souls waged between ourselves (who innately desire to be close to God) and the devil (who wishes us to be as far from God as possible). In practical terms, the battle is material (earthly) versus spiritual (heavenly), meaning that we wage a daily battle for the works of the flesh versus the Fruit of the Spirit. And yes, it is a battle. I don't know anyone who has won the battle and can just relax, filled with the Spirit with no concerns with temptation. I suppose there are some who have given up or are taking a break and letting the works of the flesh win. But there is no one who has won the battle for the Spirit over the flesh. It is a war we will fight until our dying breath.

In heaven, there will be only Spiritual Fruit. There won't be this battle, there will be no spiritual turmoil. However, in order to reach the Kingdom of Heaven, we have to fight this battle in our earthly life. We have to cultivate the Fruit in our life now, so that when the harvester (God) comes for us, He will find souls filled with good fruit, with Spiritual fruit, souls that are ready to enter His Kingdom and enjoy the Fruit of their labor.

Choosing to walk with the Spirit is a choice. And it is a choice we have to make daily. But we can't have it all - we can't be a "Spirit-filled" hater, or a Spirit-filled "peace taker" or a "Christ-centered kill joy" or an "out of control" dedicated Christian. Just like we can't make a right-left turn or take both forks in a road - we have to choose the path to salvation. If we say we "live by the Spirit" then we also must "walk by the Spirit." If we say we are a Christian, then we have to act the way a Christian is supposed to act.

Lord, thank You for the gift of Your Holy Spirit which I receive through prayer and worship.

Fill me with Your grace, so that I may grow in love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, faithfulness and self-control today.

Help me to have courage to live my Christian faith even in moments when others around me are encouraging me not to.

Help me to keep focus and to nurture the Fruit of Your Spirit in me, today and always.

Amen.

Let your **actions** reflect your Christian **faith!**



Have you ever felt trapped in a situation? Ever felt completely overwhelmed? Like there is literally no way out. The Gospel of Luke (*Luke 8: 26-39*) tells the story of the healing of a man possessed by demons. The demon-possessed man is healed by Jesus Who sent the demons into a herd of swine. The herd of swine rush down a steep bank and into the sea where they perish. This was a big blow to the economy of the region where people raise livestock. A herd of swine suddenly perishing would have created some economic strife for some of the citizens of that area who raised the swine as a business enterprise. Thus, the people of the town ask for Jesus to leave their area.

The man was tormented by demons. He was really trapped by them. How many of us are tormented by demons? Abusive relationships, substance abuse, financial crises, marital problems—all of these things that people are chained to, that rob people of dignity and worth and joy. The man wore no clothes. He was vulnerable and exposed, and consigned to living in the tombs. He was abandoned by family and friends showing further how tormented his life was. Again, it seems that in some way he represents all of us at times in our lives.

When the man saw Jesus, he seemed to recognize Him, questioning him "What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God?" (Luke 8:29) This is an early announcement of Jesus as the Son of God. Do WE recognize Jesus, the Son of God, here with us? Do we cry out to Him when we're lost or confused or beaten down? Do we expect to hear Him answer us? To heal us?

When the people saw the man clothed and sitting at the feet of Jesus, they probably wondered how their whole social order had been reversed. It was now the demon possessed man who was healed and sitting at the feet of the healer. And some of them, the farmers, had lost their herd of swine.

We know from Luke's account, the man who was healed begs Jesus to stay with Him. Jesus, however, tells the man not to stay with Him, telling him "Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you." (Luke 8:39) And the man went and did exactly that, telling the whole city what Jesus had done for him.

There are three lessons to be learned here:

First, the man asked Jesus to stay with him.

As I reflect on this, I wonder how often we ask Jesus to be with us. Some Christian denominations use the phrase "asking Jesus into your heart". That's not a phrase used in Orthodoxy. Nonetheless, in our prayers, we should invite Jesus to be with us. We should pray that we grow ever closer to Him. We should ask Him to guide our hearts, our thoughts and our actions.

The second lesson is that sometimes we think we are called to something and Jesus calls us to something else.

In this Gospel passage, the man had an overwhelming desire to stay with Jesus, perhaps join the group of disciples that was travelling with Jesus. However, Jesus told the man that this was not going to be his role. For this man, Jesus wanted him to tell those he met, presumably in his town, what Jesus had done for him. Most of us have had the disappointment of not getting a job we wanted, or a role in the school play, or the starting position on a sports team, or an office we had hoped to be elected or appointed to. When this happens, often we are so disappointed that we don't look for the proverbial "other door" that usually opens. Sometimes Jesus rejects OUR ideas because HE has a different plan for us. Have you asked Jesus what He wants from YOU? Have you listened to His answer? Have you sat at His feet and have you felt relief? Like the man, do you "beg" to be with Jesus.

The man didn't go away sulking that his request was not met. He did what Jesus asked him to do. He told everyone about Him.

Which bring us to the third lesson - being a Christian takes a lot of courage.

The man knew that Jesus wasn't popular. After all, the people of His own town asked Jesus to leave. So it was courageous for him to talk about Jesus. The challenge for us, in a modern world that is shutting out Jesus and Christianity, do we have the courage to talk about Him? Do you tell others all what Jesus has done for you?

Ask the Lord in prayer today to be close to you..

Take the opportunities He provides even if they were not the ones you were looking for..

Have courage in your Christianity!

Our Thoughts Determine our Lives: The Life and Teachings of Elder Thaddeus of Vitovnica" (1914-2003) On Repentance

We need repentance. You see, repentance is not only going to a priest and confessing. We must free ourselves from the obsession of thoughts. We fall many times during our life, and it is absolutely necessary to reveal everything [in Confession] before a priest who is a witness to Our repentance.

Repentance is the renewal of life. This means we must free ourselves of all our negative traits and turn toward absolute good. No sin is unforgivable except the sin of unrepentance.

There are many kinds of tears. Some people cry out of rage, some to spite another person, others because they have been offended. Some cry because they have lost a loved one. There are many kinds of tears. There are also **tears of repentance**, when a person's conscience tells him that he has committed many sins. When he realizes his sinfulness, he weeps. That is an act of God's Grace — a soul repents, and the sin is washed away by tears. Tears of repentance are a gift from God. When a person realizes his sinfulness, he gradually frees himself from the cares of this world and from his own egoism and leaves all his cares to the Lord. His soul is humbled, and when this occurs, it is in a state of Grace. Prayer requires a completely carefree life, for even the slightest worry disrupts our prayer, as the Holy Fathers say. Just as the slightest speck of dust can blur our vision, so, too, does the slightest worry interfere with our concentration in prayer.

When we are united with the Lord, then our soul is at peace and Grace descends upon us. A person who dwells in a state of Grace is ready to weep for anyone. He weeps when he sees the suffering of an animal, a plant, a person.... Such a person is always ready to shed tears for the whole world. That means that the Grace of God is in that person and that his tears are a gift from God. Those are tears that save. They bring a soul to perfection. Perfection cannot be achieved by worrying about the things of this world. The Lord has said that we are not to burden ourselves with food and drink and with the cares of this world.

All of us sin constantly. We slip and fall. We fall into traps set by the demons. The Holy Fathers and the saints always tell us, "It is important to get up immediately after a fall and to keep on walking toward God." Even if we fall a hundred times a day, it does not matter; we must get up and go on walking toward God without looking back. What has happened has happened. It was in the past. Just keep on going, all the while asking for help from God.

Remembering a sin we have committed does not mean that the sin has not been forgiven. This remembrance of our sins is only a warning to us lest we become proud and sin again. In fact, we - not God - are the ones who cannot forgive ourselves. We cannot forgive ourselves because of our pride. A genuine sign that a sin has been forgiven is the fact that it has not been repeated, and we are at peace. It is also important how we spend the last years of our lives. A God-pleasing life in old age blots out the sins of youth.

Cosmas and Damianos

1 November

These Saints were from Asia Minor. After the death of their father, their Christ -loving mother Theodota reared them in piety and in all manner of virtue and had them instructed in every science, especially that of medicine. This became their vocation, and they went about healing every illness and malady, bestowing healing freely on both men and beasts alike. Because of this, they are called "Unmercenaries" and thus, having completed the course of their life, they reposed in peace.



Synaxsis of Archangel Michael & other Bodiless Powers

8 November

All the Angels, according to the Apostle Paul, are ministering spirits, - sent forth to minister to them who shall be heirs of salvation - (Hebrews 1:14). God sent them as overseers of every nation and people and guides to that which is profitable (Deuteronomy 32:8); and while one Angel is appointed to oversee each nation as a whole, one is also appointed to protect each Christian individually. He commands them to guard those who hope on Him, that nothing should harm them, neither should any evil draw nigh to their dwelling (Psalms 90:10-12). In the Heavens they always behold the face of God, sending up to Him the thrice-holy hymn and interceding with Him on our behalf, seeing they rejoice over one sinner that repents (Matthew 18:10; Luke 15:7).

In a word, they have served God in so many ways for our benefit, that the pages of Holy Scripture are filled with the histories thereof. It is for these reasons that the Orthodox Church, wisely honoring these divine ministers, our protectors and guardians, celebrates today the present Synaxis that is, our coming together in assembly for their common feast to chant their praises, especially for the Archangels Michael and Gabriel, who are mentioned in the Scriptures by name.

The name Michael means "Who is like God?" and name Gabriel means "God is mighty." The number of Angels is not defined in the divine Scriptures, where Daniel says that thousands of thousands ministered before Him, and ten thousands of ten thousands attended upon Him (Daniel 7:10). But all of them are divided into nine orders which are called Thrones, Cherubim, Seraphim, Dominions, Powers, Authorities, Principalities, Archangels, and Angels.



Saint Nektarios

9 November


Saint Nektarios was born in Selyvria of Thrace on October 1, 1846. After putting himself through school in Constantinople he became a monk on Chios in 1876, receiving the monastic name of Lazarus. Because of his virtue, a year later he was ordained deacon, receiving the new name of Nektarios. Nektarios went to Athens to study in 1882. Completing his theological studies in 1885, he went to Alexandria, where he was ordained a priest in 1886 at the Cathedral of Saint Sabbas. In August of the same year, in the Church of Saint Nicholas in Cairo, he was ordained an Archimandrite. Archimandrite Nektarios showed much zeal both for preaching the word of God, and for the beauty of God's house. He greatly beautified the Church of Saint Nicholas in Cairo. Years later, when Nektarios was in Athens, Saint Nicholas appeared to him in a dream, embracing him and telling him he was going to exalt him very high.

In 1889, in the same Church of Saint Nicholas, Nektarios was consecrated Metropolitan of the Pentapolis in eastern Libya, which was under the jurisdiction of Alexandria. This office did not affect his modesty and childlike innocence, but it aroused the envy of lesser men, who slandered him. In 1890, Sophronius relieved Metropolitan Nektarios of his duties; in July of the same year, he commanded Nektarios to leave Egypt.

Without seeking to avenge or even to defend himself, the innocent Metropolitan left for Athens. Because his good name had been soiled, he was unable to find a position worthy of a bishop, and in February of 1891 accepted the position of provincial preacher in Euboia; then, in 1894, he was appointed Dean of the Rizarios Ecclesiastical School in Athens. Through his eloquent sermons, his generous alms deeds despite his own poverty, and the holiness, meekness and fatherly love that were manifest in him, he became a shining light and a spiritual guide to many.

At the request of certain pious women, in 1904 he began the building of his convent of the Holy Trinity on the island of Aegina while still Dean of the Rizarios School. Finding later that his presence there was needed, he took up his residence on Aegina in 1908, where he spent the last years of his life, devoting himself to the direction of his convent and to very intense prayer; he was sometimes seen lifted above the ground while rapt in prayer.

He became the protector of all Aegina, through his prayers, delivering the island from drought, healing the sick and casting out demons. Although he had already worked wonders in life, an innumerable multitude of miracles have been wrought after his repose in 1920 through his holy relics, which for many years remained incorrupt. There is hardly a malady that has not been cured through his prayers; but Saint Nektarios is especially renowned for his healings of cancer for sufferers in all parts of the world.



Saint John Chrysostom

13 November

This greatest and most beloved of all Christian orators was born in Antioch in the year 344; his pious parents were Secundus and Anthusa. After his mother was widowed at the age of twenty, she devoted herself to bringing up John and his elder sister in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. John received his literary training under Anthragathius the philosopher, and Libanius the sophist, who was the greatest Greek scholar and rhetorician of his day. Libanius was a pagan. With such a training, and with such gifts as he had by nature, John had before him a brilliant career as a rhetorician. But through the good example of his godly mother Anthusa and of the holy Bishop Meletius of Antioch, by whom he was ordained reader about the year 370, he chose instead to dedicate himself to God.

From the years 374 to 381 he lived the monastic life in the hermitages that were near Antioch. His extreme asceticism undermined his health. compelling him to return to Antioch, where Saint Meletius ordained him deacon about the year 381. Saint Meletius was called to Constantinople later that year to preside over the Second Ecumenical Council, during which he fell asleep in the Lord. In 386 Bishop Flavian ordained John presbyter of the Church of Antioch. Upon his elevation to the priesthood his career as a began, and his exceptional oratorical gifts were made public preacher manifest through his many sermons and commentaries. They are distinguished by their eloquence and the remarkable ease with which rich imagery and scriptural allusions are multiplied; by their depth of insight into the meaning of Scripture and the workings of God's providence; and not least of all, by their earnestness and moral force, which issue from the heart of a blameless and quileless man who lived first what he preached to others. Because of his fame, he was chosen to succeed Saint Nectarios as Patriarch of Constantinople. He was taken away by stealth, to avoid the opposition of the people, and consecrated Patriarch of Constantinople in 398, by Theophilus, Patriarch of Alexandria, who was to prove to be his mortal enemy.

At that time the Emperor of the East was Arcadius, who had had Saint Arsenius the Great as his tutor. Arcadius was a man of weak character, and much under the influence of his wife Eudoxia. The zealous and upright Chrysostom's unsparing censures of the lax morals in the imperial city stung through Theophilus' the vain Eudoxia: plottings collaboration, Saint John was banished to Pontus in 403. The people were in an uproar, and the following night an earthquake shook the city; this so frightened the Empress Eudoxia that she begged Arcadius to call Chrysostom back. While his return was triumphant, his reconciliation with the Empress did not last long. When she had a silver statue of herself erected in the forum before the Church of the Holy Wisdom (Saint Sophia) in 403, Saint John thundered against her, and she could not forgive him.

In June of 404 he was exiled to Cucusus, on the borders of Cilicia and Armenia. From here he exchanged letters with Pope Innocent of Rome, who sent bishops and priests to Constantinople requesting that a council be held. Saint John's enemies, dreading his return, prevailed upon the Emperor and had John taken to a more remote place of banishment called Pityus near the Caucasus. The journey was filled with bitter sufferings for the aged bishop, both because of the harshness of the elements and the cruelty of one of his 310 guards. He did not reach Pityus, but gave up his soul to the Lord near Comana in Pontus, at the chapel of the Martyr Basiliscus, who had appeared to him shortly before, foretelling the day of his death, which came to pass on September 14, 407. His last words were "Glory be to God for all things."

His holy relics were brought from Comana to Constantinople thirty-one years later by the Emperor Theodosius the Younger and Saint Pulcheria his sister, the children of Arcadius and Eudoxia, with fervent supplications that the sin of their parents against him be forgiven.

Saint John was surnamed Chrysostom ("Golden-mouth") because of his eloquence. He made exhaustive commentaries on the divine Scriptures and was the author of more works than any other Church Father, leaving us complete commentaries on the Book of Genesis, the Gospels of Saints Matthew and John, the Acts, and all the Epistles of Saint Paul. His extant works are 1,447 sermons and 240 epistles. Twenty-two teachers of the Church have written homilies of praise in his honor. Besides his feast day, he is celebrated as one of the Three Hierarchs on January 30, together with Saint Basil the Great and Saint Gregory the Theologian.

Saint Philip

14 November

Saint Philip one of the Twelve, was from Bethsaida of Galilee, and was a compatriot of Andrew and Peter. He was instructed in the teachings of the Law and devoted himself to the study of the prophetic books. Therefore, when the Lord Jesus called him to the dignity of apostleship, he immediately sought out and found Nathanael and said to him, "We have found Him of Whom Moses in the Law and the Prophets did write, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph" (John 1.45). Having preached Jesus the God-man throughout many parts of Asia Minor and having suffered many things for His Name's sake, he was finally crucified upside down in Hierapolis of Phrygia.



Advent Fast for the Feast of the Nativity

15 November - 24 December

In the Orthodox Church the Feast of Christmas is called "The Nativity". As with Pascha, the Feast of the Nativity begins with a period of preparation known as Advent or the Nativity Fast. It is proceeded by a fast corresponding to Lent and lasting for forty days. The fast begins on November 15, 40 days prior to the Birth of Christ.

The Nativity Fast is one of four main fast periods throughout the ecclesiastical year. Beginning on November 15 and concluding on December 24, the Nativity Fast gives individuals the opportunity to prepare for the Feast of the Nativity of Our Lord and Savior in the Flesh on December 25. By abstaining from certain food and drink, particularly from meat, fish, dairy products, olive oil, and wine, as well as focusing more deeply on prayer and almsgiving, we can find that the primary aim of fasting is to make us conscious of our dependence upon God.


As we go thru the next 40 days, let us reflect on how we can make ourselves better Christians. Let us change our habits for the next 40 days and focus on the true meaning of Thanksgiving and Christmas. Beginning with Christmas Day, the Feast of the Nativity is celebrated for twelve days of fast-free (except on January 5), culminating in the Feast of Epiphany on January 6.



Saint Matthew

16 November

Saint Matthew who was also called Levi, was the son of Alphaeus and had Galilee as his homeland. A publican before being called by Christ, he became one of the Twelve Apostles, and an Evangelist. While still in Palestine, he wrote his Gospel first in Hebrew, being also the first of all to write the Gospel. When he is depicted in icons, there is portrayed next to him the likeness of a man, one of the symbolic living creatures mentioned by Ezekiel (1.10), which, as Saint Irenaeus writes, is a symbol of our Savior's Incarnation.



Gregory the Wonderworker 17 November

Saint Gregory was born in Neocaesarea of Pontus to parents who were not Christians. He studied in Athens, in Alexandria, in Beirut, and finally for five years in Caesarea of Palestine under Origen, by whom he was also instructed in the Faith of Christ. Then, in the year 240, he became bishop of his own city, wherein he found only seventeen Christians. By the time the Saint reposed about the year 265, there were only seventeen unbelievers left there. Virtually the whole duration of his episcopacy was a time of continual, marvellous wonders worked by him. Because of this, he received the surname "Wonderworker"; even the enemies of the truth called him a second Moses.

21 November

According to the tradition of the Church, the Theotokos was brought to the Temple at three years of age, where she was consecrated to God and spent her days until she was fourteen or fifteen years old; and then, as a mature maiden, by the common counsel of the priests (since her parents had reposed some three years before), she was betrothed to Joseph.



Saint Katherine

25 November


Saint Katherine who was from Alexandria, was the daughter of Constas. She was an exceedingly beautiful maiden, most chaste and illustrious in wealth, lineage, and learning. By her understanding, she utterly vanquished the passionate and unbridled soul of Maximinus, the tyrant of Alexandria; and by her eloquence, she stopped the mouths of the so-called philosophers who had been gathered to dispute with her. She was crowned with the crown of martyrdom in the year 305. Her holy relics were taken by Angels to the holy mountain of discovered many years later: were monastery of Saint Katherine was originally dedicated to the Holy Transfiguration of the Lord and the Burning Bush, but later was dedicated to Saint Katherine. According to the ancient usage, Saints Katherine and Mercurius were celebrated on the 24th of this month, whereas the holy Hieromartyrs Clement of Rome and Peter of Alexandria were celebrated on the 25th. The dates of the feasts of these Saints were interchanged at the request of the Church and Monastery of Mount Sinai, so that the festival of Saint Katherine, their patron, might be celebrated more festively together with the Apodosis of the Feast of the Entry of the Theotokos.



Saint Andrew

30 November

Saint Andrew was from Bethsaida of Galilee; he was the son of Jonas and the brother of Peter, the chief of the Apostles. He had first been a disciple of John the Baptist; afterwards, on hearing the Baptist's witness concerning Jesus, when he pointed Him out with his finger and said, "Behold the Lamb of God, Which taketh away the sin of the world." (Book of John 1:29,36), he straightway followed Christ, and became His first disciple; wherefore he is called the First-called of the Apostles. After the Ascension of the Saviour, he preached in various lands; and having suffered many things for His Name's sake, he died in Patras of Achaia, where he was crucified on a cross in the shape of an "X," the first letter of "Christ" in Greek; this cross is also the symbol of Saint Andrew.

To generations of our descendants yet unknown to you, who some day in the dim and distant future will read this account of the dramatic history of the Hellenic community, we who have written this account not only on paper, but in the blood, sweat and tears of our daily lives make this statement:

We have built this community with its hopes and its fears, and its land and its buildings because we believe, as did our forefathers, in the soul's immortality, and its eventual union with God.

We believe that whether or not we have amassed a great deal of personal wealth or fame, it matters little, since we could not take that with us. What does matter is how we have discharged our obligation to pass on to you the faith and ideals that have sustained us through our lives... and we venture the hope that as you read these lines, you may breathe a prayer that what we have done here may have found favor in the eyes of God.

Pray for Your Enemies

God's goodness is shown to His enemies by His works. You should at least show your goodness towards them by your words: Pray for your enemies and in this way, at least, you will be like your Father in heaven who "is good to the ungrateful and the wicked" (Luke 6:35). How many times we have preached about this! And we will not stop preaching, no matter how annoyed you get. For we will never cease discoursing on these things until your conduct is agreeable to them.

Imitate God! If He wills that all people be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth, there is reason why one should pray for all. If He wills all to be saved, you should want it too. And if you want it, then pray for it; for wishes lead always to prayers. Observe how from ev-

ery quarter He urges this upon the soul, to pray for the heathen, showing how great advantages come from this. . . . And what is more, it is pleasing to God to do this, for in doing it we become Godlike since we will the very same things that God wills. This is enough to shame a dumb beast! Fear not therefore to pray for the unbelievers, for God Himself wills it. But fear only to pray against anyone; for this God forbids. And if you pray for the heathen, you ought, of course, to pray for the heretics also. For we are to pray for all people, and not to persecute. For we are of one human nature with all, and God commands and accepts good will and affection towards all.

St. John Chrysostom
